Washington, D. C. — There was scheduled but later cancelled, an "International Seminar" to be held in Tanzania on July 15 to the 23, on the matter of sanctions against the governments of Rhodesia and South Africa. The United Nations was a part of the sponsoring authority and was to assist in its financing. The U.S. was to participate and of course to foot a goodly part of the bill. Just what business is it of the United States to dip its ear into the affairs of South Africa and Rhodesia is not easy to understand.

Speaking for our government in the United Nations, Ambassador Arthur Goldberg joined in support of the British in calling for sanctions against Rhodesia when the government of Ian Smith refused to accept joint control with the Africans to govern Rhodesia.

This is not a question of economics, the form of government or its character, but, rather, social.

"Apartheid" simply means a separation of the races, and these two countries are the only places in the world it is applied.

South Africa and Rhodesia say that the word means "apart" but equal development of the blacks and the whites. Many of those with an intimate knowledge of this area of the world, by firsthand observation, are convinced that there is less discrimination, as the term is ordinarily applied, than in many parts of our own country, but the do-gooders have world way and are going to reform all those who do not share their view.

While the United States continues to back the British on the Rhodesian embargo, British flagships continue to carry goods to Communist Vietnam. They are less than they were a few months ago, but the double

Now in his 12th year at HPC, Dr. Newman has traveled extensively in Europe, Middle East and behind the Iron Curtain.

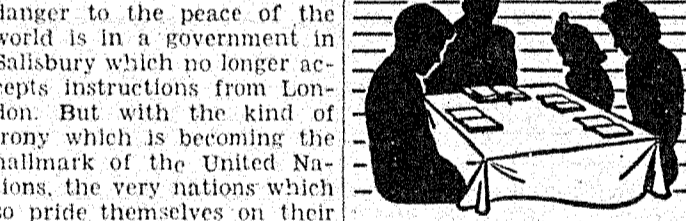
During his travels, he studied the development of the Common Market, socialism, communism and Europe's image of America.

Read Exodus 34:29-35; Hebrews 3:1-6

Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. (Exodus 34:29.)

As a small child, I attended a rural church which had only one room for all its activities. We had our class in the choir seats at the front. When the class ended we stayed in our places until Sunday school had been closed with prayer by one of the older people.

One Sunday during the closing prayer, I was looking around instead of bowing my head as I knew I should. My attention was caught by the face of the elderly man who was praying. His face shone with radiance as he was talking with God.

It was perhaps 20 years later that I was reading the Bible through for the first time and came to this passage in Exodus. The face of the old man praying in the church came to my mind. I think I understood how Moses must have looked to the people who saw him. The God who illumined the face of Moses can illumine the faces of others as he did the old man in my home church.

Doe Gets Relief Following Surgery

There's a lady in the Hill Country who has nothing but praise for man's humanity to animals, modern veterinary medicine and wildlife biologists.

That lady, who now roams the Hill Country spreading tales about her surgery, is a doe deer.

A Hill County resident noted a deer with a large growth on her jaw. Wildlife biologists with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department captured the deer and carried her to Texas A&M University's School of Veterinary Medicine to be checked for communicable disease.

Surgeons found no disease — only a large impaction of deer food. Following surgery, the doe was returned to her native Hill Country.
