Judge Joe Dibrell Seeks Re-election

Judge Joe Dibrell, Presiding Judge since January 1, 1961, of the 35th Judicial District Court of Texas in Brown, Coleman and McCulloch Counties has announced that he will seek re-election for another term that begins January 1, 1969.

In making his announcement, Judge Dibrell had the following statement to make to the citizens residing within the three county Judicial District.

"These are times that call for all of us to exert ourselves in upholding and creating a respect for law. We all have a duty to continue to see that the dignity and rights of the individual and the public alike are preserved by having an impartial administration of justice. As your District Judge you have given me the privilege and have rightfully charged me with the obligation to so judge and administer the law to see that your District Court Calendar is kept current, to decide controversies with as much dispatch as the law and justice will permit.

After presiding almost 7 years as your District Judge, I can frankly say that I have never regretted forsaking the private practice of law for the challenging work of a judicial career. Being a District Judge has proven to be a very humbling experience. Many decisions have been hard to make, not because of the complexities of the law involved, but because of the factor of real human failure and conflict that is presented to the court for solution.

However, the task of presiding has been made easier by the splendid practice of the attorneys before the court and the cooperation of responsible citizens who are called for jury duty from time to time. This has enabled the court to hear and decide approximately 2,997 cases filed in the 35th District Court, including 151 cases presented to a jury for their verdict. In only 29 out of the almost 3,000 cases has there been an appeal to a higher court. Of the cases appealed only 7 have been reversed by the appellate courts and in 3 of these cases the 35th District court was later affirmed on review by the Supreme Court of Texas.

This cooperation of the attorneys and citizens has enabled me to keep the court calendars in the 35th District current and to give any case a jury trial within a maximum time of three months. It has enabled me not only to fulfill my duties as judge of the 35th District Court, but in addition to assist other District Courts in the State.

As a State District Judge, my salary is paid by the State of Texas. Therefore, I, along with other District Judges, have a duty to sit in other District Courts when requested by a Presiding Judge to help relieve crowded court dockets in heavily populated areas as well as to assist a Judge who is ill or disqualified. Such an assignment is made by a Presiding Judge of a Judicial Administrative District under authority of Article 200a, Texas Statutes. As my court calendar permitted I have felt obligated and privileged over the years on request of a Presiding Judge, to hold court in at least 25 different District Courts. Through such assignments I have accumulated additional judicial experience of value to the trial of cases in the 35th District Court.

In 1960, the citizens in Brown, Coleman and McCulloch Counties gave me

the privilege of presiding over their 35th District Court based on my general background and my promise to become a dedicated judicial servant. Now, with seven years judicial experience, I sincerely ask you to continue this trust by helping to re-elect your District Judge for another term."

Judge Dibrell has attended numerous seminars and conferences in which judges and lawyers are given an opportunity to keep abreast of new developments affecting their professional competence. In April of 1964, he was invited to join some 240 other judges, lawyers and laymen in a three day study of the Texas Courts and judicial system sponsored by the State Bar of Texas and the Joint Committee for the Effective Administration of Justice, headed by the then Justice Tom Clark of the United States Supreme Court. In June, 1967, Judge Dibrell was invited to attend and participate in a five day seminar limited to 150 participants of judges, lawyers and doctors on Psychiatric Consultation for the Court sponsored by the University of Southern California at Los Angeles.

Judge Dibrell is a member of the State Bar of Texas, Judicial Section of the State Bar, American Bar Association, American Bar Association, American Judicature Society, Brown County Bar Association, Coleman County Bar Association and Phi Alpha Delta Legal Fraternity.

Judge Dibrell is active in civic affairs in Brown, Coleman and McCulloch Counties. He is a member of both the Brownwood and Coleman Chambers of Commerce, member and Past President of the Kiwanis Club, member of the Brown County Sportsman Club, and Past Director of the Brownwood Civic Music Association.

Judge Dibrell, now 42 years of age, is a native of Coleman County where he attended the public schools. He attended the University of Texas at Austin where he received his Bachelor of Arts and Law Degrees. He practiced law in Coleman and was former Coleman County Attorney at the time he became District Judge.

He is a veteran of the Air Force where he served during World War I. He is married to the former Jayne Word of Austin, Texas, and they have two children, a boy, Will, age 14, and a girl, Margaret, age 11. Mrs. Dibrell is a Speech Therapist in the City School system. Judge and Mrs. Dibrell are members of the First Methodist Church where the Judge teaches an adult couples class.

Joe Flores To Be Promoted

The Army announced on November 8th that Lt. Col. Joe B. Flores has been selected for promotion to full colonel, with actual promotion anticipated some time next year.

Lt. Col. Flores graduated from SAHS in 1940, attended Allen Military Academy in Bryan, Texas and later graduated from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. He also received a Master of Science degree from the University of Southern California.

Since his entry in the Army Lt. Col. Flores has served in a variety of combat and peacetime assignments.

Old timers might remember when another newspaper reported that he had "died from wounds" during the Korean War—but Joe showed up later, alive and kicking.

Flores is now stationed with his family in Heidelberg, Germany. His mother, Mrs. Mae Flores, long a resident of Santa Anna, now resides in Bangs. His sister and family, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Baugh live at Santa Anna.

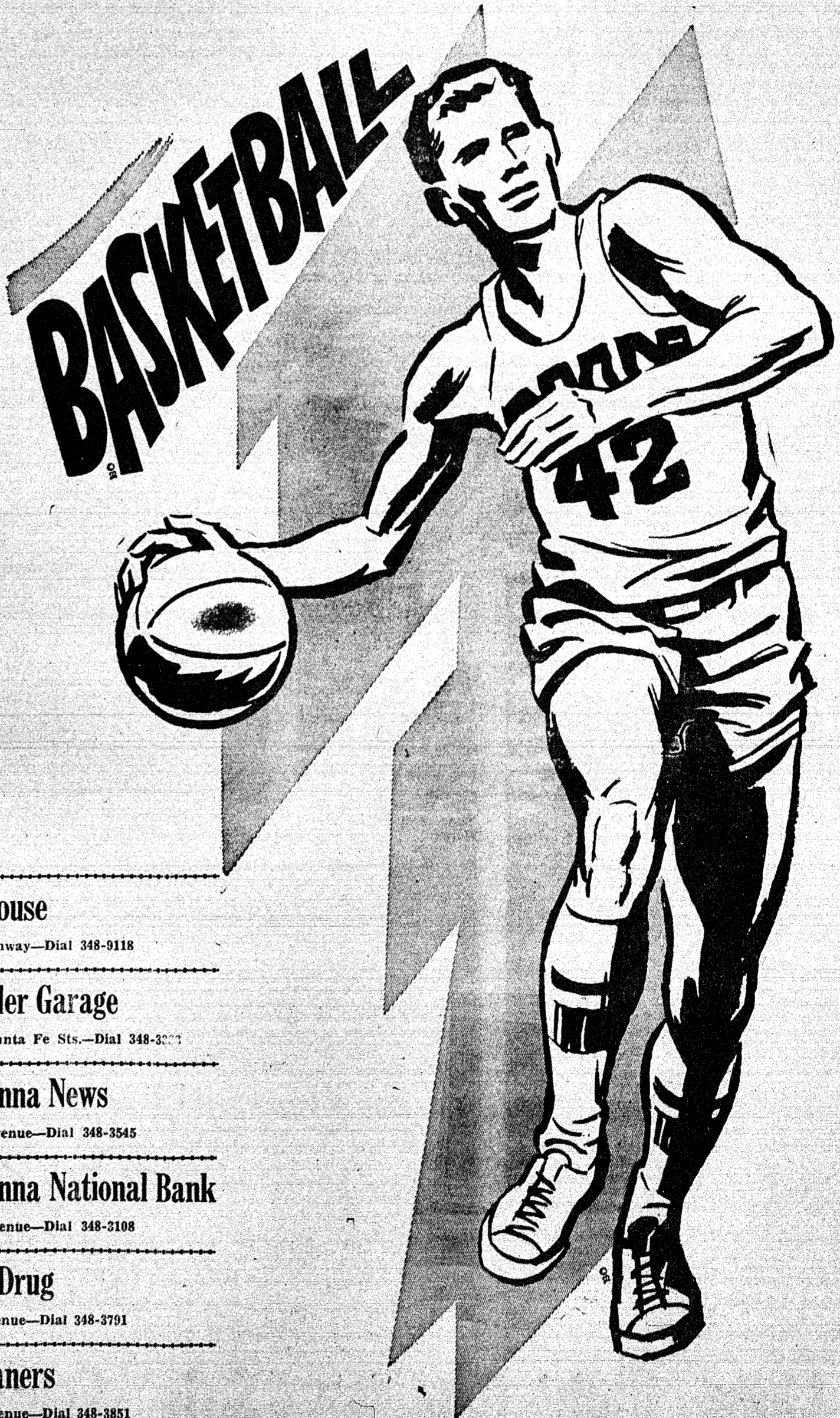

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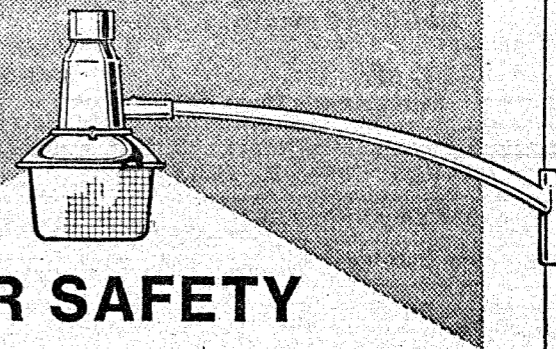

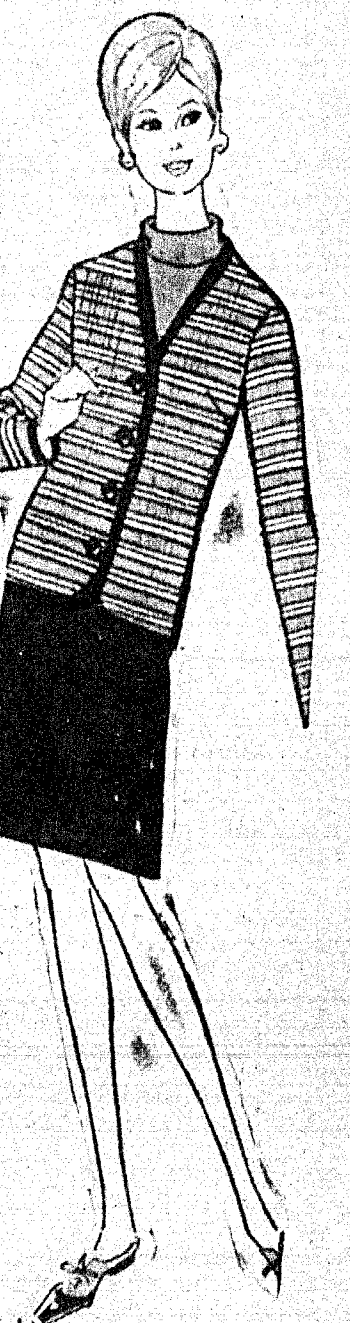

Mental Anguish

With blunt and angry language Millie's boss told her she was fired. Understandably upset, Millie filed suit for the "mental anguish" she had suffered.

But she could point to no personal violence, no slanderous words. The court concluded that her complaint was not tangible enough to support a claim for damages.

That has long been a basic rule of law. You may collect damages for mental anguish only if it is the result of some other wrongful act, such as assault or battery or false imprisonment. But not for mental anguish alone.

Why hasn't the law given compensation for mental anguish just as freely as for physical anguish? Mainly because of the danger of opening a Pandora's box of fake claims. How could a court tell if the complaint of mental anguish, uncorroborated by any other specific offense, was really true?

Nevertheless, with the advance of science, we have learned a great deal more about our mental processes—including the causes and effects of mental anguish.

As a result, the law has grown steadily more tolerant of such claims, a feat where the evidence of harm is reasonably clear and the conduct complained of is particularly outrageous.

Thus, a woman won damages for mental anguish from a trouble-maker who spread a false rumor that her son, away at college, had hanged himself.

And a young girl won damages for mental anguish from a furniture repossessor who, knowing that she was home alone used terrifying

threats to make her open the door.

However, the law does not and cannot promise total tranquility to one and all. As a leading authority put it:

"Against a large part of the irritations of community life, a certain toughening of the mental hide is a better protection than the law could ever be."

In one case, a customer in a bar took offense at a waiter's tactless comments. But when the customer demanded damages for his mental anguish, a court turned him down.

"Plaintiff's charge amounts to nothing more than that his feelings were hurt," said the judge. "This does not state a cause of action."

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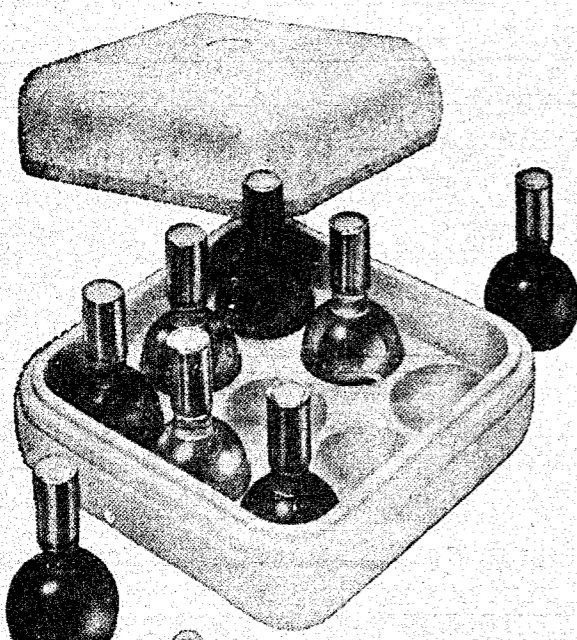
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Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, Tex. — Everybody's talking about the 1968 governor's race. As of this writing, however, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith is the only one who has formally announced. Secretary of State John L. Hill says he wants to run—and will, if support "continues to crystallize". Adds Hill: "I know the political realities are such that if I am going to run, I ought to announce soon, but I don't want to speculate when."

Uvalde rancher - banker Dolph Briscoe says he definitely is interested but has reached no firm decision. Although he hasn't announced, former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr made a candidate like move in demanding that

U. S. Sen Ralph Yarborough, another potential candidate, resign his office should he enter the governor's race. Austin attorney and former Congressman Joe Kilgore, a close friend of Gov. John Connally, says it is likely he will be a candidate but he did not close the door.

Other names have been mentioned but no statements have come from them, pro or con, as to their interest in the race.

COURTS SPEAK — Millions of dollars may be added to the Texas Permanent School Fund pending outcome of suit by a San Patricio County man challenging private ownership of 12,068 acres of South Texas oil lands says attorney general's department. Walter C. Atchley, in lawsuit, claims that the state never deeded away land to oil operators and is still owner.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld award of \$117,456 to a six-year-old Austin boy whose leg was cut off by a power mower at a drive-in theater here.

State Supreme Court in a divided (five to four) decision held that a San Antonio detective investigator was dismissed on insufficient grounds, though he offered for sale a shot gun reported stolen.

High court rejected appeal of an Edinburg man for release from jail where he is held on order to pay \$17,000 of his Mexican national lottery winnings to a woman who had purchased a half interest in one of his "lucky" tickets.

Supreme Court concluded that a Travis County district judge should not have ordered a new trial of case protesting denial of a new savings and loan association charter in Llano.

Court of Criminal Appeals held that conviction of a man imprisoned for 23 years on forgery and other felony charges cannot stand because he did not have counsel in his 1939 trial.

SMITH APPOINTMENTS — Lieutenant Governor Smith announced these appointments: Sens. Charles Herring of Austin and Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells to Multi-State Tax Compact Advisory Committee.

Sens. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo, Criss Cole of Houston, William T. Moore of Bryan, Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi and Ralph Hall of Rockwall to joint Interim Highway Safety Committee.

Sens. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas, James S. Bates of Edinburg, Creighton, H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock and Murray Watson Jr. of Waco to special committee to study Governmental Immunity with request to recommend whether principle should be continued or abolished.

Sens. William N. Patman

of Ganado, Watson and Hazlewood to special Parking and Traffic Committee to study congestion in the state capitol area.

CITY SALES TAX SUCCESS CONTINUES — Five more Texas cities have given overwhelming approval to 1 per cent city sales tax levies. Huntsville, Uvalde, Seguin, Commerce and Llano voters asked for the tax by margins ranging from two-to-one to eight-to-one.

So far, 33 cities have approved the local revenue-raising method passed by the Legislature this year although it was believed to be highly controversial. Only two, Lufkin and Electra, have turned it down.

Next two elections — December 2 — are in Galveston and Kilgore. Fifty-six cities will vote on December 5, including Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth. **BOND PROGRAM** — Two state agencies are busily planning how best to take advantage of \$275,000,000 worth of authorization voted them by Texas citizens on November 11.

One of the constitutional amendments revived the Veterans Land Program and authorized the issuance of \$200,000,000 in bonds to finance it. Another set up the Park Development Fund and provided for the sale of \$75,000,000 in bonds to finance it.

Veterans Land Board, administrator of the land program, should be ready to begin its operations soon after the votes are formally canvassed on November 28. No friction is anticipated in this for two reasons.

First, the old Veterans Land Program expired only in 1965, so Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler is experienced in operating it. Second, there are few complications to work out—the state merely sells the bonds and acquires the money, then asks for applications from veterans. Sadler said veterans should locate tracts they want, then apply for loans after January 15.

But Parks and Wildlife Department is facing a different situation. Bond experts

met with department officials last week to give them a "short course" on securities.

Neither agency is planning to sell all of the authorized bonds at once. Land Office is talking about \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000 in the first issue, and though the Parks and Wildlife Commission will have the final say-so, the most popular figure discussed at the meeting was \$10,000,000.

Land bonds will be 40-year bonds. Park bonds are limited to 10 years, and will be retired by revenues from entrance fees to the state parks. Both have a 4½ per cent constitutional limit on the interest the state may pay, which could complicate their sale.

JOB CORPS PLACEMENTS — More than 14,000 Texas young men and women have been employed by the Job Corps.

Since the program began two years ago, about 13,000 male trainees from Gary Job Corps have accepted assignments. The McKinney Job Corps for girls, which began screening applicants in April, already has placed 1,132 on jobs.

LIQUOR BOARD SUSPENDS AGENTS — Coke Stevenson Jr., administrator of Texas Liquor Control Board, suspended two Dallas agents for "remarks" about board operations, and ordered them to a Tuesday, November 28, hearing here.

Action followed distribution of a circular in the capitol area and in Dallas criticizing Stevenson and James E. Dale, Dallas LCB supervisor. Circular also repeated the Baptist General Convention demand for investigation of the Board Stevenson called the publication "malicious slander".

Dallas State Sen. Oscar Mauzy said he is looking into LCB activities himself following rumors about alleged

wrongdoings.

SHORT SNORTS — House Speaker Barnes has been named to the board of directors of States' Urban Action Center, along with 4 governors and other national leaders.

Texas draft quota for January will be 1,659 men, highest since November 1966.

Governor Connally selected Nueces County Commissioner Robert Barnes to interim committee to study roads and parking areas on Texas beaches.

Texas Research League has recommended a teletype network to connect all Rio Grande Valley law enforcement agencies, and that their radio systems be improved for use in emergencies like Hurricane Beulah and floods.

Frank Hildebrand, Texas Tourist Development Agency director was picked by President Johnson to serve on 22-member special travel task force.

December 5 and 9 House of Representatives vacancy elections have been called in Har-

ris and Travis counties.

William J. Burke, executive director of State Board of Control, has been elected a vice-president and board member of the Institute of Purchasing and Supply of Great Britain. Burke is president of National Institute of Governmental Purchasing.

El Paso Attorney Robert L. Donigan has been named as chief counsel of the Commission on Law Enforcement Procedures, which is to produce a handbook to serve as a practical guide for law officers in the field.

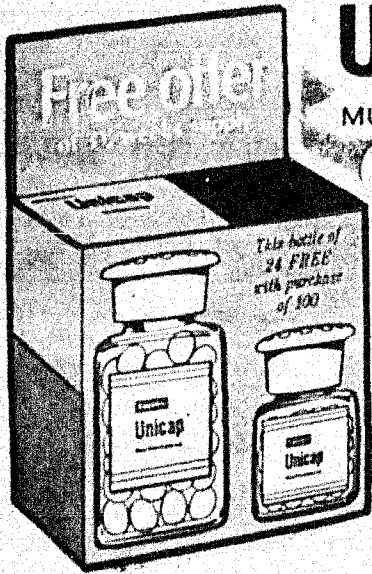

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
