## Holland Cheaney Dies Monday, April 22nd

Holland A. (Tubb) Cheaney, 51, died Monday, April 22, at 11:30 p. m., of an apparent heart attack.

Services were held at Pharr at 4:30 Wednesday with interment in the Pharr cemetery.

Mr. Cheaney was born in Santa Anna, October 14, 1916. A graduate of Santa Anna High School and World War II veteran. Attended College in San Marcos and has been teaching in the Pharr public school system 20 years.

## School District Approved For Head Start

The Santa Anna Independent School District has been approved for a summer Head Start Program for the summer of 1968. The Santa Anna Board of Trustees must consider applicants for positions as Head Start teachers, aides and a part-time supervisor. The local school was approved by the Office of Economic Opportunity for only one teacher, one aide, and a part-time supervisor. The approval also states and requires that either the teacher or the aide must be bilingual. Another approval has been granted under Title I, ESEA allowing the employment of an additional teacher and a teacher aide if the need is evidenced by enrollment. Persons interested should have contacted the school business office before May 7. First consideration will probably be given to present school employees for the professional positions.

## Savings Time Will Be Adopted By Schools

Daylight saving time which begins on Sunday, April 28, will be adopted by the school district and patrons are informed that bells and buses will operate by the clock at the same time but one hour earlier with reference to sun time.

The school term will end with the last day of classes on May 17. Junior High Graduation exercises are set for Monday, May 20, and Senior High Graduation is scheduled for May 21. Baccalaureate service is set for Sunday, May 19 in the high school auditorium.

Driver training classes will begin on or about June 1 this summer. Registrations for that course will be taken during May. Changes in the law require that students be at least 15 years of age before any phase of the course is studied. Locally it will be required that a student be 16 years old before July 1, in order to be eligible for driver practice.

(By Gov. John Connally)

**GREETINGS:**  
The State of Texas recognizes both a debt of gratitude to and an obligation for its senior citizens. Older Texans in great numbers continue to spend active and useful lives in activities that through their youth, middle age to now have made their citizenship an asset to the commonwealth. Others in their older years face physical and financial difficulties that limit activity.

Texas of today exists on the foundations laid by these surviving Texans of yesterday. Their work, their efforts, their very lives stand as an enduring challenge to the future. If we are to enjoy the full productive capacities of our resources, we must continue to utilize the skills and knowledge of our older citizens in all civic and community endeavors. Their inspiration and counsel form a continuing asset in the growth and development of Texas.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the month of May, 1968, as SENIOR CITIZEN MONTH in Texas, and urge all Texans to join in honoring their fellow citizens who have reached a status of seniority and respect, and further urge that all Texans include senior citizens into the normal sphere of life.

# STATE Capital NEWS

Austin—Sen. Ralph Yarborough has taken himself out of contention with Gov. John Connally for Texas Democratic favorite son designation. But he has drawn battle lines for party conventions.

Liberals, if they follow Yarborough's lead, will oppose the favorite son device, demand selection of an unconstructed state delegation to the Democratic national convention and oppose the traditional "unit rule."

Conservative - moderate forces, rallying behind the governor, will offer resolutions backing Connally for favorite son and head of the 104-vote Texas national convention. In all probability,

they, too, would require all of the state's 104 votes to be cast as a package, without consideration to preferences of a minority viewpoint among the delegates.

That, in a nutshell, is the main issue to be decided in some 5,260 Democratic voting precincts May 4. In selected precincts, supporters of Sens. Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene McCarthy are expected to push resolutions seeking to commit delegates to their presidential candidacies. Neither of the senators at this point appears to have any substantial support over the state.

Some of the nation's Democratic governor's at a St. Louis, Mo., conference last week gave Connally a boost by urging him to become a serious contender—a sort of favorite son among the governors—for vice - president. Connally said he has no aspirations for the job, and he does not expect it to be offered. Nevertheless, he is expected to play a major role in charting the course of the 24 Democratic state chief executives at the nominating convention.

Meanwhile, although they are traveling widely and speaking frequently, the 11 candidates for governor of Texas continued to find themselves overshadowed by world, national and partisan events. And the election is only a little more than a week away!

#### RECORD NUMBER OF VOTERS

The total voter registration this year is a record 4,072,397—nearly a million more than the last presidential year of 1964, but still shy of predictions.

The figure compares with 3,014,597 in 1964 and 2,970,966 in 1966.

The five biggest counties of the state alone account for nearly 1,633,000 of the total eligible voters, and if all major metropolitan areas are counted, city voters overwhelm the rural area residents. That statistical fact figures strongly in campaign plans of gubernatorial candidates who are busily scouting the big cities during the windup weeks of their vote drives.

Last county to report to Secretary of State Roy R. Barrera on registration was Harris with 583,721 voters. Dallas county has 466,925, Bexar 237,359, Tarrant 242,693 and Travis 102,264.

#### OIL PRODUCTION CUT

The Railroad Commission ordered a second consecutive reduction in statewide oil production allowable, pegging it at 45.7 per cent of potential for May. This will allow maximum production of 3,476,972 barrels daily for the next month.

Major producers submitted nominations for 3,071,289 barrels of Texas crude oil a day for May, a decrease of 60,099 from April. The Bureau of Mines' forecast of demand remained unchanged at 3,040,000.

Production allowable a year ago was only 33.8 per cent, or 3,022,309 barrels a day.

#### DRAFT QUOTA DOWN

Texas draft quota for May is 2,131, compared with 2,378 for April, reports Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

However, local draft boards

actually will forward more men to the armed forces examining and entrance stations for pre-induction physical and mental exams. May call in this category is 9,000 compared with 8,506 for April and 7,200 in March.

Schwartz also announced that the state must provide 12 medical doctors and two doctors of osteopathy for the Army during July-September.

#### NEW WATER PLAN TOLD

A plan for tapping the great icecap water wealth of the northwest to satisfy the needs of Texas and 16 other southwestern and western states will be presented to the Texas Water Development board at a hearing here Friday, April 26.

Lewis G. Smith of Denver, a retired U. S. Bureau of Reclamation engineer, proposes to bring in water from Columbia, British Columbia and Yukon via the Rocky Mountain Trench to High Plains and Pecos River for diversion to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. The plan would divert water to the Rio Grande for South Texas and the Valley area.

Smith estimates the potential yield of icecap sources of British Columbia and the Yukon are roughly 650,000,000 acre-feet a year, and 38,000,000 acre-feet would meet import needs of 17 states until 2070. Smith projects reuse of water four times before it finds its way to the sea and general curtailment of per capita consumptive use from 2.16 acre feet to .5 foot after 2200.

Costs of the enormous project would be paid by cities using the water made available.

#### COURTS SPEAK

The State Supreme Court rejected a breach of contract damage suit against Houston Boxing Club and K. S. Adams brought by P. L. George, a Houston boxing matchmaker.

The high court ordered Amarillo district court to reconsider a law suit brought against truckdriver D. F. Thompson by Donnie Thoreson for damages to 90 acres of wheat burned after the truck drove over a field.

In a Victoria case, the Supreme Court upheld an injunction against Louis W. Chennault from going into competition with Otis Engineering Corporation within 100 miles of that city.

The Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the conviction for sale of heroin against a Tarrant County grade school teacher who was sentenced to 19 years imprisonment. Life sentence assessed against a Brownsville man for murder of his wife was also upheld.

#### APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Governor Connally named Louis R. Sarazan, Ft. Worth businessman, to the State Board of Public Welfare. Sarazan succeeds Carl Flaxman

of Dallas who resigned. Drs. H. A. Barnett of Houston, Robert L. Daily of Wichita Falls, P. C. Funk of Dallas and Merle Wade Delmer of San Antonio were appointed by Connally to State Board of Medical Examiners. Dr. Howard R. Coats of Tyler was reappointed.

#### VISITOR STATISTICS

The Texas Highway Department's new brochure on 15,100,000 out of state visitors who spent \$807,900,000 in Texas last year showed they stayed on an average of 5.9 days.

The average travel party had 2.9 members, spent \$3.89 each per day, drove 3,622 miles on complete trip. Half of them came on vacation, 28 per cent to visit family or friends and eight per cent on combination business-vacation trip. Bulk of visitors came from Louisiana, California and Oklahoma.

#### PLANNING GRANT AUTHORIZED

A state regional planning grant of \$7,834 has been freed for Houston - Galveston area council which previously received a \$21,000 grant.

Funds will support the Council's program for study and planning of unified regional development, including transportation and application to land-use planning in Brazoria, Chambers, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Montgomery and Waller Counties.

#### SHORT SNORTS

An extensive report on ground water supplies in Liberty County from the U. S. Geological Survey and the Texas Water Development Board shows good quality water could be pumped at four times the present rate of 50,000,000 gallons a day without causing excessive declines in water levels.

The State Building Commission has set May 7 for the second bid opening on the \$588,834 dormitory construction project at West Texas Children's Home at Pyote. The first one was called off because the specifications would have gone over the money.

A \$35,525 federal grant has been approved for development to Palmetto State Park, 15 miles northwest of Gonzales in South Central Texas to be matched by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The Parks and Wildlife Department reports selection of San Antonio Bay and Espiritu Santo Bay for oyster reseed efforts under a \$50,000 federal aid effort scheduled to start the first week in May.

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Omar Burleson, M. C. Washington, D.C. -Of whatever political persuasion be the candidate or whatever party he represents, a man offering himself president of these United States should start with some simple yet fundamental qualifications. People have the right to expect no less.

In these times of crisis, of violence, of hatred and of horror, one thing is at least clear amidst the vast and menacing uncertainties of our day. This is that the political future belongs to the man who truly embodies a sense of dignity, of judgment, of restraint, of action, of strength, of compassion, of calm resolve to restore to this nation the old and traditional values which seem largely to have been lost.

For some years now, it seems that most everything fashionable has been sick—sick comedians, sick students, sick politicians, sick demonstrators and counter-demonstrators, sick books, periodicals and sick movies.

Old fashion qualities have not seemed fashionable at all in many quarters—patriotism, loyalty, love of family, responsibility in private and public conduct, consideration toward other men and other ideas—even in religion.

In this latter, it seems the "in" pulpits have been ringing out, not so much with man's obligations to God as with the shrill, socio-political dogmas of the political preachings. Many men in the "square" pulpits have called attention to the use of sanctuaries of noble cathedrals being used for bitter pseudo-

dramas, for wild psychedelic so-called music and the gyrations of youthies, rather than for the somber measure and timeless liturgies of our ancient faiths.

Seemingly lost also is that sense of manners standing for mankind's true values next to morals themselves. Neither public nor private morality can long endure with that lesser but indispensable companion which used to be called "good taste."

"Student activists" defy military draft, coaxed by professors publicly advising them on schemes to evade a common obligation of their generation while less privileged boys carry the guns and do the dying. While these intellectuals proclaim freedom for everything, they close their minds and ears to every opinion except their own. Many have encouraged university students to shout down and even physically menace men invited to their platforms for open discussions if views contrary to theirs are offered. Many such institutions owe their existence for another reason than for the free and decent exchange of ideas.

Some of us are old enough to remember the hoarse, terrifying, midless roars of Hitler's youth. It is an uncomfortable thing to say, but nevertheless it should be said—conditions existing on some of our campuses and elsewhere are not too dissimilar from Hitler's youth of that time.

**Quieting the Neighbor's Dog**  
One man's dog may be another man's nuisance. If you are disturbed by your neighbor's dog, and if complaints don't help, you might consider another possibility: a court order to abate the nuisance. What does the law say in such cases?

By and large, it is sympathetic to the person who is subjected to an excessive amount of canine clamor. "Dogs in a neighbor's yard may murder sleep," observed one judge, "and destroy the reasonable enjoyment of a home."

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Thus, a suburban family won an injunction against the owner of a German shepherd dog whose furious barking awakened them regularly at 4 o'clock in the morning. The court said the defendant would have to either reduce the noise or get rid of the dog.

Suppose you go to court only after having tolerated the noise for some time. Your neighbor might then argue that you have "accepted" the situation by your acquiescence. But chances are that the court would not penalize you for being patient. Your complaint wouldn't be turned down merely because you held back for a reasonable time, in the hope of finding some solution short of the court-house.

What if the neighbor was already living there—with his dog—before you moved in? That, too, is not enough grounds to bar your complaint. His being there first does not give him a permanent right-to-be-noisy, regardless of the feelings of new-comers to the street.

On the other hand, you will not get far in court with a complaint that reflects your own unusual sensitivity rather than the dog's unusual behavior. The law of nuisance is a law of moderation—tailored to people of average dispositions, not to those with jumpy nerves or trigger tempers.

In one case a disgruntled home owner, in court about a neighbor's dogs, was coun-

tered by several witnesses for the defense. Although these witnesses lived close to the dogs as he did, not one of them found the barking the least bit annoying. The court thereupon refused to mix in. The judge ruled that, whatever one particular individual might think, barking—in moderation—is a lawful ingredient of neighborhood life. 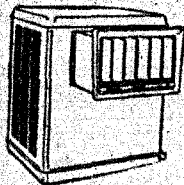

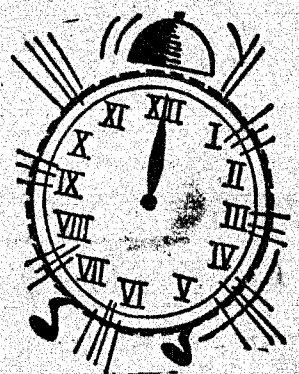

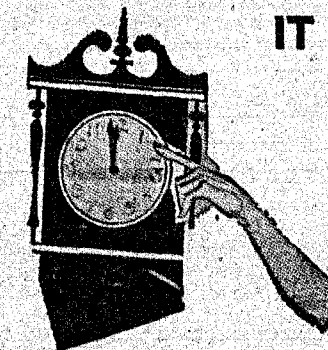

## Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q**—I've been unable to get a W-2 from my former employer. Should I file my return without it?

**A**—Yes, file your return even if you have not received all your W-2 forms. If a W-2 is missing, attach a note in explanation including your name and social security number, employer's name, wages and taxes withheld.

If wages and taxes are not known estimate them to the best of your knowledge.

**Q**—I just got my refund. Can I throw away last year's tax records?

**A**—No. Records should be

kept as long as they are material in administering Federal tax law. Generally, this is three years from the date the return was due.

Some records, like those on the purchase of a home or stock, may have to be kept indefinitely.

**Q**—Do weekends count in computing the waiting period for a sick pay exclusion?

**A**—Yes, count them unless the illness began on a weekend. In that case, the waiting period begins on the next work day.

**Q**—Where should I send my return?

**A**—On page 10 of the 1040 instructions and on the back cover of the 1040A instructions, you will find the mailing address to use. If you have a refund coming, use the envelope that came with your tax package.

**Q**—I read where missing schedules held up some refunds. Which ones were they talking about?

**A**—Listed below are the schedules taxpayers are most often required to complete and send with Form 1040.

**Schedule B**—Required when income is from pensions, annuities, rents, royalties, partnerships, estates and trusts. This schedule should be used to claim the retirement income credit.

**Schedule C**—Required to report profit or loss from a business or profession.

**Schedule D**—Required to report gains or losses from the sale or exchange of property.

Copies of these schedules and instructions for filling

them out are available at many banks and post offices as well as all offices of the IRS.

**Q**—I support my uncle who lives with us. Will his social security pension affect my dependency claim for him?

**A**—Social security benefits do not have to be included in determining whether your uncle met the \$600 gross income test, but they are counted in determining the support test. Check page 4 of the 1040 instructions for details on the dependency tests.

**Q**—I got a divorce in January 1968 and my ex-husband wants me to file a joint return with him for 1967. Can we do that?

**A**—Your marital status for 1967 is determined by whether you were married on the final day of the tax year, so you may file a joint return for 1967. Keep in mind, however, that if you file a joint return with your ex-husband, you will be as legally responsible as he is for payment of any tax due.

**Q**—When is the next social security payment due on my maid's wages?

**A**—Employers required to withhold social security taxes on household help should file Form 942 for the first quarter by April 30.

—How does the new rule on medical insurance deductions work? Can you only deduct \$150 for this expense now?

**A**—Taxpayers who itemize their deductions, may now deduct one-half of their medical insurance premiums up to \$150 without regard to the three per cent limit. The balance of the taxpayer's medical insurance premiums should be added to his other medical and dental expenses and may be deducted subject to the three per cent of income limitation.

**Q**—I paid some medical bills for my daughter last year. Can I deduct them even though I'm divorced and my wife has custody of the child?

**A**—If you are entitled to

claim your daughter as a dependent, then you may deduct the medical expenses you paid for her. If your former wife claims the child as a dependent, then you may not deduct these expenses.

**Q**—How much can you deduct for car expenses to obtain medical treatment—five or ten cents per mile?

**A**—The deduction is five cents a mile for travel costs to obtain medical care or treatment. However, when allowable travel expenses exceed this rate you may deduct your actual expenses.

The ten cents per mile figure is for business travel.

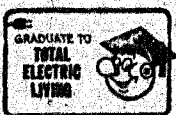

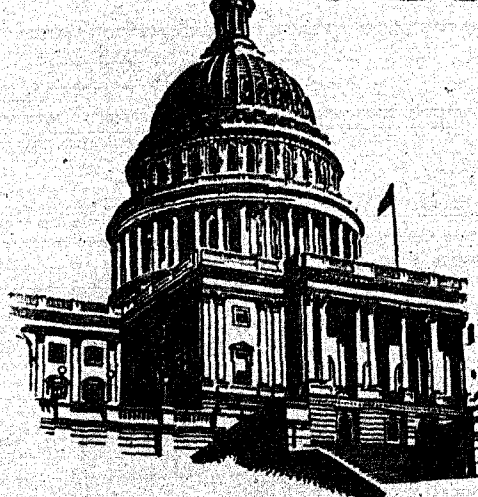

## SCREWWORM SITUATION

Screwworm cases in Texas continue to crop up in South Texas. If cases go undetected, they could mean trouble ahead for livestock producers further to the north and west. Officials of the eradication program urge livestock producers to continue sending in worm samples from all animal wounds. Once a case is located immediate treatment of the area with sterile flies can stop further spread of the pest. Be alert.

Effective cotton insect control results from many decision-making operations. Weldon Newton, extension entomologist, says methods and chemicals which formerly did an effective job on many cotton insects no longer are effective. Farmers must give consideration to many factors instead of just applying chemicals, continues Newton. He suggests a visit with the local county agent for detailed information on the factors and insects involved.

# Outdoors In Texas

What is the most popular cartridge in the world today? To make the question even simpler, what is the best-selling cartridge in Texas? If you answer the .30/06 you're wrong. The .30/30? Wrong again. Far and away the most popular is the .22 Long Rifle.

Just about anyone interested in guns has a .22 rimfire of one type or another. In fact, some people who are

not remotely interested in hunting have a .22 around the house. It's handy for plinking and unwanted pest or for protection.

Furthermore, every major firearms manufacturer sells .22 rifles and ammo. This tiny cartridge and rifles chambered for it are as American as baseball and football.

But don't let the small size of the cartridge fool you. There's a lot of power wrapped in that diminutive package. The Long Rifle pushes a 40-grain bullet from the muzzle at 1,335 feet per second, and out at 100 yards it still is zipping along at 1,045 feet per second. At the muzzle it develops 158 foot pounds of energy. At 100 yards it still has 97 fp of energy.

The Long Rifle (the Short was developed for plinking and is okay for squirrels and cottontail rabbits when in the

hands of a proficient marksman) is adequate for any small game up to and including the jackrabbit.

Deer have been killed with it, but the .22 rimfire is now outlawed as a deer weapon in Texas.

The Long, an in-between of the Short and Long Rifle, serves no useful purpose except to please a few customers who still demand it. The Long Rifle is a much better buy, it is more accurate and more efficient.

Much of the credit for the .22 rimfire as we know it today belongs to Joshua Stevens who, oddly, was a maker of firearms, not ammunition. Back in the late 1864, Stevens founded J. Stevens and Company and started making guns on his own. He had worked in several gun enterprises and figured he was ready to make his own mark in the world.

His first shop was part of a small grist mill on the north shore of the Chicopee River in Massachusetts. Here he began making a break-action, single shot pistol. Soon he branched out in rifles and shotguns.

He developed several pistols for the then popular .22 rimfire cartridge. But he was not satisfied with the low powered .22 Short, nor with the awkward combination for more power by using a longer case and keeping the same 29-grain bullet of the .22 Short.

Stevens enlisted the aid of

a famous ballistician, William M. Thomas, at the Union Metallic Cartridge Company to find a more accurate and powerful .22. Result was the .22 Long Rifle introduced in about 1889.

This shell uses the same case as the .22 Long, but employs the heavier 40-grain bullet. The Long has the same slug as the Short. Thus it is sort of a hybrid of the two, yet really doesn't do the job as well as either of the other two. The Short and Long Rifle both are much more accurate.

If you prefer plinking, use the Short; should you like hunting, employ the Long Rifle. The Long is absolutely unnecessary.

How well the cartridge was designed is reflected in the .22 Long Rifle of today, which has not changed much since 1889, except for the substitution of smokeless powder for black powder. Otherwise, it is the identical cartridge. It has stood the test of time. And for any cartridge, that is the ultimate test.

### FUNGUS COULD CAUSE THE TROUBLE

Brown patch, a fungus that attacks St. Augustine lawns during the spring and fall seasons, could be the troublemaker for homeowners experiencing grass troubles. Dr. C. W. Horne, extension plant pathologist, suggests an application of PCNB (Terraclor) as soon as the disease is identified. It is characterized by a circular pattern in the lawn. The fungus kills on the leaves and normally does not attack the stolons.

## Provocative Mail Can Be Stopped

Mail patrons offended by pandering ads can now take steps to curb such mail, Acting Postmaster John C. Gregg, said today, in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

If an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet — "How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements" — which is now available at the 14 post offices in Coleman County. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket size leaflet contains a form letter one can use

when sending his complaint to the post office.

The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement which is, in his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language, to his post office with the words, "Request for Prohibitory Order" on the face of the envelope.

Gregg said: "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to their children."

"Last year the post office department received some 140,000 complaints from those offended by pandering advertisements. While in most cases the ads were not legally obscene and were therefore mailable, they are often offensive and are usually not the type of material one would want his children to read," the postmaster said.

He added that "because the law gives a mail patron the sole right to decide what is offensive, and does not deny others the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt it does not violate Constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech."

While the patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, Postmaster Gregg believes that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because "the great bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 so-called 'smut dealers' who are frequently

swapping mailing lists."

If a mailer does not strike a complainant's name from this mailing list, and the patron receives a second mailing 30 days after the firm has received the prohibitory order, he may bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster, issuing the initial order by writing him and enclosing the second pandering ad with its envelope. If

the mailer still fails to respect the order, the Postmaster General may ask the Attorney General to apply for a Federal Court order directing compliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.
