THE AMERICAN WAY

COMPETITION TO LIVE BY

The American consumer is the most pampered in the world. In no other country does he hold the whip hand over the producer of goods as he does here. The fiercely competitive efforts on the part of many merchants of widely varied types bring to this fortunate nation the world's most generous supply of necessities and comfort luxuries.

Nowhere else does the fact of surplus goods dominate so completely the psychology of a nation. A curious, endless chain of circumstances results. Surplus generates competition. And competition, in turn, generates surplus. The problem of our society is to maintain a continuing effort to avoid breaking that chain.

Sometimes it is an over-solicitous act of government which threatens interference with the natural relationships of supply and demand, of labor and management, producer and merchant, or of the money market. The greatest upset occurs when inflation or deflation interferes with the normal purchases made to satisfy the needs of a nation.

Retailers and manufacturers alike cite the 'cost-price squeeze' as the major management problem today. But the consumer enjoys its benefits.

The three largest department store groups in early post-war years earned four to five percent on gross sales. Now profits range from one to three percent. Likewise, successful discount chains earn little better than two percent. Today the department store operates in competition with the discount department store, the discount house, the variety store, the supermarket and the all-purpose drug store.

To the department store, the answer is greater efficiency. By matching — or approximating — the prices of the opposition, the traditional store can hold its public.

The department stores have \$14 billion in sales annually, compared with \$4.5 billion a piece for the discounters and the variety stores. But the latter groups are catching up. It is to the credit of the department store operators that they are overlooking no chance to hold their position by doing their job better.

One device for so doing is being demonstrated in a small department store in a suburb outside Baltimore. It is called Unit-Tote, and has been developed by American Totalisator Company, a division of Universal Controls Inc., the company that produces and operates the pari-mutuel totalisators found at race tracks and county fairs.

This system fills a void in the processing of information, from the point of sale to the point of management decision. It replaces the cash register with a unit that instantaneously makes all the calculations now torturing salesladies, produces a printed sales slip, checks the credit rating, and transmits all information about the merchandise into a computer process. As a result, the merchant has instant access to all the facts needed for decisions on inventory, reordering, tax payment, advertising and possible price cuts on less-favored items.

This is a typical example of how the American Free Enterprise system works. It demonstrates basic characteristics of American businessmen: the will to change, the need to improve — from which the consumer is the chief beneficiary. Improvement comes only from competition. When government controls production and distribution (as it does in many other countries — and is doing more and more here), there is no competition, only total monopoly. As a result, there is no will to change, no need to improve.

The department and discount stores will continue their vigorous rivalry. Individual concerns may go by the wayside, but each of the types will continue to play an important part. And you and I are the beneficiaries — as is the entire economy.

Our WASHINGTON Letter

THE TRADE BILL, which sailed through the House, is due for a thorough going-over by Senator Harry Byrd, Senate Finance Committee, before final action is taken.

Already, some of the most ardent of the free trade supporters are conceding the bill which cleared the House goes beyond anything ever before proposed in respect to foreign trade in this country. They admit that if improperly administered the program can be disastrous to large numbers in U. S. industry.

In fact, administration spokesmen have estimated that initially, following the drastic reduction being planned, some 800 American businesses will have to fold but sponsors contend this impact will be offset, they hope, by stepped-up exports by other industries.

In the field of agriculture, the legislation is most liberal. Here the President is given power, at his own discretion, to completely eliminate all tariff on practically all agricultural commodities and all agricultural products. That includes live animals — sheep, goats, hogs, and also chickens and turkeys. These lists may also include wool and mohair.

This authority is granted to the President to be exercised by the State Department, for a period of five years, with no effective right of Congressional review during that time.

From the standpoint of Texas, the bill ignores the plight of domestic oil producers where a real depression is now in full swing, due to excessive dumping of low cost foreign oil.

Much of the opposition to the bill crumbled in the face of full-dress pressures that were brought to bear. Now it's up to the Senate to remove some of the bugs and apply a semblance of moderation and restraint, plus some guide lines in lieu of blanket delegation of powers by the Congress to the Executive, with no strings attached.

Sergeant Sosebee reported that four rural traffic accidents occurred last month in which no persons were killed. Five were injured with property damage amounting to \$2,810.00. During the same month last year there were five accidents with no one being killed, 11 were injured and property damage amounted to \$6,185.00.

Sergeant Sosebee reminded that more strict compliance with our traffic laws would further reduce this tremendous loss that kills and cripples so many of our citizens each month.

Every other person in this country wears either glasses or contact lenses, according to a medical publication, "Patterns of Disease."
