SOUTH CAROLINA AND LIBERTY

The anguish which goes with making out tax form 1040 is still vivid in our memory. This year it produced a "greater than usual" interest in the LIBERTY AMENDMENT which is designed to eliminate the point of conflict between government and people.

Constitutional authorities regard the federal individual income tax as essentially un-American in concept and practice. The original Constitution of the United States (Article 9, Paragraph 4) specifically prevented the central government from levying a tax on people except "in proportion to the census or enumeration." The restriction against encroachments upon the individual and the states was set aside by the 16th (income tax) amendment, regarded as essentially un-American because it conforms to the second plank in the Communist Manifesto which advocates "a heavy progressive income tax."

Aside from these technical viewpoints, the American people detest the income tax, the invasion it imposes, and the invasion of their private lives. Fresh from the battle with tax form 1040, we have a keener appreciation for the LIBERTY AMENDMENT. This proposal first provides for removing the federal government from all fields of private enterprise directly competitive with its own citizens, and then provides for repeal of the 16th Amendment.

Unbelievable as it may seem, this can be done by simply restoring the original Constitution. This would remove federal corporate activities which compete with the private enterprises of the American people although they have no constitutional authority for so doing. These bureaucratic empires consume most of the federal revenue each year to pay their losses and hidden costs.

There are more than 700 federal agencies which have participated in the invasion of private enterprise. They have taken over 40 percent of the land area and 20 percent of the industrial capacity of the nation. These lavish enterprises each year consume more dollars than all the American people combined pay in individual income, estate and gift taxes.

By simple arithmetic, then, it becomes apparent that by thus removing this encroachment upon the American people and restoring constitutional protection to private property and private enterprise, the costs of the federal government would be cut more than half, accommodating repeal of the federal income tax (16th) Amendment and at the same time the federal government will have a balanced budget and do a better job with its authorized functions.

Many are accustomed to the "status quo" and can hardly consider a change, yet the sheer logic and provable justice of the LIBERTY AMENDMENT has caused more than 6,000 organizations to adopt Resolutions of support for it. Forty-two States have organized groups supporting it, and organizations in the other eight are forming.

The LIBERTY AMENDMENT pending in Congress as H. J. Res. 23 has been formally approved by the Legislature in six States by overwhelming margins. Wyoming approved it by "Voice Vote" in the House and without dissent in the Senate. The Texas House voted 80 to 55 for it and the Senate approved by "Voice Vote." It won unanimous approval by the Nevada Senate and won in the House by a vote of 81 to 10. In Louisiana the House approved it by "Voice Vote" and the Senate approved it 28 to 9. Georgia (February 16, 1962) adopted it 88 to 17 in the House and 39 to 2 in the Senate. South Carolina (March 22, 1962) approved it 46 to 17 in the House and unanimously in the Senate.

May Plentiful Foods In Tune With Spring

College Station — May plentiful foods — five on the official list — can make your menus sing a merry air, right in key with perked-up spring appetites, suggests the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Milk and the whole family of dairy foods are the feature. Production in early 1962 was averaging more than 2 percent above that of a year earlier. It's at its peak in May and June. Further, lower milk support prices, effective April 1, are being reflected in lower consumer prices on some dairy foods.

Other items on the May plentiful foods list, as determined by the Agricultural Marketing Service, include tender broiler-fryers, canned freestone peaches, eggs and vegetable fats and oils. The supply of each is expected to exceed normal trade needs.

Broiler-fryers, once considered a rare spring treat, now rate high as a year-around economy meat. Prices have been unusually attractive, except for producers. February at-the-farm prices were the lowest on record for that month. And production in April, May and June is expected to increase more sharply than usual.

Eggs are another typically spring item. Biddy is producing more, as she does each spring. And the number of Biddies is up 2 percent from a year ago. So eggs are plentiful; prices are low.

Stocks of salad and cooking oils continue at record levels. They go naturally with the abundance of spring salad greens. And you likely will find many stores running specials on canned freestone peaches this spring. Last fall's pack was huge. They're still plentiful.

Savings Bonds Sale Reaches \$98,775 In First Quarter

Savings Bonds sales for the first three months of 1962 in Coleman County totaled \$98,775. Of this amount \$46,301 were purchased in March according to a report released by Robert I. Bowen, Jr., chairman of the Coleman County Savings Bonds Committee.

Texasans purchased \$41,512,602 E and H Bonds during the first quarter of the year and March sales were \$17,031,657.

It is designed to remind every citizen of an opportunity for patriotic service through the Savings Bonds program — to ask him to invest his dollars in his country, for the strengthening of our economic defenses against the danger we face. Our WASHINGTON Letter



By Congressman O. C. FISHER

FIDEL CASTRO'S LATEST defiance of civilized decency was his ransom demand for the release of the 1176 men captured last April 17 at the Bay of Pigs. Castro has conducted a propaganda trial and sentenced each of the patriots to 30 years at hard labor. But if \$62 million can be raised, the prisoners will be exchanged for that amount.

Here is a brand of trafficking in human beings that belong to the dark ages. The incident serves to remind us that Castro is after all nothing but a common bandit. This Havana tyrant was let out of prison within 15 months after he had sought to overthrow the Batista regime. But now, with the shoe on the other foot, he metes out 30-year sentences to rebel patriots, and then seeks to extort money for their liberation.

IF THE UNITED NATIONS is interested in such repulsive conduct, then here would be a chance for it to at least condemn such debauchery, and let the world know that the UN is interested in human rights and does not condone international banditry. UN silence in the face of such conduct is another evidence of its weakness and ineptness.

CASTRO'S ECONOMY IS in very bad shape, and this may account for his quest for dollars. All our trade with Cuba has been

cut off, except for a small amount of medical supplies. This would seem to be an appropriate time for the United States to intensify means of liquidating the Cuba mess. Trade boycott will hold but it is not enough. It should have been done long ago, but wasn't. From the standpoint of our national security this country can ill afford to stand by and allow the communists to make an armed camp, with rockets, missiles and submarine bases, etc., only 60 miles off our shores.

Many Children of Deceased Veterans Eligible for Benefits

Unmarried minor children of deceased veterans may be eligible for pension payments even when their mother, the veteran's widow, is not eligible. P. J. Mins, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, reminded today.

Most frequent examples occur when the widow becomes ineligible due to remarriage or receives income in excess of the legal limit. Ineligibility of the widow does not affect the eligibility of the minor children, Mins said.

No problem arises when widows on the pension rolls become ineligible, the VA pointed out, because pension payments are stopped to the widow but continued to the eligible minor children.

But, if the widow has not applied for a pension, knowing that she is not eligible, or if her application was not allowed, the VA has no record of any minor children who may be eligible.

Unmarried children of deceased veterans are eligible for pension payments until they are 18, or until age 21 if they are attending school, provided their own personal income would not bar them, Mins said.

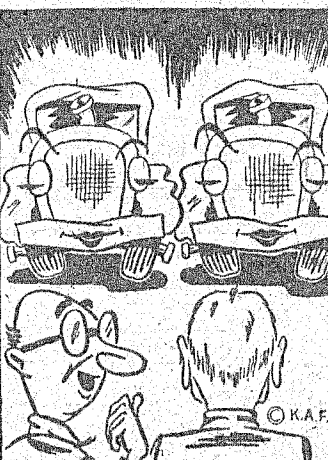

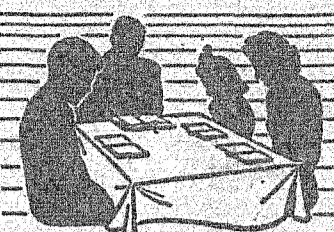

The Upper Room

Read Matthew 24:36-51.

"Therefore you also must be ready; for the Son of man is coming at an hour you do not expect." (Matt. 24:44. RSV.)

A picture representing an incident in the life of Napoleon shows a sentry who had been placed on duty in a cornfield. Overcome by the heat and fatigue, he had fallen asleep.

The emperor passed by, took the man's musket from his side, and stood in his place at the post of duty.

The picture shows the soldier as he awakes and finds a sentry standing in his place. He stares with white face and horrified eyes as he recognizes the sentry as the Emperor Napoleon himself.

We must stand guard against neglect of duty, against carelessness. In Jesus' parable when the master of the vineyard was delayed in returning, the evil servant became self-indulgent and quarrelsome. Because the reckoning was not soon demanded, the servant thought perhaps to escape it altogether. To guard against this tendency, Jesus frequently warned His disciples, "Watch," "Take heed."

PRAYER

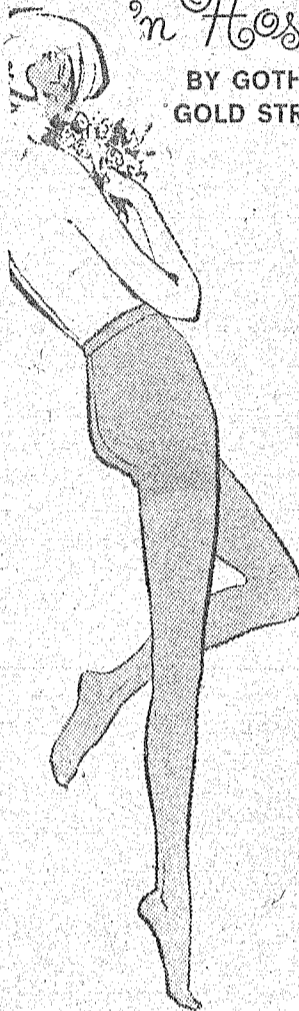
