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PUBLIC SCHOOL MILK PROGRAM DISCONTINUED

After being in operation for a number of years, the special milk program in public schools has been discontinued, according to an announcement from the Texas Education Agency. The federal milk program was not included in the other food programs, but TEA stated that there is a possibility that Congress may reinstate the program or adopt a similar milk program in the next few months.

Milk has been available for all school children for only 5 cents a half-pint, with the government program paying part of the cost. Without the aid of the milk program, the milk will now cost ten cents a half-pint. If there is not enough participation at the new cost, the milk program will be discontinued until further funds are available.

Hundreds of children, especially elementary age, have benefitted from the special milk program.

Supt. Perry and lunchroom personnel are in hopes that the program will be reinstated soon.

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In Our Opinion

PLow DEEP WHILE SLUGGARDS SLEEP, is a quote from Elbert Hubbard's scrap book, and although not many of us take that advice, there is one organization that takes it literally and they are the most zealous group anywhere, including any religion.

They are the Communists. Most of us realize that there are some Communists in the United States, but we are not necessarily impressed. Well, we should be.

It was only a small minority that took over Russia a few years back, and you can see where they are today.

Their method of operation is crafty. They don't openly claim connection with the Reds but use all their influence to infiltrate every phase of government, religion, civic organizations, and whatever, in order to spread their dogma. They present it with conviction, and to the unwary, it sounds like it is something logical and good. But behind it is the Communist Manifesto and everything it stands for.

The Black Panther Party and the Students for a Democratic Society are unquestionably Communist. They have even attended schools in Cuba and other Communist countries, yet they will yell loud and long that they are not Communists.

Now their membership is small, comparatively speaking, but look at the naive, young group who are influenced by them. Their operation is to organize and then disappear. When we read of riots and demonstrations turning to violence, the ones who really did the organizing are not there for the actual operation. They make every effort to show no connection with the demonstrators.

That has been their method of operation wherever they have been, and it has been very successful. Many people, and especially those who are in the lower income group or are more or less illiterate, fall for their line because it sounds like they will benefit from a takeover by the group. But if they would only take a look at Russia, they would see that they would be oppressed even more than they are here.

The party of the workers ends up like some of our unions have in the United States. The big brass in the organization receive the benefits and the rank and file do the work.

They have infiltrated some of our church groups, and very definitely our government bureaus and there is no question that their influence is reaching the Congress as is evidenced by some who are following the line down to a tee.

We had better wake up, America, and do something to reverse the trend we now face.

The way things are going the ideologies of Russia and the United States will be pretty close together in a few years. They are growing toward more capitalistic ideas while we are rapidly moving toward the socialistic type of government.

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STATE Capital NEWS

A veteran state tax bill author predicts that the Legislature will be levying more new taxes on Texans next year than the king-sized \$348.6 million revenue bill of 1969.

Forecast was offered by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas, chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee and head of the Committee on State and Local Tax Policy.

Bolstering Atwell statistically was James W. McGrew, research director of Texas Research League, who acknowledged that his original estimate of a \$400 million tax bill "looks smaller all the time."

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes frankly concedes that a "major" tax bill is looming — unless the federal government agrees to some form of unrestricted revenue sharing with the state or picks up the entire tab for welfare aid. Barnes further acknowledged that he is not optimistic about prospects for a federal rescue in the nick of time. This view was heartily concurred in by Atwell.

Although Barnes and Atwell did not appear far apart in their estimates of revenue need, they were speaking a different language as to sources.

Atwell, who declined recommendations at this point, told newsmen he thinks an increase in the sales tax rate is likely and that the Legislature properly should look to broad-based taxation in 1971.

While going along with the possibility of a sales tax boost, the Lieutenant Governor said flatly that the Senate would insist on balancing any revenue bill with a corresponding tax on business.

Difference in viewpoints perhaps illustrates to some extent the divergence in House and Senate philosophies.

But, once more in harmony, Barnes and Atwell agreed that Texans will be facing state corporate and personal income taxes sometime during this decade.

INSURANCE HIKE DELAYED — Further delay in a public hearing on auto insurance rates or investment income makes any rate increase this year even more unlikely than ever.

State Board of Insurance changed to October 19 the September 9 hearing on whether to consider insurance company investment income in determining insurance rates.

A three-way hearing on auto insurance, manual rules and policy forms will be held at a still later date to be announced in the future.

Investment income hearing originally had been slated for July 14 and the rate hearing August 17. One delay already

had been ordered. Companies had hoped to put any new rate increases into effect by September 1, but the delayed meetings made that impossible.

CRIME RATE UP — Major crime rate in Texas rose 19.9 per cent for the first half of 1970, Col. Wilson E. Speir, Texas Department of Public Safety director, reports.

Latest statewide report reflects a major crime is committed every minute from January through June. Sheriffs and local police chiefs furnish the information.

Increase actually is 20.9 per cent in urban areas and 10.5 in rural territory.

Robbery shows the biggest jump — 40.2 per cent. Rape increased 28.7 per cent, murder 28.1 per cent, theft 21.6 per cent, burglaries 17.9 per cent, auto thefts 16.3 per cent and aggravated assaults 10 per cent.

Speir said an estimated 233,599 major criminal offenses occurred during the January-June period. Comparison-wise, it was 4,404 per 100,000 population. Crime clearances (solutions declined from 27 per cent during the first half of 1969 to 26 per cent for 1970, but the clearance rate for murder and robbery increased slightly.

ATTORNEY GENERAL OPINIONS — Attorney General, on request of the Air Control Board, can take action based on violation of Board rules, but local government can take action based on violation of Board rules, but local government can take action to institute legal proceedings without Board approval, says Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

- Any person receiving probation for driving while intoxicated who refuses to take a chemical breath test for d. w. i. is subject to administrative proceedings to revoke his license.

- Neither the State Commissioner of Education nor the State Board of Education has power to determine unliquidated damages on appeal by a teacher dismissed without cause by a school district.

- Governor may use his staff to provide direct planning aid to cities.

- Higher education Coordinating Board's plan for junior college development lays out services areas, and a junior college district can be expanded under provisions of an applicable statute.

- Parks and Wildlife Department can sell development bonds at par and accrued interest for cash only, and is not authorized to exchange bonds for land to be developed as a park site.

- Mother of a school board member may not be promoted to the position of tax assessor-collector of the school district.

- American Revolution Bicentennial Commission members on official business are entitled to 10 cents a mile and

\$25 a day per diem.

- Red River County Commissioners, have no right to prohibit people from carrying rifles or pistols around Langford Lake near Clarksville

- Water Rights Commission may only pass on the issue whether good cause is shown as to claims presented under adjudication act.

- Where there is no change in school district boundaries, there is no requirement that an election be held to assume outstanding bonds or other debt of a district as existed prior to consolidation or annexation; nor is there requirement that bond or maintenance tax be voted.

- Hemisfair's skyride in San Antonio is taxable although city-owned and leased to a concessionaire.

APPOINTMENTS — Dr. David Wade, Austin psychiatrist and member of Gov. Preston Smith's health planning staff, has been named commissioner of the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

John Simmons, longtime Sabine River Authority manager, of Orange will become the governor's special consultant for water affairs.

Former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr heads a 100-member committee studying the duties, responsibilities, compensation and ethics of state legislators.

Warren G. Woodward of Dallas will represent Governor Smith on his committee studying use of state-owned aircraft.

Austin attorney Will Davis is chairman of a 15-member Texas study committee on Texas Democratic party structure and convention delegate selection.

Rep. Frank Lombardino is the latest Smith appointee to the Texas Criminal Justice Planning Council.

Dr. George G. Killinger of Huntsville heads a select, seven-member committee that will make recommendations for core curriculum in law enforcement education.

WOMEN WANT RECOGNITION — Representatives of an Equal Opportunity for Women's group ask the Governor's Commission on Status of Women be made permanent, legally-constituted agency with \$100,000 biennial budget.



Bully On A Bus

Bus driver Hawkins noticed that one of his passengers, obviously drunk, was getting belligerent toward a young woman. Hoping things would calm down, Hawkins did not interfere.

But things did not calm down. On the contrary, the man climaxed his outburst by giving the woman a vicious kick in the shins.

In due course, she filed a damage suit against the bus company. And a court ruled that the company was indeed liable. The judge said Hawkins had failed to live up to his legal responsibilities as the "man in charge" of the bus.

As a rule, a bus driver has the duty to do some basic policing of his vehicle. When one passenger menaces another, the driver cannot just take refuge in the role of a neutral bystander.

In fact, he may have to take affirmative action not only against grown-up bullies but also against youthful rascals. In another case several teenagers, armed with rubber bands, began firing paper clips around the interior of their school bus.

Again, the driver followed a hands-off policy. But when a girl was struck in the eye and injured, the bus company was held liable in court. The judge said the driver had an affirmative duty to halt this dangerous game.

Nevertheless, since he is not really a policeman, he does not have to go out of his way to search for trouble. Thus:


An intoxicated passenger jabbed a large pin into another man's hip. The indignant victim later demanded damages from the bus company, pointing out that his attacker had been quarrelsome and profane even before thrusting the pin.

But it also appeared that the fellow had been sitting far back in the bus, and that the driver had simply not been aware of his misbehavior. Accordingly, the court found no grounds for placing blame upon the driver.

"His primary duty," said the judge, "is to give his full attention to the operation of the bus. If he concentrates upon this all-important duty, he cannot give attention to the actions of the passengers unless so unusual as to demand it."



EAST RESULTS WITH WANT ADS

ASC News . . .

by Joe K. Taylor

We are informed that some cotton farmers in areas affected by adverse weather conditions are considering the abandonment of cotton crops in the field. They are wondering whether the harvesting of a poor crop will adversely affect the farm yield for payment purposes in future years. Some figure it might be better to abandon the crop since, for 1970, the proven yield procedure allowed the farm's projected yield to be substituted for any year in which no acreage has harvested.

With carryover stocks at the lowest level they have been in nearly 20 years and with demand exceptionally strong for certain qualities of cotton, especially the lower grades, growers should make every effort this year to harvest as much cotton as possible from their fields in order to supply the markets. The question of whether to harvest a particular field exists for many growers whose cotton has been adversely affected by abnormal weather conditions. It seems that if some profit can be made by harvesting the field, this should be done in order to make the cotton available for domestic and export markets.

Unfortunately, we are not in position at this time to advise growers on the procedures that will be used in determining farm yields for payment purposes under the 1971 program. Not until the farm bill becomes law will we be able to explain the exact procedure to be used for the 1971 program. However, to the extent the law authorizes adjustments to be made for abnormal weather conditions, we will make every effort to administer this provision in a manner that will give fair and equitable treatment to the growers who harvest their full crop in 1970 as compared to the grower who abandons or destrops acreage from which cotton could have harvested.



1911 ACCIDENT AT CROSSING RECALLED BY LOCAL WOMAN

Recent near-tragedies at railroad crossings in our community have reminded one local lady of a train mishap in which she was injured 59 years ago in Brownwood. Miss Pearl Wilburn sent us a copy of the February 9, 1911 Brownwood Banner-Bulletin story about the accident as follows:

"The long expected tragedy was enacted at the Austin Avenue crossing on the Santa Fe last night about eight o'clock when a string of cars, being switched about in the yards, ran down a surrey loaded with young folks and all were more or less seriously injured, and two persons perhaps fatally hurt.

The injured are Miss Pearl Wilburn, cuts on head and under eye, back hurt, finger and thumb on left hand cut off, severe bruises on body and scalp torn.

Miss Lizzie Strother, great gash on the head, scalp torn, body bruises and hurt back.

Miss Stella Rucker, foot cut and hole in ankle.

Ira Rucker, severe bruises about head and body.

The young people had started to the Baptist Church to attend a lecture and when they reached the crossing hesitated a moment on account of an engine which came to a standstill above the crossing. When the engine stopped and the party started to drive across the tracks they did not notice a string of cars coming down the main line. The cars hit the surrey when it was center across the track and the wrecked vehicle was pushed in front of the foremost car for a distance

of 50 yards before the cars were brought to a standstill.

Just how anyone of the party escaped sudden death is a thing that baffles those who have visited the scene of the wreck. Miss Wilburn was taken from under the car at the rear tracks. Her life was perhaps saved only by the fact that the rails on that portion of the track are very heavy and very high and the road bed is clear to the ties. She was probably hurt before she rolled from the wrecked vehicle save for the cutting off of her finger and thumb, and this was done under the wheels. That she had the closest call of her life, if indeed she will recover, is evidenced by the fact that portions of her hair were cut off by the grinding wheels. Her clothing was cut into strips and cloak worn by her was torn into rags.

The injuries of Miss Strother are perhaps more severe than any of the others injured.

(Ed. note: Miss Wilburn stated that soon after the accident in Brownwood, construction started on the Austin Avenue underpass in Brownwood.)
