Mounties Clobber Panthers, 32-6

All Voters Must Register Regardless Of Their Age

House Bill 89, as passed by the 60th Legislature, concerning qualifications and requirements for voting, will effect a good many people in Coleman County, particularly the provision that specifies that all voters must register, regardless of age.

The legislation provides that all voters must be registered in order to vote in any election held after Feb. 1, 1968. Previously persons over 60 years of age in this county did not have to register. There is no charge for the registration and the registration period opens on October 1, and continues to January 31, 1968.

Tax Assessor-Collector John Skelton advises that an individual may register by mail or in person. Blanks for registration will be left at the banks, hospitals, rest homes and places of business for the convenience of those not able to come by Skelton's office in the courthouse.

Another change from the past is that the voting year will begin March 1, rather than February 1 as in the past.

Military Personnel
The law is now changed as concerns military personnel. Those serving outside Texas may vote without having registered through the regular registration procedure as administered by the Tax Assessor-Collector. The official federal post card application for absentee ballot for each election is treated as an application for registration, and this application will be hand-

led through the office of the County Clerk. It is stressed that the application for absentee ballot serves as registration for that election only. The individual in military service outside of Texas may also register through the ordinary procedure, through the Tax Assessor-Collector office.

There are new regulations concerning former aliens, new residents and persons reaching voting age. Persons becoming 21 years old after the close of the regular registration period and new residents to the state after the registration deadline may register at least 30 days prior to

any election in which they wish to vote.

Persons over 60, who have not been required to register in the past, may continue to vote under the old law until February 1, 1968.

In the first quarter Dickie Horner put the Mountaineers on the score board when he went over from the 2 yard line. Blanton kicked the extra point to put Santa Anna ahead with 4:20 left in the first period. This score did not last long as the Panthers' Johnny Scitern received the Mountaineers kick - off on the 35 yard line and then raced straight forward, turned back and handed off to the Gorman quarterback, Daryl Hirst, who raced down the right side and scored before the Mounties realized what had happened. The try for extra points with an aerial failed, leaving the score 7-6 for the Mounties.

The Mountaineers didn't stand for this however and scored on the very next series of plays. Taking the ball on their own 40 yard line the Mountaineers big Tommy Blanton pounded their way to paydirt in nine plays. Tommy Blanton scored on a 28 yard jaunt around left end. With about nine minutes left in the first half the Mounties scored again when Larry Williams took a Gorman punt and returned it to the Panther 15. After three tries the Mountaineers scored again when Larry Williams carried it over from the three. This left the score at half time at 19-6.

After a scoreless 3d quarter the Mountaineers scored twice in the fourth quarter. Quarterback Roy Joe Harvey with a sick handoff to Larry Williams produced a touch down as Williams outraced the Panthers for 20 yards. The "Raiders" then took over for the Mountaineers for several thrilling minutes of the ball game. With five seconds to play in the ball game and the main eleven back in Quarterback Roy Joe Harvey took the ball from center, took a few steps backwards and hit Larry Williams down the middle for the fifth touchdown of the game for the Mountaineers. 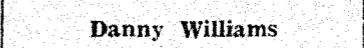

Austin — Mrs. Jane Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. D. Bryan, Santa Anna, has just begun three months of training under the Austin State Hospital Psychiatric Nursing Program reports Dr. C. R. Miller, superintendent.

Mrs. Smith graduated in 1952 from Santa Anna High School and attended the San Angelo State College. Mrs. Smith and her husband have five children.

The psychiatric nursing course is designed for affiliating students in their junior or senior years and consists of a review of personality development and a study of etiology, symptomatology, course and treatment of common types of psychiatric disorders.

Emphasis is placed on the nurse-patient relationship and the methods used in the care of the mentally ill patient; on community agencies established for the purpose of dealing with social problems arising out of mental illness; on the community health program directed toward the preservation of mental health and on projects contributing toward a better understanding of mental illness.

Statewide the 4-H program is guided by Texas A & M University, the state's land-grant university. Nationally, the U. S. Department of Agriculture administers the program as the youth phase of the Cooperative Extension Service.

Coleman County Extension agents invite youths and their parents who are interested in knowing more about 4-H projects and activities to visit their office for detailed information.

3/4 cu. bread crumbs.

Mix above ingredients and place in baking pan. Spread the remaining 1/2 can tomato sauce over loaf and bake at 295° about 1 1/2 hours.

Pecan Crispies

1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup butter
2 1/2 cups brown sugar
2 well beaten eggs
2 1/2 cups flour
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. soda
1 cup chopped pecans
Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar; add eggs and beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients, then nuts. Drop from teaspoon about 2 inches apart onto greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven 350° 12 to 15 minutes.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Of Beauticians and Barbers In the average visit to a beauty shop or barber shop, the customer's greatest risk is a curl that won't stay put or a botched sideburn.

But occasionally the hazard may be more serious. Injury may be done not just to the customer's vanity but to his person. When that happens, the law may be called upon to fix responsibility for the harm.

The general rule is that, by opening its doors to the public, a shop promises the kind of service provided by "a reasonably prudent and skillful person engaged in the same business." If its service falls below that standard, the proprietor may be held liable for the consequences.

For example:

A woman collected damages from a beauty shop because the operator, washing her hair, doused her head with scalding water.

And in another case, a woman won damages for a skin infection resulting from a facial treatment given without the proper sanitary precautions.

This standard of quality applies not only to the service rendered but also to the equipment used and the condition of the premises. Thus, a woman successfully sued a beauty shop on the basis of a soapy puddle on the floor which caused her to slip, fall, and suffer assorted injuries.

Nevertheless, the management is not held to an iron-clad guarantee of safety. If an accident was not reasonably avoidable, the law will not impose liability.

Accordingly, a woman who fell while getting out of a chair was denied damages from the shop where it occurred. The judge could see no way the management

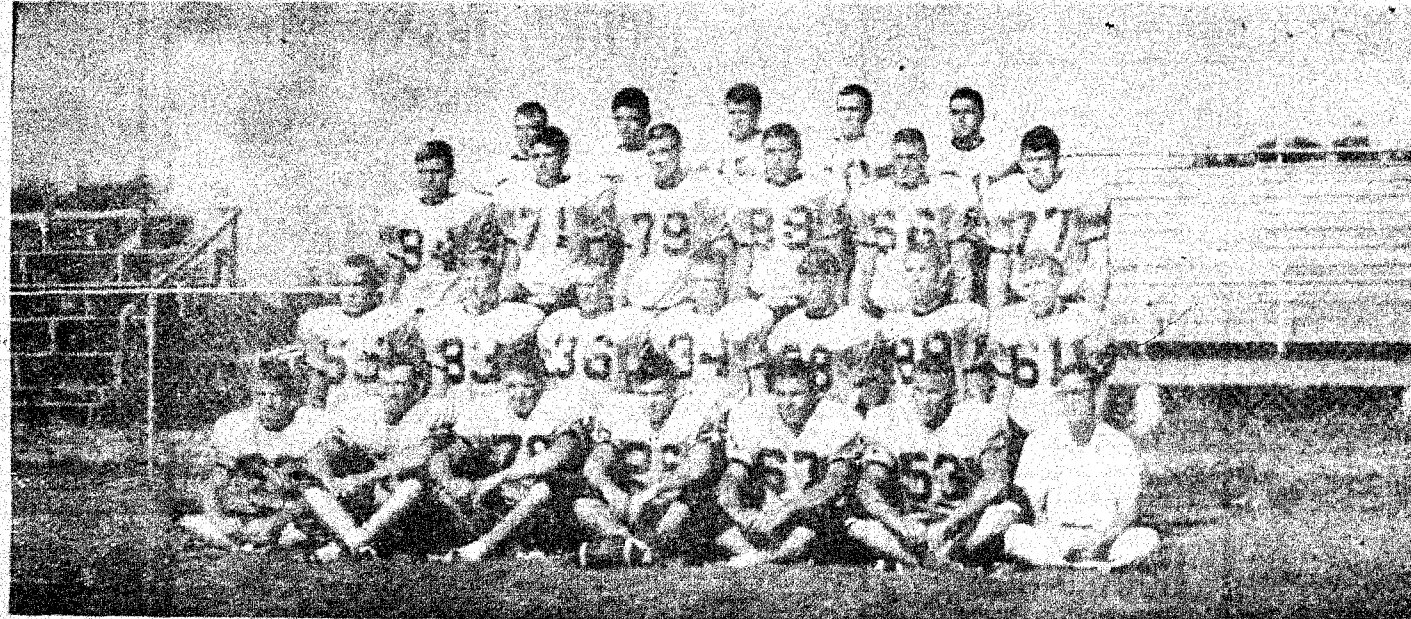

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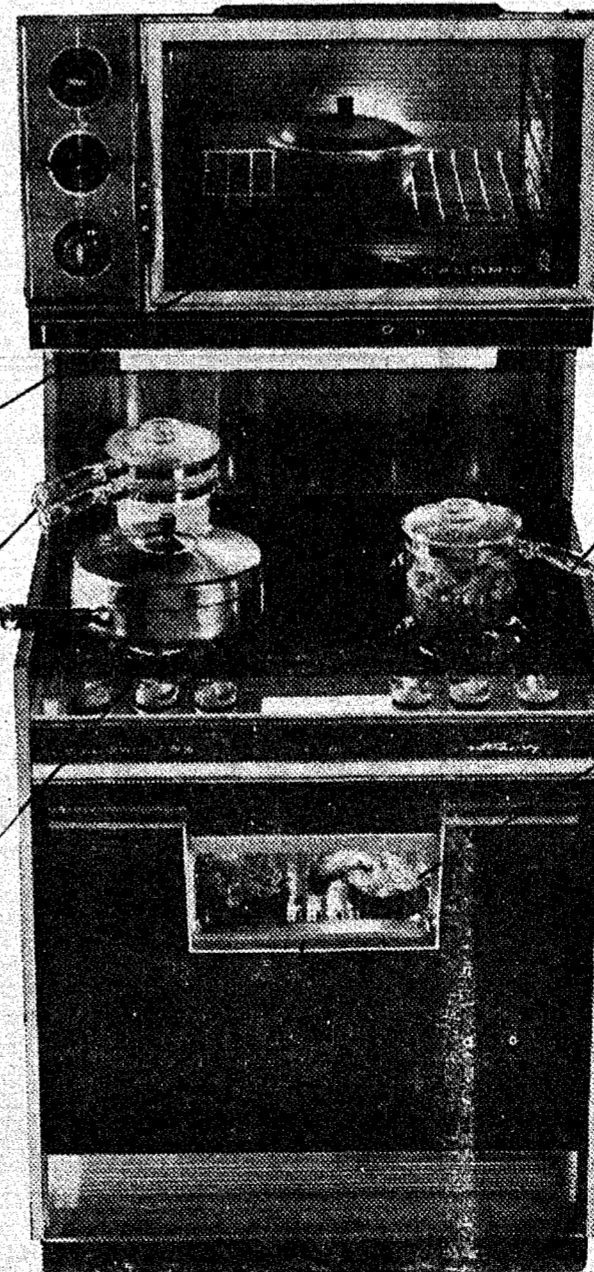
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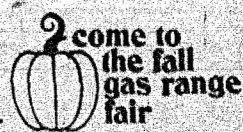

State Capitol NEWS

Austin, Texas — Although the primaries are not until next May, Texas politicians here and there, already are beginning to get in and out of statewide races.

The big question still is whether Gov. John Connally will run for an unprecedented fourth term. He says he hasn't made up his mind. If he doesn't run, it now appears that it will be at least a three-way race in the Democratic primary — between Lt. Gov. Preston Smith who already has announced, Speaker Ben Barnes and former Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

If Connally does run, Barnes and Carr probably will vie for lieutenant governor, though neither has as yet announced a definite decision.

In the state Supreme Court, both Associate Justice James R. Norvell and Meade F. Griffith say that they will not seek re-election in 1968. Woodrod Bean of El Paso and former state Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio are being mentioned as possible candidates for those two posts.

HIGHWAY OFFICIALS PROMOTED

On January first B. L. DeBerry, Dallas district highway engineer, will replace Assistant State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall. Dingwall will replace State Highway Engineer DeWitt Greer who is retiring.

There will be four other administrative changes in the highway department:

Archie J. Sherrrod, now district engineer in Odessa, will be promoted to chief engineer of maintenance operations.

John G. Keller, Beaumont district engineer, will succeed DeBerry.

Franklin Carter Young, district administrative engineer in San Antonio, will take over Keller's job.

Paul H. Coleman, assistant district engineer at Odessa, will replace Sherrrod.

RESEARCH AWARD TO TEXAS

The Texas Research League was presented the top research award of the Gov-

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ernmental Research Association for its report, "Metropolitan Texas: A Workable Approach to Its Problems."

The award was made in Boston. Accepting were Alvin A. Burger, executive director of the League, and James W. McGrew, research director and head of the project.

The League's report was made after an 18-month study requested by Governor Connally. It contained seven legislative recommendations, but only one of them passed the Legislature. This one provided \$250,000 of state money for regional planning.

TEXAS TOURISM PUSHED

Texas official travel exhibit — pushing the state as a vacation land with a "World of Difference" — was seen by approximately 450,000 persons

at the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto. So says Walt Warner, director of programs for the Texas Tourist Development Agency, which sponsors the exhibit.

Warner regards Canada as an important but unexplored market for the Texas travel industry. "Many (Canadians) were unaware that Texas lay just 1,200 miles from Toronto's border," he said. "They seemed surprised to find a state so near that offered a warm, tropical climate during the winter months."

Texas' exhibit is being displayed in travel shows all over North America.

OIL PRODUCTION DOWN
Texas oil production was reduced by 109,071 barrels for October. The Texas Railroad

Commission cut the allowable after finding demand lower as the Middle East crisis eases off.

The Commission was to have announced its decision immediately at its regular statewide prorotation hearing, but delayed it four days to see what effect hurricane Beulah would have on production and refining.

After studying that situation, it was decided that no major damage had been incurred, though there were

temporary disruptions.
