A-Except for commuting expenses, the costs of business use of your automobile ire deductible. You may deduct actual expense, or if you prefer, a standard rate of 10 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business use and 7 cents a mile thereafter. Related parking fees and tolls may be deducted to the standard mileage rate.




