

All lighting devices required on

a vehicle are required for daytime operation as well as at night.

All required lights must be lighted from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise and at other times have lost just about all their when there is not sufficient light to see persons or vehicles 500 feet away.

Every motor vehicle (except motorcycles and motor scooter) shall be equipped with 2 head lamps, one on each side of the front. Not more than 4 front lamps shall be burning at the same time.

A motorcycle or a motor scooter is required to have at least one and not more than 2 head lamps to the front.

### **Negro Students** Practice Monday **Transferred To Coleman School**

Supt. Cullen N. Perry announced this week that the State Board of Education has definitely closed the local Colored school and all the local Negro students will be transferred to Coleman. The Mozelle Negro students will also attend the Coleman Negro School.

This action was taken because the average daily attendance of the school dropped below the required 15 students per day.

Mrs. Minnie<sup>c</sup> Alexander, who has been teaching the local Negro School for the past several years, has been employed by the Coleman School. She is attempt. ing to make arrangements to live in Santa Anna and ride the bus with the local students to Coleman each day.

Under a new Texas law, before local schools can be desegregated, an election would have to be held with the majority of the voters favoring integration of the schools. In order for the election to be called, 20% of the qualified voters would have to sign a petition to call the election

Thus, it is not likely that the local schools will be desegregated in the near future.

A spot light must not be used on a motor vehicle when in sight left over 30 days. of a vehicle approaching from the front with one exception: In case of failure of the headlights, the spot light may be used if the beam strikes the roadway not

more than 50 feet ahead. A motor vehicle may be eqipped with a back-up light, but it shall not be lighted when the vehicle is moving forward.

Vehicles such as road machinery, farm tractors, animal-drawn vehicles and farm implements, when on a public highway at night are required to have burning a white light or lantern on the front and a red light or lantern on the rear visible from a distance of 500 feet.

Note: Additional lights or other equipment are required on buses, trucks and large trailers.

In that same year, ten miles of 138,000 volt line will be built from the Rio Pecos Plant to Mc-Camey, and the present 69,000 volt line from McCamey to the Central Power & Light Company connection in Val Verde County will be converted to 138,000 volt line.

These 138,000 volt lines will be operated in connection with the 69,000 volt system which interconnects with the Southwestern Public Service Company on the north, the Texas Electric Service Company on the east and west, and the lower Colorado River Authority on the south in addition to the interconnections with the Public Service Company of Oklahoma and Central and Light Company. Power These interconnections other utilities provide for a flow of electric power either into or out of the system as needed.

To supplement and strengthen the present 2,652 miles of high voltage transmission lines serving West Texas, WTU plans to have in operation by 1960 a continuous 138,000 volt transmission line from the Oklahoma border near Quanah to San Angelo and another 138,000 volt line from the Rio Pecos Plant at McCamey to Val Verde County in southwest Texas.


