Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from Grade School 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50

Almost all percels that are charged up to \$1.10 under the present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post, Gregg pointed

There will be a 15 cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20 cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.
