Election Year Is Here, Six Co. Terms Expire

Election year is here and interest in local politics is beginning to come alive. In this weeks issue the Santa Anna News will start the political announcements column which will appear on the Classified page. As the candidates announce the Santa Anna News will carry them in this column.

There are six County offices that are expiring this term. These offices include three county commissioner precincts. Terms expire for Precinct One Commissioner Kay Anderson, Precinct Two Commissioner Jake McCreary and for Precinct Three Commissioner W. W. (Pete) Skelton.

Usually terms of only two county commissioners expire every two years; however, McCreary was appointed to his position and the appoint-

ment was effective until the next general election. Also, the Precinct Two election will be for a Two Year term, in order to hold with the staggered term requirement.

Other county officials with terms expiring include that of Sheriff W. J. Smith, Tax Assessor-Collector John Skelton and County Attorney Wallace Dingus.

Officials with unexpired terms include Judge Frank Lewis, County Clerk Lee F. Craig, District Clerk Todd Hensley, County Treasurer Monte Gideon, County Supt. D. H. Williams, Precinct Four Commissioner Ralph Brown, Precinct One Peace Justice Walter C. Holt and Precinct Seven Peace Justice Mrs. Mary L. Irick.

In the 35th Judicial District, Judge Joe B. Dibrell has already announced he

will seek re-election. The term of District Attorney Gordon Griffin Jr. also expires.

In the 119th Judicial District, terms of Judge Glenn R. Lewis and District Attorney Royal Hart expire.

Drop Letters To Be Eliminated Sunday, Jan. 7th

"Many changes will be made in postage rates beginning Sunday, January 7," Acting Postmaster John C. Gregg, said today. "In a study of the new rates, the ones that will affect the largest number of mailers will be the elimination of the drop letter—the ones that have been mailed for 4 cents—the increase to 6c on all first class letter mail including unsealed greeting cards, the increase to 10c on air mail, the increase to 5c for postal cards and the increase on third class mail (small packages). Many other changes will also be made."

The postmaster said that to outline all the changes in a newspaper article would consume too much time and space, but that everyone would be affected by the new rates. He urged anyone who might be confused concerning the rates to come to the post office and discuss the rates with him or any of the other employees.

"We realize it is going to take some time before everyone becomes familiar with the new rates," Gregg said. "However, we are prepared to offer all the assistance possible to each person who does not understand the new rates."

"When you consider that 6 cents will carry a first class letter addressed to any one of 200 million persons in 50 states as well as letters addressed to any of 63 million persons in Mexico and Canada," he continued, "it still remains one of the biggest bargains on earth."

The 29 per cent rate in first class letter rates, effective Sunday, January 7, is a smaller percentage raise than that imposed on other types of mail. The postmaster pointed out that there has been a 24 per cent raise in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 per cent hike in the charges for advertising circulars and other bulk third class mail.

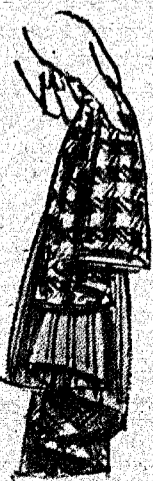

Austin, Texas—Any way you look at it, 1968 shapes up as the most action-packed political year for Texas in more than a decade.

It will start with a wide-open governor's race in the Democratic primary perhaps the roughest since 1956. Also, there may be some other close races for less exciting offices. And of course, the presidential battle will hold the November general election spotlight. If Texas Republicans make good their threat to field a strong candidate for governor, and it seems they will, there will be plenty of action on that front almost the year around.

There is no sure way of predicting at this point as to whether U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Secretary of State John Hill, former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Dallas radio man Gordon McLendon, Attorney Don Yarborough or an unheralded dark horse will emerge as the Democratic nominee for governor. Neither is it clear who the Republicans will put up to oppose him. Congressmen George Bush of Houston? Senator John Tower? An unknown?

While Texas national Democratic Convention delegates obviously will be pledged to support President John-

son, state Republican leaders have not tipped their hands as to their favorite candidate for nomination.

Although the winners cannot be picked in advance, red letter dates can be marked on the 1968 political calendar. Here are the main ones:

• February 5—Last day for filing as candidate in primaries.

• May 4—First primary election and party precinct conventions.

• May 11—County party conventions.

• June 1—Second primary election.

• June 8—State conventions to pick national convention delegates.

• September 17—State conventions to pick Texas party leadership (executive committees) and write the state party platforms.

• November 5—General election.

Remember that, to participate in any of the action, you must register (it's free) with the county tax assessor-collector or authorized deputy by January 31. Registration is simple and can be accomplished through the mail on forms provided by most of the newspapers.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

The State Welfare Department can pay medical aid directly to recipients of services or to physicians, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

• An amorphous ammonia pipeline is subject to jurisdiction of the Railroad Commission.

• A qualified agricultural engineering major can be licensed as a professional engineer.

• Cochran County Medical Hospital District can pay expenses of sending needy persons to outside hospital facilities where it cannot discharge its full responsibility to provide adequate medical care.

• The requirement of newspaper advertisement to take competitive bids does not apply to county expenditures for purchase of equipment for general use by the county payable out of the current funds. Where the county wants to make a contract under competitive bidding requirements, bids must be stated in terms of gross price without "trade-in". However, county commissioners may ask for trade-in data and consider it in awarding the contract.

COURTS SPEAK

A Negro mathematician at the spacecraft center in Houston who had a plate yanked out of his hand by a private club manager is entitled to \$900 in damages for "battery," the State Supreme Court agreed. Decision reversed lower courts.

The Fourth Court of Civil Appeals, in a Webb County case, agreed the state has the right to regulate picketing in labor-management disputes. Labor group unsuccessfully attacked a ban against more than two pickets at a time within 50 feet of the struck establishment or other pickets.

APPOINTMENT ANNOUNCED

Gov. John Connally announced the appointment of Lawrence Miller, Jr. of Dallas and George R. Bolin of Houston to Texas Real Estate Commission. He also appointed McLennan Co. Court at Law Judge Derwood Johnson of Waco as Judge of the 74th Judicial District Court.

COOPER DAM ROW RESOLVED

The controversy with federal authorities over Cooper Dam and Reservoir has been resolved to the state's interest.

New contract omitted the controversial water quality requirements, according to Joe G. Moore, Jr., executive director of Texas Water Development Board.

The long range issue of federal requirements concerning release of "flushing" water to control downstream water pollution statewide still is very much alive.

POLICY CANCELLATION GUIDELINES SET

The State Board of Insurance announced these general guidelines for cancellation of certain insurance policies or company refusal to renew coverage:

• Family auto policies and auto coverage should be cancelled only for premium non-payment or for license suspension or revocation.

• Companies should not balk at renewing family auto policies strictly on account of ages of insured.

• Thirty days' notice of non-renewal should be given before declining to renew family auto policies and auto coverage, homeowners policies and standard fire policies on one-family dwellings.

• Cancellation cannot be ordered on home owner and standard fire policies for one-family dwellings solely because the company changes underwriting requirements during the policy term.

FOURTEEN CITIES START SALES TAX

January 1 marked the start of actual collections of the new one per cent city sales tax in 14 of more than 150 cities which have approved the tax since September. These 150 cities represent 65 per cent of Texas' urban population.

Collections of one per cent levy (added to the two per cent state tax) will begin on April 1 in at least 140 other municipalities. Only about 20 city sales tax elections have failed.

State comptroller has a full quarter of a year to set up the collection machinery after a city reports approval of the tax.

NEW BOOK ON CAPITOL

Whiston Churchill said, "We shape our buildings and they shape us." His quote is used in the handsome new book, "The Texas Capitol,

Symbol of Accomplishment."

This 168-page volume is illustrated with color photographs and reproductions of historic documents. It was written and produced by the Texas Legislative Council in cooperation with the State Highway Department, at the direction of the 1965 Legislature.

It's so "hot off the presses" that it records some significant events of the 1967 session of the Legislature.

"The Texas Capitol" reaches back graphically to those 18 days at Washington on the Brazos in 1836 when Texas' independence was declared. That story is followed by a brief history of the Republic and the joining of the Union in 1845.

From that point on, the reader will find himself engaged in the story of the state's growth through the development of its government and the men who have guided it the past 122 years. Pictures and stories acquaint the reader with the present day Capitol complex and its surroundings.

This book should be read by every Texan who has seen, plans to see or wishes he could see the State Capitol. It is available from the Travel and Information Division of the Texas State Highway Department in Austin. The price is \$2.00.

MH - MR REORGANIZATION

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation will undergo a "broad reorganization" during the next six months, says MH-MR Commissioner John Kinross Wright.

As plans now stand, the Deputy Commissioner for Mental Health and the Deputy for Mental Retardation each will be made responsible for activities in his respective work will all governmental, community and volunteer agency programs, and further liaison will be maintained with local boards of trustees for MH-MR programs.

John C. White has announced for a 10th term as Texas Commissioner of Agriculture.

State Securities Board reports handling a record volume of \$650,400,000 in permits to sell securities during the year, an increase of \$100,000,000 over 1966.

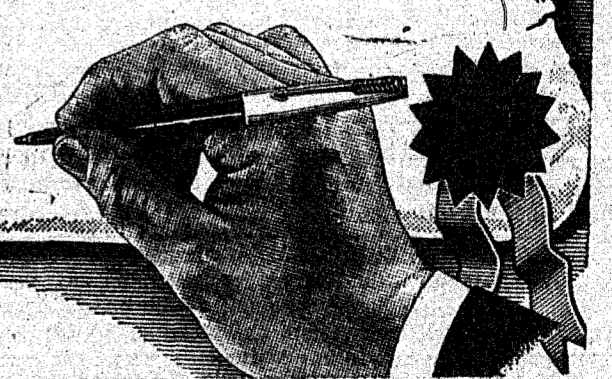

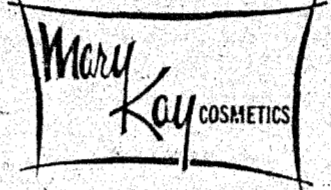

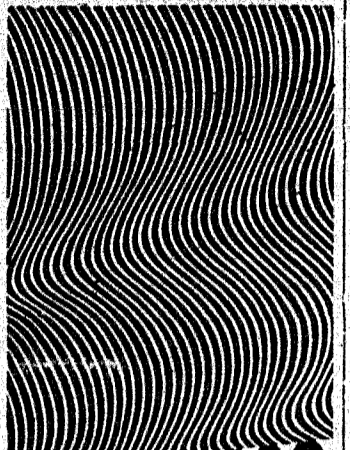

Hospital Costs Increase 14.3%

For the first seven months of 1967, hospital costs over the nation have increased by 14.3 per cent over the same period of 1966.

What are the hospitals going to do about it, the public wants to know. What are the reasons, and how and when will it level off?

Merl Roller, administrator of Santa Anna Hospital, explains that hospitals do not apologize for rapidly increasing costs. "Many factors pushing costs up the scale are external ones — something hospitals have no control over." He cited wage increases, expensive equipment, and special care areas, such as intensive care units and coronary care units, as costly factors.

"Hospitals cannot control the cost of a piece of equipment, but they can refuse to make the many costly items available. That one costly machine, however—a respirator, for instance, which takes over breathing functions for an infant fighting to expand his lungs—may save his life.

"Could you, if you were us say no?"

Today the nation's hospitals are caught up in an explosion of technical knowledge. Medical science has already increased the average life span 20 years. Ten years ago an x-ray department in a hospital could be fully equipped at a cost of \$10,000. Today the cost is from \$50,000 to \$500,000.

"Equipment in a hospital never wears out; it only becomes obsolete," said Mr. Roller.

Physicians and hospital officials have discovered patients benefit greatly when all critically ill patients can be confined in one area, designated as an intensive care unit, rather than distributed throughout the hospital in private rooms, often far from the central nursing station. Another new concept in care for heart patients is a coronary care unit. Studies show a 30 per cent lower fatality rate is the result of treatment in such a unit.

Equipment and special care units are expensive items, "but your health is the most precious asset you have," emphasizes the administrator. "Would you trade it for a dollar, or even many dollars?"

Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The Border Patrol is the armed, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Applications are now being accepted for the civil service examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector which will be held on January 27, 1968. An additional examination is scheduled for April, 1968. However, those wishing to be tested in Jan. must submit their applications before December 8, 1967. Airman McQueen is an air passenger specialist assigned to the 603rd Military Airlift Support Squadron at Kadena AB, Okinawa. The 602nd is supporting the airlift of units of the 101st—the famed Screaming Eagles—from Ft. Campbell, Ky., to Viet Nam.

The deployment—dubbed Operation Eagle Thrust—began Nov. 17. Military Airlift Command C-141 Starlifters and C-133 Cargomasters will carry more than 10,000 troops and some 5,000 tons of equipment during the giant airlift.

The long-range C-141 fan-jet, which cruises at 500 miles an hour, is carrying a normal troop load of 94 or a combination of troops and cargo. The paratroopers wear com-

bat clothing and carry their weapons aboard the aircraft.

Other MAC airlift of cargo, troops and passengers to global destinations, including Southeast Asia, has continued without interruption during the Operation Eagle Thrust.

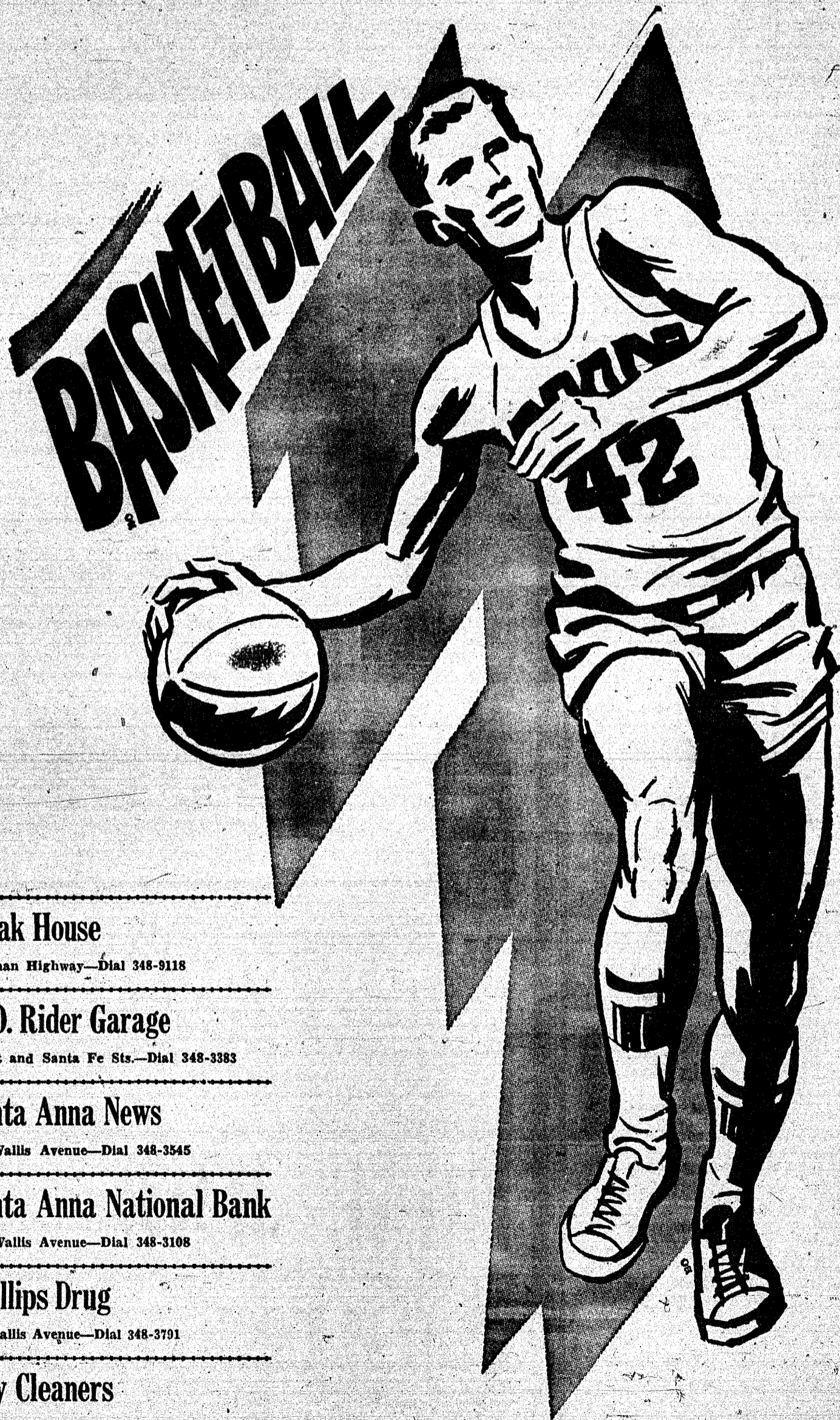
