Mountain Echoes

The entire "big country" area has had the longest dry period without measurable rain since the late 1880s, according to a story in the Friday Abilene Reporter News. The last measurable rain fell in Abilene on June 2, 72 days ago.

Santa Anna had only one-tenth inch of measurable moisture during the month of July, and the last rain prior to that was only one-quarter inch which fell on June 22. Santa Anna's official rain total for 1970 is 14.05 inches, according to Ray Owen, local weatherman.

Many local people have predicted rain on certain days—depending on superstitions, old wives' tales, or dead snakes. However the most reliable date we can forecast is Saturday, Sep. 5. That's the day of the annual membership meeting of the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative.

The Co-op's meetings have been dampened more than half the times they have been scheduled. The employees have almost quit trying to decorate the football stadium stage because the decorations have been ruined—or moved—by bad weather.

Some of us in the community are wondering if Manager Thomas Wristen might schedule the meeting sooner—in case we don't have rain before that date!

Kindergarten To Open Monday

It's back-to-school time again for Santa Anna area students, and for about 50 of them it will be the "first time to school." About half of this number will be in the first grade in the local school, but the other half will be those enrolled in the public school kindergarten.

Among numerous changes in Texas schools this year, the state supported kindergarten program will begin for most school districts, including Santa Anna.

Mrs. Sue Newman will be kindergarten teacher, and 25 to 28 children in the district are eligible, being five years old or before September 1 of this year.

Although attendance at the kindergarten is not compulsory, parents of children enrolled are urged to keep their children in school and help develop good attendance habits.

The kindergarten day will begin and end at the same hours as the other primary grades—8:20 a. m. to 3:15 p. m. Children will have their meals in the school cafeteria if they wish, and those in rural areas will ride the school busses to and from school.

Mozelle School Starts Monday

Classes will begin next Monday at Mozelle, according to Charles Yarbrough, superintendent. Approximately 137 students are expected for the new school year, which is about the same as the enrollment last year.

No pre-registration is being held for the students at Mozelle.

COLEMAN JUNIOR RODEO UNDERWAY THIS WEEKEND

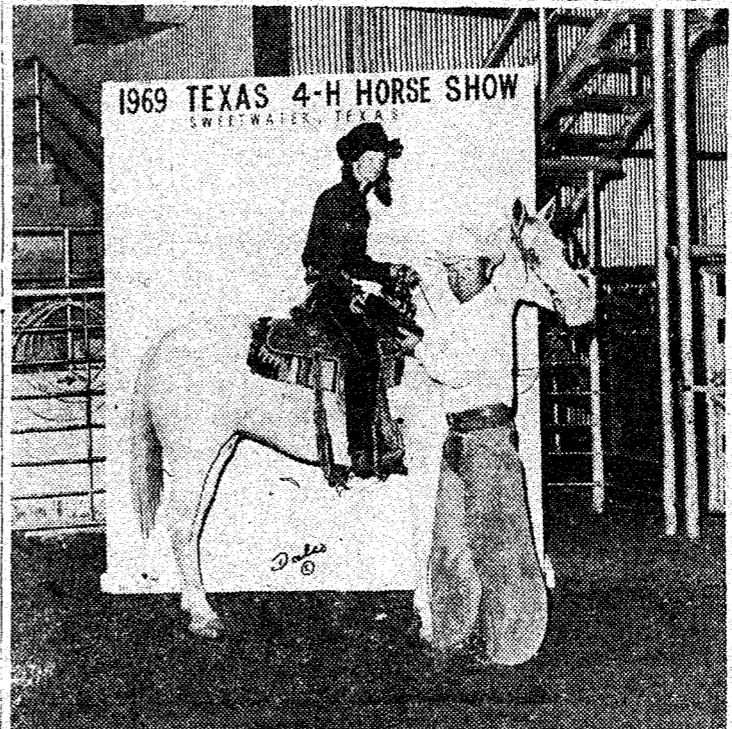

In Our Opinion

IF THE WOMEN of this country fall for the new styles the designers are trying to put over on them, then this is going to be one disappointed man.

We viewed the Miss Wool Pageant and Style Show the other night and about all they had to offer was the "Middle" or "Maxie" styles with the hemline down to mid-calf or to the ankles.

Now we are not saying anything against wool, as such, just the crack-pot ideas of the designers. We realize some of the best clothing is made of wool, and especially in the winter do we approve it.

Not only were the hemlines too long, but some of the designs bordered on the atrocious. If I were a woman, I wouldn't be caught dead in most of them.

Of course, being a male, I am probably a little biased in my opinion, but I will have to admit that some of the ladies look real nice in the present styles. Maybe some of them show a little too much leg, but I can't help but believe that they are more comfortable than they would be if their skirts hit their ankles.

Even in some of our largest cities such as Houston and Dallas, the problem is not nearly what it is on the east or west coasts. California has been noted for its smog for several years and in New York Con Edison and other industries with smoke stacks are always catching it one way or another.

There is no question that air pollution is a growing problem and some industries are making efforts to combat it, but also some of it is the result of automobile exhausts and burning trash dumps.

There has been some activity in the state legislature and studies are being made as to how best to combat the problem, but, as skeptical as we are, we fear that politics also has some influence here.

The residents of Steubenville, for the most part, accept their plight philosophically. They realize that their livelihood, in the most part, comes from the manufacturing plants and mills, so they are not pressing for an immediate solution, but probably government intervention will take some action before too long.

Already the government is studying automobile exhausts and safety measures for the car manufacturers, as well as methods to reduce the residues from factory smoke stacks.

Maybe there will be a solution before we all succumb to the poisonous gas filling our air.

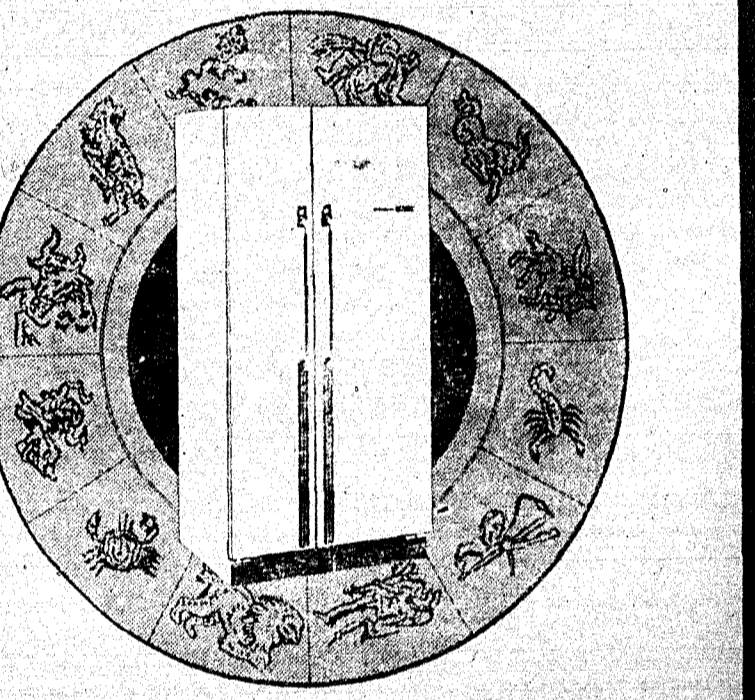

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
 General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
 "(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition.
 "Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

WHY GLAMORIZE THE HIPPIES?

by Bill Weeks

A great deal is being written these days about the eruption of social deviates who call themselves "hippies". Much of it follows a pseudo-sociological pattern that is becoming familiar—and more than a little nauseating. Rarely have such pains been taken to glamorize the repulsive and magnify the insignificant. A kind of wearying wistfulness envelops the hippies and fairly saturates the flood of stuff being published about them. The fact is that this disgraceful movement is composed of a tiny minority of younger people who would rather pass their days in a drug-induced dream than to accept their responsibilities as members of society.

Implicit in the publicity that is being gushed about these social deviates is the assumption that their deviations are somehow the fault of society and not chargeable to any mental or moral deficiency in the hippies themselves. Society has "failed" them.

All this ignores the fact that our society, whatever its shortcomings, has yielded more good for more people than any other the world has ever known. And a logical question follows: Shall we all put on sackcloth and sprinkle ashes over our heads because a lone fringe chooses to turn their backs on that good society to garner some passing attention?

One of the least convincing bits in the legendary being woven about these self-elected outcasts is the effort to invest them and their goings-on with a kind of socio-religious significance. They are depicted as being rather like the early Christians, especially in their attitude toward possessions. By discarding conventional attire, scorning money and taking no thought for the morrow, some people claim the hippies are offering a new and devastating critique of our materialistic society.

What is the picture that emerges? We read of a teenage girl who has left home to live in a hippie rookery and whose fondest hope is to lure her brother away from home so she can "TURN HIM ON." Then there is the case of the attractive young woman who has abandoned her job in order to live with a bumptious ignoramus. We see occasional samples of hippie

"poetry," which is sophomoric and uninspired. We hear, too, in a kind of subdued undertone, of the occasional "activists," who create street incidents and promote disorder. But this is usually played down. So far as I am aware, nobody has yet identified Communist infiltrators, but it is hardly likely that the Comrades would neglect so potential a field.

On the whole, even with the bright colored lights and thumping hi-fi, hippie land is a desolate scene and it is hard to understand why anyone would want to "make it." Anyone that is, who is not "high" on drugs.

One writer reaches the said conclusion that "the signals between the generation are irrevocably jammed." This implies that the hippies make up a whole generation and that we should all be wringing our hands because nobody over, say 30 has any way of communicating with anybody under 20. It assumes, in short, that this is "the hippie generation."

The latest statistical abstract figures available are for 1960 and they show the number of youth between ages 15 and 20 as 13,287,439. Assuming that this category has increased in the same percentage ratio as the general population, we find there are a trifle over 15 million young people in the generation to which the hippies happen to belong. Now the wildest claim that I have seen, attributed to the hippie "leaders" themselves, indicates that there may be as many as 200,000 hippies of all kinds in the country. If these figures are reasonably accurate, then the hippies number a trifle over one per cent of the 15-to-20 year age group.

Responsible Americans will lament over the sad circumstances that even one per cent of our youth have been neglected, or that they are socially maladjusted, or incorrigible, or hooked on drugs—or just plain silly. But let us not go into hysterics about it so long as 99 per cent of the young people are not that way.

To call this "the hippie generation" is a wicked exaggeration upon the overwhelming majority of today's young people. A few thousand freakish specimens in that age group daub themselves with paint, don bizarre attire, congregate in unsavory habitats and speak gibberish by way of communication. Okay, if that's what they want. But they are not a "generation." They are only a screwball one per cent of a generation.

And while they deport themselves in a psychedelic paradise of unswept floors and unwashed dishes, upwards of 15 million young people of the same age are leading normal teen-age or post-adolescent lives, trudging off dutifully to high

school or college, laboriously learning something out of the riches of history and science, sampling the wealth of the world's literature, learning how to think—getting ready to match wits with life. They know what they want—a reasonably organized and orderly life. They understand the social value of cleanliness and comfort and decent surroundings. They are not interested in occupying a dingy "pad"; they hope to own a home. They are not ashamed of being ambitious. They want to achieve.

Moreover, they know that there is greater satisfaction, comfort, peace and safety in a morally oriented society than in a lawless one.

Why glamorize hippies? Let us rather glamorize the 99 per cent—the responsible young Americans in whose hands the destiny of our society is directly a result of a lack of communication and to a great extent lack of involvement on the part of

adults. I do not know all the answers but I do know that we can try harder to communicate than we have in the past and also that involvement must be undertaken by a larger part of our society than has been in the recent past.

ASC News . . .

by Joe K. Taylor

Eligible farm voters have only six days left in which to circulate and sign nominating petitions for ASC community committees. August 17 is the final date petitions may be filed at Coleman County ASCS office. Mail elections are set for the second week in September.

We want to re-emphasize to farmers who are eligible to vote that nominating candidates by petition is of prime importance. If six or more eligible candidates are nominated by petition in an ASC community, no other names will go on the ballot. In the past, the incumbent community committee also had the privilege of making nominations. Now, a community committee may nominate only if fewer than six eligi-

ble candidates are nominated by petition, and the committee may nominate only the number of candidates needed to make up a full slate of six nominees.

No special forms are required for a petition, only a sheet of paper naming the candidate and the ASC community. Signatures of at least six eligible voters in the community are required on each petition. Only one candidate may be named on a petition but voters may sign as many petitions as they want.

In general, to be eligible either to become a candidate or to vote, a person must have a farm interest in the community and must be eligible to participate in one or more programs administered by the County ASCS office. Full details on eligibility require-

ments for candidates and voters are available at County ASCS office, along with a list of known eligible voters in the county.

Each year eligible farmers nominate and elect ASC community committees of three members and two alternates. The community committees elect persons to fill vacancies on their County ASC Committee and also help administer farm programs such as farm acreage allotments and bases and conservation cost-sharing.

They are the key people the U. S. Department of Agriculture relies upon for direct contact with producers. Community committees help keep farmers informed of farm program provisions. They advise their County ASC committee on the farm situation in their communities and assist in administering farm programs on the local level.

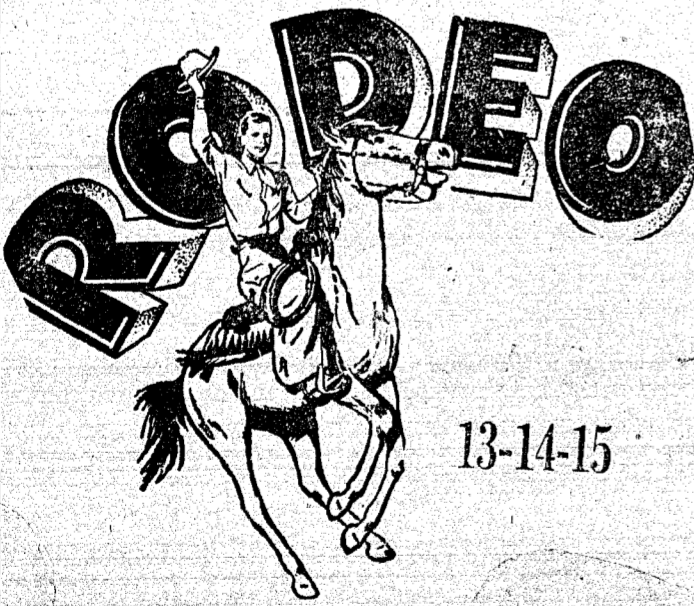
