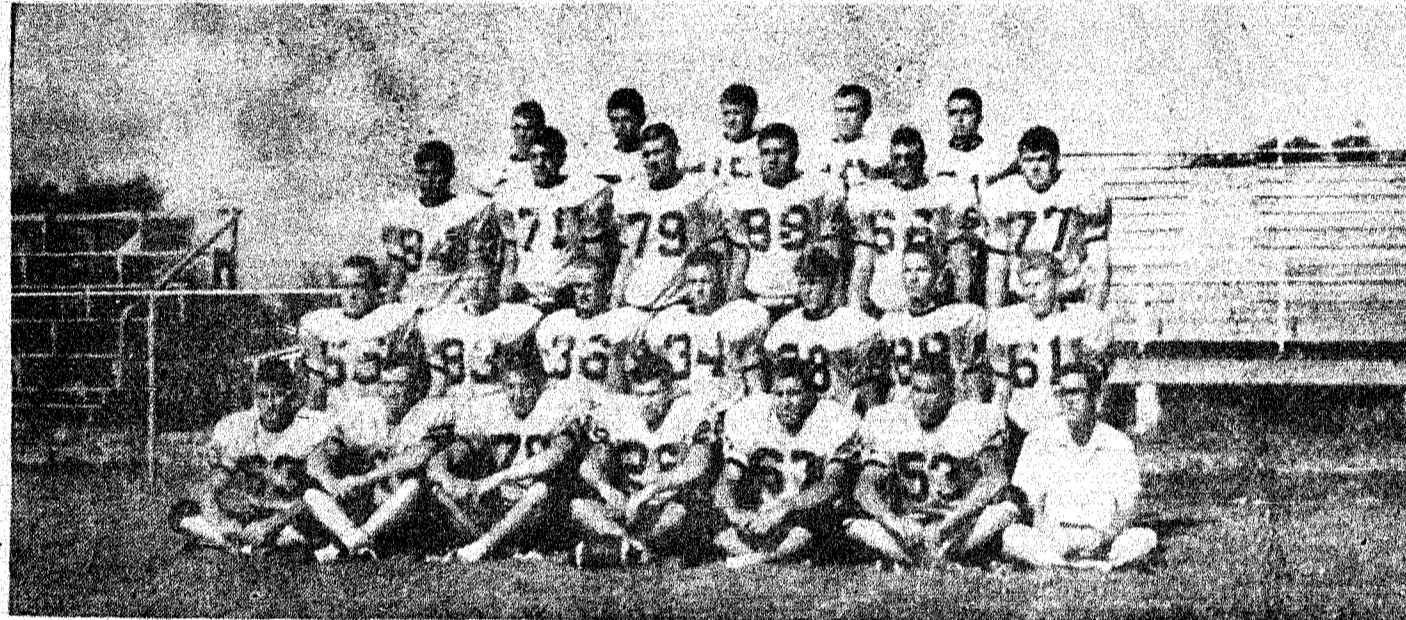

## Food and Agricultural Team Make Tour In This Area

Brownwood, Texas, Oct. 6.—More than 25 international soil experts toured the Coleman, Brownwood and San Angelo area this week according to E. J. Hughes of the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood.

The purpose of the tour was to make a soil map of the North American Continent. The map will be part of a world-soil-map project of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization. The project is aimed at boosting world food production. Similar tours already have been held in Canada and Mexico.

The group made stops along the route to study the soils of the southern half of the United States. One stop was just west of Santa Anna, according to Bob Pearson of the SCS at Coleman. The tour began at Raleigh, N. C. on October 2 and will end at Las Cruces, N. M. on October 12. They were in the Brownwood - San Angelo area on Monday and Tuesday, October 9 and 10.

Dr. Guy D. Smith, director of soil survey investigations for the United States Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service, was leading the tour. Dr. Smith is known around the world for his work in developing a new soil classification system for the United States which is being adapted in many countries.

Official delegates from the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization in the group were D. Luis Bramo and R. Dudal of the Rome headquarters; W. A. Ehrlich, Canada; Miguel Brambila, Mexico, and R. Coasta de Lemos, Brazil.

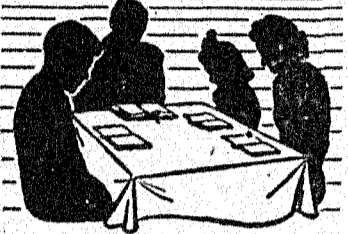
Several observers from Canadian agencies and universities were also along, as were observers from five United States universities.

The group was guided thru this area by David Kelley and Lee Botts, Soil Conservation Service soil scientists at Brownwood.

In addition to looking at soils along the way, the group also is looking at various soil management systems such as land leveling, irrigation and drainage, fertilization, crop rotation, and others. Farmer experience on a specific kind of soil can be applied to similar soils elsewhere in the world where climate and other conditions are also similar. Transfer of knowledge about soils that can be managed or developed for greater crop production will aid in meeting the world's fast-growing need for food.

## Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q—When my return was audited, every single deduction I claimed at the suggestion of the fellow who helped me prepare my return was disallowed. Isn't there anything that can be done about so-called tax experts like the one who "helped" me?**

**A—The law holds the taxpayer legally responsible for all the information on his return even when someone else helped prepare the return. Your experience shows the value of using only reputable and qualified advisors when tax help is needed. It also demonstrates the need to check every item carefully before the return is filed.**

**Q—My son has just started work and should earn well over \$600 this year. Does that mean I will lose his exemption?**

**A—Not necessarily. If he is under 19 at the end of the year or a full-time student, he may earn \$600 or more and you may still claim the exemption if he otherwise qualifies as your dependent.**

If any tax has been withheld from his wages he must file a return to obtain a refund. In any event, he must file a return when his gross income is \$600 or more. In filing such a return he also claims his own exemption even though you claimed him as a dependent.

**Q—I was married recently and my wife works. Is there any change I should make in my withholding?**

**A—A married taxpayer's withholding is at lower rates than a single taxpayer's. Therefore, by notifying your employer of the change in your marital status, with the filing of a new Form W-4, your withholding may be reduced.**

**Q—You also may want to take the exemption for your wife. This will also reduce the amount withheld from your paycheck. However, if your wife claims her own exemption on her job, then you may not claim her exemption to.**

**Q—On the \$50 requirement for paying social security on household help, what happens if you spend \$50 for this purpose, but it is divided among several people?**

**A—You are liable for the tax only when you pay one person \$50 or more cash wages in a calendar quarter.**

**Q—I drove my car on a selling job I had last summer. Since I didn't get paid for mileage by my boss, can I deduct these costs when I file my return?**

**A—Except for commuting expenses, the costs of business use of your automobile are deductible. You may deduct actual expense, or if you prefer, a standard rate of 10 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business use and 7 cents a mile thereafter. Related parking fees and tolls may be deducted to the standard mileage rate.**

**Q—My mother is receiving benefits from my father's life**

**insurance. Is this taxable income for her?**

**A—No. Death benefits, life and accident and health policies are not considered taxable income.**

**However, if the benefits are paid in regular installments instead of in one lump sum, a portion of the payments may be taxable. This is explained in IRS Document No. 5045, What Is Income? Send a post card to your district director for a free copy.**

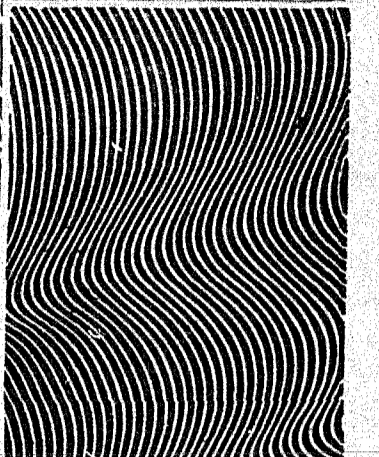

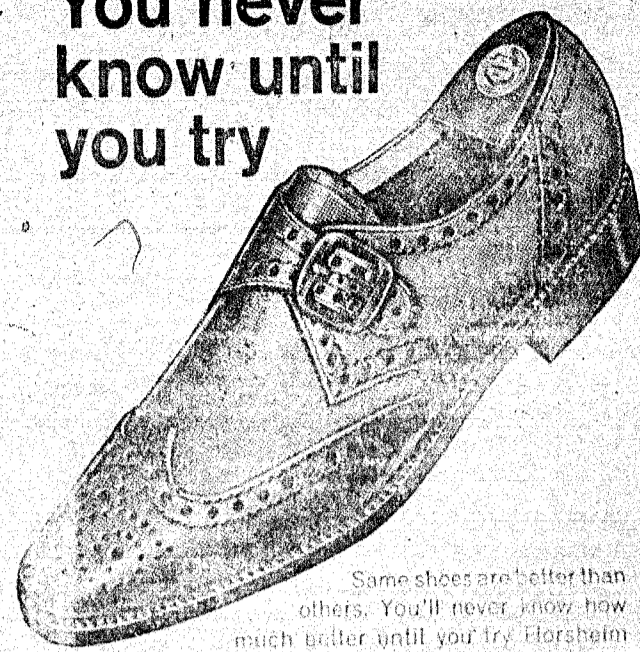
