HOUSTON-Two hearing aids According one. Or aradiologist Baylor College of Medicine in

"It is usually the right ear, " 'said Dr. James F. Jerger, a professor of
otorhinolaryngology at Baylor, who believes that some hearing probcems result from how sound is processed in the brain, rather than from in the ears.
Speech processing is controlled by the left side of the brain, said Jerger, which means that sounds re-
ceived in the right ear travel directly to the left hemisphere. Sounds received in the left ear, however,
travel first to the right side of the rain, and then cross to the left side the corpus callosum.
"This is probably
he right-ear advantage " he said for For some time, researchers have noticed that people with age-related
hearing loss tend to process hearing loss tend to process sounds
entering the right ear more efficiently.
Jerger studied topographical brain maps of more than 100 patients.
