In critical condition following the accident was Rudy Sanchez, 17, and in serious condition in the Coleman hospital are Joe Rosales, 16, and Robert Rosales, 23, of Abilene, who was driver of the car.

Funeral services for the three Rosales brothers were held Tuesday, and young Sanchez' services were held on Monday. Local survivors of the Rosales boys include an uncle, Pete Diaz of Santa Anna.

Letter To The Editor

Nha Trang, Viet Nam
October 29, 1968
Dear Friends:

Here is Viet Nam at night, during the monsoon season with a war going on. Although this air and seaport city half way up the coast of Viet Nam and facing out to the Yellow South China Sea is reputed to have good security, one is constantly aware that war, bloodshed, suffering and death can be but a moment away. This is one vast military base with components of American and allied forces, mainly air, but also Army, Navy, Marines, and Special Forces.

I share a four room house with three other individuals, and a tiny little Vietnamese widow of 21 or so, with a three year old daughter. All of us together pay her 4,000 piasters per month for which she does our laundry, keeps the place clean, and will do our cooking for us, if we should choose. It is much quicker, safer and easier for me to eat at one of the military installations near by than to have her bother going downtown, getting all the food, which may be contaminated with all sorts of worms, tropical diseases, including typhoid, etc. (120 piasters equals \$1.00 U. S.) In this compound is a relatively new four story building which houses a number of apartments, and the entire compound is surrounded by walls, sandbags and guards inside and outside the iron gate.

Out in the streets is the remains of Tet or the Viet Namese New Year. The central building of their city government are still in shambles, although most of them are still being used. According to the best local authority, the Viet Cong moved in, began tearing up the city by mortar fire, etc. As the record shows, this activity was returned with immediate violence and force by American and allied forces. The city was torn up in this escapade, but mop-up teams were coming through. A woman or two was up on the upper floors on a balcony. She fired a round or two at some of the scattered soldiers looking for Viet Cong. They immediately returned her fire and killed her, only the "her" was a Viet Cong dressed up like a woman.

My association with Americans and allies here in this key city and military base leaves me as impressed as I

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was in Saigon, that they know what they are doing and how to get the job done. Although Charlie, as the Viet Cong are called by the military men and people here, the tough little formidable enemy, there is no question in anybody's mind that if America decided to end the war in this area of the world, without thinking of the consequences as far as China and Russia is concerned, that it would be all over in 24 hours. Probably very few of us understand the national connotation of this conflict.

The Vietnamese do appreciate Americans, respect us, are willing to work with us, and have hopes of someday being a free country. There is no question in anyone's mind there would be neither freedom or autonomy in South Viet Nam if America was not here to guarantee these rights.

Those of you who have relatives, friends and acquaintances in these areas, be sure to keep mail, home newspapers, birthday or other occasion cards coming. Small gifts mean a lot to our fighting men and women located half way around the world.

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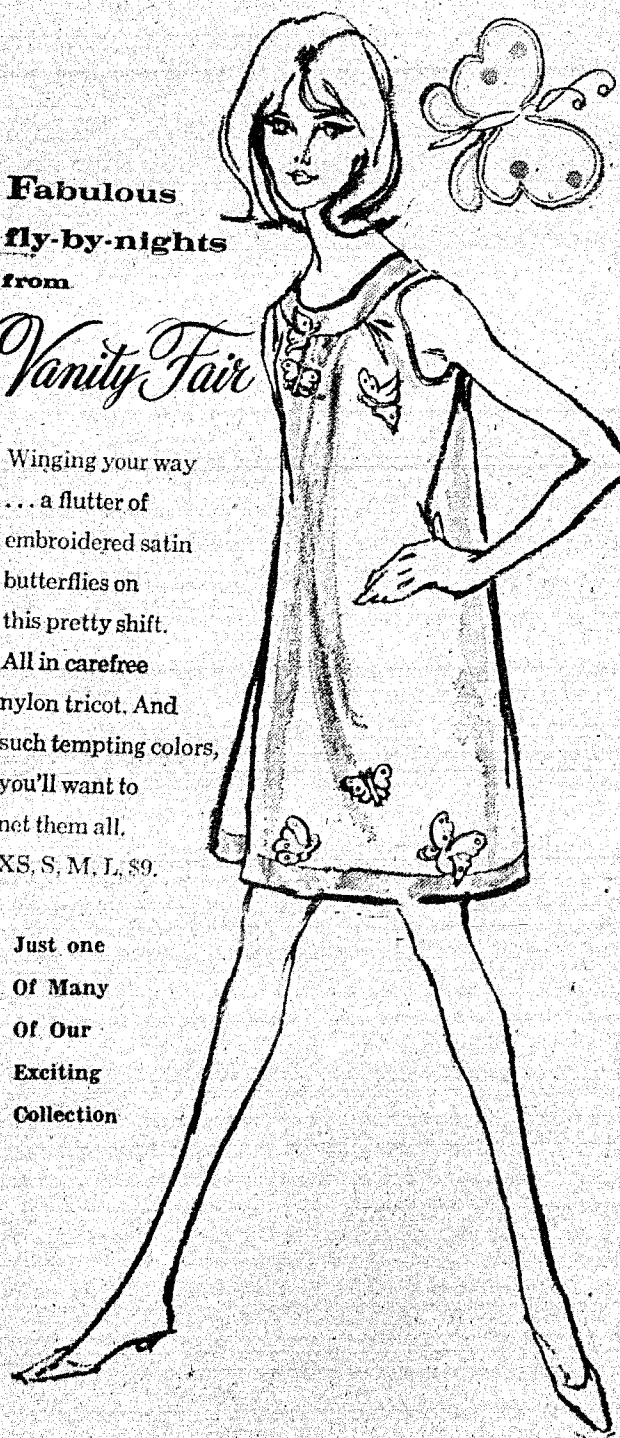

City Council Revises Decision On Fire Trucks

After consulting with the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department, City Council members revised their decision concerning the use of city fire trucks outside the city limits. It has been decided that the pumper truck will remain in town at all times and that the big tank truck and one other truck will be available for rural use as needed. Although rural use—particularly grass fires is hard on the trucks, the presence of a second truck is often needed. An example of this is the recent fire in Gouldbusk where the Methodist Church was destroyed following a grass fire. 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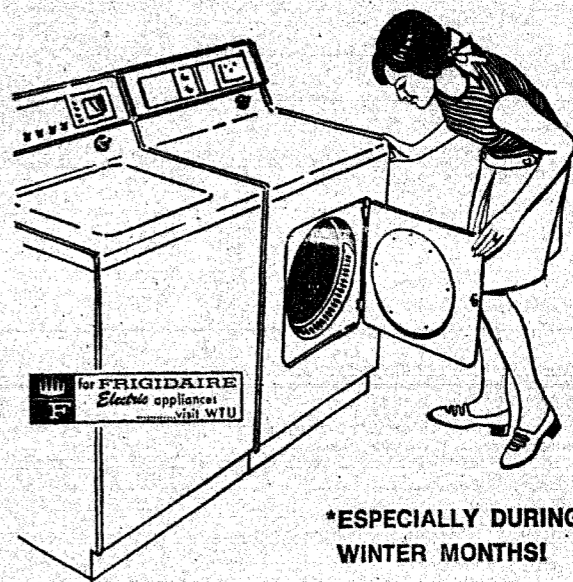

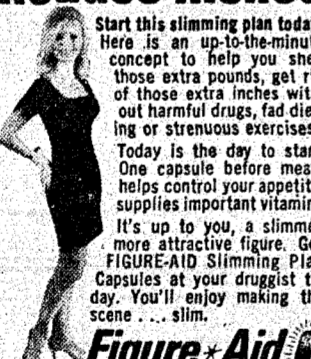

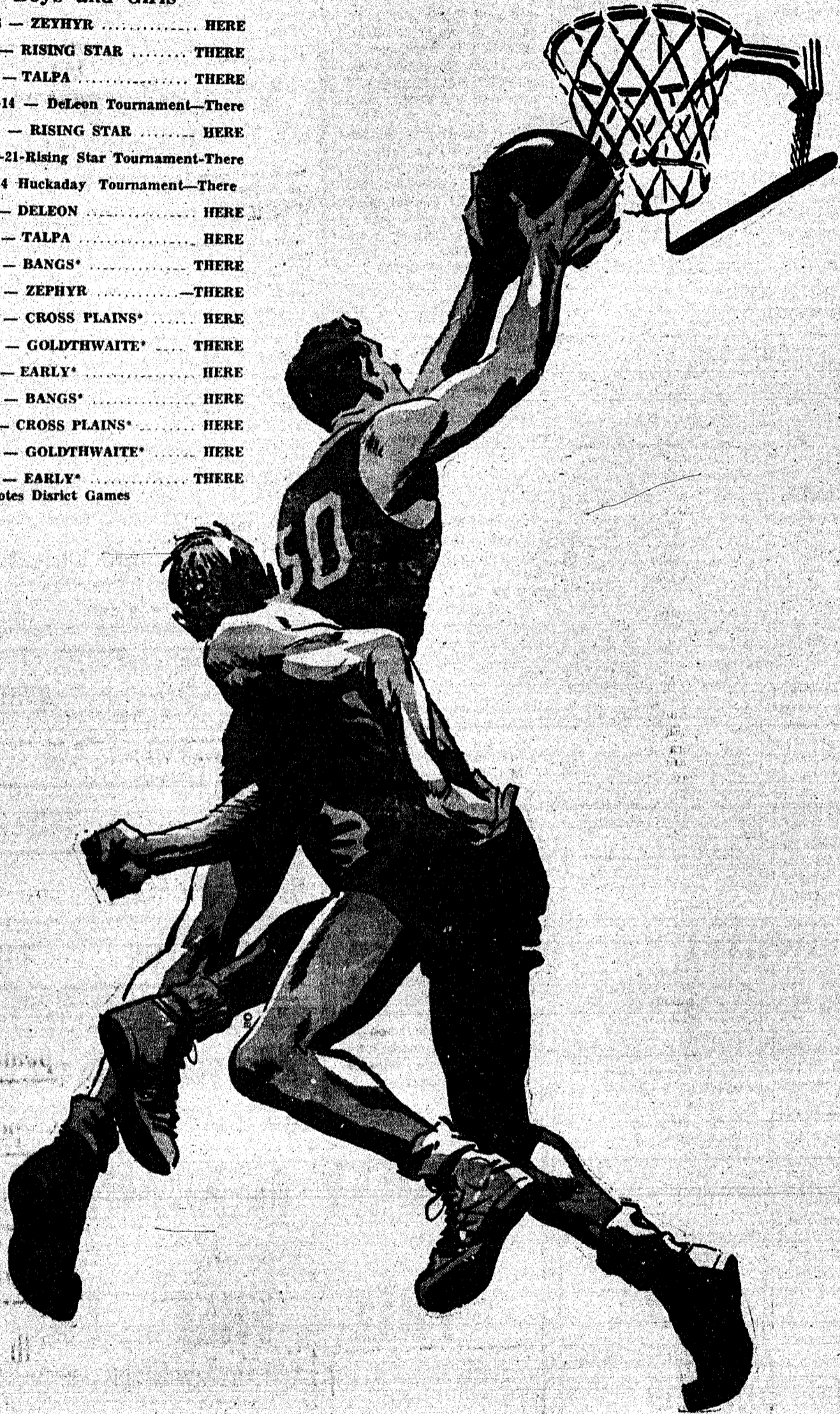

Austin, Texas — A dramatic 40 per cent increase in benefits to injured Texas workers is proposed in compromise legislation agreed to by labor, employers and trial lawyers.

AFL-CIO, Texas Manufacturers Association and Texas Trial Lawyers Association unveiled details of agreement on workmen's compensation administrative reform bill that will go to the Legislature in January.

The proposal would raise the maximum weekly benefits for on-the-job injuries from \$35 to \$49 during time lost from work. This will cost employers 18 per cent more in insurance rates—or about

Reversing the intermediate court, State Supreme Court held that an oil well servicing company could not be sued for damages in an illegal slant-well case even though it knew the well was out of line.

In a pair of cases, the high court overruled lower courts and upheld State Savings & Loan Commissioner James Gerst. The Commissioner had refused application of Mission Savings and Loan Association for a North East San Antonio site, granted Richardson S&LA application, and denied Guardian S - L A bid.

Some discount houses are starting to stay open both Saturdays and Sundays, in violation of blue laws which are being tested in appellate courts after a Midland district judge ruled them unconstitutional.

The Supreme Court refused to direct a Tarrant County judge to change his verdict that a Fort Worth man was insane before and after he was charged with rape of a young mother and drowning of her two children.

The Court of Criminal Appeals called for a new trial in a Harrison murder case because the state impeached its own witness.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

Deaf and blind students are exempt from all fees at state colleges except property security charges and deposits, lodging board or clothing, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said in a new opinion.

In other opinion, Martin concluded that:

* A justice of peace has the authority and duty to require a court reporter to prepare examining trial proceedings for proper court.

* An administrative judge's term expires with his regular term of office, but he can be appointed for four more years after retirement.

* School district personal bonding requirements are satisfied when bond is signed by a bank officer or other authorized agent, and bond so given fulfills requirements of security for funds deposited from sale of school bonds.

MAJOR COLLEGE DECISIONS DUE

Coordinating Board, College and University System will make showdown decisions on dental, medical school and North Texas higher education needs here on December 3.

In a day-long public hearing November 11, board heard rival bids of San Antonio and Dallas as site for the new dental school. Houston, Austin, Lubbock, Amarillo and Temple all want the next medical school. The board's recommendation to bring the campuses at Arlington and Denton under a single "urban university" governing board received strong criticism.

FACULTY AID EXPLORED

Whatever the Coordinating Board decides, Texas obviously will need more teachers for higher education. To get those, and to keep the ones now teaching, a senate committee headed by Sen. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur will propose state payment of moving costs for new faculty

members, group disability income insurance; free tuition for faculty members' families and free parking space.

If just a few of the proposed changes in education come about, you can see new taxes will come about, and not the least of the tax-provoking proposals will be a public school teacher pay raise of \$1,800 over the next two years.

MONEY-SAVING IDEAS LAID OUT

Senate Committee on Economy in Government, chaired by Rep. Bill Patman of Galveston, is looking at ways to save taxpayer dollars. Texas Research League, a non-profit state helper, already has given the committee a few suggestions:

1. Centralize all janitorial, mail and messenger, office supply and duplicating services, instead of allowing each agency to budget them separately;

2. "Look at" state employee travel costs, and allow air travel when it would be cheaper than auto transportation;

3. Convert McKnight State Tuberculosis Hospital near San Angelo into a school for the mentally retarded and allow other TB hospitals to take indigents for illnesses other than tuberculosis;

4. Save \$4 million a year in prison and welfare costs by providing a more efficient system of parole;

5. Classify more "realistically" highway and road construction;

6. Save close to \$93,000 a year by abolishing the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness and letting the treasury take care of that function;

7. Develop a more meaningful information network than the present proliferation of electronic data processing equipment

SCHOOL FUNDS RECEIVED

Texas Education Agency has been allotted \$10 million in federal funds for elementary and secondary schools and programs for handicapped.

More than \$8.4 million will go to finance supplemental education facilities statewide. Grant of \$1.2 million will help strengthen state administration and identify needs. About \$1.2 million will go to programs for handicapped. Smaller grant of \$29,405 will help strengthen arts and humanities programs in public schools.

WATER USE REPORT READY

Water users along the Rio Grande between Falcon and Amistad reservoirs can now examine the water use report, and photographs of the area at county clerks offices in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Kinney and Val Verde counties.

Texas Water Rights Commission has completed its study of this area in preparation for adjudication of the water rights. Hearings will

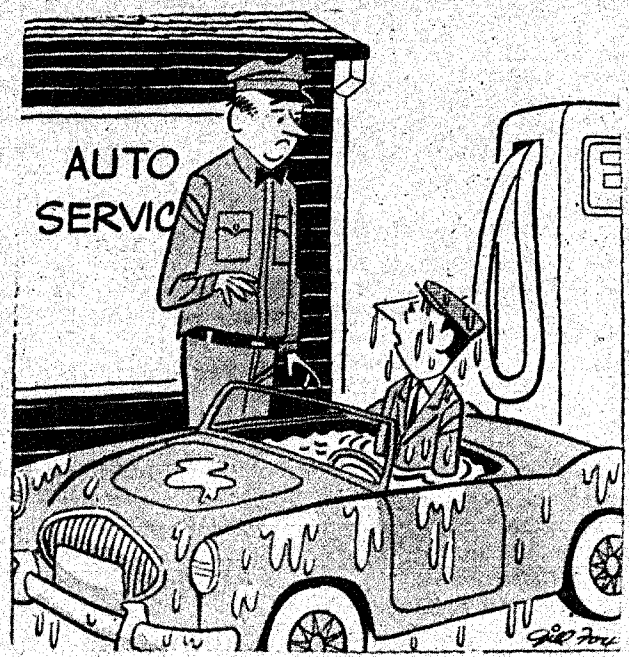

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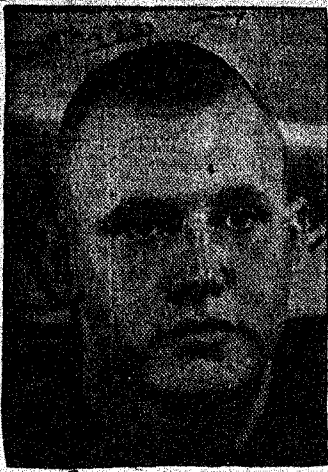
