are going to vote when you go to the polls Saturday, July 26? For your information and convenience, elsewhere in this issue of The News you will find a sample of the official ballot you will receive when you go to the polls.

There are 10 races on the ballot, other than precinct races, that are contested. Every voter in the county will vote on these 10 offices, along with all the uncontested races, which number 16. Each precinct will then have

some difference in their ballots.
All ballots in Precinct No. 2
and No. 4 will have the contested races. Parts of Precinct No. 2 and No. 1 will have un-contested races for Justice of the Peace.

All the races are listed on the sample ballot so every county voter will have an opportunity to see how the names are placed in each race.

We urge every voter in the county to study this sample ballot and know who you are going to vote for when you go to the polls. We are sure most of you know who you are going to vote for, for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, United States Senator and the district and county races - BUT, what about the two contested places on the Supreme Court, Commissioner of General Land Office and Com-
