School Financial Condition Revealed In Statement

A financial statement of the condition of the Santa Anna Independent School District is published on Page 3 of this issue of The News. This is the first time a statement of this nature has been published. Supt. C. N. Perry said effective next fall it would become necessary by law to publish statements of this nature and that he and the school board felt there was no need in waiting until next year to begin publishing them.

Total expenditures of the school district for the 1956-57 school year amounted to \$150,986.11 with a total balance on hand of \$26,673.14. This balance is divided into four separate funds. You are urged to study the financial statement and if you desire a more detailed report, it is available at the school office.

1957-1958 BUDGET

The total budget for the operation of the Santa Anna schools for the current year amount to \$171,749.86. This is divided into nine categories as follows: Administration, \$9,970.00; Instruction, \$99,054.44; Other School Services, \$22,926.20; Operation of Plant, \$9,000.00; Maintenance of Plant, \$4,700.00; Fixed Charges, \$2,000.00; Community Services, \$60.00; Capital Outlay, \$6,000.00; Bond Debt Service, \$18,039.3.

The school board has prepared a five-page detailed budget for the coming year. These are available to the public at the school office.

About 7:30 a. m. Tuesday, October 8, George Ronald Wynn was found dead in his bed in the house he was living in on the Chap Eeds farm south of town.

Earl Irick, Sr., Justice of the Peace, pronounced him dead of natural causes, after examination by Dr. William Tryon.

He had been dead approximately 10 hours when found. He had been in Santa Anna Monday evening.

Wynn was born August 25, 1902 in Parker County. He was 55 years, one month and 13 days old at the time of death. He came to Coleman County in 1929 and has remained here since. A farmer by profession, he was employed by Mr. Eeds. Funeral services were held at the Whon Baptist Church at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday. Burial was in the Whon Cemetery under the direction of the Hosh Funeral Home. Wynn formerly lived in the Whon Community.

Survivors include one brother, Leonard Alvin Wynn of Coleman, and four sisters, Mrs. P. A. Rade of Santa Anna; Mrs. Aron Avants of Whon; Mrs. Gaines Smith of Rotan; and Mrs. B. T. Alsop of Sterling City.

 A cluster of small reddish flowers on low-growing weeds may spell death to a corn crop in a matter of days.
 Witchweed, a parasitic plant that attacks primarily corn, plus a few other crops, has been found in the United States. Although the weed has not yet come to Texas, farmers are warned that it can thrive in the South and Southwest. At present, it is believed to be confined to about 38,000 acres near the coast in North and South Carolina, but all areas have been alerted to be on the lookout.
 Farmers are asked to watch for an unfamiliar weed with bright green, slightly hairy leaves.

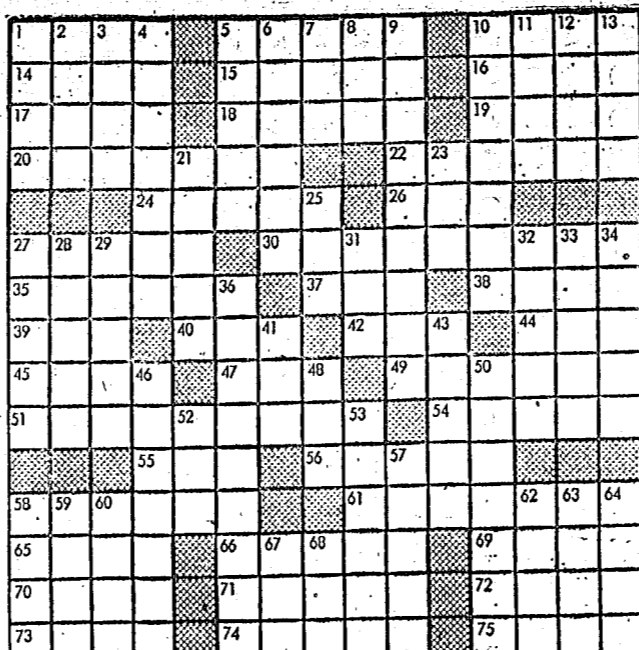

can spread rapidly. Symptoms of this parasite resemble damage done by acute drought; the corn plants are stunted, wilt quickly and turn yellow. The witchweed accomplishes its work with a vast network of fast-growing roots which entwine with roots of the host plant. This mass of witchweed chokes off the food and water supply of its host, starving it and making fruitation almost impossible.

The first witchweed blooms usually appear in June and will ves and the bright, generally reddish flowers. First discovered in the Carolinas in the fall of

1956, it is known that the plant continue to bloom until frost. The flower is small and usually brick red, although it can be scarlet, yellowish-red, yellowish or even almost white.

Any farmer suspecting the presence of this plant should notify his county agent. The agent can arrange for positive identification and suggest measures for eradication. Witchweed plants or seed SHOULD NOT BE MOVED from the field, since the minute seeds are easily spread. And one plant can produce up to a half million tiny seeds.

Mountaineers Win First Conference Game Friday, 27-12

The Mountaineers showed considerable improvement over the previous week as they dropped the Rising Star Wildcats in the first conference game of the season for both teams Friday night. The Mountaineers won by a 27-12 score in a hard fought game. Rising Star scored first and last and the Mountaineers scored in the first, two in the second and fourth quarters.

THE GAME

The Mountaineers took the kick-off, a short one, on their 39-yard line. They picked up 3 yards on the first play, then fumbled on the second play with Rising Star recovering on the Mountaineer 41-yard line. The Wildcats picked up 3 yards, then a first down on the Mountaineer 29-yard line. Quarterback Robert Needham pulled a fast one, on the draw play, held the ball and circled his right end for the entire 29 yards. The try for extra point was missed and the Wildcats were ahead 6 points with less than 5 minutes of the first period gone. This apparently brought the Mountaineers out of their trance and on the next series of downs, they took the kick-off on their 26-yard line and returned it to their 37-yard line, picked up 5 yards on the ground, attempted a pass, then stayed on the ground for four more downs with Ray going the last 23 yards wide around his left end. White kicked the extra point and the Mountaineers were in the lead 7-6. Rising Star took the kick-off and managed to work it back to the Mountaineer 47-yard line before having to kick. The Mountaineers took the ball on their 15 yard line and returned it to their 28-yard line. A ground play was good for 5 yards, a pass from White to Perry was good for 33 yards, a 5-yard penalty set them back on the Wildcat 39-yard line. Seven ground plays later and in the second period, the Mountaineers were on the 1-foot line. White went over, but the Mountaineers were penalized 15 yards. On the next play White passed to Perry for the score. The extra point was missed and the Mountaineers led 13-6. Later in the second period, the Mountaineers recovered a Wildcat fumble on the Wildcat 49-yard line and 5 plays later Ray went over from the 19-yard line. White kicked the extra point and the half-time score was 20-6 for the local eleven.

The third period was scoreless with the Mountaineers dominating the ball the entire period, except for the first four downs. As the period ended the Mountaineers were on the Wildcat 5 yard line. They had made a TD just moments before but it was called back and they were penalized 15 yards, losing a second TD because of a infraction of the rules. On the second play in the fourth period, White went over from about 6 inches out for the score, then kicked the extra point.

The Wildcats took the kick-off and drove from their 11-yard line, the entire length of the field to score. The TD play was a jump pass from Needham to Billy Rucker. The try for extra point was no good. The game ended with the Mountaineers in possession of the ball about mid-field.

OTHER GAMES

Mason seems to be the big powerhouse in the district this year. They have won five games in five starts against some pretty tough competition. In five games they have scored 95 points and their opposition has scored only 15 points. Last week the Cowpunchers won their first conference game by handing Llano a 19-7 defeat. Cross Plains was idle over the weekend and Goldthwaite lost a non-conference game to McGregor by a 20-7 score. Bronte, the only non-conference game left on the Mountaineer schedule, was also idle over the weekend.

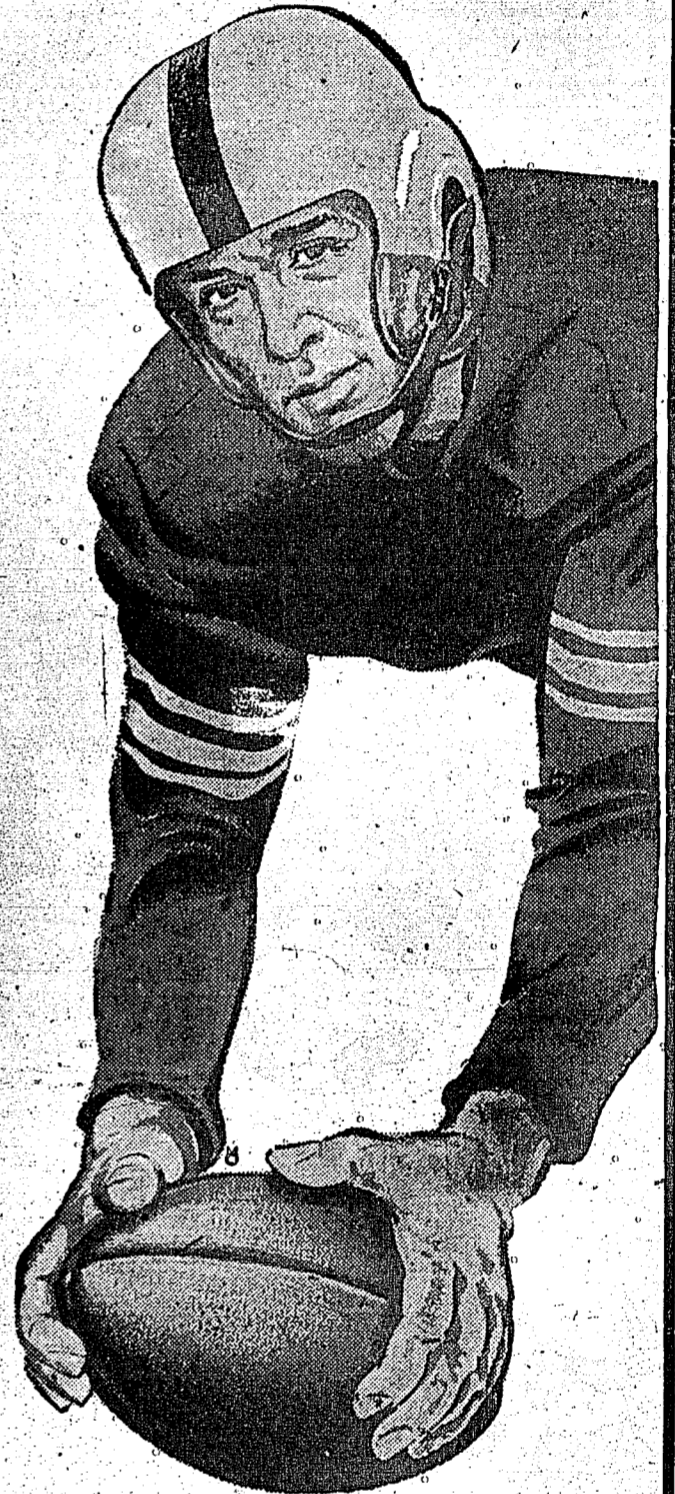
