

**"PROFITS" — A LOVELY WORD**

The way the word "profits" gets kicked around, you'd think it was synonymous with "child-stealing."

Yet profits have produced everything we have. Without them, what would give an employer the incentive to risk his savings to provide work for others? Who would have bothered to produce all of the modern conveniences we take for granted — such as the newspaper you're now reading?

The hope of profit has spurred man to most of his greatest achievements. And we too often forget what a man is required to do in order to obtain profits. There is only one thing in the world that can produce profits. That one thing is service. In order to receive profits, a capitalist must provide a genuinely needed or desired service. In a free economy, there's no other way.

**What Are Profits?**

Profits are a measure of the service we give.

The more service a man provides — the more he answers the real needs and wants of society — the more profits he will probably receive. If he has nothing of genuine value to offer, who will voluntarily provide him with a profit?

The man who can produce the greatest good for the greatest number of people, will be the man who makes the most profit.

That's the beauty of the free enterprise system. In order to make money, a man has to help others. Altruism is built into the system. No regulation or slave labor is necessary.

**Neglecting System**

Unfortunately, however, we have allowed our free enterprise system to fall into disrepair. We have allowed government to create artificial incentives and barriers.

Men now receive profit from the government for performing work that is not genuinely needed by society. And legislation is passed conferring artificial advantages to labor unions so men can gain personal profits without serving.

And while providing false incentive on one hand, government is also placing, artificial barriers in front of the genuine incentive to serve. Businesses are penalized for serving too much, thereby reaping more than the "allowable limit" of profits.

**Solution Overlooked**

Politicians supposedly lay awake nights trying to think of ways to organize society (by force) so as to bring the greatest good to the greatest number. It's a shame they are blind, to the only answer that can possibly produce that worthy objective. History has proven that only free enterprise can produce the greatest good.

To make it real again in America, we must pass the Liberty Amendment, clean out the oppressive regulatory agencies, and stop penalizing success in business.

The utopia that socialists and communists think is over the rainbow, is really right under their noses. Let's bring back the profit system!

**Land Bank To Reduce Interest Cost To Borrowers**

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has announced that effective on January 1, 1963, it will reduce temporarily to 5% the interest rate on all outstanding loans which presently bear a rate in excess of 5%. The contract rate on new loans will continue to be 5 1/2% but interest on loans closed on and after December 1, 1962, will be billed temporarily at 5% until further notice by the bank.

In making the announcement, Hal Weatherford, President of the bank, said that of its \$260 million of loans outstanding, more than \$100 million bear contract rates in excess of 5% and that the savings to Texas farmers and ranchers by this action will be more than a half million dollars in the year of 1963 alone. Weatherford said this is the fourth time the Bank has voluntarily reduced the interest on its outstanding loans.

The Houston bank makes long-term farm and ranch loans through 73 Federal Land Bank Associations located throughout Texas. The one serving this area is the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman. Leslie Bryant is the Manager and the other officers and directors are Johnnie I. Henderson, President, Burkett R. Coleman, Texas; N. M. George, Vice President, Baird, Texas; Ralph M. Edens, Talpa, Texas; W. R. Hickman, Jr., Coleman, Texas, and R. O. Nichols, Baird, Texas.

**Cotton Quota Polling Places Set**

Polling places where Coleman county farmers may cast ballots in the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop have been announced by A. V. Bullard, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. The referendum will be held on Tuesday, Dec. 11.

The polling places are located as follows: Agricultural Building in Coleman; Box Grocery in Rockwood; Santa Anna National Bank in Santa Anna. Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m.

Any person who does not reside in the county in which he is engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1962 may obtain a ballot prior to the referendum from any county ASCS office and cast his ballot by mail. Also, any producer who resides in the county in which he is engaged in the production of cotton, but will be out of the county on Dec. 11, may cast his ballot by mail. Absentee ballots must be mailed in accordance with instructions available at county ASCS offices and must reach the county office for the county in which the producer is eligible to vote, by 6:00 p. m. December 11.

Chairman Bullard explained that every effort has been made to inform farmers fully about the allotment-quota program so that the outcome of the referendum may represent the considered opinion of all voters. Farmers eligible to cast ballots are all those who engage in the production of upland cotton in 1962. This includes those farmers whose 1962 cotton history acreage is protected by participation in the soil bank, released acreage or preservation. If the husband is eligible to vote, the wife is eligible. Approval by at least two-thirds of the growers voting is necessary if quotas are to go into effect.

Issues to be decided in the December 11 referendum are (1) quotas or no quotas, and (2) the level of price support to be available for the 1963 upland cotton crop.

If the vote is favorable, quotas will be in effect for the crop — with penalties on any "excess" cotton produced on a farm, and price support to growers who comply with their farm allotments will be available at a level of from 65 to 90 percent of parity.

If the vote is not favorable, there will be no quotas or penalties applicable to the 1963 upland cotton crop, and price support to cooperators will be at 60 percent of parity, as directed by law. Department of Agriculture officials have pointed out that, while the administration plans to recommend new cotton legislation early in 1963, it is anticipated that such legislation would supplement rather than substantially change the basic program choices in the December 11 referendum.

# State Capital NEWS

Austin — Twenty changes in Texas' two per cent sales tax law are recommended by the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy.

Some changes would result in decreased revenue and some would mean an increase. But the total outcome of a legislative put-and-take would produce an additional \$10,500,000 a year from a tax that is expected to bring \$170,000,000 into state coffers this year.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas is chairman of the commission. Other members are Hugo H. Loewenstern of Amarillo; Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin, Sen. Louis Crump of San Saba and Jop S. Fuller of Port Arthur; Representatives Charles Sandahl of Austin and Charles Wilson of Trinity.

Parkhouse predicted that if spending in the next biennium is in line with the present level, no additional taxes would have to be levied.

A large addition to income — if recommendations are adopted — would come from applying the state sales tax to motor vehicle sales in place of the selective excise tax now levied on vehicles.

Commission recommended repeal of the exemption of farm machinery and equipment, but suggested that feed for farm animals; herbicides, defoliant and desiccants, and all fertilizer sales be exempt.

Some other recommendations were:

1. Apply sales tax to all clothing sales, which would up revenue \$10,000,000 a year.
2. Exempt vending machines sales of less than 25 cents, and all sales of less than 25 cents for retailers who derive 50 per cent of receipts from such sales.
3. Exempt sales made to state banks, since sales to national banks are exempt.
4. Exempt all sales of alcoholic beverages.
5. Permit grocery stores to pay sales tax in proportion to purchases of taxable and non-taxable items. Grocers with annual receipts of less than \$100,000 would pay sales tax on the assumption that 85 per cent of receipts are from exempt items.

**RUNS AT STANDSTILL**

The "run rate" at Gatesville State School for Boys has been reduced to zero since September 4, when the new \$2,000,000 Mountain View School for serious offenders was opened.

School was dedicated last Saturday in a public ceremony featuring an address by Gov. Price Daniel.

Weldon Brewer of the Texas Youth Council said the "run rate" has been cut down gradually over the past five years.

In 1958-59, when the average monthly population at Gatesville was 1,115 boys, there was a monthly average of 51 escapes. In 1959-60, with 1,197 boys, there were 44 escapes a month. In 1960-61, with 1,364 boys, there were 31 escapes. In 1961-62, there were 1,502 boys with only 24 escapes.

Since the 200-plus inmates most likely to run were moved into the double-fenced Mountain View campus, there have been no escapes.

"A walled home may seem cruel to some people," Brewer remarked. "But it's a very humane arrangement when you realize that the boys within are able to take part in a training program and group recreation."

Before the new school was opened, the boys who broke out had to be confined to a small room.

Guards on Gatesville's 40 acres do not carry guns.

**BRACERO CALLS DOWN**

Texas cotton farmers reacted to a U. S. Department of Labor wage standard of 70-cents an hour, for braceros hired to chop cotton, by resorting to almost exclusive machine harvesting.

While 45,000 Mexican contract laborers were hired in August of 1961, only 16,000 were used in August this year, and they also harvested vegetables and grain.

**ELECTION CHANGES**

The Election Law Study Committee released a 221-page report on proposed changes in Texas election laws.

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, chairman of the committee, said the main goal is to remove conflicts and deficiencies from the present code. The more palatable suggestions will be included in one bill for legislative consideration. More controversial items will be presented separately.

Public will have a chance to challenge the proposals on December 6 and 7 when an open hearing will be held in the Senate chamber. Committee also will hold hearings at that time on a voter registration law and a proposal to change the dates of primary elections.


Some of the 120 proposed amendments concern:

1. Having voters check preferred candidates on paper ballots, instead of "scratching" those opposed.
2. Requiring write-in nominees and runoff candidates to pay the same fees as other candidates.
3. Fining voters who cast a ballot in one party's primary and then vote in the runoff of another party.
4. Requiring campaign expense reports by newspapers, magazines, billboards, printers, radio and TV stations, on all advertising contracts.
5. Requiring all voters over 60 years of age to get annual exemptions.
6. Permitting different parties to hold primaries in the same building, as long as there is no means of direct passage between polls.

**Your Community And Your National Guard Unit**

This is the first of a series of articles to be published each week to produce a better understanding of the ways the National Guard serves the Community, State and Nation.

When and where was the National Guard born? The first time an organization was called the National Guard was in 1824 when the 7th Regiment of New York furnished a unit to act as a guard of honor to General Lafayette at the start of his tour of America. This date does not, however, reflect the beginning of the civilian-soldier type of defense. The tradition of the Guard dates back to the days of Jamestown and Plymouth when every able-bodied man left his work and picked up his weapon to fight off the Indian attacks on the settlements. The first Home Defense Militia was formed in 1936 when every man had to serve in it. From then to now the Guard has stood by ready when needed as set out in the following article: "I am the Guard."

"Civilian in Peace, Soldier in War... of security and honor, for three centuries I have been the custodian, I am the Guard."

"I was with Washington in the dim forests, fought the wily warrior, and watched the dark night to the morning... At Concord's bridge, I fired the fateful shot heard 'round the world. I bled on Bunker Hill... My footprints marked the snows at Valley Forge... I pulled a muffled oar on the barge that bridged the icy Delaware... I stood with Washington on the sun-drenched heights of Yorktown... I saw the sword surrender... I am the Guard... I pulled the trigger that loosed the long rifle's havoc at New Orleans... These things I knew, I was there! I saw both sides of the War between the States... I was there!... The Hill at San Juan felt the fury of my charge... The far plains and 'mountains of the Philippines echoed to my shout... On the Mexican border I stood... I am the Guard... The dark forest of the Argonne blazed with my barrage... Chateau Thierry crumbled to my cannonade... Under the arches of victory I marched in legion... I was there!... I am the Guard... I bowed briefly on the grim Corregidor, then saw the light of liberation shine on the faces of my comrades... Through the jungle and on the beaches, I fought the enemy, beat, battered and broke him... I raised our banner to the serene air on Okinawa... I scrambled over Normandy's beaches... I was there!... I am the Guard! Across the 38th Parallel I made my stand... I flew MIG Alley... I was there!... I am the Guard. 'Soldier in war, civilian in peace... I am the Guard."

"I was at Johnstown, where the raging waters boomed down the valley... I cradled the crying child in my arms and saw the terror leave her eyes... I moved through smoke and flame at Texas City... The stricken knew the comfort of my skill... I dropped the food that fed the starving, beasts on the frozen fields of the west and through the towering drifts, I ploughed to rescue the marooned... I have faced forward the tornado, the typhoon, and the horror of the hurricane and flood — these things I know — I was there!... I am the Guard... I have brought a more abundant, fuller, finer life to our youth... Wherever a strong arm and valiant spirit must defend the Nation, in peace or war, wherever a child cries, or a woman weeps in time of disaster, there I stand... I am the Guard... For three centuries a soldier in war, a civilian in peace — of security and honor, I am the custodian, now and forever... I am the Guard."

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**Bids Asked On First Project On N. W. Laterals**

Site 8, the first of 20 flood-water retarding structures in The Northwest Laterals Watershed work plan, to be constructed by the Soil Conservation Service, is being advertised for bids according to the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District, grantee of construction easements for the project. Bids for Site 8 will include as major items, placement of approximately 175,000 cubic yards of completed earthfill material; 2,175 pounds of steel bar reinforcement in approximately 50 cubic yards of concrete with about 200 feet of 24 inch spun concrete pipe for the principal spillway; salvaging and placing 7,500 square yards of top soil on the embankment and emergency spillway for establishing grass cover and about 5,300 feet of net wire fence around the dam and emergency spillway to protect the grass for lowered maintenance costs. The structure is located on the Mrs. Lee Byron farm, about 8 miles south of Valera.

The bids are to be opened by the Soil Conservation Service in Temple, Texas, at 2:00 p. m. December 19, 1962, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist, at Brownwood. John P. Curtis, Project Construction Engineer at Coleman, will supervise construction of the flood prevention structure, Hughes states.

Land used in the watershed is devoted to ranching and farming with about 61,300 acres in cropland. Flood damages commonly occur on about 14,000 acres in the Flood Plain and cause an annual damage of over \$138,000, according to information developed in the recent Work Plan. Installation of the twenty floodwater retarding structures, plus the conservation land treatment program, will reduce flood damages by about \$100,000 annually, the work plan reveals.

Twelve additional flood prevention structures in the watershed are scheduled for construction to begin by mid June 1963. They are Sites 18, 19, 6, 12, 9, 10, 14, 15, 1, 2, 5, and 7 and are scheduled to be advertised in the order listed.

Coast Guard has announced that applications are now being accepted for the Coast Guard Officer Candidate School which will convene at Yorktown, Virginia on February 11, 1963. A subsequent class for Officer Candidates will convene in September 1963. Applicants must be between the ages of 21 and 26 and hold a baccalaureate degree from an

accredited college or university at the time of selection for this school. Applicants who are qualified in law or oceanography are particularly desired.

Upon completion of 17 weeks indoctrination at the Officer Candidate School, graduates are commissioned Ensign in the U. S. Coast Guard Reserve and required to serve on active duty for three years.

**67th Fort Worth Stock Show To Be Held In January**

Fort Worth—Thirty prominent livestock judges have been named, a new livestock building is going up and entries are mounting toward still another record for the 1963 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show here, President-Manager W. R. Watt has reported.

Oldest major livestock show in the nation, the Southwestern Exposition will present its 67th edition January 25-February 3. Entry deadline for cattle, horses, sheep and swine is December 20. Entries close January 15 for poultry, pigeons, rabbits, turkeys, ducks, geese and game and exotic birds.

Feeder heifers are new in the cattle division, and Charolais return for the second year. It'll be the second time around as well for the tremendously successful carcass steer contest, introduced to the Southwest at the 1962 Fort Worth show.
