Probably the oldest and most traditional food Americans still enjoy is corn bread, specially this buttermilk version. It's made into a cobbler crested with shredded old-fashioned Cheddar cheese and pie-sliced apples. But the making is modern, notes the Borden Kitchen. Just unwrap the cheese and it's ready for shredding; the apples come ready-to-use right from the can.

Hasty Cheese Cobbler (Makes 8 servings)

1 cup sifted all-purpose

1 cup yellow cornmeal 1/4 cup sugar

powder 3/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1 cup Borden's Butter-

1/4 cup soft shortening 2 cups shredded (one 8-oz. pkg.) Wisconsin Old Fashioned Cheddar

cheese 2-1/2 cups (1 lb. 4-oz. can) Pie-Sliced Apples, drained

1/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar

In a medium-size bowl, sift together flour, commeal, sugar, baking powder, salt and baking soda. Add eggs, buttermilk and shortening; beat with rotary beater about 1 minute, or just until dry ingredients are well moistened. DO NOT OVERBEAT. Pour mixture into a greased 9 x 9 x 2-inch baking pan, In a medium-size bowl, lightly mix cheese and apples together. Gently spread over corn bread mixture. It is important to spread mixture to sides of pan. Sprinkle brown sugar evenly over cheese mixture. Bake in a moderate (375°F.) oven, 40 minutes or until firm and golden brown.
