Mountaineers Slip By Indians, 13-7

In a flag throwing defensive battle the Santa Anna Mountaineers held off the Jim Ned Indians to win by a close 13-7.

All the scoring took place in the first half with all of the Mountaineers scoring coming in the first quarter. Danny Williams set the Mountaineers up for their first score when he intercepted a Jim Ned pass. He returned the ball from the Indian 44 to the 14. It took Dale Herring three plays to get Santa Anna its first touchdown with Tommy Blanton kicking the extra point. With 9:47 left in the first period the Mountaineers had a 7-0 lead.

Three minutes later the Mountaineers had the ball again on their own 38 yard line. It took seven plays for Herring to get in this time, taking a hand-off from quarterback Roy Joe Harvey and slaming straight ahead over left tackle, cutting toward the sideline, and out-running two Jim Ned safety men to score again with 5:02 left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter the Indians came alive, fielded a Mountaineer punt and went all the way to pay dirt and David Papasan kicked the extra point to end the scoring for the night with 7:29 left in the first half.

The second half was a defensive battle with Santa Anna threatening one time and Jim Ned threatening one time. It made little difference what the two teams did in the last half anyway because everything that happened was rabbed out by the red flag.

Seven County Voting Precincts Short Of New Requirements

Seven voting precincts in Coleman County do not meet the minimum requirements, as established by the 60th Legislature, and members of the County Commissioners Court are now evaluating the situation for them must take action before the first day of October.

Voting precincts affected by the new law include Trickham, Glen Cove, Silver Valley, Voss, Leaday, Fisk and Bowen.

The law sets forth that each voting precinct must have resident therein at least 50 voters as ascertained by the number of "registered" voters for the last preceding presidential general election year.

None of the above listed voting precinct meet that requirement. Registered voters, by precinct, in 1964 were as follows: Coleman, East: 1008; Coleman West, 907; Santa Anna, 435; Trickham, 32; Talpa, 90; Glen Cove, 47; Novice, 91; Silver Valley, 37; Burkett, 86; Rockwood, 61; Valera, 61; Gouldbusk, 65; Voss, 46; Leaday, 29; Shields, 57; Fisk, 44; and Bowen, 28.

The law also sets forth that no precinct shall be formed out of two or more justice precincts or commissioner precinct, nor out of the parts of such precincts. This means that the people in the voting precincts affected must continue to vote within their commissioner precincts.

In Commissioner Precinct 2, only one box is effected, that being Trickham. In Commissioner Precinct 3, there are three voting boxes effected, including Voss, Leaday and Fisk. There are also three involved in Commissioner Precinct 4, including Glen Cove, Silver Valley and Bowen.

Consolidation of eliminated precincts with existing precincts which meet requirements, or the merging of two or more eliminated precincts to create a new and larger precinct, appear the two routes to be given most serious consideration. However, the Court could re-align any

or all of the existing precincts, as long as they meet requirements of the new law.

One point is positive. Action must be taken before the first day of October to meet the requirements of the new law. Thus, the seven boxes with less than 50 registered voters in 1964 cannot remain as is. The new law requires the Court to make changes.

Figures reviewed by the Court, in session yesterday, also included the per cent of County voters residing in each Commissioner Precinct, according to the vote for governor in the 1964 general election. This showed Precinct 1 to have 62 per cent, Precinct 2 to have 20 per cent, Precinct 3 to have 7.5 per cent and Precinct 4 to have 19.5 per cent. These figures have been eyed, as concerns the test case involving county precincts and the strong possibility that one day equal population in all county precincts may be required by law.

He is receiving instructions in Naval customs, courtesies and organization, ordnance and gunnery, seamanship, damage control, first aid, swimming and survival, shipboard drills and sentry duty.

A program of physical fitness, military drill and inspections keeps the recruits mentally and physically alert during their training.

His Navy classification tests will determine whether he will be assigned to a school shore station or ship after his graduation.
