Items Needed For Red Cross

The following is the quota and items needed for the Coleman County Chapter of the Red Cross.

160,000 filled gift bags, mid-western area quota.
125 filled gift bags, Coleman County quota.

Each gift bag should contain a variety of small items such as the following:

1. Ballpoint pens (we have enough of these for 125 bags).
2. Paper back books—mystery, adventure, western, science fiction, crossword puzzles.

3. Plastic soap cases to hold a regular bar of soap, only the cases requested. (We understand these may be purchased at Gibson's Drug count for 6c each).

4. Small packages of writing paper with self-seal envelopes.

5. Plastic toothbrush holders. You may not be able to get these without the toothbrush, which may be included.

6. Terry cloth wash cloth (dark colors preferred).

7. Nail clippers.

8. Plastic cigarette cases.

9. Pocket games, small enough to be put in pocket. Such games as may be placed in a plastic bag are especially welcome. I.e. small decks of cards, chess games, checkers, puzzles, etc. Pinochle very popular.

10. Small tins of puts or candy, vacuum packed. (Not over 6 1/2 ounces).

11. Small kitchen size sandwich bags, plastic.

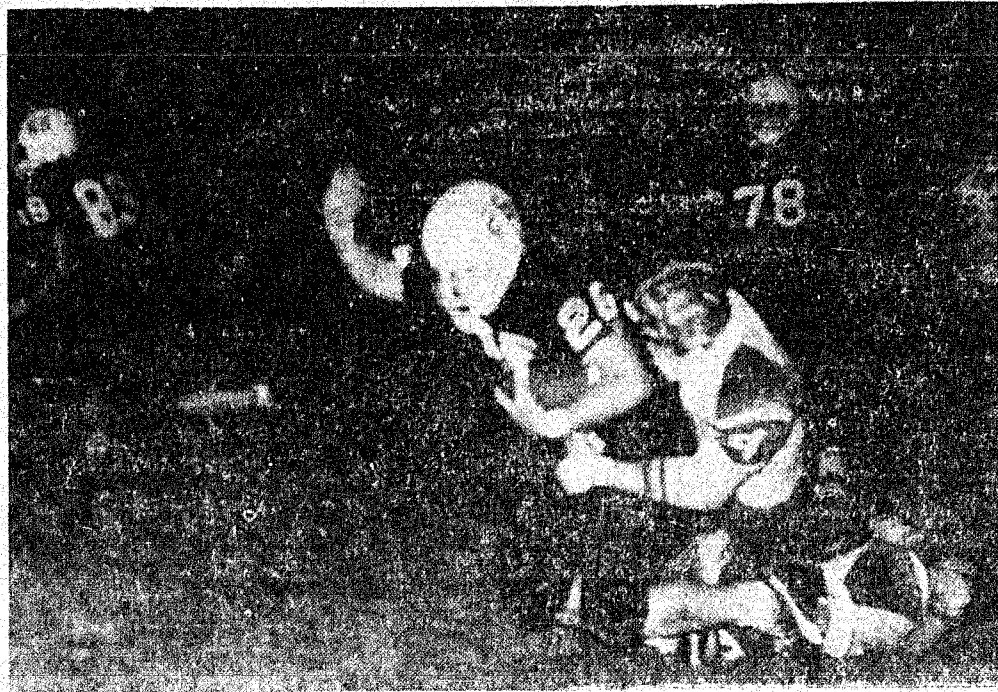
12. Wipe and shine shoe polish kits. These come in about 40 to package, and may be divided 8 or 10 to the bag.

13. Pre-soaped "wash and dry" wash cloths in packages. (These small cloths come in sealed packets, about 30 to the box and may be divided also).

This is a suggested list. Anything you think the boys would enjoy, that is small and not too heavy may be substituted for some of the items.

Do not send combustibles, such as matches or lighter fluid. No medicines, or foot powder, no liquids, and no cookies or cakes, these will be sent by individual families, friends, etc.

We have 95 bags of material for the rest, and these

Play Gorman Friday Night

The Santa Anna Mountaineers gouged the Bangs Dragons by a score of 21 to 6 in a non-district battle last Friday night. The Mountaineers showed their defensive strength by holding the Class B favorites to a lone score which came in the fourth period. Tommy Blanton led the defensive battle with 10 tackles and 5 assists. Lynn Wristen, another of the tough defensive players for second place in the defensive statistics with 8 tackles and 2 assists, Davey Beal had 7 tackles and 4 assists, Ricky Abernathy had 7 tackles and 2 assists, Korky Wise had 4 tackles and 4 assists and also blocked one pass and one kick.

Two deciding factors in the game were interceptions by Roy Joe Harvey and Larry Williams. The interception by Roy Joe Harvey was almost a score as he nearly broke loose down the sideline after the interception. Ted Ford and Korky Wise recovered fumbles.

If you haven't noticed the stars on the helmets of the Mountaineers, they are for recovered fumbles, blocked kicks, interceptions and for outstanding plays, etc.

After a scoreless first period the Santa Anna Mountaineers recovered a fumble on the Bangs 15 and halfback Williams plunged over from the one, five plays later, Williams also kicked the extra point.

In the third quarter the Mountaineers took the ball on a kickoff and scored in eight plays when halfback Tommy Blanton went over from the three. Williams kicked the extra point.

Later in the third period Williams took a handoff from quarterback Roy Joe Harvey and went 56 yards to pay dirt in one of the most exciting offense plays for the Mountaineers of the night. He then kicked the extra point to leave the score at 21 to 0 at the end of the third period.

The only Bangs score came when in the fourth quarter Bangs recovered a Santa Anna fumble on the Mountaineer 28. Six plays later the Mounties were penalized to the 2 yard line and two plays later the Bangs fullback Tommy Stevens scored from the one yard line and the extra point failed.

The Mounties displayed again what makes them a winning ball club, being outweighed in each game, the Mounties have sheer determination to win which is the deciding factor in most high school football games.

The Mountaineers take on Gorman Friday night at the Mountaineer stadium for their second home game. Gorman has a fine ball club and this should prove to be stiff competition for the Mounties. Gorman beat Early last week by a score of 32-0. The game will start at 8:00 p. m. Let's all get out and support the home team.

Voting Precinct Decision To Be Made Friday

Members of the Coleman County Commissioners Court have set Friday, Sept. 29, as the date for a special meeting when they will take action concerning seven voting precincts that fall short of requirements as set forth by the 60th Legislature. By law, the Court must act prior to October 1.

The seven voting boxes concerned include Trickham, Glen Cove, Silver Valley, Voss, Leaday, Fisk and Bowen. The law sets forth that these voting precincts cannot continue. Also, the voters in the precincts involved must continue to vote in the future within the same county commissioner precinct.

It is expected that requirements of the law will be met through consolidation or by merging of precincts.

The parade, which will begin at 9:00 a. m. Saturday in downtown Coleman, will feature the Coleman County Gold Star Girl, Vickie Skelton of the Mozelle 4-H Club; Vickie Watson, County entry in the State 4-H Dress Review; sweethearts of all 4-H Clubs in the County; and the County 4-H Horse Club members, in costume and mounted on their horses.

Activities at the Fair will begin immediately after the parade. Each club will have an exhibit of work done by members during the past year. Free punch, coffee and cookies will be served throughout the Fair.

Theme of this year's observance of National 4-H Week is "4-H: A World of Opportunity." Main objective of the Week is to acquaint more young people, ages 9 through 19, and their parents with 4-H and encourage them to join the program, which combines the best of learning and fun. The position of District supervisor must be filled by a landowner who is actively engaged in farming or ranching, and who lives in a county that is included in the Soil and Water Conservation District. He must own land in the zone he represents.

J. H. Martin of Trickham is the incumbent supervisor of Zone IV and is ineligible for re-election, stated Mr. Young.

James Othar Owen, 81, of 1108 Ave. C, Santa Anna died September 14, at 2:15 a. m. in the Santa Anna Hospital.

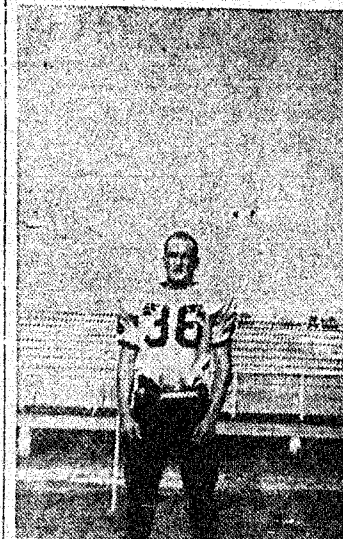

Ted Ford

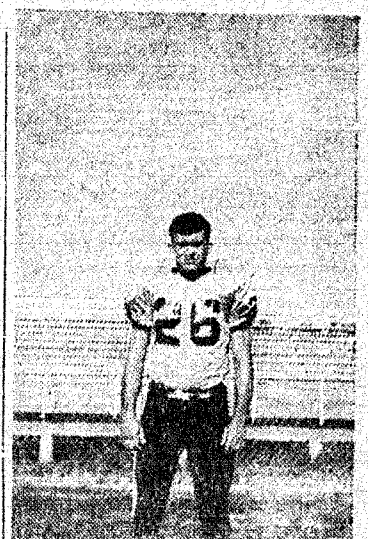
Ted Ford S A Fullback

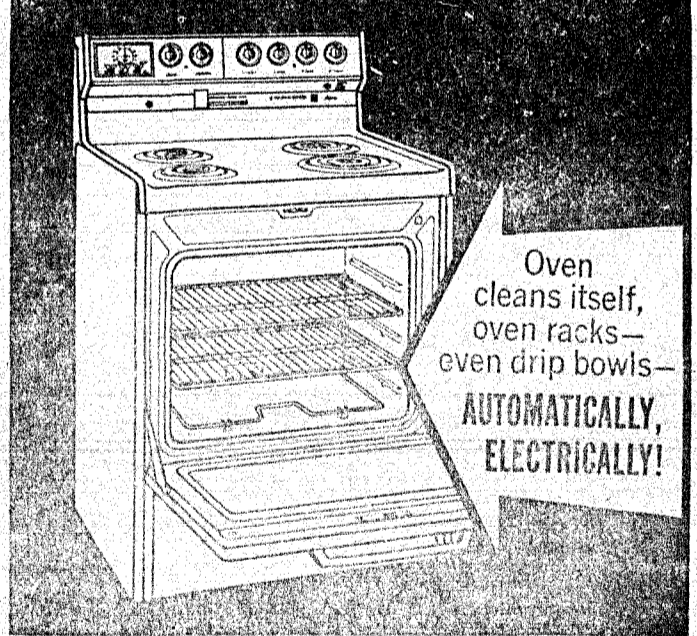

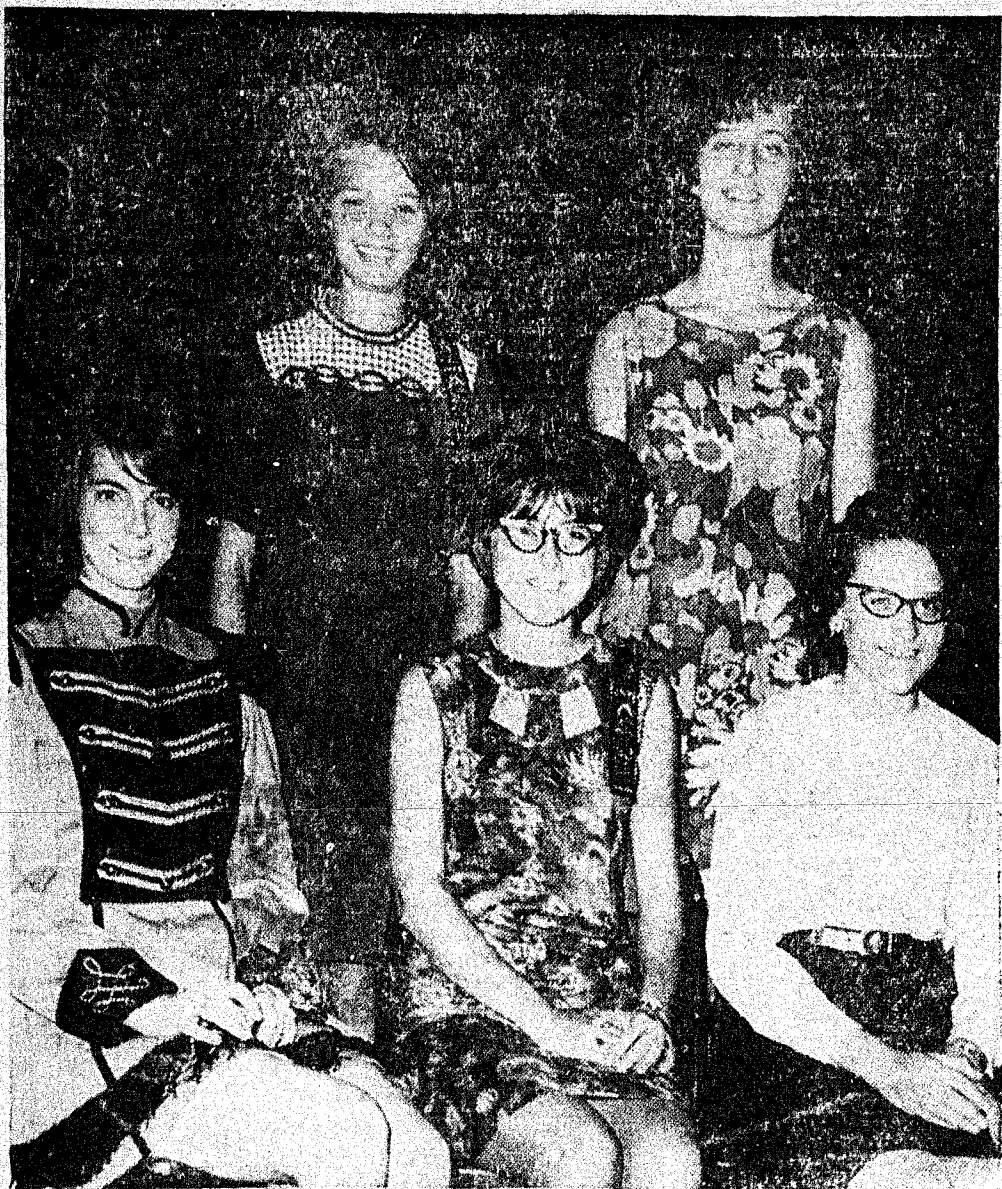

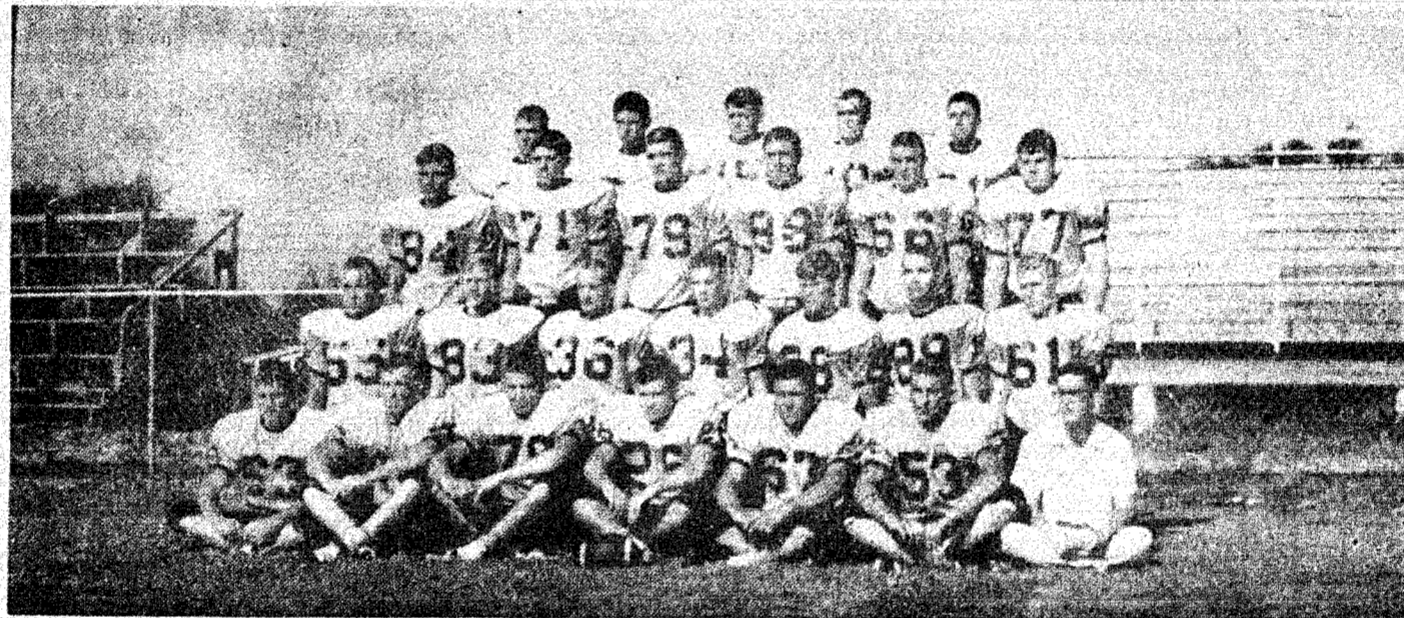

Zip - A - List Kits To Be Delivered Mon.

Beginning Monday, October 2, ZIP-A-LIST kits will be delivered to every user of the mails at the Santa Anna Post office.

Acting Postmaster John C. Gregg urged all residents to use the postal cards contained in the kits to obtain the Zip Codes needed for addresses in their personal mailing lists.

Each household will receive eight cards with spaces for the addresses to be "zipped" by the post office and for the return address. No postage is needed, the acting postmaster said.

The project is part of Postmaster General O'Brien's program to make Zip Codes more accessible to the mailing public and thereby increase the use of the codes in mailing addresses.

In addition to the kit, which is folded like a closed accordion, a separate card is being delivered to remind residents of the local zip code number.

"Zip Code is necessary the year round to increase the efficiency of the postal service," Gregg said, "but it is more important than ever around the holiday season. This year, the Post Office Department expects to handle over nine billion pieces of mail during the Christmas rush. ZIP code will be a great help in delivering that mail accurately and on time."

The postal official reminded Zip-a-List users to print clearly and to include their return address so that the post office will know where to deliver the completed form. Last year, thousands of people throughout the nation forgot to include their return address and their efforts to cooperate in the project went for naught, he said.

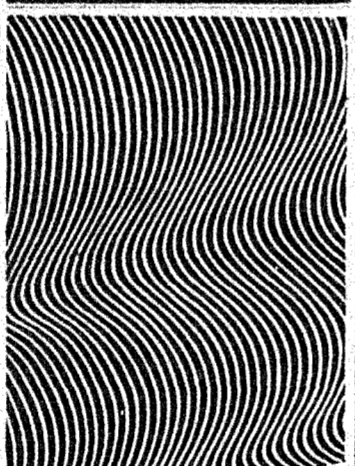


