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Texas Need For Growing One Variety Of Cotton Shown

No matter what one may think of William L. Clayton of Houston, who for a time expressed disapproval of the President and his policies, no one can doubt that he is perhaps the best posted man on cotton and its production and uses of any man in the South. So when he speaks on the subject he should be worth listening to and his remarks heeded.

Clayton has returned from a tour through South America and finds that there is more cotton being produced there than in past years, and that the acreage will probably increase. But he says not yet is there as much cotton grown in South America as the one state of Texas produces.

He also finds that the quality of Texas cotton, as regards staple, is being lowered rather steadily. He attributes this to planting of too many varieties, of planting seed from cotton that was not up to standard and that may have been injured before maturity by adverse weather conditions. It is plain from his statement that the interests of the Texas cotton grower would be served by growing as nearly one variety as can be done profitably, and by making more careful selection of seed than has been the custom in the past.

That is good sense. Any person who grows crops of any sort, cotton or what not, knows that the better the seed the better the product. And quantity production is not always the most profitable for if quality be neglected the additional labor required to harvest the quantity will make the profit much less than if quality were given first consideration.

Clayton thinks consumption of cotton will increase. Texas producers can profit from that increase more if they will produce better quality.

Clean-Up Week Scheduled for April 4 to 11

Austin, Texas, March 18.—The Annual Clean-up and Fire Prevention week will be held April 4 to 11, according to word just received from Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. In observance of this week there will be a joint effort between the State Fire Insurance Department and the State Department of Health.

The warm days of spring will soon be here and everyone is urged to see that their property is cleaned of the accumulation of trash. It is only through individual responsibility and effort that one can have a clean and neat appearing city.

In planning your spring cleaning start with the house itself in the attic and work down, not forgetting the basement. Attics and basements are the greatest collectors of refuse and therefore of dust and dirt that the house possesses, and their neglect often constitutes a serious fire hazard. Do not forget to screen against flies and mosquitoes. The better the job of cleaning, and with a garbage pail kept tightly covered, the fewer flies there will be, because flies love dirt and filth and breed in garbage and other filth.

We are prone to judge people in the no small measure by the kind of yard keepers we think they are. Many times you have heard some one say, "No, I don't know the people next door but they can not amount to much because their yard is cluttered with tin cans and papers and their garbage can is always open." Do not let your neighbors be able to pass judgment on you on such grounds.

Know Texas

DENTON, March 18.—While nations of the world vie with one another in contributing to the progress of aviation, Texas has managed to hold its position as a leader in this field.

Such factors as the great amount of open country in this state, the high percentage of clear days, and the relatively warm winters caused the national government to center its military aviation training here during the World War.

Randolph Field, often called the "West Point of the Air," was established near San Antonio, and is now one of the greatest military fields in the world.

Apart from the army set-up, six commercial airlines operate regular schedules between important cities within the state. They connect with the national lines to Chicago, Atlanta, Ga., Charleston, S. C., and New Orleans, as well as with the transcontinental line from New York to Los Angeles and the international air system to Mexico City.

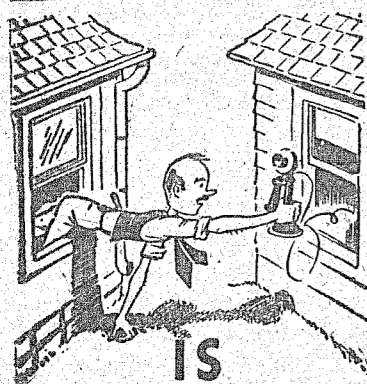
Airports in Texas total 133, this compares favorably with the national total of 2,369. A general idea of this state's rating can further be seen from the 1935 statistics, which show 3,613 airplanes in operations in the United States, 449 being in Texas. The number of licensed pilots in Texas reached 728 in 1936.

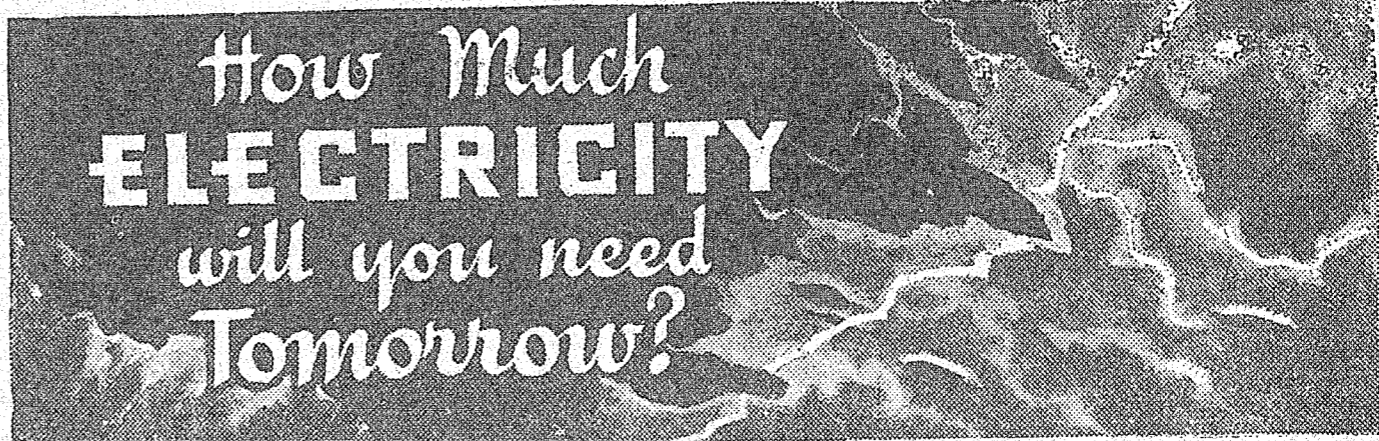
The 48 winners will be taken on industrial tours, Exposition tours and will be welcomed by city officials and officials of the Greater Texas Committee when they arrive in Dallas.

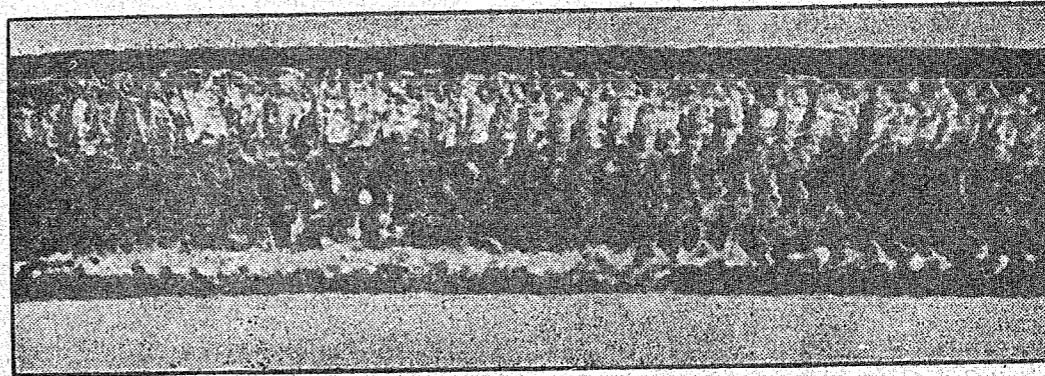


Above: Wire with insulation blistered. Such heating causes energy losses of as much as 25 per cent of light bulb or electric appliance efficiency.

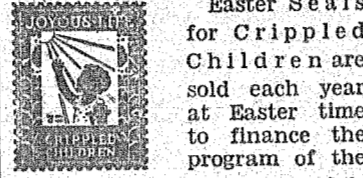

EASTER SEAL SALE OPENS ON MARCH 22

TO CONTINUE UNTIL EASTER

Joyous Life for Crippled Children Is Theme



Easter Seals for Crippled Children are sold each year at Easter time to finance the program of the Texas Society for Crippled Children and this year the seals will be placed on sale March 22 in Santa Anna.

There's a small Miss dressed in green on the seal this year; under one chubby arm is a brown crutch but the other hand is free and is outstretched toward the golden sunlight of opportunity which signifies "Joyous Life" (this year's seal theme) for this and many such small crippled people.

The seals sell for a penny each, \$1.00 per sheet of 100 — not a large sum, but an investment that pays big dividends in building sounder bodies, and brighter minds, as the Texas Society for Crippled Children continues its work.

This is the agency, state-wide organized for the purpose of looking after the welfare of Crippled Children. Its program is one of cooperation with all agencies both public and private, lay and professional to the end that every crippled child may inherit its birthright. This is beautifully stated in Article X of the Crippled Child's "Bill of Rights" which reads:

"In brief, not only for its own sake, but for the benefit of Society as a whole, every crippled child has the right to the best body which modern science can help it to secure; the best mind which modern education can provide; the best training which modern vocational guidance can give; the best position in life which his physical condition, perfected as best it may be, will permit; and the best opportunity for spiritual development which its environment affords."

Ninety per cent of the proceeds remain in Texas to help maintain and extend the program of the Texas Society for Crippled Children. The remainder goes to the International Society for Crippled Children, Inc., which sponsors the seal sale, and spurs world wide interest in the problems of treating and preventing crippledness, and represents the state societies in sponsoring Federal legislation for the benefit of crippled children. A bill has just been prepared by the International Society for Crippled Children for presentation to the present Congress, providing for Federal aid to states in the education of handicapped children.

Proclamation by the Governor of the State of Texas

To All To Whom These Presents Shall Come:

WHEREAS, in the interest of public health and fire prevention, a spring clean-up campaign is conducted annually in Texas to permit the sanitation of yards, premises and alleys, and to remove fire hazards from around buildings, lots and drive ways; and

WHEREAS, the present safety campaign being sponsored in our State by what is known as the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee could be served by giving consideration to those matters which would protect the lives and property of our cities against the spread of disease, disabling sickness and property loss through fire damage; and

WHEREAS, the Texas State Health Department and the State Fire Insurance Department have, together with various civic organizations, suggested April 4 to 11 for this protective work;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JAMES V. ALLRED, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby set aside and proclaim the week of April 4 to 11, 1937, as

STATE CLEAN-UP WEEK in Texas. I call upon the schools, churches, clubs, newspapers, the radio, civic organizations and all good citizens to cooperate in the observance of this week. I further urge that all our citizens consult with their city officials as to the best ways and means of conducting this campaign so that each community may receive maximum benefits.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto signed my name officially and caused the Seal of State to be impressed hereon at Austin, this, the 10th day of March, A. D. 1937.

Roosevelt Issues Challenge to Youth

DENTON, March 17.—Issuing a challenge to youth to face life's problems, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of the President, pointed out that the necessity of earning a living is the first great problem for most young people today. Speaking before a capacity crowd at Texas State College for Women (CIA) Tuesday morning, the First Lady further stated that this problem must be met with two kinds of preparation, one to earn a living, and the other to enjoy living.

Referring to the NYA and CCC setups, she said, "Much of their work may prove to be purely emergency activity, but some may be permanent because it not only meets the needs of certain young people but may be used as laboratories for studying what could be done with larger groups of people elsewhere."

War was emphasized by Mrs. Roosevelt as one of the major problems of youth. She presented an appeal to young people that they study the causes and effects of war as intelligently and as sympathetically toward other nations as possible.

In her evening lecture the wife of the President discussed the "Relationship of an Individual to His Community," and asked that a person "see for himself what conditions in his community needed improving, and then do what he can about them."

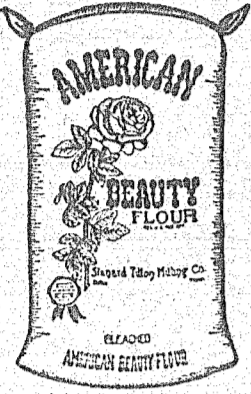
