## Ivie Nearing Spillway Level

Predictions of one of the most popular recreational spots in the state appear on the verge of fulfillment at Lake O.H. Ivie. The Colorado River Municipal Water District's newest reservoir located southwest of Coleman, now has approximately 517,768 acre-feet of water and a surface area of 19,150 acres.

According to personnel at the Colorado River Municipal Water District office, the reservoir topped the 400,000 acre-foot mark the first of Feb. and as of Monday of this week, March 2, it stood at 517,768 acre-feet. The lake elevation level on Monday was 1549.55. Lake water had risen to within two feet of spillway level which is 1551.55. More rain was expected on the lake's watershed on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

When the gates of S.W. Freese Dam closed in April of 1990, the water district officials estimated that with average flow in the two rivers that feed the lake, the Colorado and the Concho, it would take eight

years before the reservoir collected the 554,340 acre-feet of water needed to fill the lake to spillway level. Lake Ivie was, as of Monday, over 90% full.

Joe Pickle, spokesman for the Colorado River Municipal Water District in Big Spring, said one of the most amazing things about the rapid rise of the lake is that it came during the months of Dec., Jan., and Feb., when little or no water usually flows into lakes.

"We ran creel surveys in the late autumn of 1991," noted Bill Follis, San Angelo, marine biologist for the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife. "Fishermen were beginning to catch 18-in. bass (the state limit is 14-in). Most unusual, the survey showed almost universal satisfaction by the fishermen both with results and the 18-in. three bass limit."

This assessment was confirmed by Richard Halfmann, CRMWD's Lake Ivie recreation superintendent. "The heavy rainfall that fell in December blossomed Ivie into a real lake and the rain that has fallen

since then has only added to the abundance of water and brought with it nutrients that will further accelerate fish growth. The number of bass at 18-in. is increasing, and at that you're talking about a 4-lb. fish."

A news release received by the Santa Anna News last week from John A. Dennis, Fisheries Biologist with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, stationed at San Angelo, concerned the stocking of fish at Lake O.H. Ivie. It seems that a rumor has it that striped bass has been stocked in the lake by the Wildlife Department. The rumor has appeared in newspapers across the state. It has also appeared in outdoor and fishing magazines. "We have even been told that it is spreading among bass clubs. The rumor is false," says Dennis, "there have been no striped bass stocked into Ivie."

"Not only have strippers not been stocked into Ivie," said TPWD District Management Biologist Bill

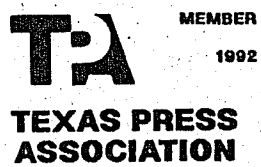

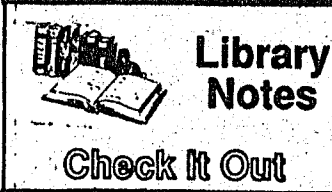

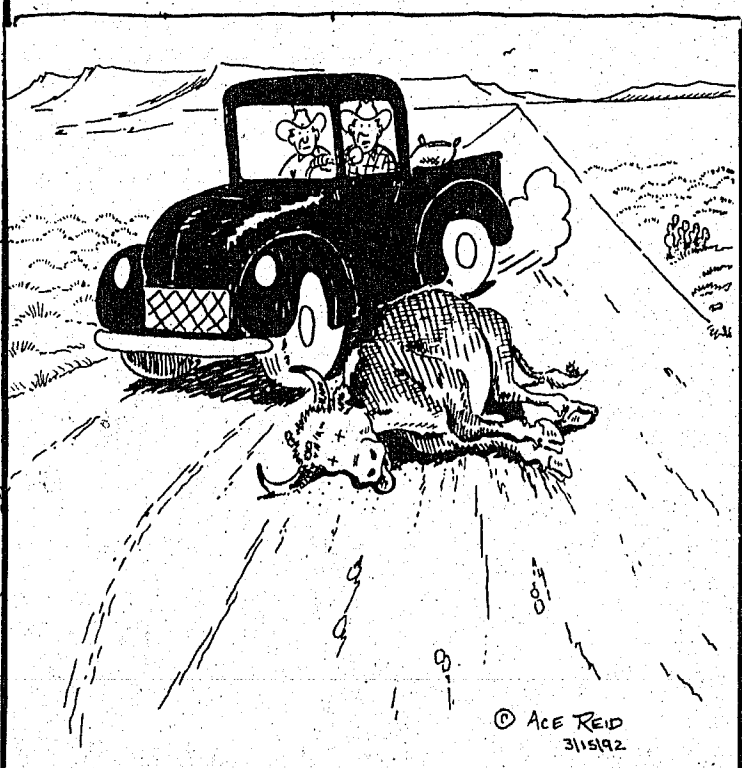

## Saluting People Who Have Helped Shape Local History

Mr. & Mrs. Garland Powell

Garland and Annie Mae (Evans) Powell were both raised in the Buffalo Community northeast of Santa Anna. They were, in fact, high school sweethearts and graduated from Buffalo schools. The couple was married in 1923 and have lived since then in the house where Garland was born and raised.

Mr. Powell says that although the community is commonly known as Buffalo, oldtimers will recognize it as "Poverty Flat." He relates that it received that name one harsh winter in the 1880's when one gentleman decided he had enough and wished to leave. However, times were so bad he couldn't even borrow enough axle grease for his wagon. By spring he was calling the area "Poverty Flat" and the name stuck.

Garland tells of the time in the 1930's when he was serving on a jury and one of the lawyers questioning jurors to be seated asked if he happened to be one of the Powells who lived at "Poverty Flats," this telling him that the nickname of the community had spread.

When asked for some interesting points to expand on in our interview, the Powells answered, "We've just been ordinary folks with the usual ups and downs." These "ordinary folks" raised a son, Darmon Powell, a retired jeweler who resides in Lamesa, and a daughter, Dorothy Burrell of Brownwood. Both graduated from the Buffalo school.

Garland and Annie Mae have two grandsons, one great-grandson and a great-granddaughter who is the first little girl in the family in fifty years. They lament the fact it will be some time before they will be able to see her in person as the family lives in the Netherlands where their grandson, a U.S. Army Colonel, is stationed.

The Powells have always been stockfarmers. Garland quips that he had to farm to raise feed for



the cattle that he also raises. He adds that he has worked in the oilfield, done custom plowing and whatever else he could find to do in order to "put groceries on the table."

The couple are members of First United Methodist Church of Santa Anna, where Garland served as president of the Methodist Men's Club for over twenty years. He also served as chairman of the administrative board, taught Sunday school classes and served in many other areas of the church through the years. Mrs. Powell has also served on various committees in the life of the church. They were members of the Buffalo Methodist Church before it disbanded about the same time that the school closed.

Mr. Powell was a member of the Buffalo school board and served as a director of the Coleman County Farm Bureau for several years.

Garland told the story of how, when he was only seven years of age, his father deposited \$10 each for he and his older brother, in the Santa Anna National Bank. He felt he was rich with his cotton picking money held safe in the bank. That incident started a banking relationship that has lasted for over eighty years, something both he and the bank are proud of.

We salute Garland and Annie Mae Powell for contributing to the history of our area.

taking applications for cost share help. Contact the Soil Conservation Service first, to complete the technical information needed.

The USDA reported that prices paid to farmers and ranchers for raw products increased almost 3% from January to February.

National Agriculture Week will be observed this year, March 15-21.

Non-farmers and ranchers should be aware of the impact agriculture has on the local and national economy. The food and fiber industry accounts for nearly 16 percent of the Gross National Product, and an estimated 21 million jobs. Only ten percent of these jobs are actually on the farm.

The only local election that has created much stir is the Texas Senate race between Bill Sims and Temple Dickson. Both have ties to this area and have voted favorably on agricultural issues. I am not going to endorse either candidate, either one will do a good job representing us in Austin. Be sure to vote, Tuesday, March 10.

Fat cattle prices slipped last week; ending the week at \$75-\$76/cwt. Feeder cattle followed suit, down \$1-\$2/cwt. Slaughter lambs were steady; ending the week at \$60-\$65/cwt. Mexican exports of 20,000 plus lambs and ewes last week fueled the strong prices.

A few local wheat growers managed to fertilize their fields before the four to five inch rains last week. Wheat producers need to fertilize soon to see any results at harvest. Prices are still predicted to top \$4.00/bu. this year, the first time in thirteen years.

Kerry Shropshire, county Agriculture Extension Agent, reports two upcoming meetings. Both will give CEU credits for Private Applicator License holders. 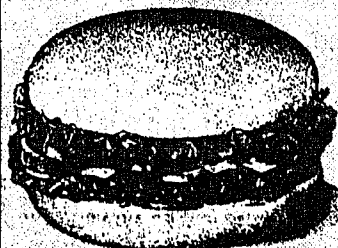

**HIGHLIGHTS**

AUSTIN - Presidential politics dominated the Capitol scene last week, wooing Texans who will vote in next Tuesday's primary:

- President Bush flew in for an international drug war pow-wow held in San Antonio;
  - Former KKK leader David Duke, a Republican, and Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton, a Democrat, sparked some white-black flashes of anger, one inadvertently; and
  - New Hampshire Democratic primary winner Paul Tsongas, backed by Texas Railroad Commissioner Bob Krueger, opened campaign headquarters in Austin, Houston, San Antonio and Dallas.
- A recent poll shows Clinton, who has the support of Land Commissioner Garry Mauro and Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle, leading Texas with more than 40 percent of Democrats.

**The Clinton Flare-up**  
The Clinton flare-up came after he remarked that black leader Jesse Jackson was double-dealing, underhanded and dishonorable for campaigning for primary opponent Tom Harkin.

Clinton thought he was off-the-air, but his remarks were taped and repeated in media news, causing a brief rift that he and Jackson apparently resolved over the phone.

Meanwhile, Duke's words were

deliberate when he said many freedoms that white Texans died for at the Alamo were being threatened by minority take-over.

That prompted appeals court judge Morris Overstreet, the first black elected statewide, to accuse Duke of trying "to incite racism" by invoking the Alamo. This rift was not resolved.

**Poll Predictions**  
Other Texas poll results showed President Bush with 78 percent GOP support; Duke one percent; and Patrick Buchanan 11 percent. Among Democrats, Tsongas was second with more than 30 percent and closing.

**Redistricting Lawsuit**  
The U.S. Supreme Court refused to speed up its review of new state senate districts, the last chance for Texas Democrats to postpone the primary many predict will gain GOP senate seats.

Meanwhile, Attorney General Dan Morales, investigating GOP lawmaker ties to the court-ordered senate map decision, said 36 calls were made from the offices of 12 legislators to Judge James Nowlin, who wrote the plan.

Morales said nine were Republicans, three were Democrats. But Rep. Alan Schoolcraft, R-San Antonio, one of those targeted by Morales, also from San Antonio, said he had telephone records showing calls to Nowlin made from 11 Democrat legislative offices.

**Bullock Joins Law Firm**  
Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock fueled a bit of controversy last week by taking a position with an Austin law firm which has represented several clients before state agencies.

Bullock, who makes \$7,200 annually as presiding officer of the Senate, will be "of counsel" to Scott, Douglass & Luton for an undisclosed salary.

The firm is not registered as a lobbyist, but state agencies have come under fire from Morales and

the media for hiring lobbyists as lawyers when the legislature is not in session.

State law prohibits agencies from hiring lobbyists.

While Bullock is not expected to appear before state agencies, public concern comes from the fact that he presides over the Senate which co-writes state agency budgets, and could exert undue influence from that unique position.

**Other Highlights**  
■ Gov. Ann Richards has a 70 percent approval rating as she heads into her second year in office, according to a *Houston Chronicle* poll. The approval rating is the highest ever posted for a Texas governor in at least 14 years, said University of Houston Political scientist Richard Murray, who conducted the poll.

■ When Texas Congressman Joe Barton clipped \$50,000 into an appropriation bill to provide for drug testing of members of Congress, Oregon Rep. Peter DeFazio countered with an amendment to use the money for congressional IQ tests.

■ U.S. District Judge James Nowlin of Austin has set a March 13 hearing to decide whether to dismiss a challenge to the Texas Supreme Court's ruling that the new school property tax is unconstitutional but must be paid.

■ Texas added more new manufacturing facilities over the past three years than other states, according to the Texas Department of Commerce.

■ Harris County Democratic Party chairman Ken Bentsen, son of U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, is a defendant in a \$70 million lawsuit brought by investors against bond sellers for alleged violations of federal and state security laws.

■ Comptroller John Sharp hired a not-for-profit consulting firm, Battelle Memorial Institute of Ohio, at \$90,000 to review contract proposals for starting the Texas lottery.

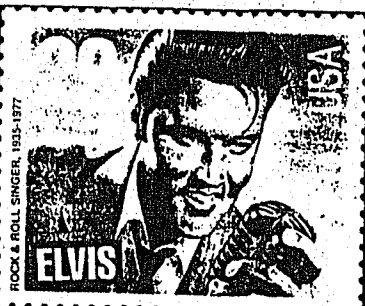
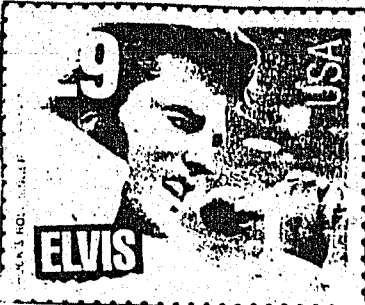

### Voting on Elvis Presley Stamp Taking Place at Post Office

Postmaster General Frank recently unveiled two stamp designs featuring Elvis Presley, one of which will appear on a Legend of American Music Series stamp to be issued in the spring of 1993. The public interest in the stamp will likely remain high until the final image for the stamp is selected and announced in May.

### Why an Elvis stamp? The Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee felt it was appropriate to have a stamp series honoring American musicians, and the Committee and Mr. Frank decided it would be impossible not to include Elvis. Elvis will be one of several musicians to appear in a stamp booklet. The Elvis stamp also will be available by itself in sheet form.

The public will determine which of the two Elvis images will appear on the stamp through a first-ever poll conducted at local post offices between April 6 and 24. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS, REGULATING SOLICITORS, PEDDLERS, AND MERCHANTS GOING IN AND UPON PREMISES WITHIN THE CORPORATE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA; PROVIDING FOR EXEMPTIONS; PROVIDING A REPEALING CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING A PENALTY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: No person, firm or corporation, except as in this Article provided, shall solicit orders for the sale of merchandise or other thing of value or peddle merchandise or other thing of value upon the premises within the corporate city limits of the City of Santa Anna without having secured a written permit from the City of Santa Anna. Any person, firm or corporation who or which is unknown to at least twenty-five (25) inhabitants of this City and who makes application for a permit shall deposit with the City of Santa Anna the sum of Five Hundred and No/100. (\$500.00) Dollars as bond to guarantee his or its good, honorable and lawful actions while soliciting for orders for sale of merchandise or other thing of value or peddling merchandise or other thing of value upon the premises of the City of Santa Anna and further guarantee that all orders taken for merchandise will be properly filled and the merchandise received either from direct sale or received after the taking of an order will be in all things as represented to the purchasing party; and in addition thereto said applicant shall pay the city of Santa Anna the cost of investigating the reputation and dependability of the applicant.

SECTION 2: Said permit shall not be issued unless and until said application shall by said investigation be proven to have reasonably good reputation, reliability and dependability and in order to defray part of the expense necessary to provide the surveillance and inspection of persons, firm or corporation as required under the terms of this ordinance there is hereby fixed a permit fee or police tax which shall be collected from any person, firm or corporation employing two (2) or more persons for the purpose of going in and upon the premises within the corporate city limits of the City of Santa Anna and soliciting for orders of merchandise or the sale of merchandise who calls upon the premises within the corporate city limits of the City of Santa Anna shall be collected a license fee or police tax of Ten and No/100 (\$10.00) Dollars per annum. If permit is granted during the calendar year, the fee shall be pro rate for the balance of the calendar year and in no event shall there be any refund of permit fee or police tax paid under this ordinance. The fee shall be paid to the City of Santa Anna, who shall issue a receipt therefor on a form prepared for that purpose.

SECTION 3: The permit set out herein shall in all things be personal to the applicant therefor, no permit shall cover more than one person, firm or corporation, and said permits shall be assignable. Permits shall be for a period of one (1) year and may be canceled by the Mayor for good cause shown and his/her decision thereon shall be final. It shall be the duty of each holder of a permit as set out above to have in his possession at all times the above mentioned permit.

SECTION 4: Said permit shall be issued to any person, firm or corporation who or which has an established place of business in the City of Santa Anna and has had for a period of one (1) consecutive calendar year prior to the application for said permit without payment of any permit fee, investigation fee or bond, upon presentation by him or it to the Mayor or recommendation of at least four (4) persons whose reliability is generally known to the Mayor of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, which persons have been customers of said person, firm or corporation during the year previous and whose recommendation shall state that he or it is honest, dependable and reliable and of good reputation.

SECTION 5: Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred and No/100 (\$200.00) Dollars, and each day shall be considered a separate offense.

SECTION 6: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

SECTION 7: In the event any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance shall be declared or adjudged invalid or unconstitutional such adjudication shall in no means affect any other section, sub-section, clause or phrase of this ordinance but all the rest thereof shall be in full force and effect, just as though the section, sub-section, sentence, or clause so declared or adjudged invalid or unconstitutional was not originally a part thereof.

SECTION 8: The fact that the present ordinance of the City of Santa Anna regulating solicitors, peddlers, itinerant merchants and transient vendors of merchandise needs to be changed in order to protect the welfare of the citizens of the City of Santa Anna, creates an urgency and imperative public necessity and emergency that the rule providing that ordinances be read on three (3) times before final passage thereof be and the same is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force after its passage and it is so enacted.

Follis, "there is currently no plan to stock strippers into Ivie." Follis added that no more largemouth bass would be stocked since the bass stocked in 1990 grew to maturity and spawned in 1991. Since the bass are protected to 18 inches there is a tremendous number of broodfish in the population. With all the new water the lake has caught this spring, those fish will spawn and produce an uncountable number of young. Due to that, TPWD is not going to stock Ivie with bass this year, but stock other lakes that have been shorted the past two years due to the large number of fish sent to Ivie.

The following is a list of all fish stocked into Ivie since 1989:

Florida largemouth bass - 2,420,681; Smallmouth bass - 120,802; White crappie - 306,299; Southern strain walleye - 2,495,000; Channel catfish - 390,436; Blue catfish - 385,891; Flathead (yellow) catfish - 3,013; Coppernose bluegill - 332,548; and Threadfin shad - 300 adults.

Facilities at Lake Ivie are being developed steadily, according to Halfmann. At Kennedy Park, Concessionaire Raymond Wilson has completed and is operating a store. He has completed one double cabana with baths and has another due for completion within about a month. He has 10 mobile home hookups in operation and is working on a trailer park with a dozen hookups. The district has provided a 4-lane concrete boat ramp for the public, plus picnic units and restrooms. Completion of extended FM1929 in the spring will vastly increase assessability, although there currently are two dirt roads to the Park.

Concho Park on the south side has restroom and mobile picnic units in place, and recent rises have inundated a second boat ramp, thus providing two 4-lane ramps for public boat launching.

The Padgett Park on the north side has a 4-lane boat ramp, restrooms, mobile picnic units, and is assessable from FM2134. Safety and rescue programs and facilities are in place, said Halfmann.
