MOUNTAINEERS AND DRAGONS PLAY 0-0 DEFENSIVE GAME

Under rain coats and umbrellas, football fans saw a defensive battle between the Bangs Dragons and the Santa Anna Mountaineers Friday night. The game ended in a 0-0 tie.

The Mounties won the toss, and Ricky Beal took the kickoff for 5 yard runback. On the third down Horner made a 12 yard run for the first. On fourth and one, Dean punted for 52 yards and Bangs took over. The Dragons made six yards, fumbled and punted. The ball was whistled dead on the Bangs 49. The Mounties did not make first down yardage, and Dean punted for 45 yards.

The Dragons ran the ball out to their 15. On fourth down with three yards needed, the Dragons went for the yardage. Randy Long and Ricky Beal led the defensive group in holding the Dragons to no gain, and Santa Anna offense took over. Eppler made five, but a clipping penalty set the Mounties back 15 yards. Beal made 13 more yards only to be set back by an offside penalty. Dean punted to the end zone, and the Dragons started play on their 20.

David Austin made the first down for Bangs. On the fourth down the Dragons went for the one needed yard. A host of Mountaineers led by Ricky Beal and Long made the stop short of the needed yard, but a Mountaineer penalty gave the Dragons another first down. The Dragons made eight more yards and punted.

The Mounties took the ball for four plays and punted. The Dragons took possession and made their only serious threat during the game. They drove down to Santa Anna territory with Austin making ground yardage. A Fisher to White pass was good for five yards and another first. Lykins attempted a field goal from the Mountaineer 27. The attempt was not good. The Mounties ran one play and the half ended 0-0.

Ronnie Walton started play the second half, kicking off to Dragon Darcy White. White ran to the Mountaineer 10-yard line, but a clipping penalty against the Dragons brought the ball back to the 42-yard line. Bangs did not make the needed yardage and punted. CITY SALES TAX BEGINS TODAY

The City Sales tax, approved by Santa Anna voters on April 4, will go into effect on Thursday, October 1. The

one per cent city tax will be added to the 3 1/2 per cent state sales tax now collected in city business places.

The city portion of the tax will be sent in with the state funds and then returned to the city at the end of each quarter. Local merchants will not have to keep records separately on the city and state tax money.

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In Our Opinion

AS THE 91ST CONGRESS DRAWS to a close, maybe we could look back and see just what they have accomplished.

We really are unable to see very much that they have done except keep up a constant struggle with the executive, something that is not unusual when one party controls Congress and another the executive.

There has been an almost constant fight with the administration over the role of the military in the world, and the repercussion of this struggle has been felt all over the world and has probably cost this country countless lives and also any possibility we ever had of settling the Vietnam issue at the conference table.

The Senate rejected two nominees for the Supreme Court over political issues and finally did confirm two second choices that many feel are not as qualified as the first two nominees.

Although there was much hullabaloo about the easing of Taxes for the middle income group, the final changes in the law did nothing to alleviate the burden of this group. They are still paying the bill.

Actually, we find it hard to put the finger on anything of major consequence that Congress accomplished during its 91st session. Maybe we just don't appreciate the finer points of radical politics.

THE FIRST STEP in the new postal corporation was taken last week when President Nixon appointed nine men to the board of governors who will be in charge of running it.

Most of us are not very optimistic about a government corporation running the postal service, even though many of the men named to the board are prominent business men over the nation who have been successful in their own endeavors.

However we are almost to the point of agreeing to anything that might improve the services of the postal department. Not only have they cut out all window service on Saturdays and all first class mail on Sundays, the time it takes a letter to get from one place to another has been terrible.

The small post offices have been doing their job as usual, but where the hang up seems to be is in the larger offices. Recently a first class letter was mailed in Brownwood to travel ten miles. It was mailed on Monday night in time to be postmarked and handled, but didn't reach its destination until Wednesday morning. Time lapse: almost two days. Where was it all day Tuesday?

Not only could the new board improve on the postal services, it is conceivable that they could cut costs. But being a government board, it is hardly likely. President Nixon has not released the names of the five-member board who will set the postal rates, but should do so before long. The chances of there being anything but an increase in postal rates are slim. When did the government ever cut the cost of anything?

We will just have to take a wait and see position of the corporation, and nobody hopes we are wrong more than we.

The three members of the Community Committee for each community will convene in the county ASCS office on September 25 at 9:00 a. m. to elect one member of the County Committee to serve for a term of three years and one member to complete the term of A. V. Bullard, deceased.

All newly elected committees will take office on October 1.

The County Committee has obligated all ACP funds received for 1970. It is not known if we will get additional 1970 funds, or if we will be permitted to over-allocate and charge such allocation to the 1971 ACP.

In fact, it is not known at this time whether or not we will have an ACP program for 1971.

Farmers are reminded the diverted acres under the cotton, feed grain and wheat program can be grazed beginning Thursday October 1.

Some nearby counties have a different date for grazing the diverted. But the date to begin grazing diverted acres in Coleman County is October 1.

Farmers are again reminded that it will be necessary to identify by farm number the cotton sent to the gin. This is so the ginner may correctly identify the farm number on the gin ticket.

All indications point to the 1970 cotton yield as being instrumental in the cotton payment under the 1971 program. It is very important that each farm planting cotton have an official record of cotton production for 1970.

As soon as we receive official information on the 1971 program, particularly wheat, farmers will be promptly notified.

er penalty was assessed the Mounties, and Bangs maintained possession for three more plays and three yards. Lykins punted for Bangs and the Mounties took over on their own 20.
A SA fumble was recovered by Roddy Dean with no loss of yardage and Horner went through the line for the first down. A fumble in the backfield dropped the Mounties

for a loss. Beal picked up seven yards, not enough for a first, and Dean punted.

The Dragons made six yards in their series, and under a heavy rush by SA, Lykins punted. A big Mountie, Mark Wise, blocked the punt and Santa Anna took the ball on the 50 yard line. Falling to gain yardage, Dean punted to Bangs. Under attack by Mountaineer Roddy Dean, the Dragons lost the ball on downs on the 33-yard line of Santa Anna. The Mounties yardage was short, and Dean

punted. Bangs fumbled the punt, and Mountaineer Ronnie Walton recovered the ball for Santa Anna.

Again the Mounties fell short of yardage, and Rocky Dean punted. The return was halted on the Bangs 10-yard line by Horner and Walton. Austin made a first down for the Dragons, but Roddy Dean and Diaz were instrumental in the defense's holding the Dragons to two yards on the next series of downs.

The Mounties took the ball on their 39, and Horner went up the middle for 10 yards and a first. Dean, Eppler and Beal made yardage of nine on the next series. With fourth and one yard needed, Ricky Beal poned through for the first. On the third play, a SA fumble gave Bangs the ball on their 37.
