Plans For Annual Baseball Program Still Incomplete

A. D. Donham, secretary and treasurer of the Santa Anna Quarterback Club, said this week that plans for the annual summer program were incomplete, but he hopes they will be completed at the regular meeting of the club Monday night, April 14. All members of the club and those interested in the summer baseball program are invited to be present.

Donham said the organization needs those who will manage a club this year to either let him or Add T. Walker know about it as soon as possible. Thus far, they do not definitely have anyone to manage a team.

Also bids are open for someone to manage the summer program. The duties are varied for this position and anyone interested should discuss the situation with Walker or Donham, then submit a sealed bid for his services for the summer months.

At the last meeting, it was voted to have about the same program as last year. However, there is not enough boys in the upper age bracket to have four teams, so some changes are going to have to be made. Donham said it may be possible to form an organization with a team or two from here and some teams from surrounding communities, to form a league in the age bracket of 13 through 15 years. This would put all the boys from the ages of 8 through 12 years in a local league. They have enough boys of this age to have four and possibly five teams.

Managers will not buy their players this year, as in the past. All the boys names will be drawn from a hat. They will be in three divisions: outfielders, infielders, and pitchers and catchers. No age limit in the age brackets will be placed on the pitchers this year.

Donham said the Baseball Commissioners and other parts of the program will be attended to at the April meeting.

Mrs. J. E. Watkins Dies Suddenly Last Wednesday

Many persons here and elsewhere were greatly shocked when they heard of the sudden death of Mrs. J. E. Watkins, in the Santa Anna Hospital early Wednesday night, March 26th.

She had been in the funeral home, sitting with a friend until a few minutes after six o'clock and planned to return the next morning. Shortly after reaching her home on South Houston Street, she suffered a stroke, entered the Santa Anna Hospital before 7:00 o'clock and died before 8:00 p. m.

Services were held in the First Baptist Church, where she had long held membership, on Friday, March 28, at 2:30 p. m.

A former pastor, Rev. S. R. Smith of Brownwood, and the present pastor, Rev. Maurice Smith, officiated.

Mrs. Watkins was born in Falls County January 15, 1880, being 78 years, two months and 11 days old at the time of death. She came to Coleman County in 1905 and remained.

She was president of the Embroidery Club and Secretary of her Sunday School Class. Women of these groups occupied reserved seats.

One Out Of 5 Cars Still Need To Pass Safety Inspection

Roughly, one out of five autos have not been inspected as required by State law and there remains but 8 more working days prior to the inspection deadline on April 15.

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that some 700,000 motor vehicles must still pass through the inspection lines prior to that date if their owners are to avoid being handed tickets for violation of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law. Enforcement will begin April 16, he said.

"It is still possible," said Garrison, "for the State's 4500 licensed inspection stations to handle the last minute rush provided that motorists take their cars immediately in order that there will be no delayed period between the handling of one vehicle and the next."

The Public Safety Director pointed out that every minute of the inspection stations' time will be at a premium between now and midnight April 15, and that waiting lines will be in store for those who wait as the deadline draws near.

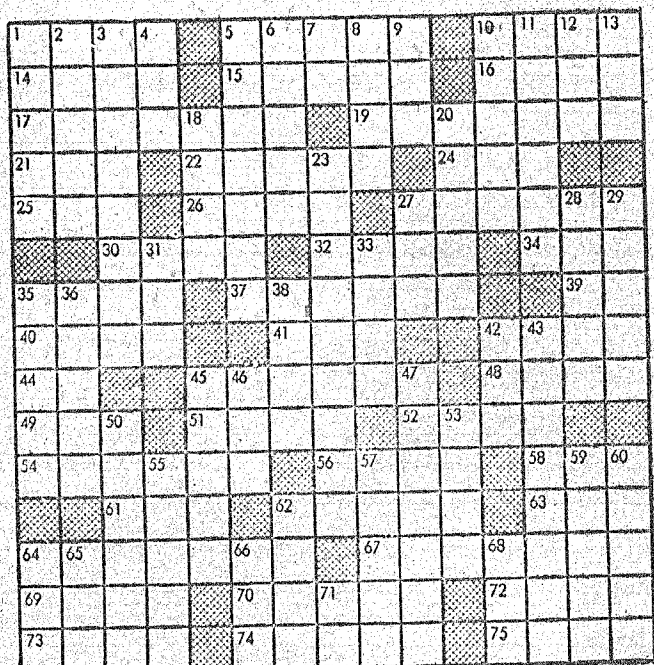

Next month Texans will note the fifth anniversary of an event which transformed the neat center of a city into a twisted debris-laden mess in a matter of seconds — the Waco Tornado.

Perhaps the best way to pay homage to the scores of people who lost their lives in the Waco disaster would be to learn and heed the proper means of protecting ourselves whenever a tornado threatens.

An elaborate tornado detection warning system is now in operation throughout Texas and neighboring states, with the central weather bureau in Kansas City. Whenever compiled weather data indicate, the Kansas City bureau alerts all weather bureaus in the affected area which in turn notify all local media of mass information such as radio stations and TV stations.

These stations then announce a SEVERE WEATHER ALERT, carefully describing the areas in which strong weather will occur. This does NOT mean a tornado is going to occur, but it does mean that conditions are such that a tornado could develop.

From this point the weather bureau, the Ground Observer Corps and the Department of Public Safety work hand in hand. Whenever radar picks up a likely trouble spot, a patrol

car is dispatched to the location to check. If it is a tornado, the direction, approximate speed and exact location are determined by both the patrolman and by the use of three radar stations getting a fix on the trouble point.

Radio and TV stations are then immediately notified and a TORNADO WARNING is issued describing the direction and speed. This is the time to take action.

No TORNADO WARNING is issued until an actual tornado has been sighted and verified. A period of SEVERE WEATHER ALERT is a time to prepare for action — but a TORNADO WARNING means act and act fast. Keep tuned to your radio or TV set and you will be immediately informed — do NOT swamp the station or weather bureau with telephone calls.

When a warning is received seek inside shelter, if in town, preferably in a steel reinforced building, but stay away from windows. If at home, the southwest corner of the lowest floor or in the basement offers greatest safety. If in the frame, brick or stone house you should seek other shelter. Electricity and fuel lines should be turned off.

Windows on the north and east sides of the house may also be opened to help reduce damage to the building. If you have one, use a storm cellar.



EGG MARKET NEWS — A NEW SERVICE FOR TEXANS

Sometime in April, thousands of Texans connected with the State's mammoth egg industry will benefit from a new important Texas Department of Agriculture service — regular reporting of prices and conditions on Texas eggs.

Since the recent inauguration of the Texas Egg Law made possible more uniform egg marketing conditions over the state, the need for such a service has been voiced from every direction. The main problem facing the Market News Section of the TDA in setting up an egg market report was to make certain all areas of the state benefitted equally when reporting began. And that was a lot of territory to cover.

It was determined that no less than six areas should have individual price reports, at least at the beginning, in order that regional differences in prices and conditions would not be overlooked.

Therefore, present plans are to report a Texas six-area market including the Lubbock-South Plains Area, Dallas-Port Worth Area, Tyler-East Texas Area, Houston Area, Corpus Christi-Rio Grande Area, and Austin-Santa Antonio Area. The report is tentatively scheduled for bi-weekly release, on Monday and Thursday of each week. Prices will be given at first on five grades — AA Extra Large, AA Large, A Large, A Medium, and B Large with possibly other classifications to be added later.

Sources for price information in each of the six areas will be bona fide egg buyers who directly purchase the producer's eggs. They will be contacted directly by personnel from the TDA's regional offices.

The Texas Egg Market will be made available to all interested persons through the press and radio as well as through the Texas Poultry & Egg Market News bulletin, mailed free of charge on request.

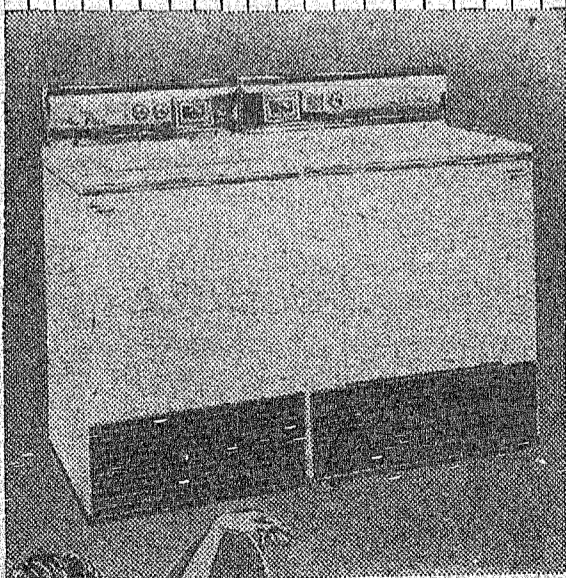

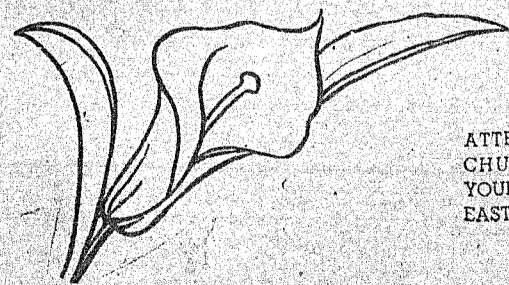

Many friends here will regret his passing.

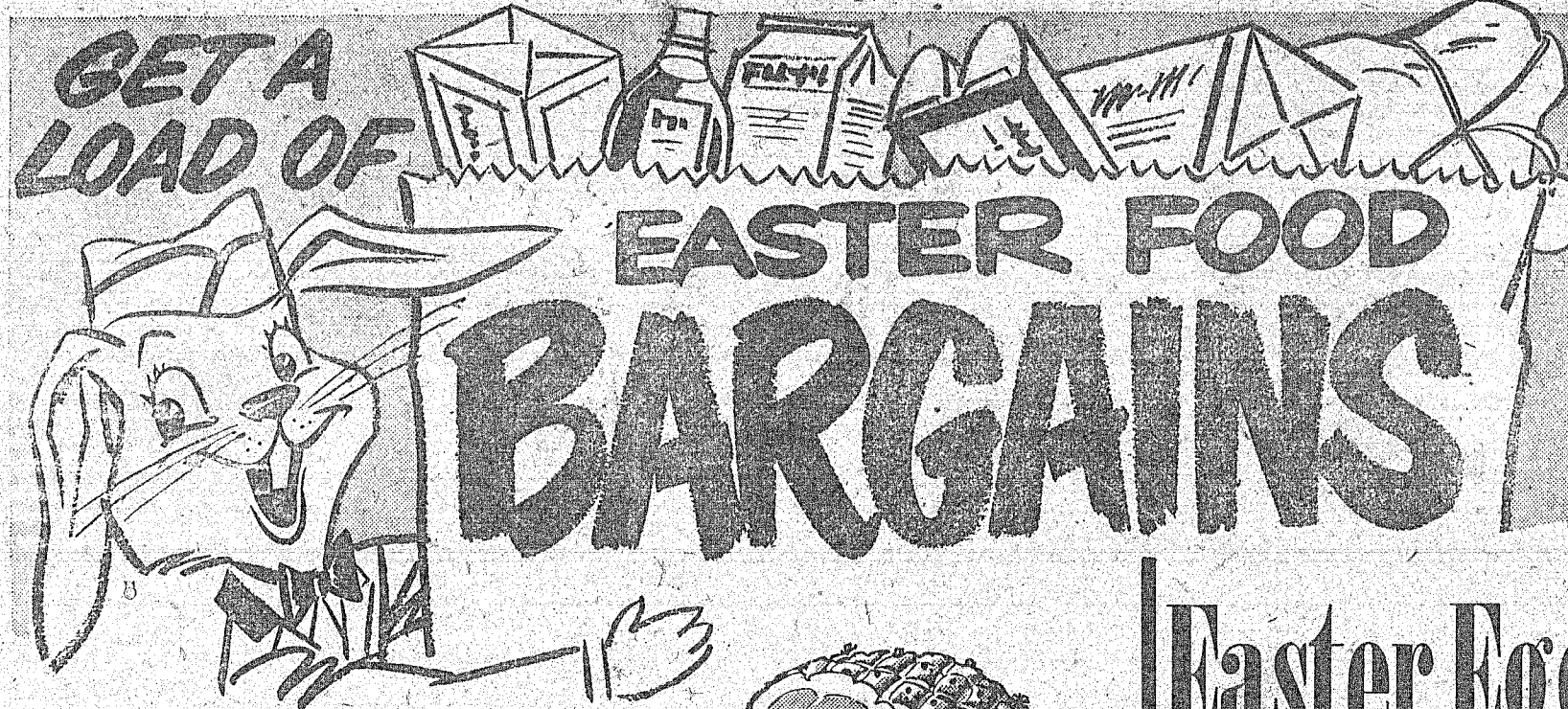
He was a member of the Baptist Church.
