
Consider this case:

A motorist was involved in an accident shortly after taking out a binder for "10-10" liability coverage. In a court test, this was held to mean that the man had coverage and \$10,000 for each injury -because that is how such a phrase would ordinarily be understood in the insurance business.

On the other hand, your binder probably will not stand up in court if it leaves some essential fact in real doubt. Omitting the amount of coverage, or the type, or the term, could mean that work to figure out what the parties had in mind. Then the binder would lack that "meeting of the minds" necessary to constitute a legal con-

Furthermore, a binder, just ike a formal insurance policy,
