A. D. Pettit Honored At Homecoming

A. D. Pettit, local vocational agriculture teacher for the past 18 years was honored at the Homecoming football game Friday night. In honoring Mr. Pettit, the following was read:

"On graduation Day, 1925, A. D. Pettit, a handsome boy with black curly hair, a very even disposition, and an ambition, was graduated from Comanche High School when he stepped to the stage to receive his diploma.

"On June 1, 1927 Mr. A. D. Pettit was graduated from John Tarleton Agricultural College and began his teaching career at Gustine High School, where he remained for seven years.

"In the 1934-35 school year Mr. Pettit moved to Comanche to teach in the school there and on May 29, 1936, he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture from Texas A & M College.

"In September 1938, Mr. Pettit came to Santa Anna High School as Vocational Agriculture Instructor and has remained with the local school system for 18 years, the only break coming during World War II, when he served as First Sergeant with an Armored Ordnance Branch.

"Mr. Pettit has served for short periods as Superintendent and also as High School Principal in the Santa Anna school system.

"Mr. Pettit can always be found among the most civic-minded of the Santa Anna Community and School District. He ranges far and wide over this 308 square mile school district, giving help to his boys who are feeding sheep and other animals in the Vocational Agricultural Program, and willingly giving attention to any problems in our farming and ranching industry. Every major livestock show in Texas has come to know Mr. Pettit and his FFA boys as real competitors.

"Mr. Pettit is past president of the Santa Anna Lions Club, a Mason, a member of the Methodist Church and other professional and civic organizations. He is respected by the business and civic interests of the Santa Anna community. He is a long time member of the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department and has served as Fire Chief and Fire Marshal a number of times.

300 Registers At Annual Homecoming

Just over 300 former students and members of their families registered at the annual Santa Anna Ex-Student Homecoming Saturday at the high school. It was estimated over 400 attended, but a number of them failed to register.

Plans for the day went off about as scheduled. The coffee was held in the lunchroom and most of the former students who were here by that time attended and spent several hours visiting with each other.

During the business meeting Donnie Simmons was elevated from First Vice President to President; Mrs. Faye Mobley was moved up to First Vice President and Tom Kingsbery was elected as Second Vice President. Robert Earl Lancaster was elected to serve 2 years on the Board of Directors. Mrs. J. W. McClellan was re-elected as Secretary and Treasurer of the organization.

William R. Brown, out-going director and chairman of the committee to purchase a speaker system for the school, presented the system to the school.

FREE FISH—Rough Fish To Be Cleaned From Lake Sealy

The Texas Game & Fish Commission with the approval of the City Council, will begin cleaning the rough fish from Lake Sealy next week. Larry Campbell, commission biologist, said equipment would be moved to the lake Monday and they would likely be ready for the operation to get underway by Wednesday or Thursday of next week. The ultimate plan is for the lake to be restocked with game fish and in 18-months to two years there should be good game fishing in the lake with very little if any, rough fish.

Campbell said to insure a complete kill of all carp, gar, buffalo and other obnoxious fish in the reservoir, the entire lake would be treated. An attempt will be made to save all desirable bass, catfish and other game species. However, there will undoubtedly be some of these fish killed when the work is done. The biologist and Harold Penny, Game Warden, assured the public that the fish killed will be good to eat and they are welcome to them. The substance used to treat the water does not do any damage to any part of the fish other than the gills.

The operation should get underway on Thursday morning unless some unforeseen circumstances arise. If everything goes as scheduled, there will likely be plenty of free fish for everyone who will drive out to the lake and get them.

The other city lake will not be treated at this time. There will be plenty of good fishing for anglers in this lake until Lake Sealy is ready for use again. Campbell said it would be restocked as soon as possible and the lake should be ready for game fishing again in about 18 months.

After the first hard rain Sunday, it began raining slowly and continued through most of the day. Monday morning the rain fell slow until about noon and a good shower fell Tuesday morning.

All our correspondents report good rains in their communities and reports from other areas show from 3 to 4 1/2 inches of good, slow rain.

As soon as the ground is dry enough to work, lots of farmers and ranchers of this area will begin getting small grain in the ground. Some have already sowed, in hopes of getting moisture. The fall pastures will also benefit greatly from the fine moisture.

The next Second Sunday Singing will be on November 10, at the First Christian Church. A good attendance is hoped for.

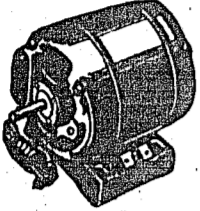

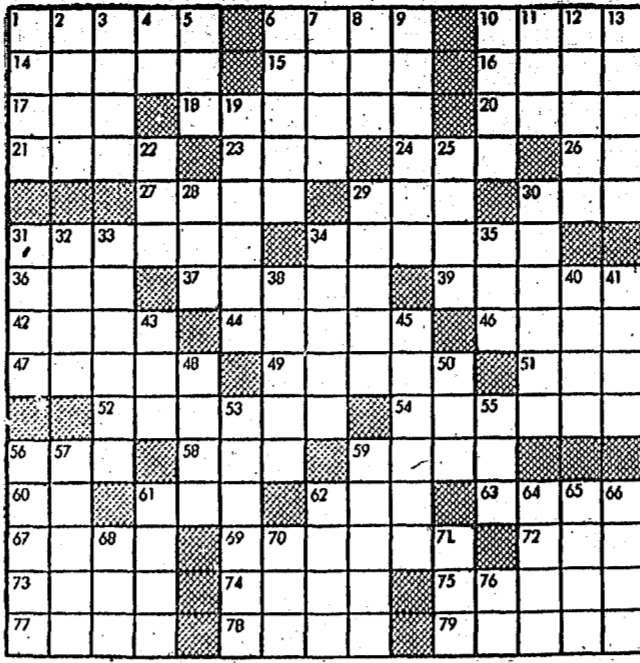

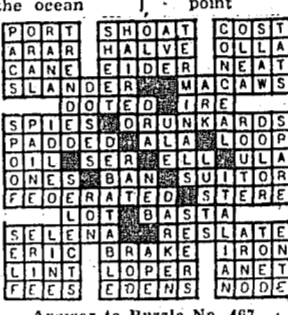

fits available under the new law. Shortage of Horses faces many Texas ranchers who are trying to rebuild beef herds depleted by the prolonged drought. Prices are high for good saddle horses with young mounts bringing around \$250 as against pre-drought prices of \$50 to \$75 a head.

Texas Turkey Production will set a new record this season with producers raising an estimated six percent more than 1956's record yield. Total U. S. production is expected to be slightly behind Texas with an overall five percent increase over last year. Distressing note is that live turkey prices are and will continue to remain below last year's levels. However, experts are predicting a price rise after Thanksgiving and before Christmas when there will be less storage costs.

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BRIEF GLIMPSES AT TEXAS AGRICULTURE

Texas Pecan production this year has been estimated at 37 1/2 million pounds by the Crop Reporting Board — more than six million pounds above the 1946-55 average. Conditions have generally improved in major producing areas, but best prospects are in East Texas and along the Upper Coast. Still lagging with the shortest prospective outturn is the Edwards

Plateau region, hard-hit by the drought. Of the 27 1/2 million pounds forecast, 31 1/2 million pounds are native, 6 million pounds improved varieties.

Income Tax Waivers on profit from drought-forced livestock sales are producing problems for some Texas stockmen. Under internal revenue provisions, stock sold under such circumstances must be replaced within a year. However, farmers are not always able to find suitable replacement stock. Also, the drought continues in some areas, causing reluctance to restock. In order to maintain tax benefits, application should be made for extension of the replacement period. Farmers still hit by drought should look into other tax bene-

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Mountaineers Lose Homecoming Game 0-21

The Mountaineers took it on the chin Friday night at the annual Ex-Student Homecoming Game at Mountaineers Stadium. At one time in the second period the Mountaineers got as far as the Goldthwaite Eagle 22-yard line and in the fourth period they got to the Eagle 32-yard line. However, they never offered much of a scoring threat. The Eagles scored twice in the second period and once in the fourth period to make a final score of 21-0 for Goldthwaite. This was the second conference game for the Mountaineers and the first for the Eagles. The Eagles made 15 first downs to 8 for the Mountaineers.

THE GAME

The Mountaineers kicked to the Eagles 9-yard line. The Eagles returned to their 27, received a 15-yard penalty, picked up 3 first downs in 9 plays, received another 15-yard penalty, then fumbled and the Mountaineers recovered on the Eagle 44-yard line. Santa Anna picked up 3 yards, got a 15-yard penalty, attempted a pass then picked up 5 yards and punted to the Eagle 17-yard line. The Eagles made two first downs and were held for little yardage, then punted to the Mountaineer 6-yard line. Failing to gain, the Mountaineers punted to their 43-yard line early in the second period.

The Eagles picked up a first down, got a 15-yard penalty, then a pass from Filmon Kirby to Jerry Kight was good for 36 yards and put the Eagles on the Mountaineer 9-yard line. Three plays later Kirby went over from the 2-yard line and kicked the extra point. The Eagles kicked to the Mountaineer 2-yard line and the Mountaineers returned it to the 15. The Eagles got another 15-yard penalty and the Mountaineers picked up a first down that put the ball on their 46-yard line. An attempted pass was intercepted on the Eagle 28-yard line and from there the Eagles went all the way, picking up only three first downs in the drive. Kirby again kicked the extra point, making the half-time score 14-0.

In the third period the Eagles kicked to Santa Anna on a short kick and the Mountaineers took the ball on their 46-yard line. They picked up two first downs and failed to gain the necessary yardage on the Eagle 22-yard line. The Eagles failed to gain, punted to the Mountaineer 35-yard line. The Mountaineers picked up a first down, then lost 14 yards on a pass attempt, then fumbled and Goldthwaite recovered, on the Mountaineer 33-yard line. The quarter ended with the Eagles on the Mountaineer 15-yard line.

In the fourth period the Eagles received another 15-yard penalty for having an ineligible man down field on a pass that was completed for a TD. This gave the Mountaineers the ball on their 28-yard line. Completing two passes and three ground plays put the Mountaineers on the Eagle 22-yard line before receiving a 15-yard penalty and they could not make up the loss. The ball went over to the Eagles on their 32-yard line. The Eagles went on to score their third TD and kick the extra point.

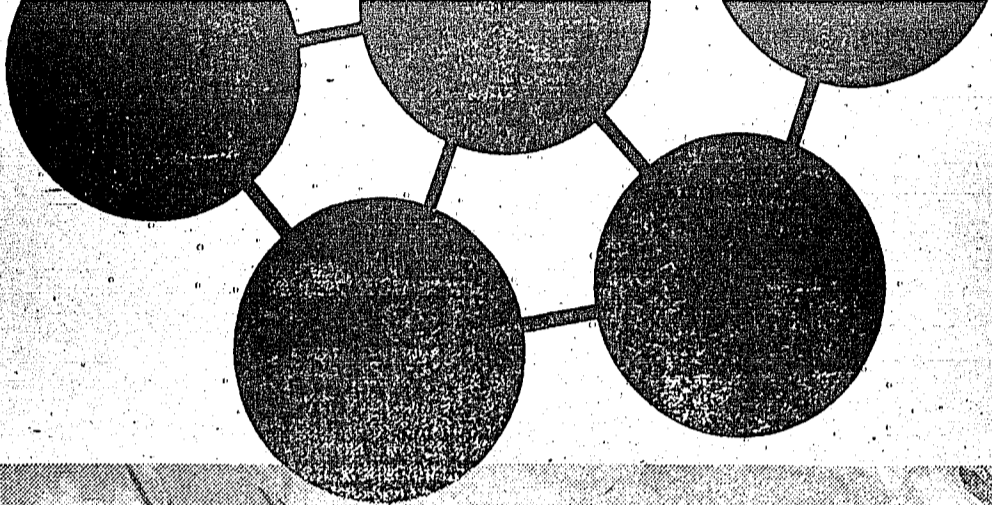
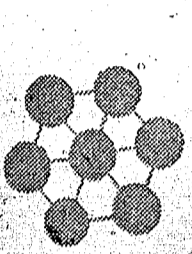

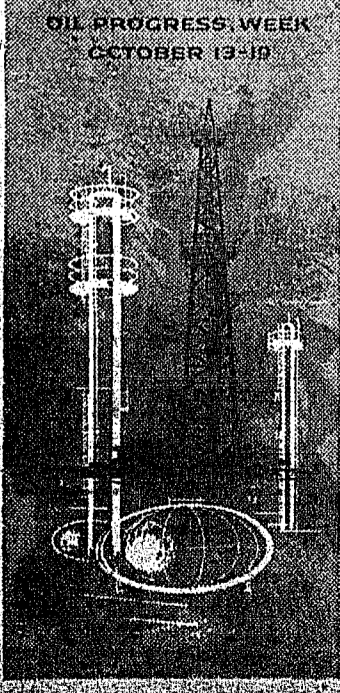
