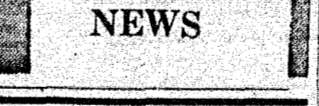

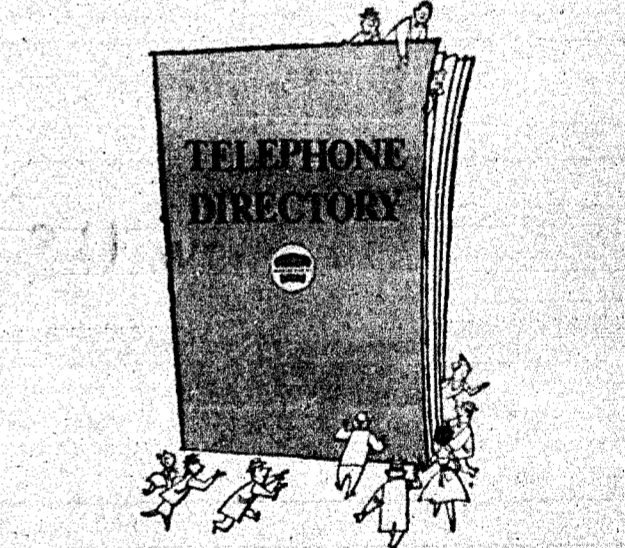

Not Just Chicken Feed - - - Poultry Industry Is Big

College Station, July 18.—Poultry is big business and is a story that needs to be told, Douglas Hamm of Clemson University said here on Tuesday during the 57th annual meeting of the Poultry Science Association at Texas A & M University. "The old cliché 'it's just chicken feed' is out of date. Chicken feeds is mighty big business," he said. Hamm's talk on "A Different Approach in Telling the Poultry Story" was one of 277 papers presented at the Conference July 8 - 12. He pointed out that there are many sides to the industry—"many which most of us may not see." The fact that it is big business is easy to show, Hamm added. In South Carolina alone last year, 24 per cent of all harvested crop land was devoted to producing poultry feeds. To put the eggs in pulp cartons and cardboard cases required the farm pulpwood harvest from 20 per cent of the state's counties. A big obstacle in telling the poultry story, he said, is deciding just what the industry is. There are the usual activities — hatcheries, pullet growing, egg laying complexes, egg packing operations, etc. "But if the egg packing operation is in a mayonnaise factory, do we consider the mayonnaise factory as part of the poultry industry?" Hamm asked. "And the same can be asked for the supermarket. Eggs pass through the supermarkets. "And how about a household refrigerator? The majority of the eggs consumed go through the refrigerator in somebody's home." Cardboard for posters at The News office.

Drowning Victims Now Number 309

Austin — Drownings in Texas now total 309 for this year, only eight less than the 317 recorded for all of 1967, according to Robert Mauermann, deputy director for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"The Fourth of July weekend's grim total of 24 was an ironic ending for National Safe Boating Week which ended July 6," he said.

Mauermann said that many of the recent accidents could have been prevented had a life preserver been worn. "In some cases," he said, "the victims had complied with the letter of the law by having one Coast Guard Approved Lifesaving device in the boat for each person and then drowned because it was not available when the emergency arose."

Other cases, equally as tragic, involved persons who, although they did not know how to swim, somehow found their way into deep water. "Our compilations of drowning information include the words 'wading and stepped into a deep hole' with awful regularity," Mauermann said. "Children, by nature, are careless, and it is sad when a child must pay with his or her life because of one of careless moment," he said. Too often the case histories show that parents left their small children unattended near dangerous bodies of water although the parents were aware that the children were unable to swim.

A five-year-old boy drowned when he fell from the bank into a bayou. His parents did not miss him until it was too late.

A 18-month-old boy drowned in a plastic swimming pool while his mother was in the house doing the cleaning.

A six-year-old girl waded into deep water and drowned as her mother watched.

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I notified the post office when I moved but my

refund still hasn't come. What should I do now?
A—Write the IRS service center where you filed your return giving your present and former address, Social Security Number, and date of filing.

Q—I need someone to represent me on my tax case. Where can I find someone?

A—Contact your local accounting, bar or tax practitioner association. They can give you names of persons qualified to represent you.

Q—Is the room and board you receive as a camp counselor considered taxable income?

A—No, it is not as long as the room and board are furnished on your employer's premises and for his convenience. Acceptance of the lodging must be a condition of your employment.

Q—I just opened a savings account for my daughter. Should I use my social security number to identify the account, or do I have to use her number?

A—Use her number.
Q—I just discovered I made a mistake in figuring my sick pay exclusion when I filed my 1967 return. Can I use the Form 1040-X to correct this?

A—Yes, you can. You should also complete and attach a copy of Form 2440, State to Support exclusion of Sick Pay, showing how you

compute your corrected sick pay exclusion.

Copies of these forms and necessary instructions for filling them out can be obtained at local IRS offices.

Q—I've heard that there's a tax advantage when you give share of stock instead of money to a college. Why is that?

A—There is a tax advantage when a donation is made of stock that has increased in value since it was purchased. A tax deduction may be taken for the full market value of the stock on the date the donation was made.

Donations of this sort enable the taxpayer to avoid paying tax on the increase in the value of the stock and get an income tax deduction for it.

Q—I run a dry cleaning store. How often do I have to deposit the taxes I withheld from my employees' wages?

A—Deposits of income tax withheld and employee and employer Social Security taxes must be made semi-monthly when they amount to \$2,500 or more for any month in the preceding calendar quarter. Employers with liabilities over \$100, but less than \$2,500 in a month are required to make monthly deposits.

Employers whose monthly total of these taxes is \$100 or less are not required to make monthly deposits.

However, if the total taxes for a quarter (reduced on any deposits) are more than \$100, the unpaid balance of these taxes must be deposited by the last day of the month following the close of the quarter.



"Don't Blame Me"

Startlingly simple was the defense offered by a young man accused of murdering his own father.

"I'm a rough character," he conceded in court, "but it is because my father brought me up that way. He taught me to drink whiskey, use a gun, and run around with a gang. So don't blame me for what I did. Blame my father."

No doubt the slain father bore a share of the fault. But the court held the son guilty anyhow, because he was old enough and rational enough to take responsibility for his own behavior.

To what degree should extenuating circumstances excuse what would otherwise be a crime? To what degree should a killer be allowed to blame his upbringing, a thief his poverty, a rapist his passion, a vandal his youthfulness?

In an earlier day, there was little of such talk in the courtroom. Wrong brought retribution almost as a matter of course. Scarcely a century ago, a murderer was put to death in an American prison even though was only 12 years old.

But with greater insight into human motivations has come greater understanding in fixing blame.

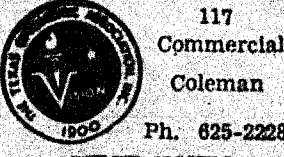
Thus, mental deficiencies are increasingly taken into account—not only in deciding on legal guilt but also in setting the punishment. And all states recognize a minimum age below which a person cannot be held to criminal liability.

Nevertheless, while today's law avoids total responsibility, it also avoids total irresponsibility. It holds that most people, in most situations, do indeed have freedom of choice between doing right and doing wrong.
