## Richardson Rites Held Monday at Christian Church

Old Time Resident Dies Sunday; Survived by One Son of Santa Anna

Funeral services for B. F. Richardson, for 36 years a resident of Coleman County, were held at the First Christian Church Monday afternoon at 3:30. He died Sunday, May 23, at the age of 80 years, 7 months and 14 days. Rev. Alan Lynch, pastor of the Christian Church officiated, assisted by Rev. E. H. Wylie and Rev. A. L. Oder.

Mr. Richardson was born October 9, 1869 at Somerset in Pulaski County, Kentucky. He moved to Missouri in 1889 and came to Texas in 1878, moving to Coleman County in 1891. On December 14, 1882 at Lockhart, Texas, he was married to Miss Martha Anna Zachary. Two children were born to this union, Nellie Viola, who preceded her father in death December 15, 1928 and Lovell, who lives near Santa Anna. His wife preceded him on Nov. 14, 1935.

Mr. Richardson was a member of the Christian Church, having joined in 1880.

Survivors include one son, Lovell Richardson of Santa Anna; a brother, J. B. Richardson of Rhome, Texas; a sister, Mrs. Lucy Cundiff of Bangs.

## Funeral Services for Leon Shield Held Yesterday

Coleman Oil Operator Killed in Dallas Tuesday Morning; Son of Pioneer Couple

Funeral services for Leon Shield, who died of a fractured skull in Dallas early Tuesday morning, were held at Coleman Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the family residence. Burial was made in the Santa Anna Cemetery. Rev. Willis Gebhart officiated.

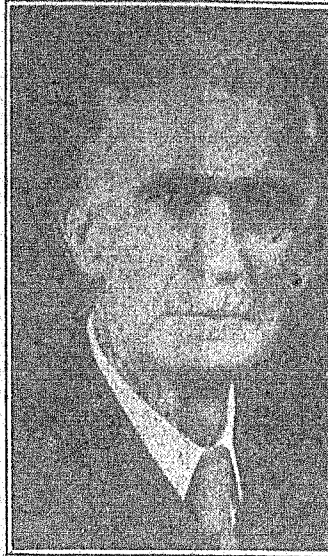
Mr. Shield, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Shield, prominent pioneer residents of this county, was fatally injured in an altercation with Barney W. Runnels of Dallas. Born in this county of Oct. 19, 1884, he was reared in this community and began his business career with his father in the mercantile business at Santa Anna, later being employed with the First State Bank here. Later he became cashier of the Coleman National Bank and remained there until he retired to enter the oil business.

Since then he had become an independent oil operator and had offices in the Gulf States Building in Dallas, in Coleman and in Sunset.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Emma Shield; a daughter, Leone Shield; a son, Donald Shield, all of Coleman; a sister, Mrs. Karl Wallace of Brownwood; two brothers, Egean and Io Shield, both of Santa Anna.

The body was brought from Dallas Tuesday night by a J. E. Stevens ambulance of Coleman in company with the funeral party of relatives who went to Dallas upon receiving word of the tragedy.

## Public Scales Installed Now In Santa Anna

Long Needed Equipment, Howe Brand, 15-ton Capacity Placed in Old Location

A new public scales has been installed this week by a local citizen and will be in charge of Carl B. Ashmore, bonded weigher of this precinct.

This innovation has been one of the most needed in Santa Anna and the scales of the Howe Brand are 34 ft. long with a capacity of 15 tons and will hold all makes and weights of trucks or anything to be weighed. They are located south of the tracks, where the old scales were placed.

Since the old scales were condemned several months ago by state inspectors, Santa Anna has been without public scales and as a result has lost a large amount of business since farmers and truckers went to other towns for weighing and naturally spent much other time and money while they were there. Now Santa Anna has scales of the best make and built to meet the need of any farmer or trucker in the entire territory.

## Expression, Dance Class Well Attended

Recreation Program Provides Full Time Librarian for City Hall

Scores of children and young people are taking advantage of the recreation facilities provided for them during the last two weeks as the result of the cooperation of local clubs and individuals and the WPA in providing recreational dancing classes, librarian, and playground supervisors for the city.

The recreational dancing classes, which will include tap, acrobatic, folk and practically all kinds of dancing except ballroom dancing, have been started several days and classes are full. These are taught on Tuesday and Friday afternoons in the Melton building. Mrs. McCall is the instructor.

Expression classes are also well filled and are being instructed by Mrs. Reuben Fulton. These classes meet on Wednesdays.

A full time librarian for the library at the city hall has been secured and now books may be withdrawn at any time of the day and assistance in selection of reading materials for children and adults will be given if desired.

Games are played each day at the playgrounds and soon more playgrounds will be available. When all plans are worked out there will be ten employees secured for the instruction of the classes and supervision of the recreation periods.

All instruction is free to the public and all interested in taking advantage of these classes are invited to attend.
