

Upland Cotton Purchase Program Initiated Here

On July 30, 1983 President Reagan signed legislation authorizing a new upland Cotton Purchase Program, according to an announcement made by the

Bailey County ASCS Executive Director Danny Noble reports that information he has received indicates that the new Upland Cotton Program provides that Commodity Credit Corporation will offer to purchase upland cotton from producers with outstanding 1980,81 or 82 crop cotton Form A loans in ex-

cess of their PIK needs. The new legislation also permits producers to submit bids without regard to a maximum bid percent of the total bales offered; and permits producers offered outstanding crop loans under the previous Upland Cotton Purchase Program to submit

These bids may be submitted beginning August 8, Monday at the local ASCS office in Muleshoe.

According to other specifications by the USDA, the previously announced "Harvest For PIK" requirements have been suspended because of the new Upland Cotton Purchase Program. Following CCC's determination of the cotton acquired under the new program, further instructions will be provided if producers are required "Harvest for PIK"

According to there could be a delay in the availability of PIK entitlements to those producers who were previously required to harvest for PIK. However, producers with sufficient quantities to satisfy PIK loans and producers with whole base bids will not be affected.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Independent Muleshoe School District will be held on Monday, August 8 at 8 p.m. in the school admin-

istration office. According to Superintendent John Fuller, several information reports will be given. Among these will be a report on the South Plains School Board Association meeting which will be held on August 25. A refund from the Texas Association of School Board's workers' compensation self-insurance fund will be discussed and a progress report will be given by the committee in school's charge of the mathematic evaluation program. Also to be discussed will be the fifth Saturday -Visit the Superintendent Program which is being in-

itiated here. Under financial reports, the Board will review bank balances in each school fund, as well as expenditures in each function of the school budget. Current bills will also be considered for payment approval.

Need For Moisture Is Immediate

County Agent Spencer Tanksley told the Journal Thursday that two things would be necessary for Bailey County to realize a good harvest season for 1983 - those two things being rain, within the next few days and a long, dry

The situation in Bailey County is complex the agent said, due to the fact that in the northeastern part of the county there is some early cotton, corn and soybeans. Still in that same part of the county, there are hailed out areas which were replanted and need still more time to produce. In the south of the county, some crops are early and some are late, creating the same complex situation. Isolated areas have received rain, but on the whole, most crops in the county

need some extra time to

New School Budget 10% Less Than '82

The Muleshoe Board of Trustees met in a special session August 4, 1983, for the purpose of reviewing the 1983-84 budget. This was a committee meeting and no action was taken. During the meeting Superintendent John Fuller presented the entire 1983-84 proposed budget. The proposed budget was analyzed by the trustees in a line by line review. The proposed regular program budget (3,407,675) is \$380,522 less than the 1982-83 budget representing a decrease of 10%. Fuller noted that in four of the five budget categories in the regular program budget that de-

creases were experienced. The main reasons for the increase in contracted services was noted as follows: an estimated 30% increase in telephone rates; an estimated 20% increase in natural gas; an estimated 10% increase in electricity (fuel adjustment cost); and an estimated 34% increase in Tax Appraisal District

Fuller pointed out to the local trustees that these expenses will increase in that the district has little or no control over the utility cost other than in conservation efforts. He also pointed out that the appraisal increase should be only a one time increase and

crease for re-appraisal (\$25,000) to decrease next year. Fuller also pointed out that where most of the decreases in the budget were significant, the greatest budget cut was in the area of renovation. Fuller urged the school trustees to seriously consider establishing a renovation program Cont. Page 6, Col. 4

Cotton crops in Bailey County, the agent said, carry the largest acreage amount and several thousand of those acres are now under a moisture stress, with no new growth appearing.

Tanksley reported that grain sorghum in Bailey County has a good potential for yields this year if moisture is received in time to do some good. Some grain in the South of the county is late, but also has

the potential. Land is now being made ready for dryland wheat crops for 1984, Tanksley pointed out; stressing the fact that three to four inches of rain is needed on this land now to enable farmers to complete their preparations. The Agent stated that available moisture in the dryland wheat areas had been used up by the extreme heat and working of the land.

The Extension Agent pointed out that wheat yeilds for Bailey County had been reported as high as 100 bushels per acre on irrigated land for the 1983 harvest, with about an average amount of yield on dryland crops. Some dry-land crops in the south of the county; however yielded more than producers had seen in some years past, according to reports. Tanksley stated that in spite of some record yields, total county production was probably down some - with some producers reporting bumper crops and others reporting good and average, and some being reported as "down".

"Because of the extreme heat in June and July,' Tanksley pointed out, "crops are behind in the Cont. Page 6 Col. 2

Concern VoicedOver Diabetic Diet Study

A recent research study is being mis-interpreted to mean that diabetics no longer have to worry about their sugar intake, says Dr. Alice Hunt, a foods and nutrition specialist with Texas A&M University's Agricultural Extension Service.

The study, which was published last month in the New England Journal of Medicine, has been widely publicized as good news for diabetics.

But according to Hunt, the limitations of the study have not been thoroughly discussed in reports of the

For example, the study used only 10-12 insulinrequiring diabetics, an equal number of adultonset diabetics and a control group. This is a small number from which to generalize to the more than four to five million American diabetics.

Most important, says Hunt, is the fact that diabetics in the study consumed their sugar with a meal containing protein. This served to slow down the digestive processes, which helps diabetics metabolize both simple carbo-

hydrates like sugar, and complex carbohydrates like

The results of the study indicated that diabetics did not differ from non-diabetics in their blood sugar levels after consuming meals which included sugar.

"That doesn't mean diabetics should start consuming sugar at will, however," states Hunt.

"It's still important to divide both complex and simple carbohydrates into at least three meals a day to be consumed with other foods," warns specialist.

Simple carbohydrates such as soda or candy consumed by themselves as a snack, will dangerously increase the diabetic's blood sugar level, she adds.

Insulin-requiring diabetics should consult with their physicians before making changes in their diets, and all other diabetics should be wary of any radical changes, cautions

Some changes in the Texas brucellosis program which will allow for more freedom of movement of cattle, along with changes in procedure for establishing a certified free herd, have been approved by Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

The changes were approved at a recent Commission meeting in Austin, says Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Present for the commission session were newlyappointed commissioners Mrs. Mary Nan West of Batesville, Laurence Bostick of Brookshire and Robert Bartlett of Canton.

Three changes relate to movement of cattle and

1. In a consignment in which there is a vaccinated animal that is a suspect on the brucellosis test will now proceed in this manner: In such a situation, negative cattle in a consignment in which there is a vaccinated card test positive but rivanol or complement fixation negative suspect, may move.

relating to testing requirements from a C state or area or within the Texas C area. Changes in procedures for establishing a certified free herd concern both dairy and beef cattle operators, Tanksley said.




