



The reason for writing separate checks for your 1967 tax balance and your 1968 estimated tax payment is that separate processing operations are involved for the tax payments, the entire amount may be credited to just one tax. 

CORN LEAF APHIDS

This insect, normally no problem in corn and grain sorghum, is causiing extensive damage to emerging plants from Central Texas east and south. Weather conditions favorable for population explosions and unfavorable for predator insect increases are largely to blame for the situation, said John Thomas extension entomolo ist. Fields already suffering damage should be treated at once and local county agents should be contacted for coninformation. The infestations are expected to 3 spread north and west as planted corn and grain sorghum plants emerge.
