

#### **Seat Belts Are Required Now In Texas**

Austin - Inspection of seat belt accessories, steering mechanisms and wheels and rims are added to the items to be inspected on all Texas vehicles, along with an increased minimum fee of \$1.75 for inspection.

The new items were added to the inspection law by the last legislature and the Department of Public Safety has instructed all vehicle inspection station in regard to the type of inspection to be

made on each item. The amendment becomes effective August 28, thus accounting for the early inspection date. Inspections for the 1968 sticker will continue until April 15, the usual deadline.

Under the new law, front seat belts are required on every motor vehicle in which seat belt anchorages are a part of the manufacturer's original equipment, For most American-made vehicles, the anchorages are standard beginning with 1962 models. The vehicles may be rejected during inspection of the seat belts are not installed, the belts are unsafe or unserviceable from wear or damage, the attachment fittings are damaged or loose or the buckles are loose or inopera-

Steering will be checked on all vehicles, including those with power steering.

Wheels and rims are to be inspected without being removed from the vehicle.





#### Federal Tax **Questions And** Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by tax-

Q - I disagree with what your agent proposes as a re-sult of my audit. Is there any way I can have someone else review the case without a court case out of it? The amount involved is only several hundred dollars

A - You should inform the examining agent that you do not agree with his proposed adjustments and desire a district conference. A conferee will consider your side of the story as well as the examining agent's and attempt to reach an agreement on the basis of the facts and law in-

No formal or written proest need be made to obtain such a conference where the amount of the tax liability in question is up to \$2,500. The previous limit was \$1,000.

Q - I plan to sell some property I inherited from my grandmother. How do I tell wheather I have any profit

A - The basis to use is the fair market value at the time you inherited it. If you obtain more than this value, when you sell, then you will have to report the difference as income. Don't forget, however, that you may deduct expenses you have in connection with the sale to determine whether you have gain or loss. The treatment of gains and losses from the sale or exchange of both business and nonbusiness pro-

A - If the government pension is from Social Security it will not be taxable. Civil Service pensions and those from private companies will be taxable depending on how long it takes to recover the amount of your contributions

Q - I got a letter asking for my Social Security Number. Where should I send it?

A - Send the information to the office requesting it Most of these inquiries originate from the service center and the information should ce sent there.

Check to see if a preaddressed envelope came with the request. One is normally enclosed.

Q - I was reimbursed for travel and hotel expenses by a company which wanted to hire me. I didn't take the job, however. Will I have to declare this expense money as income?

A - The reimbursement will not have to be declared as income unless it exceeds your actual expenses. In that case, the excess should be reported as income when you file your 1967 return. If your expenses exceed the reimbursement they are not dedu-





Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

Public Motice

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE 11, 1967, at which time the bal-LEGISLATURE OF THE lot shall have printed thereon the following: STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Toxos beamended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as fol-

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hespital bills for Shertis, Deputy Sheriffs, Constable. Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law en-forcement officials who are injured in the course of their of ficial duties; providing that white said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or precinct law enforcement official is hospitalized or incapacitated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salary; providing, however, that said payment of salary shall cease on the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however that no provision contained berein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or null-ify Article 16, Section 31, of the Constitution of the State of Texas,"

Chicken And Rice Mexicana

Fresh tomatoes, green pepper, onion and chili powder give Chicken and Rice Mexicana its south-of-the-border flavor, This is the kind of main dish to cook in and serve from your prettiest casserole. Brown the chicken in the casserole or cook it and the vegetables in a separate skillet before transferring them

to the casserole. Then put with the remaining ingredients in the baking dish, cover tightly (using foil if the casserole doesn't have a cover), pop into a moderate oven and forget it for half an hour. Even though you might be tempted to peek into the casserolo during cooking, it is strongly recommended that you do not. 'Don't peck" is a standard admonition in all rice cookery instructions, and the reason is simple. Rice cooks to its best when steamed — not boiled — and when the cover of the saucepan or

casserole is lifted, steam escapes and the rice has less chance of turning into tender and separate grains.

To add to the Mexican therae, serve with a guacamole salad, salt sticks and for dessert, wedges of fresh melon - cantaloup, honeydew and watermelon.







### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended

to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of war-rants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air Na-tional Guard of Texas, the Na-tional Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Murina Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as Organized Reserve of the strictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State of-ficer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original of-

fice or position for which he

receives salary or compensa-tion. No member of the Legis-lature of this State may hold

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE any other office or position of LEGISLATURE OF THE profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of inter-est with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other of-tice or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and re-tired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."
