The Fighting Mountaineers Lose Close Battle To Ranger, 14-6

The fighting Mountaineers of Santa Anna High School in their first defeat of the season, lost to the Ranger Bulldogs by a score of 14-6. The Mounties never gave up and with a couple of breaks could very well have come out on the other end of the game.

If the Mountaineers get through district these two teams will probably meet again. We think that it will be the other way around next time. But, let's win district first.

On the opening kickoff the Bulldogs took the opening kickoff and smashed 59 yards for their first touchdown. The Ranger quarterback took the ball to the right and pitched out to Squires who raced untouched for paydirt. Orms kicked

the extra point. The Mounties couldn't go on their first two tries with the ball and had to punt. With a partially blocked kick the Bulldogs had an opportunity to score again. But two spectacular defensive plays by Lynn Wristen and Korky Wise dropped Goleman, the Ranger quarterback, for losses totaling 18 yards and forced the Bulldogs to punt. Then with strong running and a pass play the Mountaineers penetrated into Bulldog territory. Then Larry Williams completed a pass to Ricky Abernathy at the 29 yard line. Santa Anna then pushed its way to the nine and a keeper by Larry Williams gave the Mounties a first and 10 on the Bulldog two yard line. It then took Tommy Blanton three bruising tries

to hit paydirt. The try for extra point was blocked. The score at half time was 7-6. On the first kickoff in the second half the Bulldogs had to punt and with nobody back for the kick a Bulldog killed the ball on the Santa Anna one. After Santa Anna punted out of the hole Ranger took the ball on the 35 yard line of Santa Anna and seven plays later, with Tommy Fox carrying every play, the Bulldogs scored from the one yard line. Orms kicked the extra point to make the score 14-6. This ended the scoring for the night.

In the final period, three consecutive 15-yard penalties against Ranger left the Mountaineers with first and ten on the Ranger 24. Then a brilliant run by back Dickie Horner carried the ball to the nine yard line. Squires dropped Williams for a 2-yard loss on the first play. Brad White got Williams on the 17 on the second play, a third down pass was broken up and Williams was dropped on the 22 on fourth down. This was as close as either team came to scoring again.

James P. McCord Dies in Coleman

James Pressley (J. P.) McCord, 89, banker, rancher and Coleman civic leader, of 615 W. Live Oak St., here, died Monday at 3:30 p. m. in the Overall - Morris Memorial Chapel, with George Herrscher, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Coleman, officiating. Burial will be in the Coleman City Cemetery.

Born May 2, 1878, in Trichham, he was married to Stella Baumont in Coleman April 27, 1910. He was the son of the late Col. and Mrs. James E. McCord. He attended Daniel Baker Col and graduated from Austin College.

He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and of the Masonic Lodge, had served as a trustee of the First Presbyterian Church and was a lifetime elder of the church. He was a past president of the Coleman Kiwanis Club, had served as treasurer from 1927-1948 of the Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital here, and had been chairman of the board of directors of the Coleman First National Bank since 1932.

He had served as chairman of the board of trustees of School district for several years, had served as president of the Coleman County National Farm Loan Association, and also as a trustee of the Federal Land Bank in Houston for several years.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Tom Sealy of Midland; three grandchildren, Mrs. Hershel Wilson of Coleman and Mrs. John Thompson of Oakland, Calif.; and two great-grandchildren, McCord Wilson and Michelle Wilson, both of Coleman.

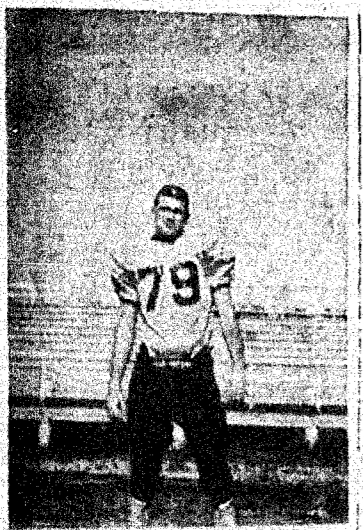
Mounties Open District Play Against Early

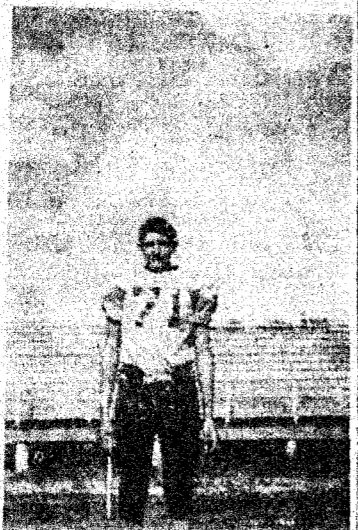
Korky Wise

Korky has lettered in football for 3 years.

Korky is one of the most consistent football players on the 1967 Mountaineer team. He had a great year in 1966 and this year he is the anchor of the Mountie line on both offense and defense. He is an exceptional blocker and as a defensive tackle, Korky is unexcelled. He is averaging 8 tackles per game. He has the largest number of defensive merit stars of any lineman (4).

1967-68 School Budget, \$205,759.00

The Board of Trustees of the Santa Anna Independent School District met on October 3, 1967 in the school office to consider items of business necessary to the operation of the school.

The status of the current budget was studied and bills and accounts totaling \$1,845 were ordered paid.

The preliminary application for Foundation Funds was studied and comparisons were made to the regular operation budget which was approved in September. Estimates were considered to be in proper form and final approvals on all budget items were made. The 1967-1968 budget approved September 5 is as follows:

Administration \$18,990.00
This section is the budget base for all administrative, secretarial, auditing, tax assessment, tax collection, legal fees, business supplies for all departments, postage and other expenses connected to supervision and administration of the school and plant.

Instruction, \$137,757.00
This budget item includes all expense connected with instruction, including salaries, teaching supplies, libra-

ry books, audio-visual materials, necessary travel for instruction.

Attendance Services
None budgeted.

Health Services \$3,285.00
This item cares for our part of the school nurse salary and other expense incident to this department. This program is operated through the office of the county school superintendent.

Pupil Transportation Services \$12,050.00
This budget section cares for the operation of school buses, including the salaries, operation, replacement of the equipment, insurance. The school district now operates six buses.

Operation of Plant \$10,150.00
For the operation of all buildings, grounds, equipment, salaries of custodians, utilities, housekeeping supplies.

Maintenance of Plant \$1,600.00
For repair, replacement, necessary construction, the maintenance of all equipment and repairs necessary to prevent abnormal depreciation.

Fixed Charges, \$1,735.00

This cares for limited social security funds, property insurance, interest on loans and fidelity bonds.

Food Service, \$800.00
No local tax money is budgeted to this lunchroom account. Some assistance is received from Title I, ESEA accounts for needy children. The local lunchroom is maintained on a self-support basis.

Student Body Activity \$700.00
This section is to care for student transportation to school events, to care for deficits in student activity accounts, to finance literary contests and participation in them by local students.

Community Service, \$600.00
The local school district is a member of the Community Chamber of Commerce and as such pays its dues.

Capital Outlay, \$725.00
This section supports the purchase of new and original equipment, not replacements. New cities, buildings, improvements, remodeling, new furniture and equipment are included. This has been seriously reduced to lower budget costs. The school cannot continue to operate on this budget basis.

Debt Service From Current Funds, \$18,107.00
This section supports payment of bonds, interest on bonds, interest and principal on short term loans, and other debt service as necessary. The 1967-1968 budget here is directed to erasing an accumulated deficit which comes from the past five years.

Total Budget Cost \$205,759.00
This is a reduction of more than \$14,000 from 1966-1967 and the school can operate under this budget only if it does not encounter some unexpected costs.

Total expected revenue for 1967-68 --- \$205,759.00
The tax rolls as prepared by the tax assessor were approved. The assessor valuation shows a total of \$5,532,360.00 and an approved tax rate of \$1.70 per \$100 assessed valuation. Collections would amount to \$92,358.62 based on 100 per cent returns. The budget has been figured on a lower local tax base in hopes that a surplus may develop to use in payment on a bank overdraft. It is hoped that these additional funds may be later placed into debt service.

Payment to the Board of Equalization was set and approval was given to make application for Head Start Program for 1968 and for Title II, ESEA, 1967-1968.

The Board of Trustees meets every first Tuesday of the month unless a change is forced by some conflict of events.
