The Mountaineers will resume conference play Friday night after a week's rest. They have four more games on the docket, three of which are conference games. All games for the remainder of the season will begin at 7:30 p. m.

The Cross Plains Buffaloes will visit Santa Anna Friday night. Picked to be one of the top contenders at the beginning of the season, Cross Plains has a 2-won, 4-lost record at the present time. They won over Baird in the first game of the season by a 19-0 score and in the second game of the season they lucked out a 19-7 win over Merkel. However, since that time the Buffaloes have lost four straight, to Coleman, Eastland, Throckmorton and a conference game to Goldthwaite last week by a 6-12 score. All the teams they have lost to are powerhouses this year.

There is little doubt but what the Buffaloes will be out to win this conference game. The Mountaineers are going to have to exert every effort to hold the Buffaloes in check and win the game. It will not be easy.

The only team that both the Buffaloes and the Mountaineers have played is the Goldthwaite Eagles. The Eagles won over Santa Anna 21-0 and won over Cross Plains 12-6.

Last week Mason pounded the Rising Star Wildcats 40-0 and Llano run rough-shod over the Burnet eleven by a 48-21 score. Bronte, the only non-conference game left on the Mountaineer schedule, won over Loraline by a 27-6 score.

Games this week will see Cross Plains at Santa Anna; Goldthwaite at Mason for what likely will be for the championship game for District 9-A; and Loraline at Rising Star in a non-conference game. Llano will have an open date.

Christmas Mail For Overseas

Patrons of the local Post Office are reminded that the time for mailing Christmas parcels for overseas is here. The Post Office Department makes a practice of delivering all Christmas mail by the big day if possible, and for that reason asks the public to get those far-traveling gifts mailed in time.

Surface mailings should be off between November 1 and November 20. As these take longer and have more handling, substantial wrappings and containers should be used, a list of the contents placed inside parcel, and strong cord tied around the package with plainly addressed label in place.

Airmail gifts should be sent not later than Dec. 10. The limit on air parcel post for overseas being 2 pounds in weight and 30 inches in combined length and girth. If you are in doubt about your parcel as regards weight or size, or wish any advice on method or materials of packing or wrapping, free leaflets showing how to do it are on the desk in the lobby of the Post Office or the post office staff will advise you.

Plan now to mail your gifts early.

The change in regulations, which resulted from action of the Public Safety Commission does not effect the remainder of the inspection of brakes, which will still be required to have the performance ability required by statutes and will still be required to meet other standards of safety which are capable of accurate determination without the necessity of the removal of a wheel.

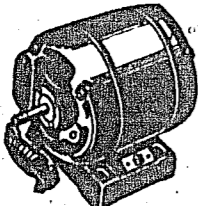

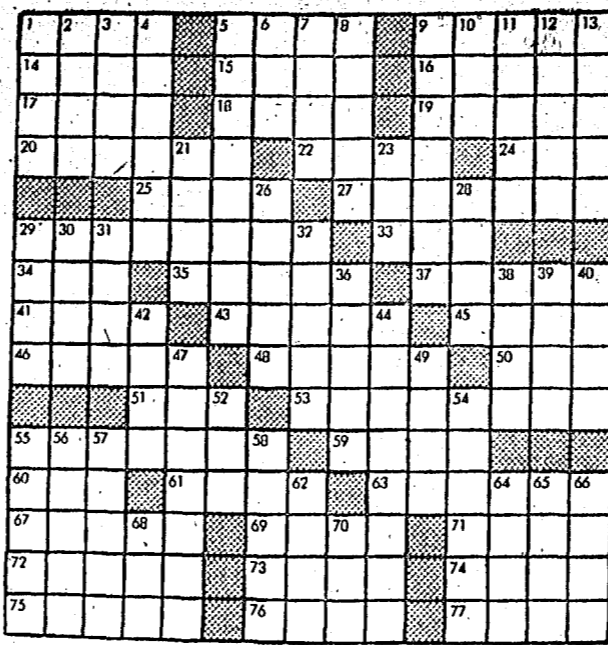

CROSSWORD PUZZLE



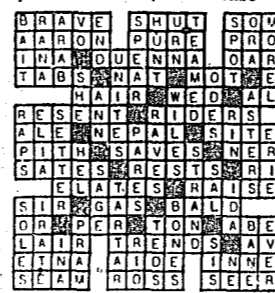

DAMAGED HIDES MEAN DOLLAR LOSSES

About \$200 million in profits are lost by the livestock hide industry each year which might be saved with just a "little extra care" by both producers and packers.

Animal hide is a sideline of livestock production that is not often thought of as a big profit factor by the average person. Yet, a perfect hide can mean as much as a \$10 'bonus' to the producer.

The hide has quite a few 'enemies', however, which must be guarded against. Grubs eat holes in them. Barbed wire, nails and jagged edges of carriers scratch them. Mange leaves a dark spot or unpleasant mottling and prod poles and rough herding tactics create unsightly blotches.

Still another damage factor are huge brand marks which

frequently cause up to a quarter of the hide to be discarded. These four pre-tannery dollar-robbers can best be brought into control by cattlemen themselves while the packers can attempt to cut losses from skinner slashers and hide-cellar rot.

The biggest problem for the cattleman is elimination of cattle grubs which cause \$100 million or 50% of the annual hide damage. Early treatment of mange, plus dehorning will help cut down blemishes and punctures. Feed lots, loading chutes, fences, and truck beds should be checked for sharp objects that will puncture, bruise or scratch.

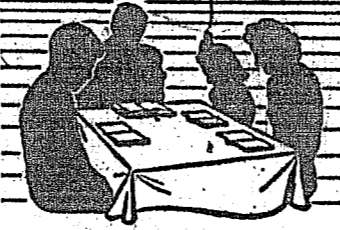
It is always a good idea, also, to start the livestock to market with clean skins. Caked manure and other lot soil cause unsightly stains which may influence the buyer to cut the cattle price.

Proper care of the hide is especially important these days when leather products are losing their markets to synthetics. At the same time, leather goods prices are going sky high because perfect hides are something of a rarity. Just a little more caution and planning can mean that extra 'bonus' for the producers.

CHICK CHATS— FOWL CHOLERA COMES IN FALL

Sudden death and high mortality characterize acute fowl cholera, one of the most destructive of poultry diseases. Usually striking during the cold, wet weather of fall and early winter, cholera is often an unnoticed invader until birds are found dead under the roosts or in the nests. The onset of this disease is so rapid that death frequently results before outward symptoms are observed.

However, when birds do linger on briefly before dying, they may show these symptoms: sudden listlessness, ruffled feathers, loss of appetite, yellowish-green diarrhea, and a dark purple discoloration of the comb, face, and wattles. A postmortem examination of an affected bird usually reveals a liver that is light in color, either overall or in streaks.

Tiny Hemorrhages Evident

Pinpoint hemorrhages may also be noted on the liver of the infected bird. Breast, heart, and muscles may be dark in color, or show signs of hemorrhaging. A characteristic foul odor is usually noticed when a cholera-affected bird is opened.

In order to be certain of the diagnosis, it is best to have it determined by a poultry-disease specialist. Cholera organisms can be seen in the fowl's blood with the aid of a high-powered microscope.

Specific Medication

Against the ravages of acute fowl cholera, specific medication plays an important role. One of the most valuable drug compounds for treating this disease is sulfaquinolaxaline. When this agent is administered, either through the feed or the drinking water, immediate losses from mortality are usually checked in a short time.

Sanitation is very important in controlling cholera in the flock. Move affected birds to clean ground or a clean house. Keep them from contacting apparently unaffected birds.

Many poultrymen vaccinate against cholera with a killed-culture bacterin. This step may be taken anytime and may be repeated as often as necessary. Such vaccination is considered an aid in preventing the disease.
