Mountaineers Blast Cross Plains, 44-16

Play Goldthwaite Friday For District Title

The Fighting Mountaineers blasted the Cross Plains Buffaloes in a district battle by a score of 44-16. This leaves the Goldthwaite Eagles and the Mounties tied for the district crown. The two teams will meet in Goldthwaite Friday at 7:30 p. m. Neither team has been beaten in district play.

The Mounties went over the Buffaloes in an offensive that was led by quarterback Larry Williams. Williams scored four touchdowns on runs of 55 yards, 33 yards, 20 yards and 10 yards. He scored once in the first quarter, twice in the second quarter and once in the third quarter.

Dickie Horner turned in a great offensive night also by scoring 13 points for the Mounties. He scored one touchdown in the second quarter and ran a 25 yard touchdown in the third quarter that was called back. Dickie kicked 4 extra points and also kicked a 25 yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

Davey Beal supplied the other score for the Mounties on a 15 yard pass play from Williams. Williams and Beal passing combination helped the Mounties all night. They connected on passes of 9, 34, 12, 17, 8, 5 and 15 yards.

The tough defense held the Buffaloes to only 2 touchdowns. The Mounties intercepted two of the Buffalo passes. Raymond Valdez and Dale Herring both intercepted passes.

Joe Baker Dies In S. A. Hospital

Joe Blunt Baker, Sr., 80, died at 5 p. m. Saturday in the Santa Anna Hospital following a long illness. Services were held Monday at 2 p. m. in the First Methodist Church, with Rev. Frank Leach officiating. Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery, directed by the Bosch Funeral Home. Pallbearers for the funeral were W. F. Barnes, O. L. Cheaney, Cullen Perry, Jack Mobley, Jess Howard, Lee Hunter, Carroll Kingsberry and Arthur Turner.

Mr. Baker came to Santa Anna in the fall of 1910 and established his own cleaning and tailoring shop. Later he and Hubert Shore had the A-1 Cleaners in Coleman. He married Miss Olivia Collier of Santa Anna on May 21, 1912. Two children were born to this marriage, Barbara and Joe, Jr.

Mr. Baker went to work for the Sid W. Richardson Oil Company in 1938 and was with that company until his retirement in 1956. During these years Mr. and Mrs. Baker lived in Tyler and El Campo, Texas and Lafayette, La. After Mr. Baker retired they returned to Santa Anna to live. Mr. Baker was a member of the First Methodist Church and was a Mason. He was active in the church and in civic affairs. He was a member of the Santa Anna Housing Authority Board and was greatly interested in this project.

Mr. Baker is survived by his wife, his son, Joe B. Baker, Jr., of Albuquerque, N. M., his daughter, Mrs. R. W. Erwin of Taos, N. M., and three grandchildren.

Receiving the award for her late son was Mrs. Madi W. James of Santa Anna, Texas. The presentations were made by Brigadier General Gilbert W. Woodward, assistant 2nd Armored Division for maneuver elements, at a ceremony held in front of 111 Corps and Fort Hood Headquarters. Pfc. James was awarded the Bronze Star Medal with "V" Device for heroism during ground combat on May 20 in Vietnam while serving as a rifleman with Company C, 1st Battalion, 8th Infantry. The Purple Heart was awarded to Pfc. James for the wounds he received.

Amendments Up For Vote Sat.

The election on the six amendments will be held on Saturday, November 11, at the Lions Club building. Polls will open at 8 a. m. closing at 7 p. m. After the re-districting by the County Commissioners, the Trickham voters will now vote in Santa Anna.

The News would like to summarize each amendment for its readers and urge each of you to get out and vote. The following is a brief summary of the six amendments:

1. To authorize counties to place all their tax revenues in a single general fund, rather than separate, special purpose funds.
2. To let local political subdivisions which have hospital districts spend tax agency for mental health and mental retardation services.
3. To revive the veterans land program through an additional \$200,000,000 bond issue, permitting war veterans, including those of the Vietnam conflict, to purchase

- land on low-interest, 40-year-payback loans.
4. To permit counties to pay medical benefits for their law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.
5. To authorize a \$75,000,000 state bond issue (supported by an admission fee at selected parks) for park land buying and development.
6. To permit non-elective state officials and employees

to serve on state and federal boards and commissions if there is no conflict of duties. This is the first general election in Texas since the "scratch out" method of voting was eliminated. Now an "X" indicates your choice. Election judge is Glen Copeland and the clerks are Mrs. Rose Bass, Mrs. Billie Guthrie, Mrs. Doris Harvey and Mrs. Helen Stepp.

Plans Completed For Santa Anna Christmas Prog.

Max Eubank, chairman of the 1967 Christmas program released plans today for the affair. Eubank said that although there were a few details still to be worked out that the main items of the program were definite.

The program will start a little later than usual this year beginning on December 1st, with a Christmas parade. The parade will begin at 2 p. m. Cash prizes will be given for the floats in the parade. First prize in the float division will be \$50, second prize \$35, third prize, \$25; fourth prize, \$15 and fifth prize will be \$10.

Judging of the window decorations will also be held on December 1st. There will also be cash prizes in this division with prizes of \$10, \$8, \$6, and \$4.

The Neighborhood Improvement Committee will be in charge of decorating the Christmas tree this year which will probably be located on Wallis Avenue in front of the old hotel across from the Santa Anna National Bank.

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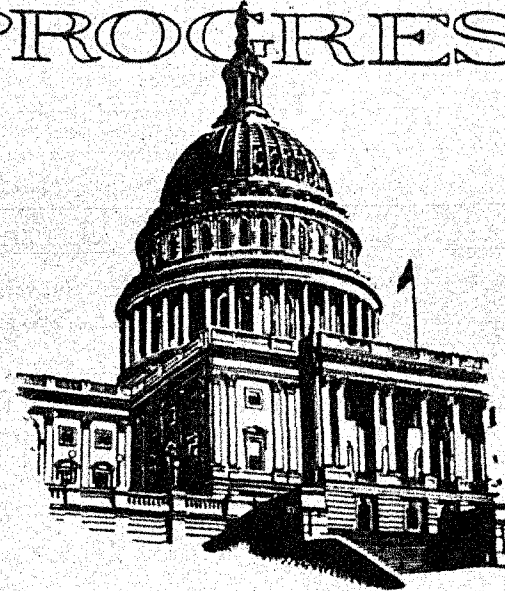

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Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—Where can I get forms I need to report tip income?
A—Your employer should have copies of Form 4070 which you should use. If he does not have them or can not obtain them for you, send a post card to your district director requesting copies.

Q—Do you have anything that explains what a taxpayer can do if he disagrees with the agent auditing his return?

A—Yes. An explanation of the audit procedure and the taxpayer's rights of appeal are contained in IRS Document No. 5202. Send a post card to your district director for a free copy.

Q—I made a mistake on my 1040 and filed an amended return sometime ago. What's holding up the refund I claimed?

A—It usually takes a little longer to process amended returns. The original return has to be compared with the amended return before processing can be completed.

Q—If I take a job overseas will I have to pay both a foreign income tax as well as a U. S. one?

A—It depends on where you work and the circumstances of your employment. The U. S. has agreements with many countries to ease the problem of double taxation. A U. S. citizen may also, in many cases, be able to take a credit or a deduction on his U. S. income tax return for the foreign taxes he pays.

Under certain conditions all or part of the income earned abroad may be exempt from Federal taxation. For details on this send a post card to your district director and ask for a free copy of Publication No. 54, "Tax Guide for U. S. Citizens Abroad."

Q—My daughter has a small scholarship which will cover part of her tuition costs. Will that have to be counted as taxable income for her? If not, will I have to pay a tax on it since she is my dependent?

A—Most scholarships are not taxable. If your daughter's scholarship happens to be taxable, however, it will be counted as her income, not yours. A taxpayer is not liable for the tax on income earned by his dependent.

To find out whether your daughter's scholarship is taxable or not, check with the person or organization granting it. You can also obtain information on the tax status of scholarships by sending a post card to your IRS district director and request Document 5045, "What's Income?"

Q—I pay social security taxes where I work. Do I also have to pay self-employment tax on what I earn in a part-time business?

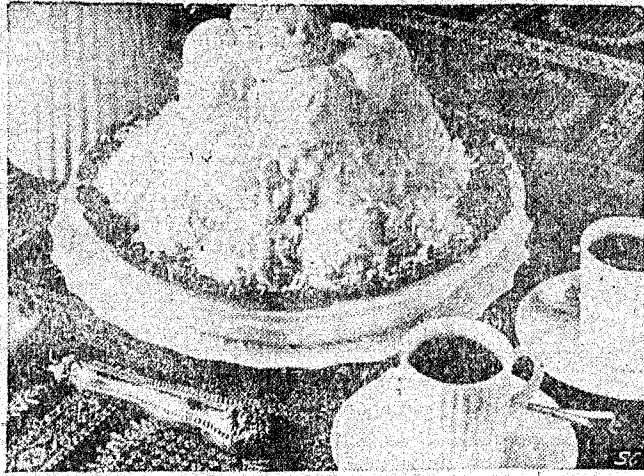
A—You may be liable for both social security and self-employment taxes.

The maximum earnings on which social security taxes must be paid is \$6,600. If your salary or wages subject to social security tax is \$6,600 or over then you do not have to pay self-employment tax on any earnings from another source. But if you earned less than \$6,600 on your regular job on which social security was withheld, then you should pay self-employment tax on the difference up to \$6,600 if the net income from your part-time business amounts to \$400 or more. For details on this send a post card to your district director and ask for a free copy of Document No. 5047, "Self-employment Tax."

Here's the scoop on a tri-color ice cream pie created in the Borden Kitchen. Just scoop out generous-size balls of ice cream... strawberry, chocolate, and vanilla, roll in coconut, stack in a crunchy chocolate crust, and pop into the freezer until serving time. A word to the wise cook: To prevent melting cover a jelly roll pan with aluminum foil and place in freezer. As each ball is finished, arrange it in a single layer on the foil-covered pan. When all the balls are scooped, remove from freezer and arrange in the chilled crust.

Triple-Treat Ice Cream Pie (Makes one 9-inch pie)

- 3 (1-ounce) squares unsweetened chocolate
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 3 tablespoons hot milk
- 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
- 2-2/3 cups (two 3-1/2 oz. cans) flaked coconut
- 1 pint each Lady Borden strawberry, chocolate, and vanilla ice cream

Line 9-inch pie plate with a piece of aluminum foil large enough to extend about an inch over plate, keeping the foil smooth and even. In top of double boiler over hot, not boiling, water, melt chocolate and butter. Blend well. In a small bowl, combine hot milk and sugar. Stir into melted chocolate and butter. Add only 2-1/4 cups of the coconut. Mix well. With spatula or back of large spoon, press mixture evenly against bottom and sides of foil-lined pie plate. Chill in freezer 25 to 30 minutes, or until firm. Remove from freezer. Lift foil out of pie plate. Carefully peel foil from firm chocolate mixture. Replace shell in pie plate. With a #10 ice cream scoop, quickly make strawberry and chocolate ice cream balls. Roll them in remaining coconut as they are made. Arrange alternate flavors in pie shell. Top with vanilla ice cream balls. Place a piece of aluminum foil loosely over top of pie and return to freezer until serving time.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Of Tips and Taxes

To the cab driver, the tips he collected were just friendly gestures by his grateful passengers. When the government tried to impose an income tax on this money, he protested:

"Tips are not income in that sense. They are merely gifts. After all, my passengers don't have to tip me if they don't want to. It is purely voluntary."

But a court held that the tips, even though voluntary, were indeed taxable income. The court pointed out that the tips were paid not as a matter of charity or personal

affection but as an extra reward for work done.

How does the government decide whether money that you receive is a gift, hence non-taxable, or income, hence taxable? The main test is the intent with which it is given. It will not qualify as a gift if it is really a form of compensation for value received or expected.

Thus, a company's "wedding gift" to an employee was held to be taxable income. Reason: the surrounding circumstances showed that the money was actually a bonus for his long and loyal service to the firm.

This rule applies not only to money but also to merchandise. An executive had to pay income tax on an automobile given to him by a business friend for whom he had done valuable favors—and might again.

On the other hand, even though money is paid by a company to its own employee, it may still qualify as a gift, not income, if that is the company's true intent. For example:

A company gave checks to a number of its employees who had suffered personal losses in a tornado. Because these payments were geared to individual needs rather than to services rendered, they were held to be "gratuitous and spontaneous"—thus, true gifts.

In another case, after a pastor had retired because of ill health, his former congregation found out he was having financial difficulties. So they voted to send an annual contribution to help him out.

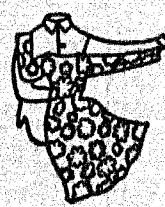

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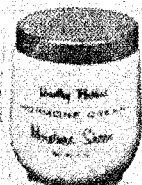

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STATE Capital NEWS

By VERN SANFORD

Austin, Texas—It's election week once more all over Texas.

Voters in 254 counties will decide Saturday (Nov. 11) whether they want six more amendments to the State's Constitution. According to Secretary of State John Hill, voters in five areas of Texas will choose legislators to fill vacancies created by death or resignation. There are six vacant seats in the House of Representatives and one in the Senate.

A light-to-moderate vote is predicted. November 11 is opening day of the deer and turkey hunting season in most counties. This means a lot of hunters will be in the field instead of the voting booth.

However, election day also is Veterans Day, and backers of the proposed amendments to revive the veterans land program are staging an active get out the vote campaign. So are supporters of two other amendments . . . the one authorizing the state to issue bonds to finance expansion of the Texas parks system and that permitting state officials and employees to hold more than one office.

Seventy candidates, including 14 Republicans, are running for legislative places. Republicans hope to improve their position. Presently they have only three representatives in the 159-member House and one senator in the 31-member Senate.

There are two representative races in Harris County, another in Cameron County, one in Matagorda and Wharton Counties; one in Travis County; and another in Bailey, Cochran, Hackley, Terry and Yoakum Counties. A total of twenty Dallas candidates are running for the Senate seat of the late Sen. George Parkhouse.

Six constitutional amendments are on the ballot in the following order:

1. To authorize counties to place all their tax revenues in a single general fund rather than separate, special purpose funds.

2. To let local political subdivisions which have hospital districts spend tax money for mental health and mental retardation services.

3. To revive the veterans land program through an additional \$200,000,000 bond issue, permitting war veterans, including those of the Vietnam conflict, to purchase land on low-interest, 40-year-payback loans.

4. To permit counties to pay medical benefits for their law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.

5. To authorize a \$75,000,000 state bond issue (supported by an admission fee at selected parks) for park

land buying and development.

6. To permit non-elective state officials and employees to serve on state and federal boards and commissions if there is no conflict of duties.

This is the first general election in Texas since the "scratch out" method of voting was eliminated. Now an "X" indicates your choice.

TAX PICTURE

Brightening?
Top legislative budget planners took a new, slightly brighter reading on the tax outlook last week. But taxpayers still won't be exactly overjoyed.

Legislative Budget Board staff members trimmed their unofficial estimate of revenue needs in 1968 from \$192,000,000 to \$149,000,000. However, the latter calls for rigid budget economies which lawmakers will find hard to effect in the face of rising costs, growing population and increasing demands for better services.

LBB staffers estimated the 1969 general fund spending at \$455,800,000. This is just \$3,000,000 above the 1968 level. Figure does not include \$258,500,000 in automatic foundation school fund transfers and \$1,500,000 in water development fund allocations.

The governor's budget office, pointing to an error in general revenue income estimates by the comptroller's office, said it appears that the 1968 tax bill, which legislators must pass in their special session, probably will be in the \$130,000,000 to \$150,000,000 range. Executive office earlier insisted that \$100,000,000 to \$130,000,000 would be adequate.

COURTS SPEAK

The Third Court of Civil Appeals held as "arbitrary and capricious" the state agency's denial of an application to open a Fort Worth branch office of Oak Cliff Savings and Loan Association.

Former State Savings and Loan Commissioner J. O. Gerst denied the application in January of 1966.

The same court upheld a \$75,000 condemnation award for the purchase of downtown San Marcos land by the city's U. R. A. The agency appealed the jury award of the Hays County court for

8,445-square-feet of property as excessive.

UNEMPLOYMENT TAX CUT

Forty per cent of Texas employers will pay lower unemployment compensation payroll taxes next year . . . and save about \$15,000,000.

Reduction was made possible because the program trust fund exceeded \$300,000,000 on October 1. Under the law, tax is cut one-tenth of one per cent for each \$5,000,000 or portion thereof by which the fund passes \$300,000,000. Balance now is \$319,000,000. Cut is four per cent for employers affected.

Fifty-four per cent of the employers already have earned a minimum statutory rate of 1 per cent. Another six per cent are "excess cost employers" with earned experience rates of 3.1 per cent or more. Neither of these groups will be affected by reduction.

PARKS WORK IS SPEEDED

Sixty-one existing state parks will reach the ultimate in usage and development by 1971, according to Deputy Director Robert G. Mauermann of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Twenty large-scale construction projects now underway and four others contemplated are expected to be completed by then. Plans call for spending of \$3,400,000 on repairs and improvements in 17 other parks.

Major construction projects slated for this biennium include Bentsen-Rio Grande, Lake Brownwood, Caddo Lake, Palmetto, Goliad, Cleburne and Goose Island. Developed from scratch, during the past five years, were the following: Falcon, Whitney and Martin Dies Jr., Bastrop, Davis Mountains, Old Fort Parker and Kerrville parks received major improvements.

Mauermann estimated \$12,000,000 will be spent in improving state parks in three years. He said construction already have been completed, and \$2,200,000 worth are in progress.

HAULERS HEARING

Nine truck lines, which already carry motion picture film and several other specific commodities, seek authority from the Texas Railroad Commission to include any shipments up to 100 pounds.

Applications were opposed by bus lines and other trucking companies which felt the additional service was not necessary.

Hearing required 17 weeks for 600 witnesses.

The Commission is studying a 250-page summary of testimonials.

POLLUTION RULES HIT

Texas Air Control Board heard complaints from industry representatives concerning its proposed regulations for controlling pollution due to smoke and flying particles, outdoor burning, sulphur compounds and motor vehicle exhausts.

The Board announced its plans following an extended hearing to adopt a version of the new rules within six weeks. The objections were centered on a proposal that the burning of waste must be outside a defined standard metropolitan statistical area.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Governor John Connally named former State Rep. Raleigh Brown of Abilene as the 42nd District Judge (Taylor and Callahan Counties). He succeeds Judge J. R. Black who resigned.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith appointed three Senators to serve on the Interim Committee on Uninsured Motorists Coverage. Named were Sens. Chet Brooks of Pasadena, Jim Wade of Dallas and Murray Watson of Waco.

House Speaker Ben Barnes named a Water Study Committee composed of Reps. Bill Clayton of Springlake, chairman; Menton Murray of Harlingen; Neal Solomon of Mount Vernon; Bill Finck of San Antonio; and Bill Swanson of Houston.

Republican State Chairman Peter O'Donnell, Jr., appointed Dudley Starp of

Houston and Walter Brauer of Ingleside as vice-chairmen of GOP policy-making task forces on job opportunities and economic growth and modernization of state and local government.

SHORT SNORTS

Three minor political parties have notified Secretary of State John Hill that next year they intend to nominate candidates in convention. They are Conservative, Socialist Workers and American parties—the latter organized to get former Alabama Gov. George Wallace on the presidential ballot.

Securities sales totalled \$462,200,000 last year, a new all-time high.

Nearly 150 Texas cities with 6,000,000 population will vote on a local sales tax before the end of the year, according to Texas Municipal League forecasts.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announces acquisition of two leased helicopters to be used for statewide law enforcement and rescue work.

Agriculture Commissioner John White designated November as "Texas Agricultural Products Month."

The taxpayers evidently listened, because only 1700 Northern Texans had trouble with the computer over their social security number. This is only 1-10 of the number of errors that taxpayers made on this item throughout the country.

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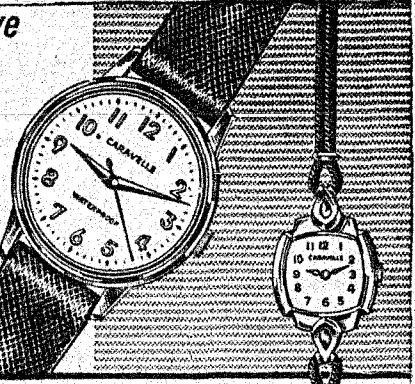

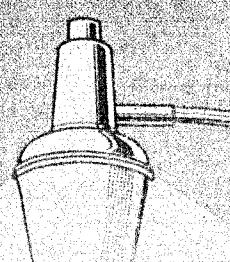
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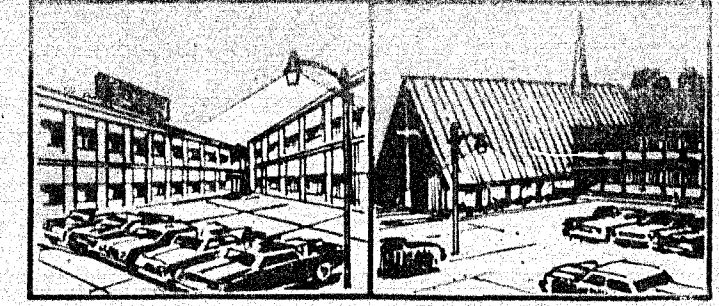
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Dodson - Alley Wedding Vows Said In Home Rites

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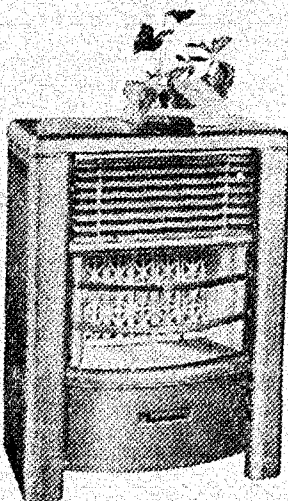
