


dents at the beginning of school last year was 337 in the 12 grades.







THE NATIONAL LABOR RELATIONS BOARD has been under fire from business men for some time as a result of what they consider one-sided decisions in fayor of labor. them overwhelmingly in favor of the law. Nationally, the vote of the members showed 82 per cent in favor, 11 per cent not in favor and seven per cent with no opinion.

Texas members showed an even stronger approval with 91 per cent in favor, six against and three with no mission boosted the oil allowopinion. Washigton D. C. showed a whopping 100 per cent in favor of the bill, and Rhode Island found no dissenters, just 12 per cent with no opinion.

The NLRB has brought this on themselves. Through the years the board has been packed with pro-labor members, and their rulings have been considered strongly anti-management. If a business had a run-in with a labor union, it was just too bad, because they didn't have a chance

Many consider one of the main causes of inflation to be the strength of the unions in forcing management to up wages beyond what cost of living would dictate consequently prices on manufactured goods go up to meet the costs and the fixed income group suffers the consequences.

We believe every man should have a living wage, and in the beginning there was as much one-sidedness on the part of management as there is in labor today. Unions needed to be organized, and they served their purpose.

However, during the early thirties legislation came through in favor of the unions in an effort to equalize power, and now some unions have become out and out rackets, where union administration just dictates the terms of the contracts and there is not much managemen can do if they want to stay in business.

Business mon have contended that the NLRB has used its regulatory powers to strengthen the unions, has increasingly liberalized rules governing union recognition, collective bargaining and union "rights" and all the time tightening rules affecting management.

Senator Tower says the board "has ignored the intent of Congress," and has rewritten the law to suit itself, has subordinated the rights of individual employees, small unions, and employers through biased decisions favoring big unions.

Sen. Roman L. Hruska of Nebraska, who supports the legislation said the "NLRB has demonstrated a distressing lack of objectivity and impartiality required of a judicial body."

The federal courts handled labor disputes until 1935 when the NLRB was established; and supporters of Tower's bill want them returned.

With the strong political power attained by larger unions in the last few years, there is some doubt that the Senator will be able to get his bill through, because the tendency of the Congressmen not to vote for something that would cost him a vote is getting stronger and stronger all the time. In fact it is our opinion that some in the House and Senate would sell their own mother for a vote. Of course we expect the Congressman to reflect the thinking of the majority of his constituents. but we feel that many times they follow pressure rather than logic in making a decision as to how they will vote.
