

Old Fort Parker Site Of Tragedy

Grosbeck - Old Fort Parker, six miles north of Grosbeck in Central Texas, has been raised again as a symbol of the courage of Texas frontiersmen, and a reminder of the tragedy which all hoped would never happen but did.

The restoration of the old fort was officially dedicated last week. The keynote address was given by Will Odom chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission who told some 125 persons in attendance that such pioneer spirit was what made Texas the state it is today

Elder John Parker came to the present fort site in 1834 to start a new life in the wilderness. With him were 31 other men, women and children, and together they built the stockade and cleared the land.

For about two years, they lived a relatively uneventful life, if the privations of frontier living can be called uneventful, and established their crops and a routine of liv-

At first the men cultivated the land during the day and returned at night to the fort for protection, but gradually abandoned these strict disciplines and safety precautions.

Some of the settlers even built cabins outside the walls in order to be conveniently close to the acres under cultivation. As a result, they were un-

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by tax-

Q-What's the purpose of the Form 1040X you introduc-

A-This new form was de signed to make it easier for tax payers to correct errors made on 1040 or 1040A returns. Instead of filling out V. W. Cope and Mr. and Mrs. an entire return to correct O. W. Carroll were visiting a mistake, taxpayers now just -Isubmit information on the item in error.

For example, a taxpayer who made a mistake in listing his 1967 medical deductions reports the correct medical information on Form 1040X. Then using key figures from the 1040 return he had filed, the new tax liability is calculated. Copies of urday, June 8, and Mrs. Mary the new 1040X are available Hollingsworth on Friday, at local IRS offices along with instructions for its use.

> Q-I got a letter from the regional service center asking me for information. Should I send it back to this center?

> A-Yes, unless the letter requesting the information indicates you should send it elsewhere. Usually a return envelope is enclosed for your convenience.

To assure prompt handling, put your social security number on your reply and also return the letter you received.

Q-Do you have to be a doc tor or a lawyer to set up your own retirement plan?

A-No, most persons in business for themselves can take advantage of the tax provisions allowing self-employed individuals to contribute to a personal retirement plan. This includes people who have their own business and also those who have income from part-time self employment which is in addition to their regular job. Details on these plans are

contained in IRS Document No. 5592, "Retirement Plan for Self-Eemployed Individuals." Send a post card to your IRS district office to obtain a free copy.





Mississippi Kites Arrive In

Abilene - Mississippi kites a bird often called a "gray hawk" although not related to the hawk family, are arriving in numbers in Abilene State Park for the nesting season, says Park Superintendent Harold Woods of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Woods says he has been noticing the migrants for several days and expects them to begin nesting as they do each year in approximately the same place.

The range of the birds extends from South Carolina and northern Florida to Texas and Oklahoma.

Kites nest each year in the Lower Plains and Panhandle, preferring dense oak or mesquite trees for their nest building.

Protected by law, the kite eats lizards, small snakes, frogs, beetle and grasshop-


