The need for a "catch" crop due to the late season for planting regular crops is causing many growers to consider guar. Guar offers a farmer a triple purpose crop — a deep root soil improving crop, a cash return from sale of guar beans and a

high protein supplement for on the farm feed. (Guar beans contain about 27% protein.) Guar is a nitrogen fixing plant with a tap root that penetrates several feet through plow pans. If water stands in terrace channels for days after a rain, guar is a good method to use in getting that water into the ground. This water can be stored in the ground if the soil is in condition to take it in before it evaporates. A deep clay or clay loam soil will store about 2 inches of moisture per foot of depth. Guar greatly increases the rate of moisture penetration.

Many successful growers have reported that guar has made them more money than grain sorghum. Guar will mature in 120 days. Considering the present sub-soil moisture, Stewart says that guar planted in moist soil in the next 45 days will mature a crop of beans without any more rain. Guar thrives in hot weather. It can be planted anytime until June 30. Guar requires no special planting or harvesting equipment. Plant 8 pounds of seed in regular width rows on moist soil using same seed plates and planting method for milo. There will still be time to plant guar after small grain harvest. This will provide another cash crop on the same land and at the same time provide needed soil improvement. 

The Texas cotton farmer's opportunity this year will be in a high quality crop—not necess-arily in quantity, Agriculture Commissioner John White said this week.
