Kenneth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Haynes of Trickham, was wounded in Viet Nam on June 28 and was returned to the states on July 10. He is getting along well and the shrapnel wounds are healing.

Kenneth Haynes, Navy BM-2, spent the past 13 months in Viet Nam, including nine months in combat. He received his injuries in grenade explosion outside his residence hotel in Saigon. He was the least injured of the group of Naval personnel struck by the explosion.

CCTC Director, Manager Attend Dallas Meeting

The Coleman County Telephone Cooperative was represented last week when board member Frank Gillespie and manager Thomas Wristen attended the regional meeting of the National Telephone Cooperative Association held at the Fairmont Hotel in Dallas, July 22-24.

Over 150 delegates representing rural telephone systems from a 13 state area gathered in Dallas for the meeting.

Highlight of the meeting was an address by David A. Hamill, Administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington, D. C. Eldon Snowden, president of NTCA, was also on the program.

In a feature of particular interest, Jim Baughen, security manager of Southwestern Bell, instructed the telephone delegates in preventive measures to reduce credit card fraud and coin box theft practices which are costing telephone systems an increasing amount of revenues.

Other features of the three-day meeting included a workshop seminar on management.

TANE Program To Be Given At FBC Sunday

Rev. Texas E. Culp, Director of the Field's Day Program of the Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE), will speak at the 11:00 a. m. service at the First Baptist Church on Sunday, August 2.

TANE is a non-profit organization, supported primarily by Texas churches and individuals. Its purpose is to prevent alcohol and drug problems through education. TANE representatives, such as Rev. Culp, speak in some 2,500 Texas churches each year.

During World War II Rev. Culp was an intelligence officer. Later he served as a criminal investigator for the State of Texas and a special agent for the Federal Government. He was pastor of several Baptist churches in the state and a member of the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. He has served with TANE since 1956 in several capacities.

Rev. Culp attended Allen Academy Junior College, Baylor University, and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He and his wife, Dollie, reside in Dallas.

The local Baptist church has at least one TANE program each year, and other churches in the community have also heard speakers from the organization. The public is invited to attend the special Sunday program.

DWIGHT EPPLER PARTICIPATES IN FB SEMINAR

Some 425 high school students from all over Texas will be in Waco July 28-31 for the eighth annual High School Students Citizenship Seminar sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau.

The outstanding youths, selected to attend the seminar on the basis of scholarship and leadership, will receive 3 days of orientation on the American system and way of life. Emphasis will be placed on the economic, moral, and social aspects of the American society.

Four nationally-known lecturers will conduct the courses.

A group of four young convicts from Huntsville will relate their personal life experiences to the seminar students. This is sponsored by the Department of Corrections as a deterrent to crime. In addition, a young former narcotics addict and ex-convict will relate the tragic story of his life as an addict and criminal.

Instruction at the seminar will consist of lectures, films, and panel discussions. The students, representing 150 counties, are sponsored by local county Farm Bureaus and civic clubs.

Dwight Eppler, senior student at Santa Anna High School, will be attending from the Coleman County Farm Bureau. Dwight was one of the winners in the speech contest held last spring. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Eppler of Rockwood.

Everyone in the community is invited to attend this showing on Friday. There will be no admission charge, although an offering will be taken to help cover the expense of the film.

Midland attorney Tom Sealy has been honored as the recipient of the 13th annual outstanding alumnus award of the University of Texas Law School.

The presentation was made by Houston attorney James W. Kronzer, president of the UT Law School Alumni Association, during the law school's annual ex-student luncheon held in conjunction with the State Bar of Texas convention.

Sealy received a plaque "in appreciation of his many services" to the UT Austin School. Recipients of the awards are chosen by a special committee of ex-students. Sealy, a 1931 law graduate

of UT Austin, is presently serving as president of the UT Law School Foundation. He also is a trustee and life member of the foundation and a former president of the law school's alumni group.

A senior partner in the Midland law firm of Stubbeman, McRae, Sealy and Laughlin, Sealy is a former member and chairman of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from the UT Ex-Students' Association in 1966.

A member of the advisory committee to the Supreme Court of Texas, Sealy is a member and former president of the Texas Association of Defense Counsels and a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation and the Texas Bar Foundation.

He is a director and former chairman of the Texas Research League and was a member of the Governor's Committee of 25 on Education Beyond the High School.

Sealy is also widely known for his work in the Presbyterian Church where he is a trustee of the Texas Foundation and a former trustee of the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary.

He is also a former resident of Santa Anna, son of the late Dr. and Mrs. T. R. Sealy, and a nephew of Mrs. Ora Hunter and Misses Florence, E. Lee and Ruby Harper.

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In Our Opinion

WEBSTER DEFINES CHURCH as a building for public Christian worship; the clergy or officialdom of a religious body; a body or organization of religious believers; or public divine worship.

What we want to know is, how can a group of atheists form a church? They don't believe in a deity of any kind so they say, so how can they have a religion?

All the news media carried stories about atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair, the old gal who stirred up such a stink about public prayer in schools and who has made a great effort to hold the public spotlight in her fight to practically outlaw religious beliefs in this country.

So we want to know, who or what are they going to worship when they form a church?

This past week Mrs. O'Hair and a group of 40 delegates held a state convention in Austin, and set up their goals for the future. Included was setting up atheist "churches" in our communities.

They went on record as saying they deplored the social, psychological, and physical reprisals to which they are subjected to when they identify themselves as atheists. They also said they will seek fair and impartial media coverage that all other religious organizations receive, and that they should have equal time and space. How would between 30 and 40 people in the state expect to have equal coverage in the news media with several million? No other state convention with 30 to 40 delegates would even make the press at all.

This is a free country, and they can believe what they will, but the freedom of religion is like all other freedoms they should be exercised until they infringe on the freedom of someone else. Then they become not a freedom but a special privilege.

The atheists can do their thing if they want to but I don't want to be forced to read their propaganda, or associate with them for that matter, unless I choose to do so.

So what is she griping about?

CAMPUS VIOLENCE has been taking a larger share of the political publicity of the candidates of late. It seems that most Texans share the belief that disorder must be dealt with firmly.

Violence in any form is not a legitimate expression of protest, and it is especially out of place in colleges and universities of our nation, where young people are supposed to be trained to be responsible citizens.

Violence is primarily a problem of local authorities and should be dealt with by them. It is something that the federal government should keep out of, unless the locals refuse to take care of the situation. It is mainly the responsibility of school administrators to handle and to call in help from law enforcement agencies when it is needed, but too many have let the militant groups bully them to an extreme before they do anything about it, and even some refuse to act then.

Most candidates for office in Texas have taken this view, so it will not be an important factor in elections this fall.

Taxation experts of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States said that the average American taxpayer started working for himself on May 9 this year. Up until that date, they figure, he worked just to pay his federal, state and local taxes. Further, they calculate, Mr. Average works two hours and 49 minutes out of an eight-hour day to pay all of his tax bills.

PUBLIC NOTICE
 Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
 NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)
 General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "Repeat of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."
