

HOSPITALS AND YOU

Perhaps, you have wondered why so many questions are asked when you are admitted as a patient to the hospital. You find yourself having to remember your middle name which you haven't used for years. You have to sometimes "dig" to remember the actual day, month, and year of your birth, where you were born, the church you attend, and many other questions about yourself that may seem unnecessary to you.

Did you ever pick up the telephone directory of a large city and turn the pages to find how many people were listed with the same name as yours? You may realize from doing this that there are often four to six "Carl Smiths" listed but only one "Carl Arnold Smith."

When "Carl A. Smith" is admitted, the hospital is interested in only one "Carl A. Smith" and that is "Carl Arnold Smith."

The reason for all these questions is that this admission procedure is the initial start of the individual medical record of the hospital stay for "Carl Arnold Smith"; no one else; and it is very important to the patient, doctor, nurse, and other hospital employees that this medical record be identified as "Mr. Carl Arnold Smith's" record and his alone.

The patient's medical record is made up of many reports from the doctor, nurses, food service personnel, technicians, and sometimes from experts behind the scenes.

The medical record will contain the patient's preliminary diagnosis (admitting diagnosis, symptoms of the present illness, the patient's medical history, including the family medical history, findings in the preliminary physical examination and in examinations made during the patient's stay; orders for tests and treatments in special departments of the hospital such as laboratory, EKG and x-ray, and reports of the results; orders for a record of administration of drugs and medications; the type of diet the patient needs; progress notes for each day and night the patient is hospitalized; reports of treatments carried out—from the simplest such as "sat up on side of bed" to the detailed record of a surgical operation—and finally, the patient's condition and final diagnosis at the time of discharge.

With the expanding advances in medical science, and the increase in the number of services which make diagnosis and treatment more precise and more effective,

the medical record has become increasingly important and increasingly complex.

Each time your doctor sees you in the hospital, he checks your medical record which shows how and when his orders were carried out; the results of tests he ordered; your temperature chart, pulse rate chart and all the nursing care and progress.

The medical record legally belongs to the hospital. The hospital is charged with its maintenance, storage and safety. It becomes a permanent record of the hospital and except when your doctor recalls the chart for review, may not be released to anyone without the patient's written consent or by court subpoena.

The keeping of complete and accurate medical records is just one of the many behind-the-scenes hospital activities.

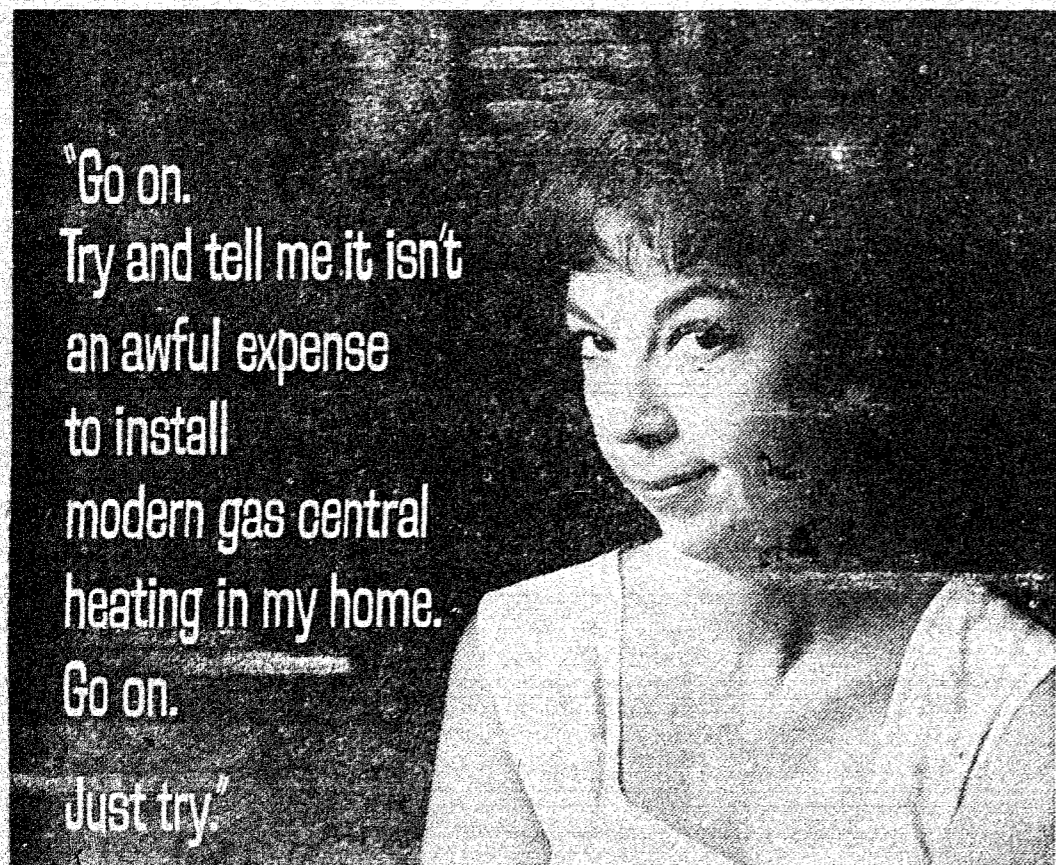

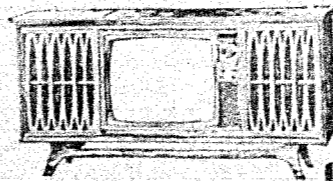

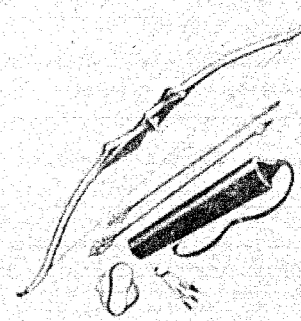

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I worked on a farm this summer and the foreman said I would have to pay an estimated tax this fall. Is that right?

A—Farm wages are not subject to income tax withholding and you may have to file an estimated tax return to put you on a pay-as-you-go basis. The next deadline for filing an estimated tax declaration or an amended declaration is Sept. 15.

A declaration must be filed if your estimated tax exceeds your expected withholding by \$40 or more and certain other conditions are met. More details on estimated tax and the forms needed to file a declaration may be obtained by calling your local IRS office.

ed for my uncle last year is being questioned. What records do I need to show I am entitled to claim him?

A—You should be prepared to show that you provided more than one-half his support for the year, that his gross income was under \$600, and that he did not file a joint return with another taxpayer for the year in question.

Your uncle must also be a citizen or resident of the U. S., or a resident of Canada, Mexico, the Canal Zone, or the Republic of Panama.

Q—I just got a letter from my stock broker asking for my social security number. He said if I don't give it I will be subject to a penalty. What is the penalty he's talking about?

A—The law requires payments of dividends and interest to \$10 or more to be identified by the social security number of the recipient also imposes a penalty of \$5 for failure to comply. This penalty can apply each time a payment is not identified on the report blanks, corporations and savings institutions are required to make to the IRS.

Q—Are tax disputes settled with your Appellate Division ever opened up again?

A—They are not reopened unless evidence of fraud, malfeasance, concealment, misrepresentation of facts or an important mathematical mistake is discovered. Taxpayers reaching an agreement with Appellate can do so with the assurance that aside from the reasons mentioned above, the agreement will be final.

Q—I don't understand the letter you sent me about my return. What should I do?

A—Call your local IRS office about the letter. When you do, have the letter handy for reference purposes.

If the letter was setn from the service center, the requested information should be sent there unless other instructions are given.

Q—Can I get a refund now on the tax withheld on my earnings this summer? I'm

going back to school and do not expect to earn any more this year.

A—You will have to wait until the end of the year to file for your refund. When you leave be sure to ask your employer for a statement of wages paid and taxes withheld, a W-2 form. This statement must accompany your return when you file next year.

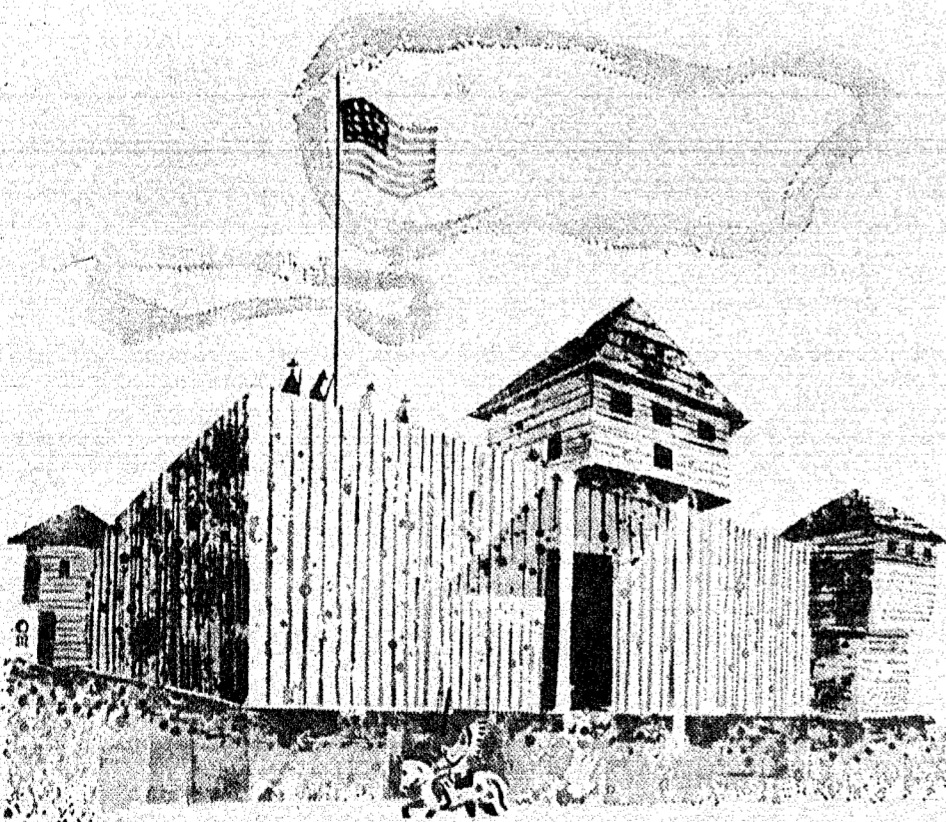

The bride chose a two-piece suit of white bonded cotton with horizontal and diagonal stripes of beige, green and tangerine, beige accessories for the wedding.

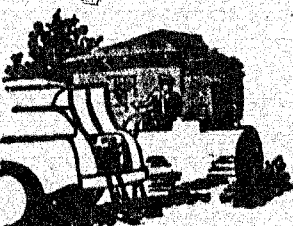

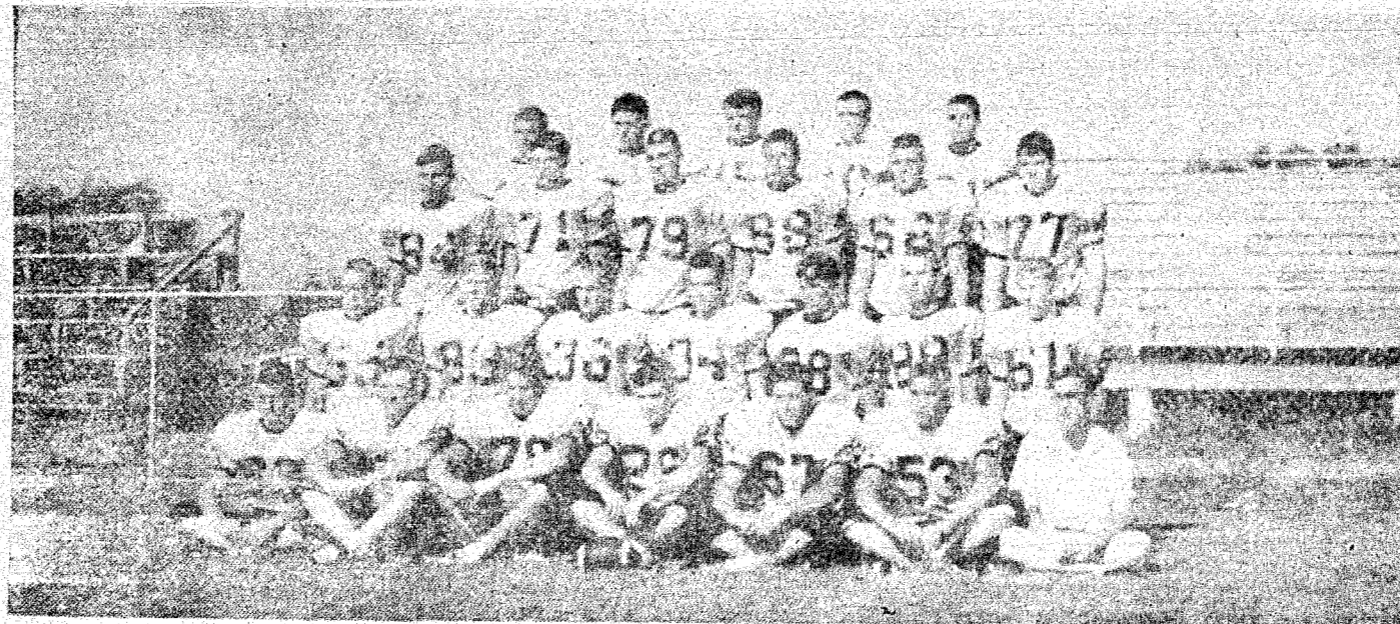

Miss Lena Boyd Woman Of Year

Miss Lena Boyd, a native of Santa Anna and a missionary for many years to India, was named Woman of the Year by the Self Culture Club and was the honoree at a morning coffee Friday in the home of Mrs. Joe Matthews.

The serving table was laid with a hand-crocheted cloth and centered with a large bottle of Indian glass wreathed with white and pink flowers on a reflector, with a red-bird figurine for accent. Coffee, cake, fruits and nuts were in silver dishes, and Mrs. Charles Evans served the coffee. All appointments were of silver. Miss Boyd was presented with a corsage of white feathered carnations.

Mrs. C. D. Bruce presided for the business session, when yearbooks were briefly studied. Roll call was answered with "The Highlight of My Summer." The study course for the year will be "Texas, Our Texas," with films, slides and guest speakers as features. Other officers for the year are Mrs. Hardy Blue,

vice-president, Mrs. J. L. Harris, secretary, and Mrs. Evans, treasurer.

Mrs. Harris told of the Indian people of Texas at the time of the Spanish conquest. Mrs. Preston Bailey spoke of the European explorers who went across Texas and of the conditions they found.

Miss Boyd related events of her childhood in Santa Anna. Born here in 1883, she was the sixth daughter in the family, the only son having died in East Texas at Joshua. The Boyds came to Santa Anna in an ox wagon, with the milk cow tied to the tailgate. Boyd bought a half-section of land from Frank and Miles Wolford about a mile south of the mountain, a deserted long cabin was there, and though it had been used for a sheep-shed the girls swept it out with broomweeds and it was made as livable as possible. Someone had dug a deep well, and water was carried from it in buckets for the home.

The sixth daughter was born in March of 1883, and that night a torrential rain

came. A neighbor woman, Mrs. Oliver, who lived in a rock house north of the Boyds was there. The wild wind and rain drove through the cracks in the log walls, and Boyd's wagon sheet which was spread over the one bed with everybody, including the new baby under it.

Later that summer, Boyd went to Baird with his ox-wagon to buy lumber for a house. For six weeks he hauled and built, placing the house some 200 yards north of the log cabin, which again became a barn. Coyotes were common, taking many chickens, and herds of antelope and other game were everywhere.

When Lena was 3 1/2 years old, her mother died, leaving a small baby. The big girls all walked to school, but Lena did not go until she was 3, as she stayed at home to care for the younger girl. She remembers a good man named Davis who had lost an arm, probably in the Civil War. He lived somewhere about, and for a living grazed his 24 sheep on unfenced land, often passing the Boyds. He liked to bring the motherless little girls apples or a bit of candy, telling their father that that was his only pleasure.

Later a drifter came, a man named Pruno who had Spanish and Indian blood. He said he could locate water for the Boyds, and was hired to do so, but one day the little girls found him asleep under a tree with a big switch-blade knife open in his hand. Boyd questioned him about this, and he confessed that he was really out searching for a burro-trail load of buried Spanish silver, the clue being a rock carved with a picture of a fish. Pruno failed to find the water or the silver, and the Boyds continued carrying on the well.

The first school Maggie and Nannie attended was in the parlor of Mrs. Austin's home, as there was no school for girls at home. Her mother had classes at home for her, the Boyd and Oliver girls. Later a small house was built near a big oak tree, and all the children went there, putting layers of newspapers inside their coats when walking in the bitter northerns.

Miss Boyd believes that then, as now, a cultured home of gentle, religious people, was the best environment for a child to have.

Ralph Burton Finishes Training

San Diego, Aug. 23—Marine Private Ralph J. Burton, son of Mrs. Osie L. Burton of Rt. 2, Cleveland, Texas, was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot here.

He will now undergo about three weeks of individual combat training and then, after leave at home, will report to his first Marine Corps assignment.

The intensified Marine recruit training emphasizes rigid physical conditioning and survival techniques, both at sea and ashore, to develop self-confidence and endurance. Marksmanship with the M-14 rifle and 45-calibre pistol are equally stressed, and close order drill instills the traditions of Marine Corps teamwork.

A thorough study of basic military subjects, hygiene, first aid and sanitation and the customs, courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare him to join Marine combat forces.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

In the early days of commercial aviation, a home owner went to court with a startling demand.

"This airline is flying its planes directly over my land," he said. "Yet, according to law, an owner of land also owns the earth below and the space above—all the way up to heaven. Therefore, these planes are trespassing in my private airspace. I demand an injunction to have them stopped."

The home owner did have a point. The "up to heaven" theory had, in fact, been an accepted rule of law for centuries. Under it, home owners had won injunctions against everything from overhanging branches to intruding telephone wires.

Nevertheless, the court held it would be absurd to apply this ancient doctrine to modern aviation. As one judge put it:

"Every transcontinental flight would subject the operator to countless trespass suits. Common sense revolts at the idea."

But tougher issues lay ahead. What about those home owners who lived close to airports? They complained not just of a technical trespass, high in the air, but of the roar and vibration of aircraft passing right overhead.

A harassed chicken farmer became the symbol of their plight. In a case fought all the way to the Supreme Court, he charged that his terrified chickens were dashing themselves to death on

the walls of their coop. "My farm," he said, "has been ruined for raising chickens."

This time, the farmer won compensation. The court said that, even though planes had a right to fly through his airspace, he was entitled to be paid for that portion of his property value that had been "taken" from him.

Ever since the chicken farmer's victory, the law has been gradually harmonizing the traditional rights of private property with the emerging necessities of the air age. It has refused to let private rights arbitrarily block progress; it has also refused to let the price of progress fall unfairly on individual property owners.

The advent of jets has intensified the problem. The advent of supersonic jets will

intensify it still more. But the law's basic guidelines are already visible.

And understandably so. "If the mind of man can invent a flying machine," said one court, "it should be able to devise a law which is adequate to deal with the problems flowing from such inventiveness."

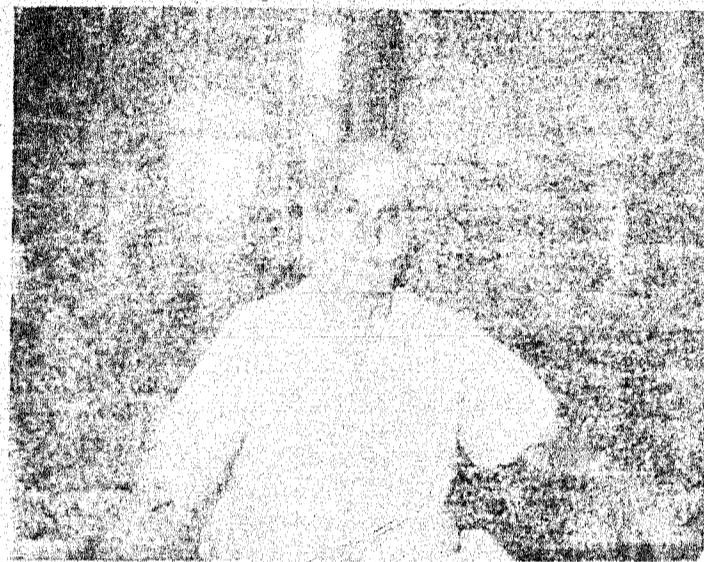

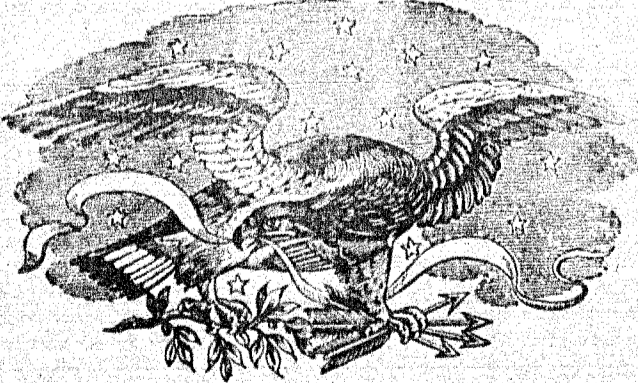
