## Know How You Are Going To Vote Saturday, July 26

Do you know just how you are going to vote when you go to the polls Saturday, July 26? For your information and convenience, elsewhere in this issue of The News you will find a sample of the official ballot you will receive when you go to the polls.

There are 10 races on the ballot, other than precinct races, that are contested. Every voter in the county will vote on these 10 offices, along with all the uncontested races, which number 16. Each precinct will then have some difference in their ballots. All ballots in Precinct No. 2 and No. 4 will have the contested races. Parts of Precinct No. 2 and No. 1 will have uncontested races for Justice of the Peace.

All the races are listed on the sample ballot so every county voter will have an opportunity to see how the names are placed in each race.

We urge every voter in the county to study this sample ballot and know who you are going to vote for when you go to the polls. We are sure most of you know who you are going to vote for, for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, United States Senator and the district and county races — BUT, what about the two contested places on the Supreme Court, Commissioner of General Land Office and Commissioner of Agriculture.

Study the sample ballot and find out all you can about each person seeking election to office. Vote for the person you think the best qualified to fulfill the office they are seeking.

You will notice there is no little □ (squares) on the ballot this year. These were eliminated by the last Legislature. In voting this year, you just mark out the names of the ones you DO NOT want to vote for.

## Funeral For Lee Mobley In El Paso

Funeral services for Robert Lee Mobley, 65, were held in El Paso at 9:00 a. m. Saturday, July 5th. Mobley died in an El Paso hospital Wednesday, July 3rd. A retired civil engineer, he had lived in El Paso for the past three years.

Mr. Mobley was the local postmaster from 1919 to 1932, then he operated a drug store here until 1938 when he moved to Las Cruces, New Mexico, where he was employed until he retired three years ago.

He is survived by the wife and two daughters, a brother, Jack Mobley of Santa Anna, and a sister, Mrs. C. E. Moore of Brownwood. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Mobley attended the services.

Burial was in the Fort Bliss National Cemetery with full military honors. Mobley was a veteran of the first World War.

After completion of the active duty, the men will return to Santa Anna to fulfill the remainder of their military obligation attending once a week drills with the local Guard unit.

Highlight of the program was recognition of the oldest natives present. Mr. and Mrs. Bob Johnson of Rockwood were recognized as the oldest native couple, born and married in the county. Mrs. Johnson was born a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Cheatham at Trickham. Mr. Johnson was born at Rockwood. They were married in 1904 and in 1905 purchased the farm they are living on at the present time. They have lived there over 53 years.

Joe E. Green was recognized as the oldest native man present. He was born near Blackwell Crossing on Jim Ned Creek, in northeastern Coleman Co. Mrs. May Sharp of Santa Anna was recognized as the oldest native woman present. She was born in the Bee Branch Community.

Other activities of the afternoon included the Golden Horseshoe Saloon, where the center of activity was for most of the afternoon. A. D. Donham was the bartender, mixing and serving free lemonade and coffee during the afternoon hours. Fifty gallons of lemonade were served, but very little coffee was requested. VERY often parents will complain that John and Mary, their teenage children, are "too lazy to breathe." This complaint is often accompanied by the observation that their children seem to spend every minute that they are not engaged in sports sprawled on beds, chairs or couches. Parents have forgotten, I think, that they too went through this

difficult stage. The fact is your teenager is probably "plain tired." True, they spend hours swimming, playing tennis, baseball and taking part in other teenage activities. This of course uses up a great part of their energy. But another great amount of their energy is used up in the process of "growing." I suggest that those parents who

sometimes think they will lose their minds if John or Mary doesn't show a little activity around the house, remember it takes a lot of energy to grow two or three inches in a year.

I have heard businessmen and women complain that they are completely "bushed" after a day at the office. And none of them have engaged in the type of physical labor that would exhaust them. The reason they are "bushed" is that mental activity has tired them physically.

Your teenager is also going through great mental development. Every minute of his day he grows mentally as well as physically. He can get just as tired as you from this mental activity.

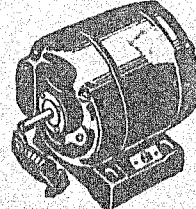

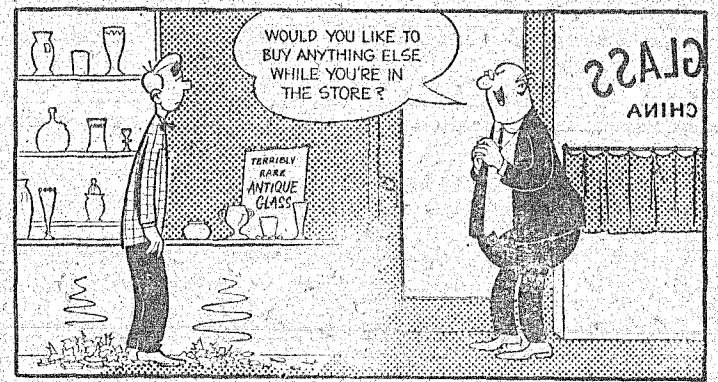
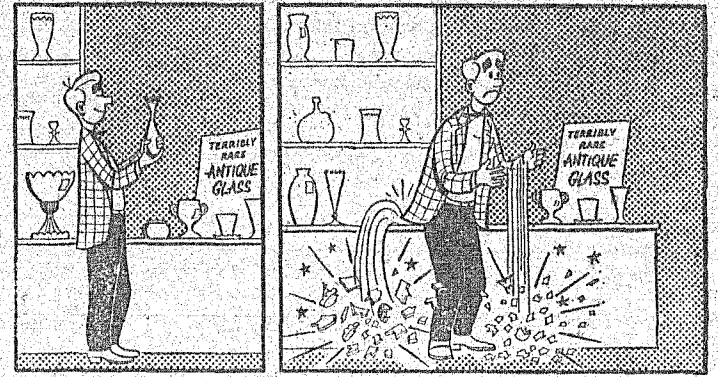

The terrible Carry Nation of Kansas would have been mighty proud of the good women of Santa Anna - the GOOD women, that is. The jezebels of the saloon got what they deserved.

Even if the bottles contained only colored water, Santa Anna's reenactment of an early-day saloon raid was a rousing one. The poke-bonneted, long-

skirted women tore up that den of iniquity with gusto. (Sort of made a man shiver, to watch it.)

The show was a re-creation from a yellowed old photograph depicting women-folk who broke up the town playhouse about 1890. The idea took form as Santa Anna's part in the 100th birthday celebration of Coleman County.

Frowning down on the Main Street assault were several old buildings which probably witnessed the original War on Evil. The Golden Horseshoe Saloon, which dispensed free lemonade until the show, occupied an empty store building Saturday.

Captains of the outraged bloomer brigade were Mrs. Lorraine Rice, Mrs. Jewell Owen and Mrs. Billie Gregg.

Before their invasion, lounging in the saloon were cowboys, town dandies and other saloon sports. Drinking and carousing with them were Painted Women

Mrs. Wanda Campbell, Mrs. Billie Guthrie and Mrs. Betty Rucker.

Uproar began when the good wives laid their arms around the booze and beer stacked on shelves behind the bar. The Belles-of-the-Bar waded in with flailing arms, but they were no match for Aroused Morality.

Only one casualty was reported among the women, after the brief tussle. Mrs. Guthrie (B-girl in a low-cut, bright green dress) got bopped in the nose by an accidental elbow of a raider. But she rubbed the nose and smiled.

Next was Destruction. The victors splattered their load of bottles on the pavement in front of the Golden Horseshoe, while a few of the male spectators winced. though they knew it was colored water.

# About Your HEALTH

It will arouse the wrath of sun worshippers, but this must be said: The healthful effects of a suntan aren't worth the time and trouble it takes to get one. After all, a sunburn — like any other burn — is a manifestation of a skin injury.

True, a sensible bask in the sun makes a fine mental pick-me-up, and there is no denying the supple appeal of a tawny life-guard. But to overdo it can lead to trouble. In fact, it can kill you. More than one person has succumbed to prolonged and unaccustomed exposure to the sun.

Even at best, overexposure can mean two or three miserable days when a mere shirt or blouse is torture and a trichly pat on the back can end in murder.

The medical term for sunburn is "erythema solaris." It's the ultra-violet light in sun rays which does the damage. And since clouds don't remove all ultraviolet rays, it is possible to get burned even on overcast days in mid-summer.

Some people are physically unable to tan. Known medically as "helio-phobes," they could spend the entire summer on Padre Island, and all they'd get

would be blisters on their blisters. The reason: Their skins lack the pigment necessary to produce the tan tint. They never had a tan and they never will, so they ought never attempt one. Each new exposure will only mean a new burn.

Assuming you are the type who can tan — a "heliophilac," that is — the well-known rule about doing it by progressively longer exposure times is valid and should be followed.

Sunshine is a source of vitamin D, as most people know. What is apparently misunderstood is that ordinarily healthy people can get all the D vitamin they need through routine activities such as hanging out the family wash, mowing the lawn, or walking to the store.

For persons suffering from pellagra, lung tuberculosis, high blood pressure, or hypothyroidism, sunlight may be definitely harmful.

In case you have wondered about the source of freckles, here is the answer: The color of everyone's skin is determined by the amount of pigment in skin cells. Dark-complexioned people have considerable blondes very little, and albinos none at all.

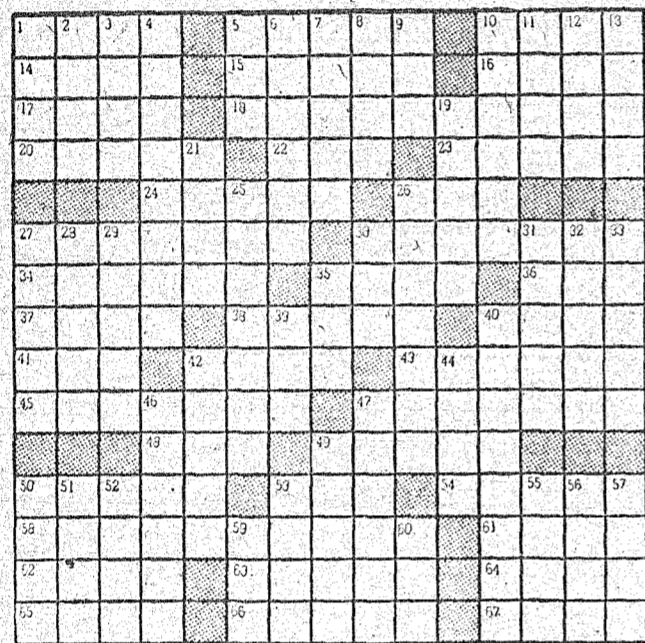

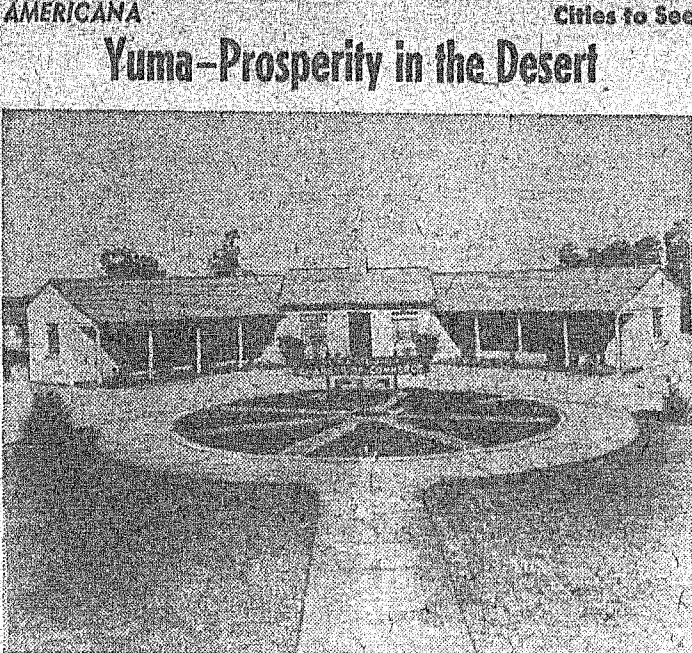

**Yuma—Prosperity in the Desert**

An old city that is bursting at the seams with new life and vitality—that's Yuma, Arizona. Located in the southwest corner of Arizona, this city of some 18,000 citizens is bordered on the west by the Colorado River and California and on the south by Mexico.

A century ago, Yuma, was heavily overshadowed by nearby Gila City, a mining boom town which became one of Arizona's first ghost camps. First white man to visit the area was Father Kino, who in 1701 reached the Colorado in an effort to prove that Baja California was a peninsula and not the island it was thought to be. It was Father Kino who blazed El Camino del Diablo—The Road of the Devil—which figured prominently in early Southwest Arizona history.

As an Indian settlement and river crossing, Yuma predated the Spanish explorations of the 16th and 17th century. Soil in Southwest Arizona varies from silty clay to fertile sandy loams and there is sunshine the year round. Yet, agriculture had to depend upon the availability of water from the Colorado and the Gila Rivers. The Gila was undependable, bone dry in some seasons, a flooded torrent in other months. The Colorado was the big hope for Yuma and the surrounding territory.

**Two Projects**

A study of the area undertaken by the government in the early 1900's resulted in two major reclamation projects. The Yuma projects include 50,000 acres southward from Yuma, to the Mexican border. The Gila project, 15 miles east of the city extends up both sides of the river for about 40 miles.

From Imperial Dam, 18 miles north of Yuma on the Colorado, hundreds of miles of ditches and canals bring the life-giving water which has transformed the Yuma area into an agricultural paradise.

**Diversified Crops**

Thousands of acres of citrus crops bloom on the Yuma Mesa. Tomatoes, onions, and potatoes have taken over fields that once grew only cotton. About 90 percent of the nation's Bermuda grass seed is grown in the Yuma area. Dates, cantaloupes and rust-resistant varieties of wheat are other products of Yuma's constant agricultural productivity.

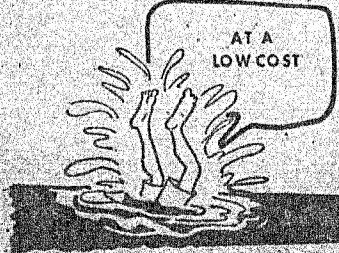
