Santa Anna Band Gets Trophy At Dublin Festival

The Santa Anna Band won the Second Place Trophy for its performance in sight reading at the St. Patrick's Day Band Festival held at Dublin Monday, March 17th. "Sight reading" is the process of performing a musical number at sight. The band cannot practice and only three minutes are allowed in which the band may look over the number.

In the Solo division, Donnie Neff received a Division II rating on a cornet solo and Glenn Gilbreath received a Division III rating on a trombone solo. Miss Ruth Walker was the accompanist for both soloists.

Mary Rehm, Dixie Baugh and Betsy Hellman took part in the Twirling section. In the solo and ensemble work they all placed in Division II.

In the Class A competition were the following schools: Santa Anna, Mason, Eastland, Rising Star, and Duncanville.

City Making Effort To Collect Delinquent Taxes

For the past several months a determined effort has been underway by the Mayor and City Council to collect delinquent taxes owed the City of Santa Anna. About \$3,500 has been collected but there is still several thousand dollars to be collected.

Some property owners do not owe very much at the present and some owe several hundred dollars. All taxes that are delinquent increase each month until they are paid. It seems a number of property owners do not realize that cities, school districts and States may sue for these overdue taxes and if they are not paid, your property may be sold for the taxes against it.

Tuesday morning \$7,766.43, including penalties, was on the delinquent tax role and during the day \$141.26 of this amount was collected. It is expected that more of it will be collected within a few days.

The tax money collected will be used for improvements in the city. It is possible that if efforts fail to collect delinquent taxes, suits will be filed against property owners for these taxes. If the suits are filed, either the property owners must pay all the delinquent taxes plus the costs incurred in the suit, or have their property sold at auction.

Improving our cemetery is one of the projects of our community, since enrolling in the Texas Rural Neighborhood Progress contest, and the Centennial year causes us to look backward in history to our pioneers who have gone on.

Some of the oldest markers are beautiful workmanship — carved from rock quarried from Santa Anna Mountains. One large one is dated 1891, another 1892. There are probably more than 200 listings, with some forever lost because the original map was destroyed by fire a good many years ago.

Local Library Has Large Selection Of Good Books

The week of March 16-22 has been designated by Governor Price Daniel as Library Week, and the week is being widely observed and commended upon.

It may be there are people living in or around Santa Anna who do not know of our nice library, situated just north of the City Hall, and filled with valuable and readable books.

The library was organized more than 30 years ago. It was launched in the then new City Hall, with a pastor from Brady assisting in the organization.

The Self Culture Club and the U. D. C. sponsored the venture. The public was invited to the launching.

The Club and Chapter elected Mrs. J. R. Banister and Mrs. R. C. Gay to represent them and the public elected this writer to represent them.

These and others kept the library open, gathered books, raised money, etc. Mrs. Banister did more than any one, creating interest and served free as librarian more than anyone else. For a time it was kept open on Saturday afternoon as well as on Wednesdays.

From time to time, others became members of the board. It was turned over to the WPA in the 30's and they operated it for several years as an almost full time library.

In late years it is operated by a board consisting of the heads of different clubs, with the president of the Self Culture Club serving as chairman.

Membership dues are just one dollar per year and two books may be checked out at one time.

When the City Council brought in the surplus buildings from Camp Barkley at Abilene, one of them was allocated to the Library Board. It was remodeled and redecorated, shelves were built, a kitchen supplied and furnished with a service for 36.

The living room was made a clubroom, with drapes and furniture in shades of rose and green, leaving space for a tea table. Interesting books are everywhere. The reading room is adjoining its shelves reaching almost to the ceiling and filled with books for all ages. Framed on the wall in the clubroom is the Library Charter, as granted by the City of Santa Anna.

At present the board consists of the presidents of all Women's and Men's civic clubs or their representatives, and a representative from the City Government and from the school. Mrs. Louie Storey is the librarian, and the building is open to the public each Wednesday afternoon from 3:00 to 5:00 p. m.

The clubroom is available to any group wishing to meet there with a charge of \$1.00 being made for the use of the entire building except the reading room.

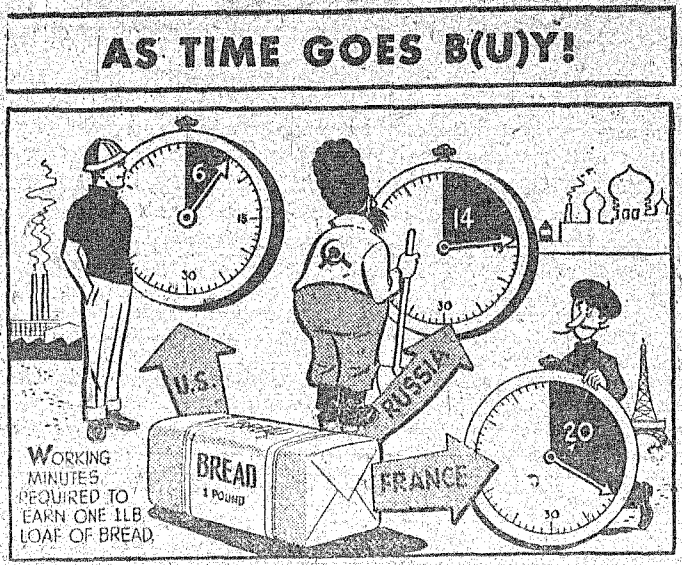

Ivan Skavinsky Skavor, the average Russian industrial worker, labors five times as long to fill his family's market basket as does Joe Smith, the typical American laborer.

In a talk before the National Food Conference, held recently in Washington, D. C., Vice President Nixon pointed out that Joe Smith can buy a pound loaf of enriched bread with six minutes of labor, according to figures compiled by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics. Ivan works 14 minutes for the same amount of bread which does not equal the U. S. loaf nutritionally.

Ivan works 132 minutes for a pound of beef. Joe Smith buys it with 31 minutes of labor. Joe works 25 minutes to add a pound of sliced bacon to the family larder; Ivan has to stay on the job 331 minutes to buy the same amount from a Moscow State store.

A grouping of 11 foreign countries, according to the work time required to buy food, indicates that the American worker spent less than one-fifth as much time to pay for a given quantity of food as the Soviet worker. He (the American) spent from 20 to 36 per cent as much as the Italian, Austrian, or French workers; from 39 to 48 per cent as much time as the Dutch, West German, Irish or Swiss; and from 62 to 71 per cent as much time as the Danish, British, or Norwegian workers.

Joe Smith works 4 minutes for a pound of flour. Irishmen and Norwegians are runners-up. They work six minutes for their pound of flour. Again, tops in the flour field is Russia, where 27 minutes of work are necessary.

French bread is in demand in many countries, but not-so-lucky Pierre works 20 minutes for a pound of it.

Ingenuity, Mussel Shells Will Make Good Fish Lures

from mussel shells can be easy and fun says William H. Brown, Aquatic Biologist, in a recent issue of Texas Game and Fish. The result of your ingenuity, Brown adds, will be a flashy bait sure to whet the fish's appetite.

In his article, Home-made Appeal, Brown gives the step-by-step instructions you can follow.

Simple tools are needed — a hacksaw to saw the shell into stripes, and pliers to pinch off small pieces of the strip until the rough outline of your lure is shaped. Final finishing touches are made with a file and either fine emory or sandpaper. A fairly rough surface with many faces to catch the light is better than one which is too smooth, Brown says.

In each end of your lure, a hole must be drilled for the attachment of split rings. This is probably the hardest part of the job, and it takes a hard, high-speed drill bit to pierce the hard inner-pearly layer of the mussel shell. Both drill bit and shell be-

come hot during this operation, so you must be careful not to get burned the author cautions.

One split ring is used at the front of the lure for attaching the line or snap-swivel from the line. Another split ring is used to attach a treble hook to the rear of the lure. When all the work is over, your lures will prove their worth with a good-looking string of fish.

100 New Jobs On

"The Legislature has authorized the Department to hire an additional 100 men, and we are now accepting applications," Speir said.

Young men between the ages of 21 and 35 who have at least a high school education, top physical condition, between 68 and 76 inches in height, weight 2 pounds per inch of height and not over 3 pounds per inch of height, and of good moral character, are urged to apply now.

The next examination will be given May 20, 21 and 22 and applications must be in by May 10. Applications may be picked up at Midland Department of Public Safety Headquarters, Abilene Highway Patrol Office, San Angelo Highway Patrol Office, Pecos Highway Patrol Office and El Paso Highway Patrol Office.

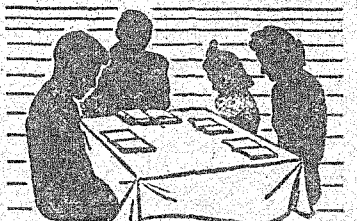

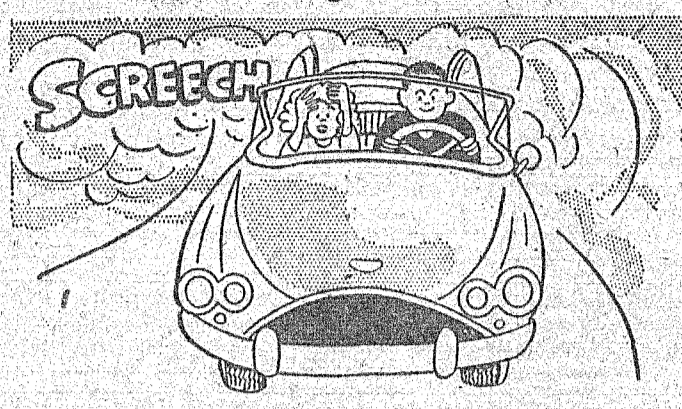

The majority in high school who drive do not think it's smart to be reckless. But most important, reckless teenage drivers are becoming more and more unpopular with other teenagers.

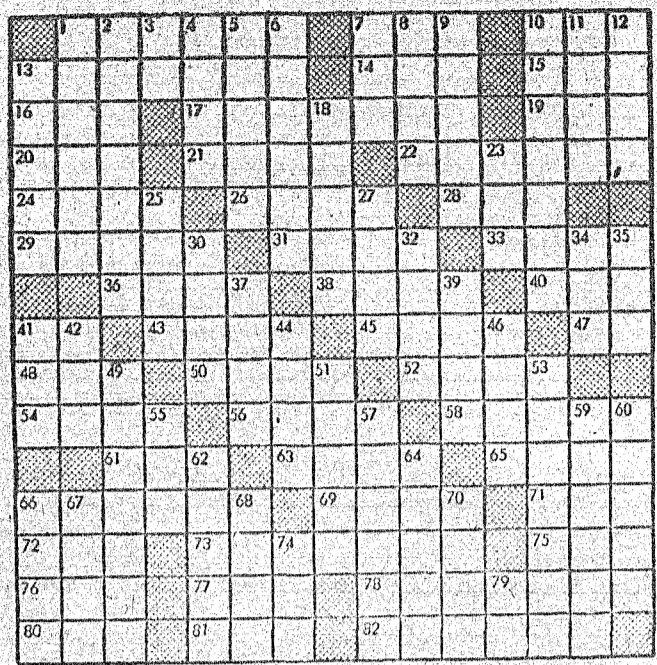

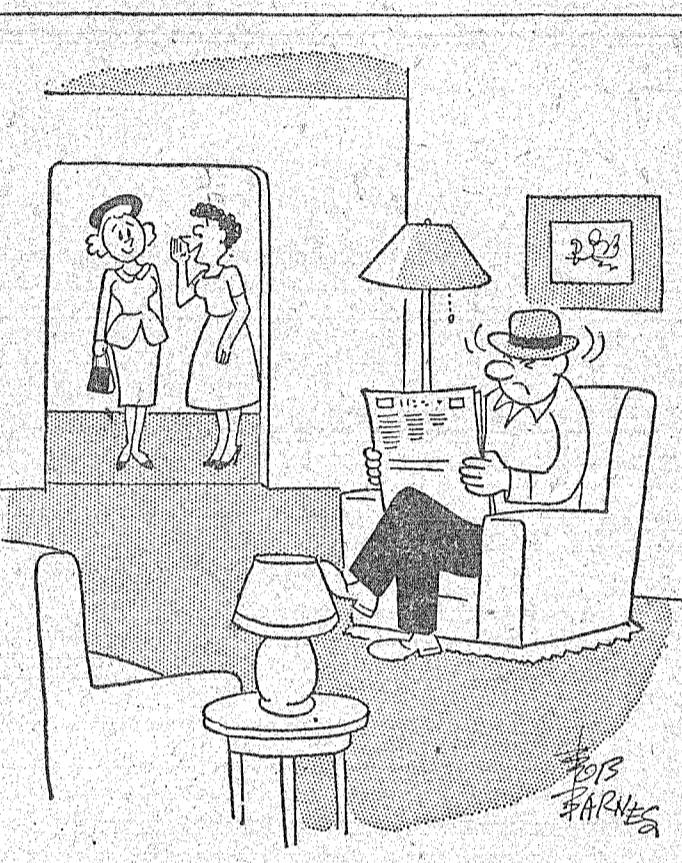
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

SCANNING THE NEWS

ECONOMIC conditions continue to be the topic for both news and conversation.

The man on the street is concerned with the increasing cost of living—particularly with the cost of food, which represents a big item on the family budget.

The administration in Washington is banking on the fact that the downward trend will be reversed in a few months and is therefore hesitant to undertake any emergency actions which might tend to encourage inflation.

The Democrats are getting on record with proposals as to how to curb the downturn.

For some time, people on both sides of the political fence in Washington have considered some form of tax cuts to be the best way out. The administration has tried to avoid the move; Democrats have been planning for it, chiefly in the form of individual tax exemptions.

At this time, one thing is certain. Economic conditions in the United States will be a major political issue for the 1958 elections.

The tornado that swept through Mississippi in late February, leaving a dozen or more dead and many injured, recalls a mind the fact that "natural disasters" such as hurricanes and tornadoes were responsible for an increase in the

number of deaths from catastrophes (accidents in which more than five persons are killed) during the year 1957.

Almost 1,700 deaths from catastrophes were recorded during 1957, about 400 more than the previous year. Chiefly responsible for the increase was Hurricane Audrey, which took a "known" toll of 350 when it struck the Louisiana coast.

How are you going to keep 'em down on the farm—when opportunities look more promising elsewhere.

According to a recent survey, only one out of six agricultural college graduates goes back to the farm.

Biggest reason, it is said, is because of the fact that aggie grads are taking advantage of well-paying positions in agriculturally-related industries and professions.

Another reason: the high cost of setting up a modern farm operation today. Some grads get back into farming later on, after acquiring a "nest egg."

Each year some 7,300 graduate with bachelor degrees in some branch of agricultural science. About 1500 receive masters' degrees and some 400 earn doctors' degrees. Advanced degree grads go mainly into teaching or research work.

ACROSS the DESK

From the Vista Press, Vista, California: Accidentally came across a newspaper from deep in the Ozarks, which carried an interesting cross section of the type of lives these people live.

The publication is from a county seat and is almost entirely filled with personal items, some of which are worth repeating, others demonstrate the simplicity to which these citizens are accustomed. Side pork, salt meat and fat back were advertised. Never saw fat back advertised in this good old state, but it must be delicious—most of the grocery ads carried it.

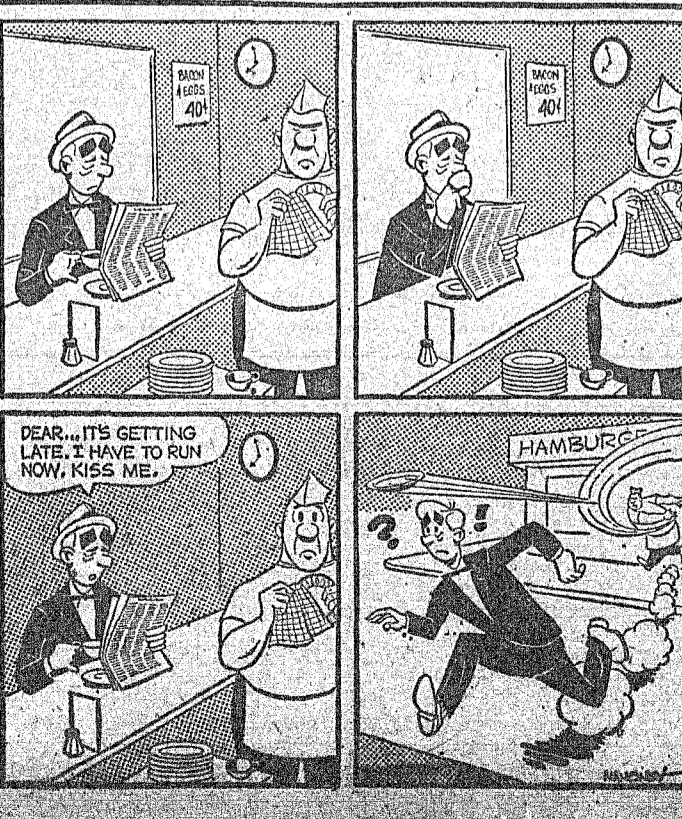

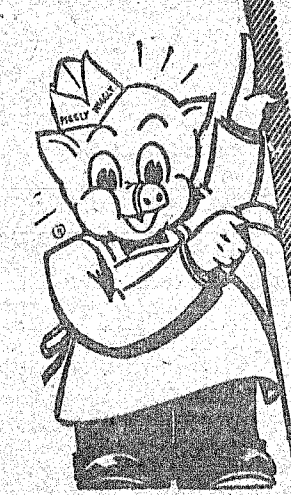

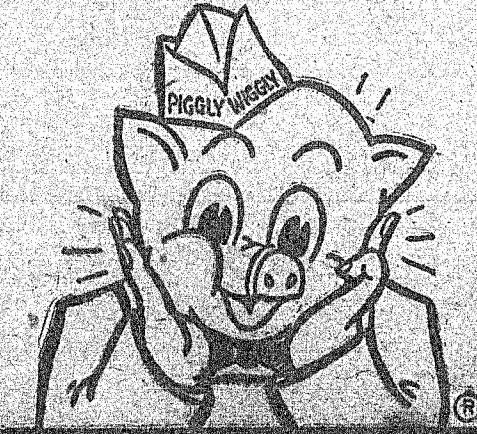
