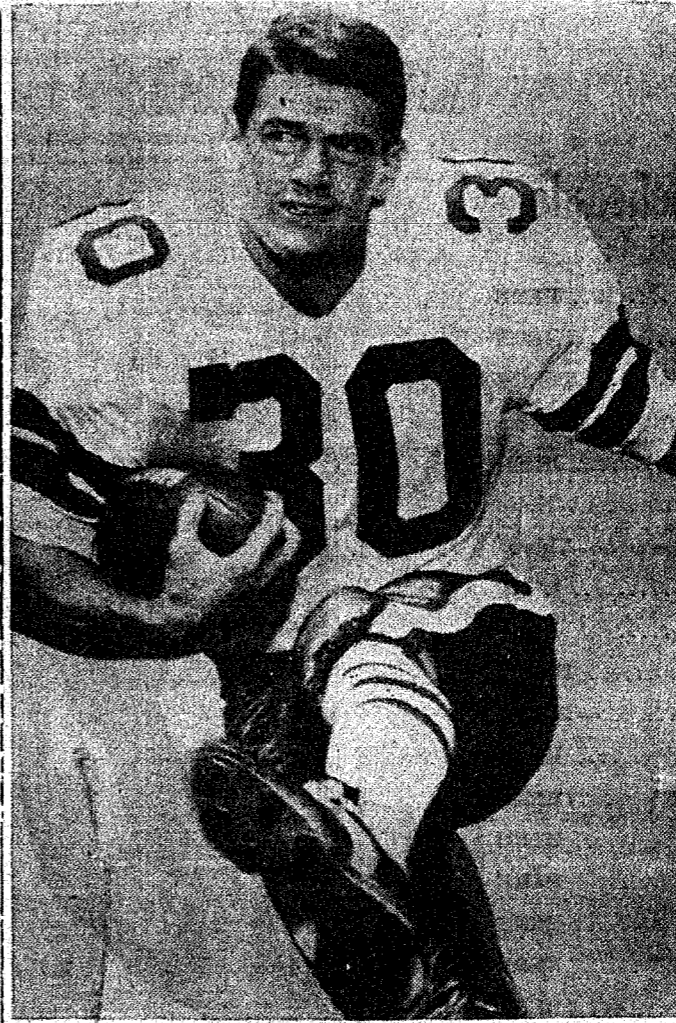
Denise Wallace Named Co-Ed Correspondent

Reeves is a personal friend of the new Coleman car dealer, Bob Lee, and will be meeting and greeting people who go by during the day. Most Coleman County people consider themselves as Cowboy fans, and will be happy to have the opportunity to meet one of the star players.

Reeves is now recuperating from knee surgery and will probably be sidelined for the season. The handsome and soft-spoken Georgian doesn't fit the NFL's cassis mold of a running back. A 6-1 and 200 pounds, he is smaller than the average. He doesn't possess great speed or power, yet he is a super star, one of the league's greatest players.

Santa Anna Nat. Guard Mustered In 28 Yrs. Ago

This week marks the 28th year since the Santa Anna National Guard was mustered into service prior to World War II. The first unit of the 142nd Infantry was established from the Santa Anna group as a result of Hitler's operations in Europe, according to the November 29, 1940 issue of the News. The local unit was described as being a streamlined, motorized Anti-tank Company containing 73 men and two

officers, Captains James T. Padgett and Tom B. Clay. About 30 of the unit were from Big Spring.

According to residents of the community at that time, the National Guard Unit was "mustered in" on the street between the bank and the old hotel building. Within one week they were at Camp Bowie for a year's training. Other units were also mobilized throughout the state to complete the 36th Division.

First Lt. with the local group was Gene L. Hensley, and Virgil D. Fulton was 1st Sergeant. Sergeants were Charles M. Blanton, Alton H. Diserens, John Hensley, O. L. Oakes, Frank E. McGonagill, and Alton S. Ray. Corporals were Joe G. Copeland, Shag Garrett, Billy Joe Harvey, Louis A. Parsons, Jack L. Price, Arnold R. Richards, Love Simpson and Thomas Wristen.

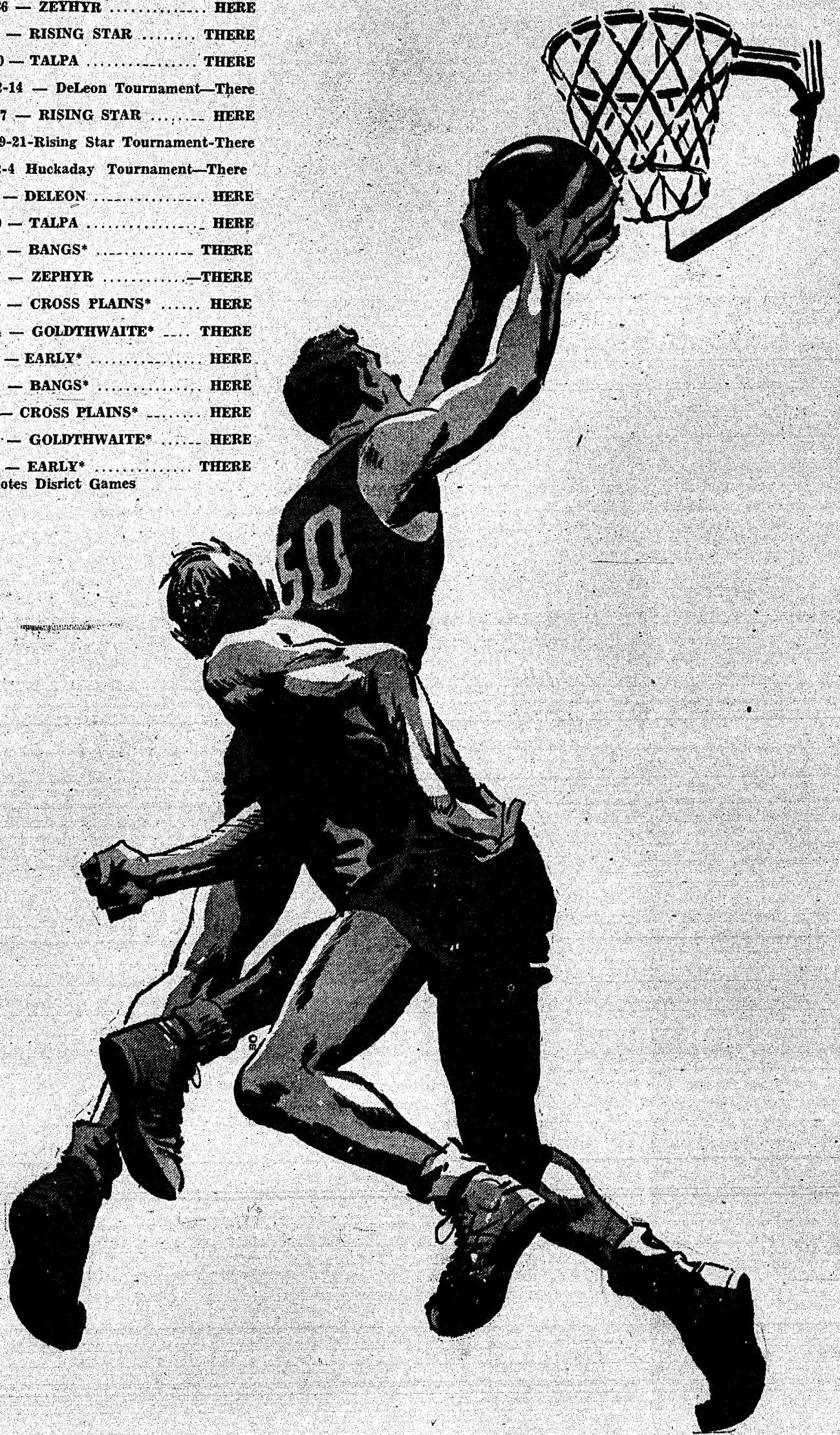

Man today fights the third world war. The enemy is one of the most hazardous acts known to nature—the uncontrolled fire. The problem facing us today is how to prevent this hazard from infiltrating our homes.

This enemy infects the home in several different ways. It can easily be started from electric extensions in the home. Most fires in the home are started by ignorance on the part of the user of electric appliances. Another fire hazard in the home is the storing of oily rags or newspapers in a possible fire trap. Combustible liquids in open containers are also another cause of many fires. Human error causes nearly all home fires. A careless smoker is one of the greatest dangers in homes. Parents too often leave matches in

the reach of children. Careless burning of leaves or other articles around the house may also lead to an invasion of the menace.

The best protection against this enemy is a good prevention. It is hard to correct some human errors but most can be. Electric wiring should be checked annually for faulty circuits. Certain areas of the home should be cleaned to prevent a build up of use-

less materials which are combustible. Matches and other flammable materials should be kept out of the reach of children. Smoking should be done in the proper places and not where a fire could occur.

Man is always developing new and safer ideas for use in the home, but until the human error is corrected, fires will continue to infest the homes of today. The enemy takes a larger toll of lives every year; man must improve his position on the home front if he wishes to win the war against the uncontrolled fire.

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—What's this business about an amnesty period for registering firearms? I did not know firearms had to be registered with IRS?

A—Certain gangster-type weapons such as machine guns, sawed off shotguns, short barreled rifles and silencers have been required to be registered with IRS since 1934 when the National Firearms Act was passed.

The amnesty period from November 2 to December 1 permits anyone who owns a gangster-type weapon and has violated the law by not registering it, to register it without penalty during the 30-day amnesty period. Grenades, bombs, land mines and other destructive devices should also register them during this period.

The Alcohol and Tobacco tax division of IRS has the responsibility for registering these weapons. Your local IRS office can give you the address of the Alcohol and Tobacco office nearest you.

Q—My return went thru OK this year and I got my refund a month or so later. Is it true I can still be audited and have to pay additional tax?

A—Yes. IRS generally has three years from the date of a return to make whatever checks might be necessary to assure that income and expense items are accurately reported and to assess additional taxes. For this reason it is advisable to keep tax records for at least three years.

It usually takes about 5-6 weeks to process a return calling for a refund. In that time it is only possible to make sure the return is complete, the arithmetic is accurate and that the taxpayer is not filing a duplicate refund claim or has an outstanding tax liability.

Q—Is the cost of an out-of-state hunting license deductible?

A—No, hunting licenses are not deductible.

Q—On a job overseas will I have to pay foreign income taxes and ours too?

A—It depends on where you work and under what circumstances. The U. S. has an agreement with many countries to ease the problem of double taxation. A U. S. citizen may also, in many cases, be able to take a credit or a deduction on his U. S. income tax return for the foreign taxes he pays.

Under certain conditions all or part of the income earned aboard may be exempt from Federal taxation. For details on this send a post card to your District Director requesting Publication 54, "Tax Guide for U. S. Citizens that are Abroad."

Q—We purchased tickets to a football game sponsored by a charity group. Can we deduct the cost of the tickets as a charitable contribution?

A—A portion of the ticket price may be deductible. To determine what this might be, find out what the cost of your seats would be at a comparable football game. The difference between the regular cost and the price you paid may be taken as a charitable contribution.

To make it easier for taxpayers to deduct the proper amount in these situations, the sponsors usually will list the deductible amount right on the ticket.

Q—I'm a free lance writer and one of the magazines to which I have sold a story wants my Social Security number. Have they a right to ask for it?

A—Yes, payments to self-employed persons need to be identified by the Social Security number of the recipient when they amount to \$600 or more. These are re-

ported to IRS on Form 1099 just as a bank reports interest payments to us.

Q—My baby is due the end of this month. When can my husband start taking another withholding exemption?

A—As soon as the child is born. The full \$600 exemption for a dependent may be taken on your tax return for a child born any time before the end of the year.

Q—My company paid the plane fares and hotel bills for my wife and me when we went to look over the city I'm being transferred to. However, I noticed that taxes were deducted from the reimbursement. Why was that?

A—The amount you received is classified as wages subject to withholding and not a reimbursement for deductible moving expenses. When you actually move to new location, the unreimbursed cost of transporting you, your family and your household goods may well be deductible moving expense. The cost of meals and lodging while traveling to your new home may also be deductible. For further details, ask your IRS district office for Document 5014, "Employees' Expense, Educational Educational Expenses."

To begin with, you are entitled to know that the article is indeed secondhand. Consider this case:

A music dealer put a used piano, nicely polished, on display among his new pianos—and an unsuspecting woman bought it. When she discovered the instrument was secondhand, she sued the dealer for deceiving her.

"I told her no lies," he protested in court. "She just failed to ask me whether the piano was new."

But the court ruled in the woman's favor. The judge said the dealer had an affirmative duty to clear up a misunderstanding for which he himself was to blame.

Besides information that the merchandise is used, you are entitled also to a fair description of its identity. Thus: A man who bought a "1964 Ford," which turned out to be a 1963 Ford, won damages in court—despite the fact that he had bought the car "as is." The court decided that "as is" does not include "as isn't."

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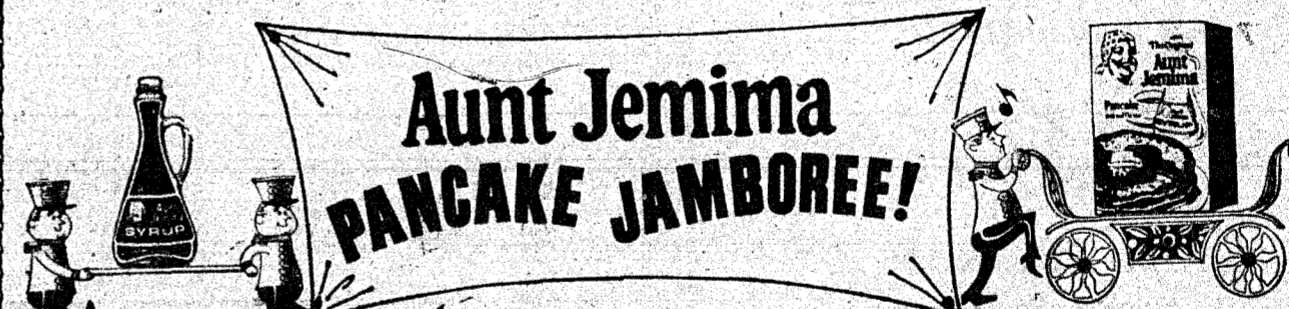

Adventist Church Begins World Service Appeal

The Santa Anna Seventh-Day Adventist Church begins its 65th annual World Service Appeal on Saturday, Nov. 30. Funds solicited will go toward extending medical, welfare, and educational services in 190 countries, including the United States. On a worldwide basis, the church last year aided more than 8.3 million persons, distributed more than 11.4 million articles of clothing, donated 9.5 million hours of volunteer time, and contributed \$4.2 million in food and cash to the church's welfare program.

The denomination operates 135 hospitals and sanitariums, 170 dispensaries and clinics, which treated more than 4.1 million persons last year. It supports a school system enrolling 384,000 students and publishes literature in 290 languages and dialects. At the present time Dr. C. M. Henner, director of the Santa Anna Medical Center, is serving voluntarily in Viet Nam, serving the civilians in that area who are victims of the Viet Cong and other cases of illness and injury.
