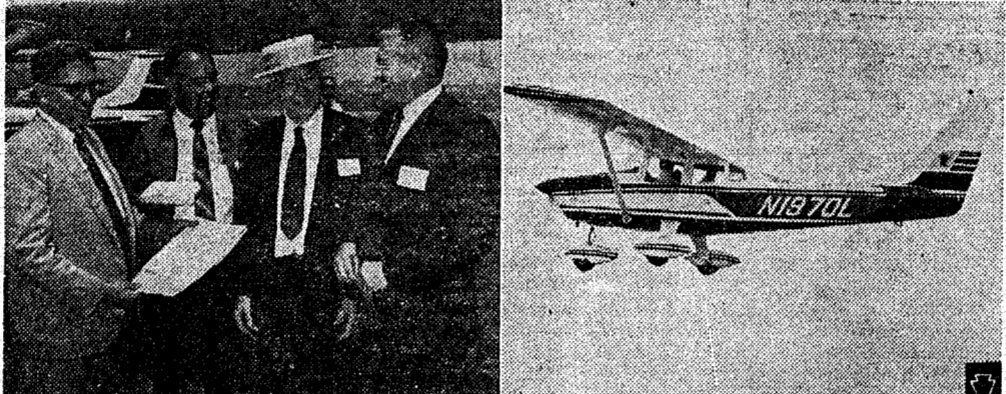
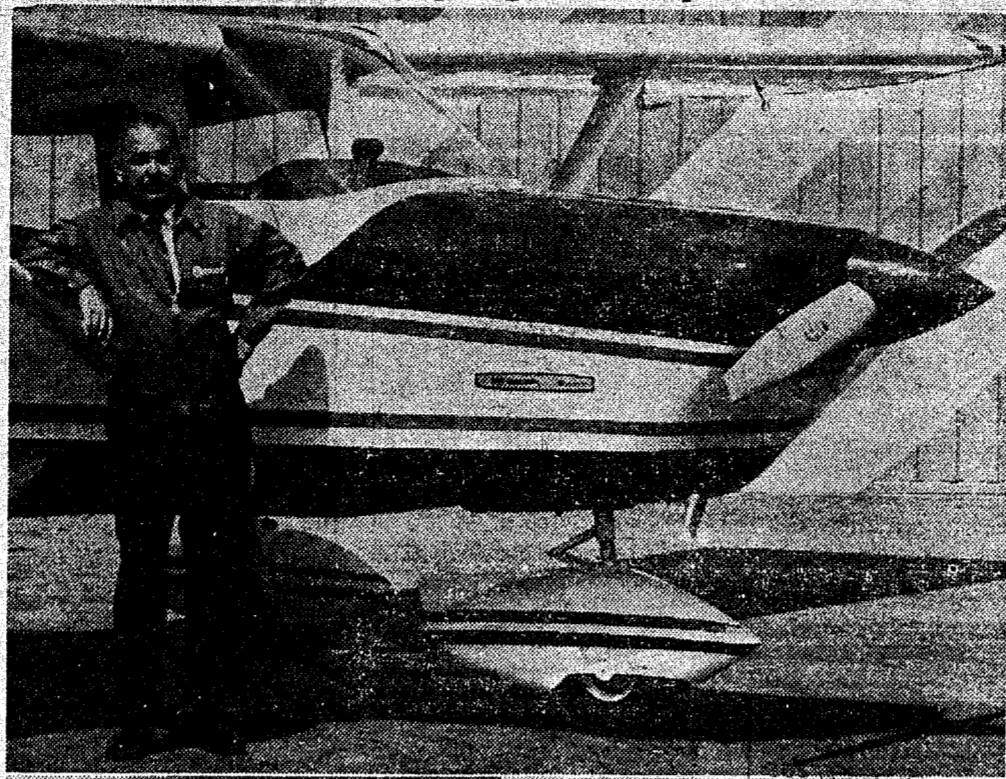

Two Flying Champs



Internationally famous racing pilot, Bill Brodbeck, flying the record-setting Lark Commander, N1970L, recently set three new flight records for light aircraft during a continuous 6 1/2 hour flight.

Built by Aero Commander, one of the General Aviation Divisions of North American Rockwell (NR), the 4-place, 180-h.p., production model Lark, claimed the records flying over Eastern Seaboard courses. The record flight originated in Albany, Ga., and concluded at the 21st annual Reading, Pa., Air Show, where Brodbeck and his Lark were greeted by an enthusiastic crowd of spectators, and (L to R) Victor Yarnell, the mayor of Reading; (Brodbeck); Col. W. F. Rockwell, honorary chairman of the board of NR, and R. N. Robinson, president of the General Aviation Divisions.

The new Lark records are sanctioned by a member group of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale (FAI), which sanctions all international aviation and aerospace records.

Brodbeck holds six international records and racing championships, all won flying earlier models of Commander aircraft. He holds the Louis Bleriot aviation medal awarded by the FAI

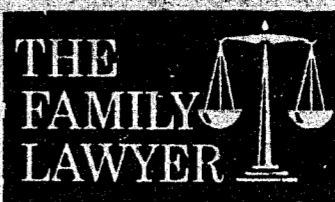

Lipstick: A Job Hazard

Near the end of her lunch hour, a stenographer sat down to put on her lipstick. She lost her balance and fell, suffering a back injury. Could she collect workmen's compensation?

The company insisted that the girl was not entitled to compensation because she was not "on the job" when hurt. Nevertheless a court upheld her claim.

"Applying cosmetics was not an abandonment of her employment," said the judge. It added to her comfort and self-esteem, and thereby permitted her to more efficiently concentrate upon her duties."

Generally speaking, workmen's compensation covers injuries that occur not only during other activities closely related to the job. For example, it applies while an employe is getting a drink of water or going to the lavatory.

In fact, workmen's compen-sation may apply even before the day's work has begun. Take this case:

A hotel waitress, arriving early headed first for the powder room to change into

working shoes. On the way, she slipped and broke her arm. Even though she had not yet been on the job, she was held entitled to workmen's compensation—because changing her shoes was so closely related to her work.

However, the law usually will not approve a compensa-tion claim if the victim's ac-tivity was in violation of the company rules and regula-tions.

In another case, a bakery worker was injured while trying to force open a tight window. He claimed later that the room had been stuffy, and that he needed some fresh air to help him work better.

However, there happened to be a company rule against anyone opening windows without the permission of the foreman. Accordingly, a court ruled that the claimant was not entitled to compen-sation. The court said he could not logically be consid-ered "on the job" while doing something that his employer had specifically forbidden.

Hot News: Mexican Restaurant At Tan Son Nhut, Viet Nam

(Ed. note: The following story was copied from the August 7, 1970, Pacific Stars and Stripes newspaper. Bass is the son of Dick and Rose Bass of Santa Anna.)

SAIGON: In as much time as it took to open, a Mexican restaurant called La Casa Grande earned the reputation as the best Mexican restaurant on Tan Son Nhut Air Base, and soldiers hankering for a couple of tamales, enchiladas, or tacos doused with picante (hot) sauce, can find them there. That La Casa Grande is the only Mexican restaurant at Tan Son Nhut doesn't lessen the achievement of its becoming the best. Staffed by a Vietnamese, managed by a Korean under the aegis of the American Airmen's open mess, it had to adjust to a war zone a bit.

The picante sauce, which is made in a 30-gallon pot because so many people eat it, starts with Vietnamese instead of Mexican peppers. Still, says M. Sgt. James Bennie Bass, who got the whole operation rolling, "It's hot enough to set the woods on fire." "Sam" Bass ought to know about the passions that make a man plunge into a dish of picante sauce. Bass, who is the secretary custodian of the Tan Son Nhut Airmen's open mess, grew up down around where it all seeped into America—in a town called Santa Anna, Texas, which has a population of 1300 "including the turkeys and chickens."

It was from his mother that Bass learned how to make the chow they're dishing out at La Casa Grande. While his father was in the service, his mother served up and sold enough tamales from several cafes she ran to take her husband to Europe to visit Bass, who was by then introducing the Mexican fare to Airmen's clubs over there. When he got to Vietnam with two generations of Mexican cooking behind him, Bass said, he launched the Mexican eatery. Col. Frank E. Marek, who runs the 377th Combat Support Group, suggested the troops would enjoy a special restaurant. The idea, according to Bass, began about seven months ago. When the final go-ahead came, the restaurant was serving food within a month at a building along the Tan Son main drag taken over from a field grade officers mess which has been consolidated earlier. The new place has an airy, clean atmosphere, with potted plants around the room, red and white cloths and Mexican type paintings on the walls done by GIs. Ever since it opened, they have been serving up tamales, tacos, and enchiladas to long lines of troops. Everyone has eaten there from buck privates to a three-star general, Bass says. T. Sgt. Donald Kehren, in town on T.D.Y. from Taiwan, was eating the combination plate there the other night after he'd heard about the place from some co-workers. He said he's liked Mexican food from way back. "When a Puerto Rican and Mexican say the food is good," Kehren explained, "there must be something to it. A double eagle was a \$20 gold piece."

Residents Say 'Celia' Wasn't Lady

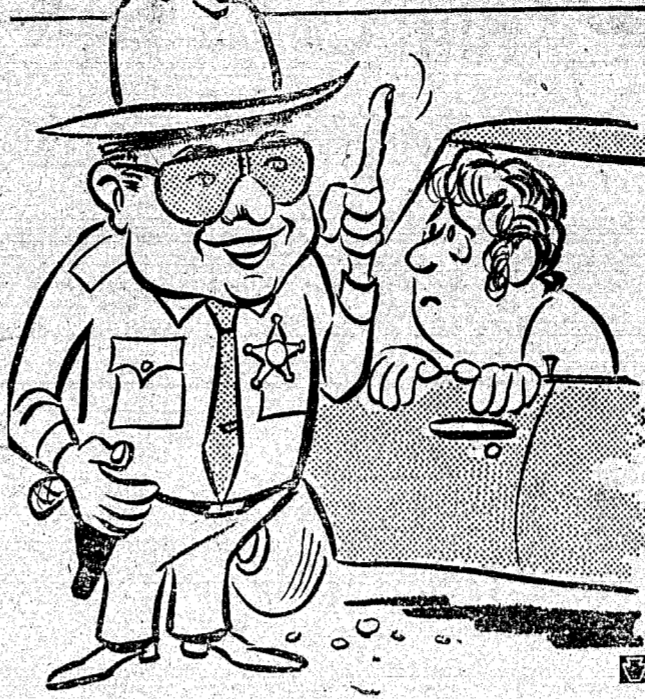
