ing to whom this week and why.





So far the Austin schools are not bussing in order to gain a balance of the races, however, the HEW has forced the closing of Anderson High School, an excellent school in a predominantly Negro and Mexican-American area, and in doing so has aroused the wrath of all races. There were some white children in the school, but it was largely made up of minority groups. However, the district lines that have been set up would have to have been completely distorted in order to bring about a balance, and the Austin schools have had freedom of choice for several years. They were the first to comply with civil rights statutes and had integrated schools as early as the late 50's. The Austin Board has always been cooperative in trying to comply with the law, but outrageous demands from HEW have drawn them to the end of their rope.

Many similar incidents are happening over Texas. San Angelo has its problems with HEW and many others.

What it all boils down to is that HEW has interpreted the law the way they want it and if necessary have ED - Forty-nine persons will bent the statutes to comply with their way of thinking be killed in Texas crashes in sending out their directives.

What they hope to accomplish by bussing kids from their home district to another just so there will be a certain number of each race is beyond us. If the Supreme Court upholds that order, there will be a lot more demonstrations than we have now, because neither of the races want it done. The minorities are happy when they have good schools, whether they are predominant in it or not. Most of them don't care whether there is a white child in the school or not.

The pathetic part is that a child will be taken from a school in his own neighborhood, where he could walk to school, and have to travel long distances by bus in order to satisfy some crank in Washington. And crank is a lenient word to describe them.

A lot of our trobule stems from the fact that a lot of "know-it-all" over-educated nuts have been drawn into federal service and are now operating a bunch of useless bureaus that we could well do without and object to paying the bill for their operation.

Sometimes when some of these young demonstrators say we need to tear it down and start over from scratch, we are inclined to go along with them.

However, when the people wake up to such as is going on, and make it known at the polls that they do not want it, something will be done-but not before.

Indian Artifacts of Local Woman **On Display at Hemis-Fair Location**

The warrior was proud of his finery. Too proud to chance soiling it in the battle to come, or letting it fall into the hands of the enemy.

He sashed his possessions away in a small cave, a few miles north of the present city of Mason, intending to pick them up afterwards.


Thus begins a story which, after considerable research by some of Texas' finest history buffs, still is filled with unknown. The efects' of the Comanche's cache are felt now all the way from San Antonio to Coleman.

The brave never returned, It is assumed he was among those who fell when a raiding party was beaten off in Mason with the loss of several warriors. The year was 1872. The warrior left behind art-

ifacts still considered as among the finest; good enough that later they were displayed at Texas Memorial Museum in Austin, and now are on loan to the Institute of Texas Cultures at San Antonio.

Whether through fate or Providence, the items did not remain long in the cave, where they most certainly would have been reduced by natural forces. A few days after the raid, a Mason settler found the cache-including a Prince Albert coat, a pair of moccasins, two armlets (or possibly modified leggings), and a pipe bag or medicine bag.


