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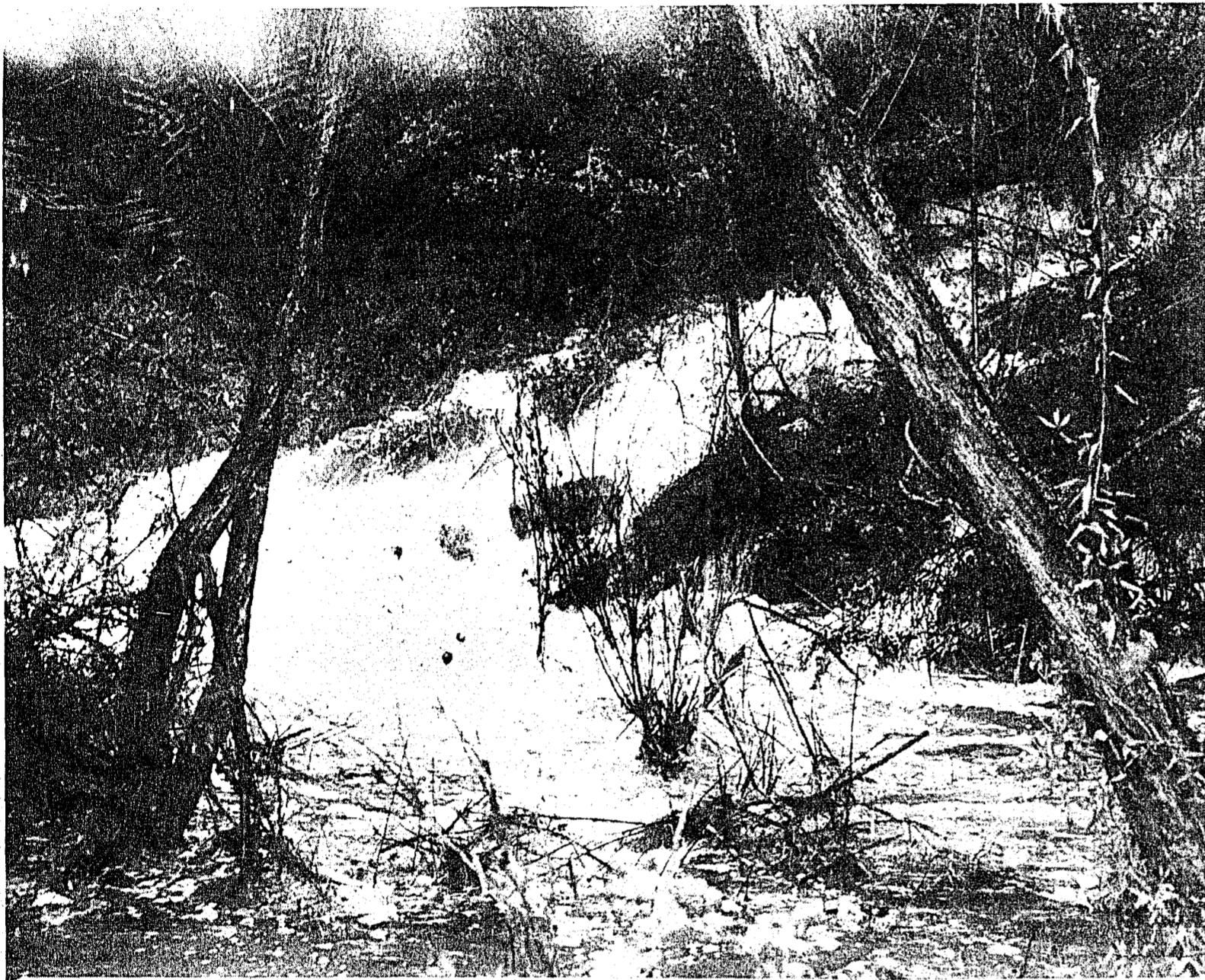

## Rain Causes Flooding In Area

Santa Anna area received somewhere in the neighborhood of 7-1/2 inches of rain from Wednesday of last week thru Sunday causing only minor problems here as compared with those of some of our neighbors. With a total of 11.22 inches in December, that brings our yearly total so far to 47.24 inches for the year according to our local reporter, R.W. Balke. Some folks are reporting a little more than that total. Normal rainfall averages about 27 to 29 inches for Coleman County. It is our understanding that Coleman has reported over 50 inches now for the year. Any way you look at it, its the wettest year in Coleman county than most can remember.

The weather has been the big story in this part of state the past few days. In fact all of Texas has experienced a great deal of rain since it began here last Wednesday. The

town of Santa Anna has been a little luckier than many of our neighbors who have seen quite a bit of flooding. The city of Coleman had some street flooding with water creeping into some homes. Lake Coleman hit the emergency spillway level at about 8:00 Friday night flooding some 10 or so homes in that area. An estimated 1.1 million gallons of water per minute were exiting the lake adding more water to already flooded Jim Ned Creek which feeds into Lake Brownwood where people were experiencing their own set of problems from the heavy continuing rains. Many homes in the Lake Brownwood area were flooded.

The town of Brownwood once again experienced flooding. Some businesses downtown and along Commerce Street were flooded. Thru Sunday. High water forced road closings in several area counties.

Here at home Santa Anna City officials and workers had a harrowing hour or two Friday morning when water began rushing around the spillway at Lake Santana into the water treatment plant area just below the spillway. City workers took a backhoe to the area where Tommy Jackson piloting the machine, lifted others to a building that stored water treatment supplies so that the supplies could be brought to higher ground.

The rush of water continued throughout the morning until mid afternoon but not doing any damage to the plant itself as had been earlier feared.

Lake Santana was as full as anyone can ever remember seeing it. Tommy Blanton, water plant superintendent, said he has never seen water come around the spillway at Lake Santana like it did Friday. He has been on that job about twenty years. The lake was

so full that water was backed up to the county road which enters the lake area. Here in town the main complaint for city crews to contend with was the rain water flooding sewer lines.

Folks along the Home Creek and Colorado River areas of the county can tell you they haven't seen that much water in a long time if ever. One rural resident reported that the Colorado was "all over the country". Bill Bryan of Rockwood reported about 9 inches of rain fell at Rockwood from Wed. to Sun.

Personnel at the engineers office at Hords Creek Lake informed us Monday morning that lake had caught 11-1/2 feet of water with water still coming in Monday. At the Monday level of 1906 elevation it tops the high of 1903 recorded in 1956. The lake water was running over the uncontrolled spillway over the weekend and still overflowing on Monday.

Officers with the CRMWD office stated Monday morning that Lake Irvie elevation had risen from 1525.85 on Wednesday when the rains began to 1533.49 on Monday with the level still rising at that time. The Wednesday acre feet was 195,396 and Monday mornings recording was 270,326.

## Texans Should Be More Alert To The Subtle Symptoms Of Diabetes

### Texans Should Be More Alert To Diabetes' Subtle Symptoms

In what some health officials call a "quiet epidemic," an estimated \$30,000 Texans may go blind, require amputations, need kidney dialysis—even die—because many fail to recognize and seek treatment for the early signs of diabetes.

Dora McDonald, in the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Chronic Disease Prevention Program, explained that diabetes' first symptoms are so subtle, and public understanding of the disease so scant, that perhaps only half of those afflicted with diabetes have been diagnosed as having the disease.

clusive, since a death certificate may name kidney failure or other complication as the cause of death, without mention of underlying diabetes," she said. At TDH, McDonald is staff director of the Texas Diabetes Council.

"By the year 2000, more than a million Texans may have diabetes. Although it is so common now, and has been documented for centuries, most people are poorly informed about the disease. Few see the prevalence of diabetes as the epidemic that it is," McDonald said.

She explained that diabetes is the most common cause of kidney disease, the leading cause of blindness and the foremost cause of non-traumatic limb amputation. The likelihood of suffering a stroke or heart disease doubles for a person who has diabetes.

"Detected and treated early, the advance of diabetes in a patient can be halted or delayed," McDonald said. "But only about half of the people with diabetes are diagnosed before they suffer life-threatening complications."

Warning signs of diabetes are: abnormally frequent urination, unusual thirst, fatigue, sudden weight loss, blurred vision and slow-healing wounds or infections.

McDonald stresses that anyone at any age can have diabetes. However, people who are 40 or older, those who are obese, or who have family histories of diabetes are especially at risk.

Some research suggests that American Indians, Hispanics and blacks have a higher tendency than whites to develop diabetes.

Anyone who suspects he or she has diabetes should ask a physician for a blood sugar test. If the test indicates diabetes, the doctor can prescribe medication, if needed, and design a diet to help control blood sugar levels.

"In most cases," McDonald said, "the patient can, by following the doctor's treatment plan, lead an otherwise active life. Failure to do so can be disabling or deadly."

Bucholz, D.O., an osteopathic radiologist at Parkview Hospital in Toledo, Ohio and president of the American Osteopathic Association. "Women over age 50 should be screened every year." He pointed out that many physicians also recommend that women have a mammography between the ages of 35 and 39.

"This provides a good benchmark with which to compare later mammographies," Dr. Bucholz said.

Mammographies can help prevent breast cancer by early detection. If a woman discovers lumps in her breast or armpit, a mammography will often determine if the lump is cancerous.

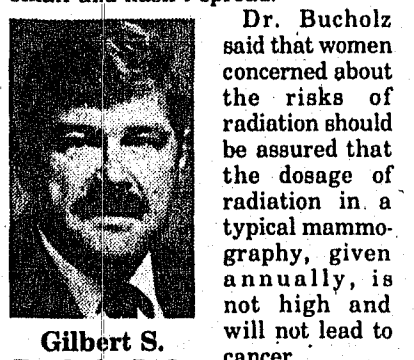
In addition to lumps in their breast or armpit, Dr. Bucholz recommended that women look for thickening of their breasts, dimpling of breasts, or a heavy or bloody discharge from the breast. Because cancerous tumors may often be too small to be felt by a woman, a mammography is a necessary procedure.

When weighing the pros and cons of having a mammography, Dr. Bucholz suggested that women focus on the benefits of early detection of precancerous changes in the breast.

"Early detection can mean a better chance of cure if treatment is begun right away," he said. "Additionally, early detection from a mammography often results in less extensive surgery if the cancer is very small and hasn't spread."

Dr. Bucholz said that women concerned about the risks of radiation should be assured that the dosage of radiation in a typical mammography, given annually, is not high and will not lead to cancer.

"Furthermore, physicians will only recommend mammographies when the perceived benefits outweigh the potential risks of exposure to radiation," he said.

Dr. Bucholz also recommended that women perform breast self-examinations each month after their menstruation.

According to the American Cancer Society, the incidence of breast cancer has increased three percent since 1980. This year, one out of every nine women will contract breast cancer, bringing the national total to 175,000. More significantly, 44,500 of these women died of breast cancer in 1990.

The only way to avoid becoming one of these statistics is by combining regular check-ups, monthly breast self-examinations and following physicians' guidelines for mammographies.

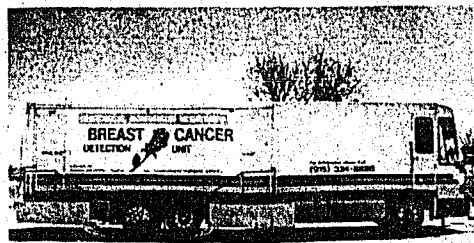

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

### Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

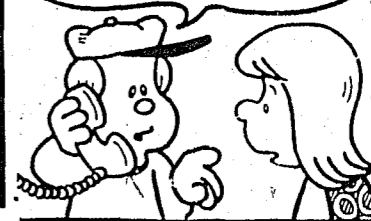

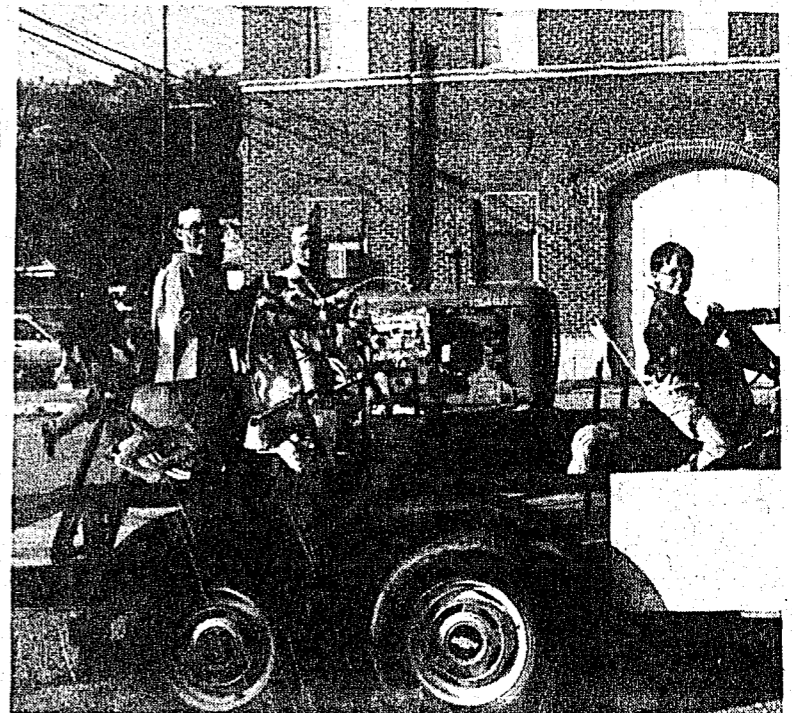
