Traffic Laws

and YOU



LIGHTS AND REFLECTORS

All lighting devices required on a vehicle are required for day-time operation as well as at night.

All required lights must be lighted from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise and at other times when there is not sufficient light to see persons or vehicles 500 feet away.

Every motor vehicle (except motorcycles and motor scooters) shall be equipped with 2 head lamps, one on each side of the front. Not more than 4 front lamps shall be burning at the same time.

A motorcycle or a motor scooter is required to have at least one and not more than 2 head lamps to the front.

On motor vehicles with headlights equipped so that the driver may select a high or low beam, the low beam shall be used when the driver is within 500 feet of a vehicle he is meeting or 200 feet behind one he is following.

A new motor vehicle registered after January 1, 1948, having multiple-beam headlights shall be equipped with a beam indicator located so that it is visible to the driver.

Every motor vehicle shall be equipped with at least one tail lamp which shall emit a red light visible at least 500 feet to the rear.

A lamp separate or combined with the tail lamp shall illuminate with a white light the rear license plate so that it can be seen for 50 feet to the rear.

A new vehicle sold after January 1, 1948, shall be equipped with a stop light emitting a red or yellow light visible for 100 feet (day or night) which is turned on when the foot brake is applied.

New motor vehicle (except truck tractors) sold after January 1, 1948, must have on the rear 2 red reflectors. These reflectors may be in combination with the tail lamps.

Every trailer must have on the rear 2 red reflectors, a red tail light and a white license plate light. If a trailer or its load obstructs the view of the stop light on the towing vehicle, the trailer must also have a stop light.

A spot light must not be used on a motor vehicle when in sight of a vehicle approaching from the front with one exception: In case of failure of the headlights, the spot light may be used if the beam strikes the roadway not more than 50 feet ahead.

A motor vehicle may be equipped with a back-up light, but it shall not be lighted when the vehicle is moving forward.

Vehicles such as road machinery, farm tractors, animal-drawn vehicles and farm implements, when on a public highway at night are required to have burning a white light or lantern on the front and a red light or lantern on the rear visible from a distance of 500 feet.

Flashing lights (other than directional signals) are illegal except on emergency vehicles and school buses.

Red lights showing to the front are illegal, except on emergency vehicles.

Note: Additional lights or other equipment are required on buses, trucks and large trailers.

Cards & Dodgers To Play For League Championship

The Cardinals and Dodgers will play Tuesday night for the championship of the Babe Ruth League and on Friday night a Little League and Babe Ruth League All-Star Game will be played. This will complete the baseball season in Santa Anna.

The tie between the Cards and Dodgers came as the result of the Tuesday night game when the Cards beat the Braves by a 12-8 score. The Dodgers got off to a good start at the beginning of the season, but by mid-season had gone into a slump and never seemed to come out of it. They have lost just about all their games since mid-season. The Cards and Braves started winning at mid-season and have been neck-and-neck since that time.

The Cubs have had a bad season, but have given their opposition a close game most of the time. They have won only one game. Last Tuesday night the Cubs played the Cards a very close game, losing by only one score, 7-8.

Friday night the Braves took the Dodgers by a 7-3 score, to bring the tie between the winner of the Tuesday night game and the Dodgers.

New Texas Laws Go Into Effect

Austin — Things will be a bit different here and there, beginning this week. August 22 is the effective date for most of the hundreds of new laws passed by the 1957 Texas Legislature.

Scores of new laws will affect what you can and can't do from now on. Examples:

1. Manufacture, sale or use of dangerous fireworks are prohibited.
2. News reporters cannot be barred from precinct, county or state political conventions.
3. Parents will be liable for property destruction by their minor children.
4. Garages must report cars left over 30 days.
5. Dangerous substances, such as poisons, must be labeled.
6. Tuition fees at state colleges, beginning this fall, will be doubled.

Voters will have to return to the "scratch" method of marking ballots. No more putting an "X" before the name of the person to be voted for.

8. In future special elections for U. S. Senate or Congressman-at-Large, runoff will have to be held unless one man gets a majority vote in the first primary.

9. No more combination bonding-insurance companies, such as the late U. S. Trust and Guaranty, can be organized.

10. License plates will cost 10 per cent more from now on to provide more money to buy right of way for roads.

Negro Students Transferred To Coleman School

Supt. Cullen N. Perry announced this week that the State Board of Education has definitely closed the local Colored school and all the local Negro students will be transferred to Coleman. The Mozelle Negro students will also attend the Coleman Negro School.

This action was taken because the average daily attendance of the school dropped below the required 15 students per day.

Mrs. Minnie Alexander, who has been teaching the local Negro School for the past several years, has been employed by the Coleman School. She is attempting to make arrangements to live in Santa Anna and ride the bus with the local students to Coleman each day.

Under a new Texas law, before local schools can be desegregated, an election would have to be held with the majority of the voters favoring integration of the schools. In order for the election to be called, 20% of the qualified voters would have to sign a petition to call the election.

Thus, it is not likely that the local schools will be desegregated in the near future.

pose a threat to area control measures long after cotton has been plowed under as a preventive against insect build-ups.

This year, the Texas Legislature placed okra under the same controls that affect cotton and the Texas Department of Agriculture will provide supervisory measures to protect the cotton and okra crops.

of doing business with unknown or "traveling" fruit or vegetable buyers on a credit basis unless the buyer is licensed by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"Hot check" dealers and fly-by-night buying contractors or past seasons are experiencing a crack-down by the Department this year. An Agricultural Protective Act is now in force over the entire state requiring fruit and vegetable buyers to be licensed and bonded unless they operate on a cash basis.

Growers are urged to check an unknown buyer's TDA license before turning over their crops on a "pay-later" basis. Purchase agreements must be made in writing. A licensed buyer is a bonded buyer and the farmer is protected from bad checks or contract failures.

Penalties of up to \$1,000 fine and a year's jail sentence are provided to snuff out unscrupulous operators of years past.

TEXAS CITRUS ENTERS FLORIDA

A quarantine of more than 20 years' standing against the movement of Texas citrus fruit into Florida has been lifted.

Negotiations by the Texas Department of Agriculture succeeded in removing the barriers which had shut off an important market for state products. Florida citrus has been sold in Texas during most of the nearly three decades that our own fruit was barred there.

Rio Grande Valley fruit growers and the entire citrus industry will benefit from the new agreement.

REGULATIONS AFFECTING OKRA

The constant battle against the destructive cotton pink bollworm has resulted in the placement of okra under insect control regulations. Okra, like cotton, provides excellent breeding, feeding and hibernating quarters for the pink bollworm. Many commercial fields of okra

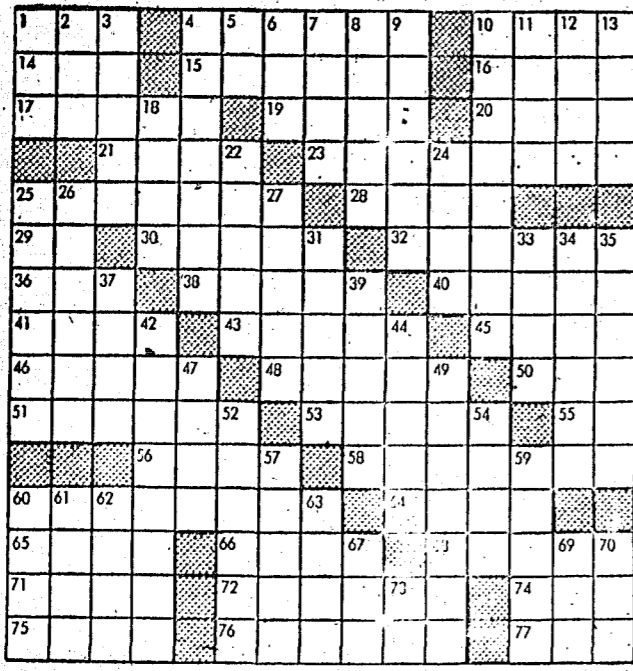

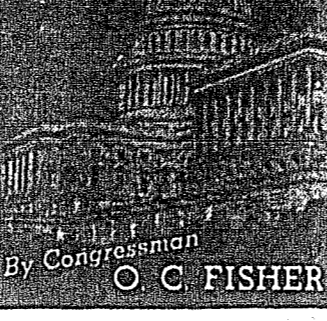

Our WASHINGTON Letter



ADJOURNMENT is in the air, and may be a reality before the end of August. Again, it depends on what happens to Civil Rights. Before this Newsletter is printed you will probably know the answer to that.

I plan to return to the district about September 1, and will spend the month of September visiting over the area. It will be necessary for me to return to Washington in late September for some committee work here.

JUNK MAIL got a lot of attention last week when the House approved a postal rate increase bill -- the first in many years. I offered an amendment to increase the rate on 3rd class junk mail, effective on October 1, to 2 1/2 cents per piece, and my amendment was adopted by a voting vote of 147-74. It finally enacted this one amendment will increase revenue by \$67 million over and above the amount proposed in the bill.

This type of mail consists of advertising circulars, miscellaneous printed matter, and merchandise weighing 8 ounces or less.

In urging the House to approve my amendment I pointed out that the Postoffice Department is losing money on 3rd class mail at the rate of \$300 million per year under present rates. It seems to me these commercial users are not entitled to this sort of a subsidy from the taxpayers. As passed by the House, rates on junk mail will just about pay its way.

SHOULD SUPREME COURT decisions be based upon legal principles rather than upon political philosophy? Therein seems to lie the basis for the issue on whether we should or should not seek to improve the caliber of that court. The present system emphasizes the political; a proposal I recently of seeks to obtain judges who will think more in terms of sound legal principles. A Texas lawyer, a student and devotee of the Constitution, in a letter to me expressed a viewpoint similar to scores of others I have recently received. He says:

"The continuation of our form of Government most emphatically requires decisions from our Supreme Court based upon legal principles rather than edicts based upon a political philosophy. Every citizen in this country should appreciate any effort directed toward placing sound lawyers, rather than politicians, upon our Supreme Court."
