

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

Q-I have already paid my tax bill but I just got another bill for it anyway. What should I do?

A-Return the bill with the notation that you have already paid it. Give the date the payment was made and the office to which it was sent to help identify your payment.

A-A close relative does not have to be a member of your household to qualify as your dependent. As long as other tests are met, you will still be able to claim your uncle as a dependent even though he no longer lives with you.







Serve A Different Cherry Pie

A quick and different cherry meringue pie uses thickened canned cherries and a meringue sprinkled with cinnamon sugar for a spicy flavor

SPICY CHERRY MERINGUE PIE 2 egg whites

1 8-inch baked pastry shell 1/2 cup sugar 2 tablespoons corn starch 1 (16 to 17-ounce) can water

pack cherries

1/4 teaspoon desired flavoring 2 tablespoons cinnamon sugar (about)

4 tablespoons sugar

Combine 1/2 cup sugar and corn starch in saucepan. Drain juice from cherries and blend with sugar mixture. Add cherries. Stirring constantly, bring to boil and boil I minute. Pour immediately into baked pastry shell.

Beat egg whites until foamy. Add 4 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, beating well after each addition. Continue beating until stiff peaks form when beater is raised. Beat in desired flavoring. Spread some meringue around edge of filling first, to touch crust all around; then fill in center or arrange in peaks in center. Sprinkle with cinnamon sugar. Bake until meringue is lightly browned, 15 to 20 minutes in 350° F. (moderate) oven or about 5 minutes in 425° F. (hot) oven. Cool at room temperature,

For 9-inch pie: Prepare double recipe of filling. Increase ingredients for meringue to 3 eggs whites and 6 tablespoons sugar.

How does one know when he should consult a psy-

Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association reports that Texas. most people who should Mr and Mrs. Billy Don consult a psychiatrist are likely to consider themselves as someone not needing his

Many shun the psychiatrist, the AMA says, because they have the distorted concept that people who are under psychiatric care are "crazy.

Psychiatrists are physicians with a special training through which they are able to help people with mental illness or emotional problems, even as other physicians are qualified to assist in physical and mental ills are closely related.

Depression, or what we could call the blues, is frequently an early sign of what can become a disabling mental illness. Likewise, excitement and overactivity - although often completely normal - form an abnormal sign when they occur in the wrong place or for the wrong rea-

Other suggestive symptoms include tantrums and exaggerated expressions of anger, hysterical attacks, unfounded fear, and guilt feelings which exist without an acceptable reason.

Any of these would justify discussing the need for psychiatric consultation by your physician.




