## Improvement Of Public School Group Meeting

They are to be completed and returned to her not later than Monday, March 17.

## Local Schools Obtain Two Quonset Buildings

The Santa Anna Independent School District has obtained, through the Texas Surplus Property Agency, the two Quonset Huts east of Santa Anna. The buildings stand on land owned by the Santa Anna Wool Association and it was only through the cooperation of the Wool Association that the local school district was able to obtain both buildings.

Five school districts, including San Angelo and Lubbock, had applied for the buildings and these districts would have dismantled and moved the buildings. The Santa Anna Wool Association gave the local school district a long lease on the land. The fact that community cooperation was evident to the agency officials, plus the local school's plans to use the buildings on the present site, became the turning point in preventing the buildings from being moved from Santa Anna.

One of the buildings will be used as a bus shelter and the other for storage of supplies and materials which presently crowd existing facilities.

The buildings were obtained at a cost of \$108.00 each; cost to the government when they were constructed was \$7200.00 each.

The accident happened while the train crew was switching some cars on the north track. The car was pushed back off the south part of the tracks after the accident.

## School Ballot Ready For Use This Week and

For the first time in the history of Texas, absentee voting will be held for the election of members on the board of school trustees. Absentee voting will begin 20 days previous to the election, which will be held on Saturday, April 5th. Absentee voting will be in the same manner as on any other election. You must certify your reason for absentee voting to the County Clerk, and the voting will be done in the County Clerks office.

Names will be listed on the ballot in the following order: Dick Baugh, Mrs. Robert L. Markland and Add T. Walker.

The voter will vote for two. A new law this year requires the little square box by the name to be left off the ballot, giving the voter only the opportunity to scratch or mark out the names of persons he does not wish to vote for. This is the same way the ballots were before the little squares were added.

Also on the ballot will be space to write in two names if the voter so desires.

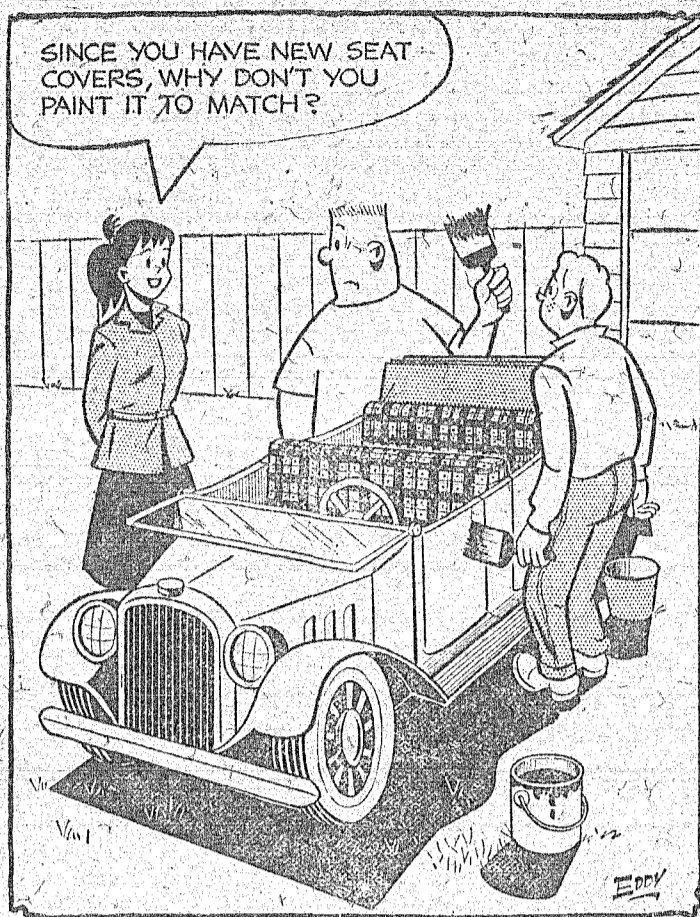

**About Your HEALTH**

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health. HENRY A. HOLLE, M. D. Commissioner of Health

Austin — How many parents have thought to themselves, "Judy seems bright enough, but just look at her report card, she should be doing much better and her teacher says she is inattentive and moody."

It is only natural for parents to be concerned about their children's behavior and achievements in school or play. Oftentimes difficulties experienced by children which may make them appear slow or uncooperative have definite physical relationship of one kind or another.

The most common and usually least suspected are those involving the eyesight and hearing. Too often a child falls behind in school or fails to enjoy himself with other children because of faulty hearing or an eye disorder.

For this reason parents and teachers alike should be alert for signs which may indicate trouble of this kind.

Parents themselves can watch for these symptoms in their children, and if one or more should occur, have the child examined by your family physician. If further examination or treatment is indicated, he can refer you to a specialist.

Hearing difficulties often attack subtly. If a child is continually turning his head to hear sounds, leaning forward to hear, asking repetition of things said or frequently inattentive, hearing loss is indicated.

Health factors to observe are: mouth breathing (tonsils and adenoids can cause trouble), draining ears, earaches, and ringing, buzzing or roaring in ears; also certain personality traits indicate hearing deficiencies such as a lack of self-confidence, extreme anti-social behavior, extreme introversion, and constantly being on the defensive.

In achievement a child may be two or three years behind his age-level in school or experience a sudden failure following a severe illness.

Eye difficulties are manifested in more obvious ways such as: frequent blinking, rubbing eyes frequently, watery eyes, styes or crusted eyelids, inflamed eyes, squinting at close objects, crossed eyes, and attempts to brush away a blur.

Also frequent crying, holding a book far away or too close while reading, screws up face while reading, tenses body in far-vision, looks out of only one eye or experiences headaches after close work.

Don't delay if any or some of these signs appear in your child. Prompt attention now could save his sight or hearing and improve his whole outlook on life.

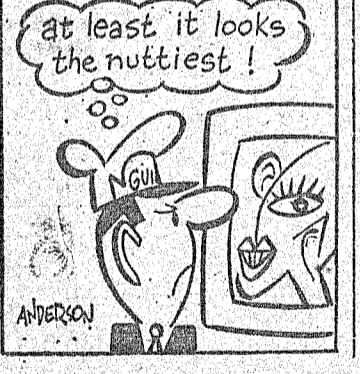

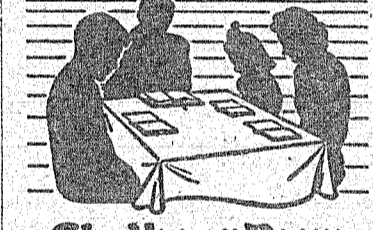

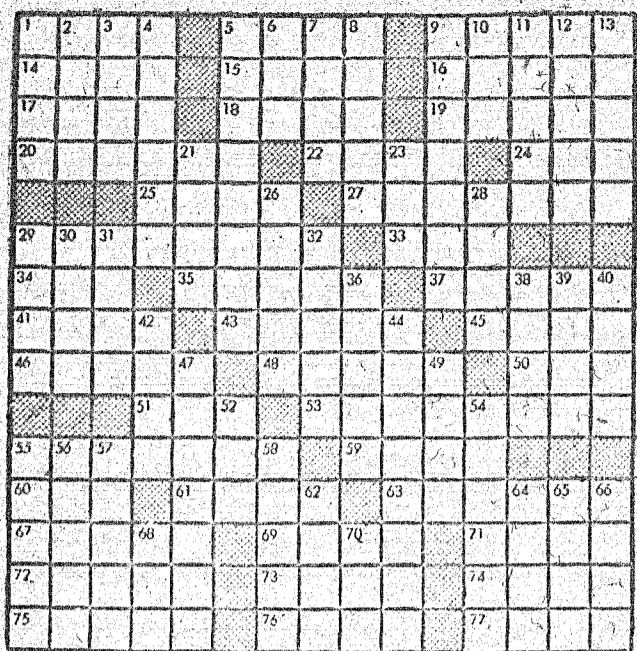

Considerable Increase Noted In Texas Crime During 1957

An increase in the criminal activities of persons under 21 years of age was indicated recently in a report released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The DPS said its count of fingerprint records of persons 20 years of age or younger, for the year 1957 was 14 per cent greater than for 1956. A total of 16,416 fingerprint cards of youthful criminals were received by the department in 1956, while 18,768 were received in 1957.

The greatest increase involved 17-year-olds, followed by the 18, 19 and 20-year groups. A considerable jump was noted in the number of fingerprint cards received from the 16 and 17-year groups. A total of 1,083 cards involved 16-year olds, while 4,493 persons of 17 years of age were fingerprinted in investigations.

The DPS said the card count was not a conclusive means of totaling the number of criminals of these age groups since many minors are not fingerprinted. However, a general increase in crimes for these age groups is reflected in the information.

General criminal offenses in Texas during 1957 for persons of all age groups occurred at the rate of 424 offenses per day, according to a department crime report recently submitted to the newly organized State Law Enforcement Study Commission. In that report Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas DPS, said major crime in Texas for 1957 was up 9.2 per cent over the year 1956.

Most of the increases, he said, came in urban areas, while rural areas experienced a decrease. Urban was up in all categories but one, while rural was down in all classifications but one.

Murder led all categories in the 1957 increase with a total of 1,084 such crimes—a 25.2 increase over the previous year. Rape showed a 3.4 per cent decrease, robbery 10.4 per cent increase, burglary 6.8 per cent increase, aggravated assault 4.1 per cent decrease, theft, 10.3 per cent increase and auto theft 17.8 per cent increase.

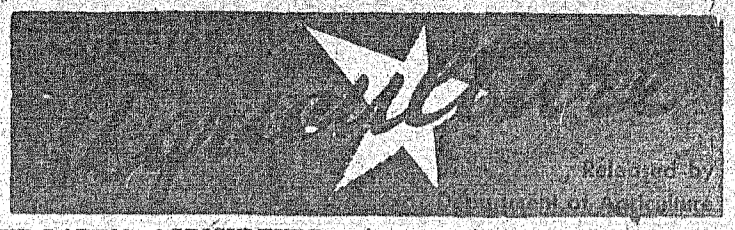
In comparing rural crimes with urban crimes, Garrison said murder was up in both instances—rural up 13.4 per cent and urban 35.4 per cent. Auto theft in urban areas was up 21.2 per cent, robbery up 15.9 per cent, theft up 13.6 per cent and burglary increased 10.3 per cent in urban areas.

Among the leading decreases in rural crime for the year 1957 came aggravated assault with a minus 10.6 per cent. Next in line was a 7.8 per cent decrease in rural thefts.

UP-DATING AGRICULTURE BY LAW

Agriculture in Texas and the nation is going through an dramatic evolution.

If the changes we are experiencing in farming and farm life were just a bit more physically violent — it could be properly called a "Revolution." No previous era in Agriculture has seen such an emphatic shift in emphasis and techniques as we have since World War II.

Old farm concepts have been outmoded by new dynamic production and marketing. As a result, laws passed 20 and 30 years ago have, in some instances, not met the needs of this new period.

This is particularly true in Texas. Some of our old laws are impractical. And even some of our legislation that is less than two years old already need amending.

A goal of the Texas Department of Agriculture during the next legislative session will be to emphasize changes in the following fields:

1. Revision of the nursery law.
2. A marketing enabling law.
3. A new general warehouse law.
4. Dressed poultry inspection law.
5. Amending the recently-enacted egg law.
6. Amendments to the weights and measures law.

A new nursery law is needed to set up some basis of standards and to control movement of inferior nursery stock into Texas.

The marketing enabling act is necessary because our selling and transportation methods have not kept up with the giant strides made in farm production. The state farm agency needs to enlarge its work to provide data to growers and handlers of volumes of commodity movement, planting, harvesting and grading services. At present, the TDA has no authority to participate in these types of programs except that which is rendered in the language of the current appropriation bill.

The present general warehouse law provides that all warehouse storage space for hire shall be bonded by the Agriculture Department. However, the penalty provision is weak and inadequate.

On poultry inspection, the federal government has made inspection compulsory for poultry moving in interstate commerce. The same type of service is needed within the state to protect Texas consumers against inferior and low quality poultry.

The new Texas egg law already needs amending because financing of the statute is insufficient. This program should and could be self-supporting without the necessity of any use of tax mon-

ey. A fee system of checking scales and enforcing the weights and measures law is also advocated. This is practiced in other states and would place financing of the act on a solid footing in Texas.

These changes by law are necessary if our state government is to keep pace of modern agriculture.

TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:

By this time of the year, you should have all of your W-2's from your employer or employers for 1957. In case you haven't gathered together your W-2 forms, your tax records, and started working on your tax, you better start gathering right now. The Internal Revenue Service requires all the W-2 forms. Don't forget to get all of them and send them along with your tax return so that Uncle Sam won't have to write you a nice little letter asking for them.

IT'S a repeat performance for Carlos Prio Socarras, the exiled former president of Cuba. He's been indicted again for conspiracy to violate the neutrality laws of the United States.

Prio, who resides in Miami Beach, Florida, was one of seventeen defendants indicted by a Federal Grand Jury in New York City in 1954 for violating sections of the Neutrality Act relating to the purchase and exportation of arms, ammunition and implements of war. At that time, a plea of nolo contendere was accepted and Prio was fined \$9,000.

The current indictment charges that Prio and eight others conspired to begin and to set on foot, and to provide and prepare the means for, and to furnish money for, and take part in military expeditions and enterprises to be carried on from the United States against the Republic of Cuba.

The offense charged in a single count indictment carries a penalty of \$10,000 fine or imprisonment for not more than five years or both.

The indictment, among other things, charges that it was part of the conspiracy to recruit and encourage the recruitment of persons in the United States to participate in military expeditions and enterprises against Cuba and to dispatch men from the United States to Cuba for the purpose of committing sabotage and to assassinate officials of the Cuban government.

Besides alleging the purchase of arms and other military equipment, the indictment charges that

it was part of the conspiracy to establish military training camps in the Dominican Republic, Haiti and Mexico. It is also charged the conspiracy involved the purchase of ships to be launched from the United States carrying armed uniformed men, materials and implements of war for use against Cuba.

Commenting on the case, Assistant Attorney General William F. Tompkins, head of the Internal Security Division of the Department of Justice, said, "This indictment is notice to all that the neutrality laws of the United States, which are intended to safeguard and preserve peaceful relations with other countries, must be respected. When sufficient evidence is available to establish that individuals are violating these laws, prompt action must and will be taken."

Looking forward to this fall's Congressional elections, the Democrats and anticipating the pleasure of sinking their teeth into unemployment and the prospects of a continued decline in the economy. The easing of required national bank reserves, which frees more money for lending, is expected to stimulate lending and therefore consumer buying.

Regardless, experts on both sides of the fence expect the current economy decline to continue for several months.

The Republicans must use every means to curb rising unemployment, or else face the threat of losing the support of the Republican members of Congress whose home-state areas have been affected.

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## Our WASHINGTON Letter

By Congressman O. C. FISHER

THE HOUSE VOTED last week to give Congress new, tighter controls over Federal spending. Backed by Hoover Commission approval, the bill provides that Congress shall put a limit each year on how much money each agency of the Government can spend. As it now is the Congress may appropriate \$300 million, for example, to build an aircraft carrier, and the money can then be spent in one, two, three, years, to suit the Navy.

Thus, under this new proposal, the Defense Department would be required to justify each year how much money it intends to spend and Congress would set the limit. The Hoover Commission figured this reform would save a lot of money. I voted for the bill.

Speaking of the Hoover Commission, the total now runs a little more than 75 percent approval on all the recommendations of that group.

TEXAS INDEPENDENCE DAY was celebrated in Washington just as it was all over the world where as many as half a dozen Texans could get together. Dr. Logan Wilson, President of Texas University, came to Washington to speak to the Texas students and their guests.

A Texas gem, a \$10 treasury warrant, dated June 19, 1863, was given to me recently. An original, it is drawn on the State Treasury, payable to Wise County, or bearer, signed personally by C. R. Johns, State Comptroller.

ANOTHER TEXAS GEM, an old 1911 publication, entitled APACHE RELATIONS IN TEXAS, was recently given me by the author, Dr. Wm. Edward Dunn. Written while he was teaching at the University, long out of print, this booklet is an authentic, documented history of Apache operations from 1713 to 1750.

While I am on the Apache subject, in response to a request I recently wrote a chapter for a book on the great frontier Indian battles. The subject assigned me was "The Battle of Bandera Pass". While that famous battle was between Texas Rangers under the great Captain Jack Hays and the Comanches, the site — about 12 miles north of Bandera — was the historic home of the Apache before his retreat westward after a disastrous defeat at the hands of Spanish troops at the same pass a hundred years earlier. That Bandera area is seething with frontier history, much of which has been preserved by the late and lamented J. Marvin Hunter.

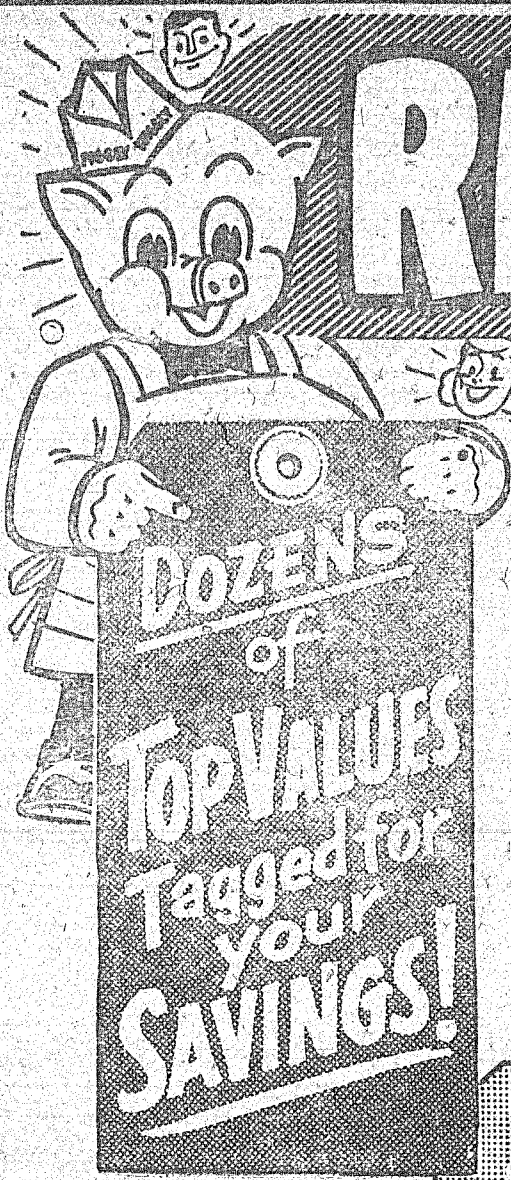
If sliding shelves in refrigerators tend to stick, rub them with a stick of paraffin (the kind used for jams) on the inside channels.

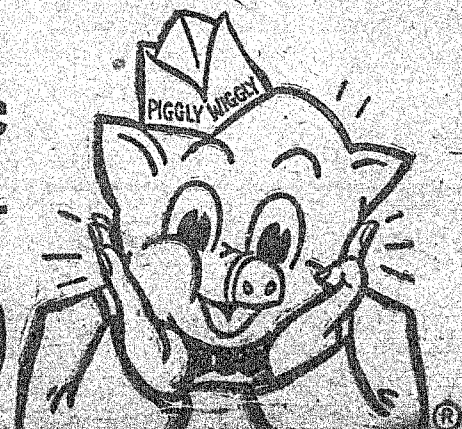
