## International **Postage Rates Increased May 1**

An increase in internation al surface and air mail postage rates went into effect Monday, May 1, Acting Post-master John C. Gregg, an-nounced this week. The new international rates, he said, does not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

The rate increases for both surface and air mail-ave-raging 13 per cent-were Allyn W. Gill first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed March 1 The Post Office Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in interna. tional mail operations.
